Topics will include the Founding Fathers, Native Americans, the American Revolution, slavery, citizenship, and much more.

Additionally, we will engage in discussions on important and sometimes sensitive topics such as reproductive rights, religion, politics, immigration, and other issues vital to understanding U.S. history. Daily Routines

While this is a History class. My other goals are to help you develop as readers, writers, and analytical thinkers. Most days will involve one or more of the following activities:

- Short journals with a minimum response of five sentences (Why do we write?)
- Reading *excerpts* from books and articles
- Annotation of text for both comprehensive and deeper analysis
- Class discussions
- Analysis of pictures and short videos
- Individual and group projects
- Essays, quizzes, and tests, & projects

Classwork and Homework

Classwork must be finished during class time; unfinished work becomes homework. Late work requires approval from Mr. Quinones and must be submitted within one week of the original due date, no exceptions. Tests and quizzes may be retaken up to two times after attending a tutoring session, with retake scores capped at 80% to encourage growth while maintaining standards.

Behavioral Expectations

All school rules will be enforced as well as the following expectations and policies:

Respect our safe learning space. Everybody deserves to feel safe and included while they are learning from and teaching each other. Behaviors such as bullying and distracting the class from learning are harmful and will be dealt with.

<u>Listen and Learn.</u> Everybody here can learn a lot from each other. When someone else is speaking, please allow them the space to be heard. **Talking over anyone is not permitted.**

<u>Leave all electronics in your pockets or backpacks.</u> Electronic devices, including phones, earbuds, and earpods, are not permitted during class unless instructed otherwise. On the first offense, the teacher will confiscate the device for the class period. For a second offense, the device will be sent to the office for parent pick-up. Recurring issues will result in immediate office submission for parent pick-up without warning

<u>Makeup Clause</u> The use of makeup or other personal grooming products during class is not allowed, as it disrupts the learning environment. Students should take care of personal grooming before or after class. Failure to do so will result in makeup confiscation
