SB 1381 changed the required birthday for admission to kindergarten and first grade and established a Transitional Kindergarten (TK) Program beginning in the 2012-13 school year. TK is an opportunity to provide the early foundations for school success for those children turning 5 years old between September and December.

The first year of a two-year kindergarten experience, a child is eligible for transitional kindergarten if the child will have his/her fifth birthday between:

- November 2 and December 2, for the 2012-13 school year
- October 2 and December 2, for the 2013–14 school year
- September 2 and December 2, for the 2014-15 school year and each school year thereafter

RATIONALE:

AGREEMENT BETWEEN RANCHO SANTIAGO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT/ SANTA ANA COLLEGE AND SANTA ANA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

This Agreement is entered into on the 5th day of December, 2011 between Rancho Santiago Community College District (hereinafter "RSCCD") and Santa Ana Unified School District (hereinafter "SAUSD").

WHEREAS, RSCCD has received a grant entitled Gaining Early Awareness & Readiness for Undergraduate Programs (GEAR UP) 2009 (Grant No. P334A090134; CFDA # 84.334A) from the U.S. Department of Education significantly increase the number of low-income students who are prepared to enter and succeed in postsecondary education, and

WHEREAS, SAUSD has agreed to participate in the purpose of this grant, and

WHEREAS, RSCCD has the right to enter into agreements with outside entities for various services with the approval of the Board of Trustees;

NOW, THEREFORE the RSCCD and SAUSD do covenant and agree as follows:

TERM

1 1

1. The effective term of this Agreement shall be from the period beginning July 31, 2011 and ending July 30, 2012 and shall be in the amount of \$173,827 and subject to the provisions of this Agreement. **SAUSD** further agrees to contribute \$749,996 as match during this same period set forth in as *Exhibit A*, *Budget Narrative*, which by this reference is incorporated herein and made a part hereof as if fully set forth. An extension may be granted in writing from the U.S. Department of Education (approving authority).

PURPOSE

2. The purpose of the program is to increase the number of low-income students who are prepared to enter and succeed in postsecondary education. SAUSD shall ensure that the program funded hereby shall comply with this purpose.

COMPLIANCE WITH LAW

- 3. In its performance under this Agreement, SAUSD shall fully comply with the requirements of the following, whether or not otherwise referred to in this Agreement:
 - (a) The Higher Education Act of 1965, Title IV, Part A, Subpart 2 Chapter 2 Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs.
 - (b) The Education Department General Administrative Regulations (EDGAR): (a) 34 CFR 74, 75, 77, 79, 80, 81, 82, 84, 85, 86, 97, 98, and 99; (b) the regulations for this program in 34 CFR part 694.

- (c) All applicable standards and orders and requirements issued under Section 306 of the Clean Air Act, Section 508 of the Clean Water Act and Environmental Protection Agency regulations in contracts in excess of \$100,000.
- (d) All applicable State statutes, regulations, policies, procedures and directives;
- (e) All applicable local ordinances and requirements, including use permits and licensing;
- (f) Court orders applicable to its operation; and
- (g) The terms and conditions of this Agreement.

If any of the foregoing is enacted, amended, or revised, SAUSD will comply with such or will notify RSCCD after enactment or modification that it cannot so comply. RSCCD may thereupon terminate this Agreement, if necessary.

STATEMENT OF WORK

This Agreement is based on the Application for Federal Education Assistance included as Exhibit C to this Agreement. SAUSD agrees to comply with all provisions, to perform all work, and to provide all services set forth in this Agreement and the aforementioned Application for Federal Education Assistance in a professional, timely and diligent manner. The parties hereto agree that concerning matters not specifically contained within the body of this Agreement, the Application for Federal Education Assistance will be controlling.

SAUSD shall utilize funding provided under this Agreement to support the following:

- 1) Math Specialists at Carr and McFadden Intermediate Schools
- 2) Language Arts Specialists at Carr and McFadden Intermediate Schools
- 3) Substitute teachers
- 4) Buses for college and campus tours
- 5) Attendance at conferences
- 6) Educational software

MODIFICATION OF PROGRAM COMPONENTS AND SERVICE LEVELS

5. The parties hereto agree that those program components and service levels detailed in Exhibit A may be modified so long as the total payments under this Agreement are not increased and the project scope, objectives, and key personnel (in accordance with 34 CFR 74.25 (c)(2) and/or 34 CFR 80.30 (d)(3)) of the program are not altered. However, any such modification shall not be made without the prior written notification of RSCCD. Any requests for changes in scope, objectives or key personnel requires written approval and should be coordinated through RSCCD for submission to the U.S. Department of Education.

PLANS AND PROCEDURES

6. SAUSD shall monitor its program for compliance with the provisions of this Agreement and all applicable laws, regulations and its institutional policies and procedures.

REPORTS

7. SAUSD shall submit such reports, data and information at such times as RSCCD may require, and in the form RSCCD may require, regarding the performance of SAUSD's services, or SAUSD's activities, costs or other data. Such reports shall include information and data for the annual performance report (financial information as specified in 34 CFR 75.118, and program activity documentation), which will be due April 1 of each year. The Annual Report Template is incorporated by reference and attached hereto as Exhibit B, which by this reference is incorporated herein and made a part hereof as if fully set forth.

NO SUPPLANTATION

8. Funds provided under this Agreement shall be used only for activities that are in addition to those that would otherwise be available in the absence of such funds. SAUSD shall not render the same services under this Agreement to any participant whose cost of services is otherwise paid for by any other person or entity.

INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

9. SAUSD agrees that the service provided hereunder are rendered in its capacity as an independent contractor and that it is not in any way an agent of RSCCD, nor shall its employees be entitled to any personnel benefits of RSCCD whatsoever.

SUBCONTRACT ASSIGNMENT

10. None of the duties of, or work to be performed by, SAUSD under this Agreement shall be Sub-contracted or assigned to any agency, consultant, or person without the prior written consent of RSCCD. No subcontract or assignment shall terminate or alter the legal obligation of SAUSD pursuant to this Agreement. SAUSD shall insure that all subcontracts for services and contracted staff are procured in a manner consistent with Federal and local SAUSD guidelines. SAUSD shall itemize all sub-contractor and contracted staff costs in the budget so it is clear how the funds will be allocated and spent by each. By entering into this Agreement SAUSD agrees that it is the direct provider of intended services. Upon request, SAUSD shall submit to RSCCD copies of all sub-contracts for services and contracted staff, and other agreements, as well as documentation indicating the approving authority's approval, that relate to this Agreement.

CONTINGENCY OF FUNDS

11. SAUSD acknowledges that approval of and funding for this Agreement in accordance with 34 CFR 75.253 is contingent upon U.S. Department of Education approval, receipt of funds from, and obligation of funds by, the U.S. Department of Education to RSCCD. Department will consider continued funding if: (1) Congress has appropriated sufficient funds under the program, (2) the Department determines that continuing the project would be in the best interests of the government, (3) the recipient has made substantial progress toward meeting the objectives in its approved application, and (4) the recipient has submitted reports of project performance and budget expenditures that meet reporting requirements found at 34 CFR 73.118 and any other requirements deemed necessary. If such approval, funding, or appropriations are not forthcoming, or are otherwise limited, RSCCD shall notify SAUSD immediately and in writing. Immediately upon such notice SAUSD shall modify or cease operations as directed by RSCCD. If the approving authority determines that modification of SAUSD's operations hereunder is preferable to cessation of such operations, within thirty (30) days of said written

notice, RSCCD and SAUSD shall negotiate necessary modifications to this Agreement and/or reimbursement of costs incurred hereunder.

BUDGET SCHEDULE

12. **SAUSD** agrees that the expenditures of any and all funds under this Agreement will be in accordance with the approved budget, a copy of which is attached hereto as part of the Application for Federal Education Assistance, *Exhibit A*, and which by this reference is incorporated herein and made a part hereof as if fully set forth. The **SAUSD** may spend unexpended funds in the following budget period for any allowable cost that falls within the scope and objectives of the project (See Carryover, Section 14).

MODIFICATION OF BUDGET SCHEDULE

13. SAUSD shall have the authority to transfer allocated program funds from one category of the overall program budget to any other category of the overall program budget, as long as the amount of the total grant is not increased and the scope of the program is not altered. Where the scope of the program is altered and results in need for a change in the budget, written approval is required and should be coordinated through RSCCD for submission to the U.S. Department of Education.

CARRYOVER

14. SAUSD may spend unexpended funds in a following budget period for any allowable cost(s) that fall(s) within the scope and objectives of the project, not just for expenditures arising out of uncompleted activities. However, if during the course of program monitoring reservations are developed on behalf of the approving authority about the SAUSD's use of such funds, a written statement from the SAUSD describing the ways it intends to use the remaining funds may be required.

TIME EXTENSIONS

15. The end date of the project period may be extended on a one-time only basis for a period of up to twelve (12) months without the need to receive prior approval from the approving authority except where such an extension would: (1) require additional federal funds, (2) change the scope or objectives of the project, (3) be merely for the purpose of exhausting unexpended funds, and (4) be contrary to federal statute, regulation, or grant conditions.

SUBMISSION OF INVOICES

- 16. Upon the effective date of this Agreement, **RSCCD** shall make payments to **SAUSD** in accordance with the following payment schedule:
 - a. <u>Payments</u>. Beginning July 31, 2011, no more often than once per quarter and no less than once per year, upon receipt and approval by RSCCD of SAUSD's invoice, showing itemized expenditures in accordance with the invoice template provided as *Exhibit C*, RSCCD shall make reimbursement payments as long as the total payments under this Agreement do not exceed \$173,827.

FISCAL ACCOUNTABILITY

- 17. (a) <u>Financial Management System</u>. **SAUSD** shall establish and maintain a sound financial management system, based upon generally accepted accounting principles. **SAUSD's** system shall provide fiscal control and accounting procedures that will include the following:
 - (1) Information pertaining to this Agreement and contract awards, obligations, unobligated balances, assets, expenditures, and income;
 - (2) Effective internal controls to safeguard assets and assure their proper use;
 - (3) Source documentation to support accounting records; and
 - (4) Proper charging of costs and cost allocation.
 - (b) SAUSD's Records. SAUSD's records shall be sufficient to:
 - (1) Permit preparation of required reports;
 - (2) Permit the tracing of funds to a level of expenditure adequate to establish that funds have not been used in violation of the applicable restrictions on the use of such funds; and
 - (3) Permit the tracing of program income, or profits earned, and any costs incurred that are otherwise allowable except for funding limitations.
 - (c) <u>Costs Charged</u>. Costs shall be charged to this contract only in accordance with the following:
 - (1) Approved Application for Federal Assistance (Exhibit A)
 - (2) The Education Department General Administrative Regulations (EDGAR)
 - (3) Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circulars A-21 (2 CFR 220) and A-110 (2 CFR 215)
 - (d) <u>Cost Principles.</u> In all cases of any type of personnel must be supported by complete and accurate record-keeping of time and effort reports, which will be due quarterly.

ANNUAL AUDIT

18. SAUSD shall arrange for an independent audit of their federal funds in accordance with OMB Circular A-133. This program should be listed in their Schedule of Federal Expenditures. SAUSD shall submit a copy of each required audit report to RSCCD within thirty (30) days after the date received by the SAUSD.

ACCESS AND RECORDS

19. (a) Access. RSCCD, the U.S. Department of Education, and the United States Government and/or their representatives, shall have access, for purposes of monitoring auditing, and examining, to SAUSD's activities, books, documents and papers (including computer records) and to records of SAUSD's subcontractors, consultants, contracted employees, bookkeepers, accountants, employees and participants related to this Agreement. Such agencies or representatives shall have the right to make excerpts, transcripts and photocopies of such records

and to schedule on-site monitoring at their discretion. Monitoring activities also may include, but are not limited to, questioning employees and participants and entering any premises or onto any site in which any of the services or activities funded hereunder are conducted or in which any of the records of SAUSD are kept. In the event SAUSD does not make the above-referenced documents available within the County of Orange, California, SAUSD agrees to pay all necessary and reasonable expenses incurred by RSCCD in conducting any audit at the location where said records and books of account are maintained.

(b) Records Retention. All accounting records and evidence pertaining to all costs of SAUSD and all documents related to this Agreement shall be kept available at SAUSD's office or place of business for the duration of this Agreement and thereafter for three (3) years after completion of an audit. Records which relate to (1) complaints, claims, administrative proceedings or litigation arising out of the performance of this Agreement, or (2) costs and expenses of this Agreement to which RSCCD or any other government agency takes exception, shall be retained beyond the three (3) year period until final resolution or disposition of such appeals, litigation, claims, or exceptions.

FRAUD

20. SAUSD shall immediately report all suspected or known instances and facts concerning possible fraud, abuse or criminal activity under this Agreement, in accordance with the applicable federal laws and regulations.

NONDISCRIMINATION AND COMPLIANCE PROVISIONS

- 21. As a condition of this award of financial assistance under the U.S. Department of Education to SAUSD from RSCCD, SAUSD assures, with respect to operation of all programs or activities funded with funds provided pursuant to the Act, and all agreements to carry out such programs or activities, that it will comply fully with the nondiscrimination and equal opportunity provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended; section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended; the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, as amended; and with all applicable requirements imposed by or pursuant to regulations implementing those laws, including, but not limited to, 34 CFR part 100 et seq. The United States, the State of California and RSCCD have the right to seek judicial enforcement of this assurance.
- (a) During the performance of this Agreement, SAUSD and its subcontractors will not deny the Agreement's benefits to any person on the basis of race, ancestry, national origin, religion, color, ethnic group identification, sex, age, physical or mental disability (including HIV and AIDS), medical condition (cancer), marital status, nor will they unlawfully discriminate, harass or allow harassment against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, ancestry, religion, color, ethnic group identification, national origin, ancestry, mental or physical disability (including HIV and AIDS), medical condition (cancer), marital status, age (over 40), sex, denial of family care leave, or political affiliation or belief. SAUSD will insure that the evaluation and treatment of employees and applicants for employment are free from such discrimination and harassment.
- (b) SAUSD will include the non-discrimination and compliance provisions of this Section of the Agreement in all subcontracts to perform work under this Agreement.
- (c) SAUSD will give written notice of its obligations under this Section of the Agreement to labor organizations with which SAUSD has a collective bargaining or other agreement.

CONFIDENTIALITY

22. Without prejudice to any other section of this Agreement, SAUSD shall, where applicable, maintain the confidential nature of information provided to it concerning participants in accordance with the requirements of federal and state laws. However, SAUSD shall submit to RSCCD, the U.S. Department of Education, and/or the United States Government or their representatives, all records requested for administrative purposes, including audit, examinations, monitoring and verification of reports submitted by SAUSD, costs incurred and services rendered hereunder.

PROPERTY

23. (a) Definitions

- 1. "Real Property" is land, including land improvements, structures, and appurtenances thereto, excluding movable machinery and equipment.
- 2. "Equipment":
 - a. For purchase before July 1, 1993, "equipment" is tangible non-expendable personal property having an acquisition const of \$1,000 or more per unit.
 - i. For purchase on or after July 1, 1993, "equipment" is tangible nonexpendable personal property having a useful life of more than one year and an acquisition cost of \$5,000 or more per unit.
- (b) Property Management. SAUSD shall budget, manage and maintain an inventory or property in accordance the standards established by the U.S. Government. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 20, SAUSD shall retain records pertaining to all equipment or property described above, and to costs incurred with respect thereto, for a period of three (3) years after final disposition of such property. Cost of equipment shall immediately return all equipment, finished or unfinished documents, photographs, data, studies and reports or unused supplies prepared or purchased by SAUSD under this Agreement to RSCCD or its representatives, or dispose of them in accordance with directions from RSCCD.

INDEMNIFICATION

- 24. (a) SAUSD shall indemnify, hold harmless and defend RSCCD, its School Board, its officers, agents and employees from any and all claims, demands, loss, liability, injury death, suits or judgments arising out of or alleged to arise out of or in consequence of SAUSD's performance of this Agreement, or any act or omission of SAUSD, its officers, agents or employees, including, but not limited to, and without waiving the generality of the foregoing, any audit disallowances or sums expended by SAUSD in violation of federal, State or RSCCD requirements or of this Agreement, or any negligent or intentional acts or omissions of SAUSD, its officers, agents or employees which injure or damage any participants or other third parties, including RSCCD personnel representatives. SAUSD shall forthwith remit all sums due RSCCD, along with the legal rate of interest pursuant to this paragraph.
- (b) RSCCD shall indemnify, hold harmless and defend SAUSD, its Board of Trustees, its officers, agents and employees from any and all claims, demands, loss, liability, injury death, suits or judgments arising out of or alleged to arise out of or in consequence of RSCCD's performance of this Agreement, or any act or omission of RSCCD, its officers, agents or employees, including, but not limited to, and without waiving the generality of the foregoing, any audit disallowances or sums expended by RSCCD in violation of federal, State or SAUSD

requirements or of this Agreement, or any negligent or intentional acts or omissions of RSCCD, its officers, agents or employees which injure or damage any participants or other third parties, including SAUSD personnel representatives. RSCCD shall forthwith remit all sums due SAUSD, along with the legal rate of interest pursuant to this paragraph.

INSURANCE

25. SAUSD shall secure and maintain comprehensive general liability insurance covering personal injury, property damage, and general liability claims in the amount of at least one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and three million dollars (\$3,000,000) in the aggregate with coverage for incidental contracts. A certificate of insurance must be provided that includes a thirty (30) day notice of cancellation, modification, or reduction in said insurance. SAUSD shall deliver certificate(s) of insurance under SAUSD's comprehensive general liability insurance policy on or before the date of execution of this agreement. Upon request, RSCCD shall be provided a copy of said policy.

SAUSD shall provide workers' compensation coverage for each of its employees. SAUSD and RSCCD shall each be responsible for providing coverage for their own students.

PATENT/COPYRIGHT MATERIALS/PROPRIETATY INFORMATION

26. SAUSD agrees to grant RSCCD, the U.S. Department of Education, and/or the United States Government a royalty-free, nonexclusive and irrevocable license to publish, copy, translate or use, now and hereafter, all materials, data, films, tapes, etc., developed under this Agreement. RSCCD, the U.S. Department of Education, and/or the United States Government reserve the right to authorize others to use or reproduce such materials. Further, these parties shall have access to any report, preliminary findings or data assembled by SAUSD under this Agreement and in accordance with 34 CFR 75.621, any publication filed by a grantee for an invention made under a grant must include the following statement in the first paragraph: "The invention described in this application was made under a grant from the Department of Education."

STANDARDS OF CONDUCT

- 27. (a) General Assurance. Every reasonable course of action will be taken by SAUSD in order to maintain the integrity of this expenditure of public funds and to avoid favoritism and questionable or improper conduct. This Agreement will be administered in an impartial manner, free from efforts to gain personal financial or political gain. SAUSD, its officers and employees, in administering this Agreement, will avoid situations which give rise to a suggestion that any decision was influenced by prejudice, bias, special interest or desire for personal gain.
- (b) <u>Conducting Business Involving Relatives</u>. No relative by blood, adoption or marriage of any executive or employee of **SAUSD** will receive favorable treatment when considered for enrollment in programs provided by, or employment with, **SAUSD**.
- (c) <u>Conducting Business Involving Close Personal Friends and Associates</u>. Executives of **SAUSD** will be particularly aware of the varying degrees of influence that can be exerted by personal friends and associates and, in administering this Agreement, will exercise due diligence to avoid situations which give rise to an assertion that favorable treatment is being granted to friends and associates. When it is in the public interest for **SAUSD** to conduct business with a

friend or associate of an executive or employee of SAUSD, or an elected official in the area, a permanent record of the transaction will be retained.

(d) Avoidance of Economic Interest. No executive or employee of SAUSD, elected official in the area, will solicit or accept money or any other consideration from a third person, for the performance of an act reimbursed in whole or part by SAUSD or RSCCD. Supplies, materials, equipment or services purchased with Agreement funds will be used solely for purposes allowed under this Agreement.

ASSURANCES

28. **SAUSD** shall execute and abide by the Assurance-Non-Construction Programs attached hereto as *Exhibit D* and incorporated herein by this reference.

DEBARMENT

29. SAUSD certifies that it is not debarred or suspended or otherwise excluded from or ineligible for participation in Federal programs in accordance with 34 CFR Part 85 (See Exhibit E).

LOBBYING

- 30. As required by Section 1352, Title 31, of the U.S. Code, and implemented at 34 CFR Part 82 (See *Exhibit F*), **SAUSD** certifies that:
- (a) No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of the undersigned, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the making of any Federal grant, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal grant or cooperative agreement;
- (b) If any funds other than Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this Federal grant or cooperative agreement, the undersigned shall complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions.

LITERATURE AND PUBLIC ANNOUNCEMENTS

31. Any literature distributed by SAUSD for the purpose of apprising businesses, participants, or the general public of its programs under this Agreement shall state and acknowledge, in accordance with 34 CFR 75.620, the support of the Department of Education in publicizing the work under this agreement in any medium. This acknowledgement shall read substantially as follows:

"This project has been funded at least in part with Federal funds from the U.S. Department of Education under grant award number P334A090134. The content of this publication does not necessarily reflect the views or policies of the U.S. Department of Education nor does mention of trade names, commercial products, or organizations imply endorsement by the U.S. Government."

Any public announcements disclosing the federal funding must conform to the requirements and guidelines in *Exhibit G*.

BREACH - SANCTIONS

32. If, through any cause, SAUSD violates any of the terms and conditions of this Agreement, or any prior Agreements whereby grant funds were received by SAUSD, or if SAUSD reports inaccurately, or if any audit report makes disallowances, SAUSD shall promptly remedy its acts or omissions and/or repay RSCCD all amounts due RSCCD as a result thereof. For any such failures or violations RSCCD shall also have the right, at its sole discretion, to: (1) immediately discontinue program support until such time as SAUSD fulfills its obligations or remedies all violations of this Agreement or prior Agreements; and/or (2) collect outstanding amounts, as determined by RSCCD to be due RSCCD from SAUSD, by offsetting or debiting from current claims or invoices, if after thirty (30) days written notice SAUSD has failed to repay same or a repayment schedule has not been made; and/or (3) terminate this Agreement in accordance with Section 35 herein.

DISPUTES

33. In the event of a dispute between the parties, the aggrieved party shall notify the other party and provide a detailed description of the alleged problem. The parties agree to use reasonable efforts to resolve such dispute by good faith negotiations and mutual agreement. In the event such informal resolution is not successful within a reasonable period of time, the parties hereby agree that such dispute will be resolved in the manner specified below.

Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, any dispute concerning any question arising under this Agreement shall be decided by RSCCD or the Department of Education. In such a case, the decision shall be reduced to writing and a copy thereof shall be mailed or otherwise furnished to SAUSD. The decision shall be final and conclusive unless within thirty (30) calendar days from the mailing or delivery of such copy, RSCCD receives from SAUSD a written request to appeal said decision. Pending final decision of the appeal, SAUSD shall act in accordance with the written decision of RSCCD or the Department of Education, whichever is the final arbiter of the dispute.

The handling of non-criminal complaints, including discrimination complaints, and complaints and reports of criminal fraud, waste and abuse shall be as prescribed by RSCCD, and/or the State of California, and/or the US Department of Education, whichever is applicable, in accordance with applicable provisions of the Code of Federal Regulations.

TERMINATION

34. Either party may terminate this Agreement, with or without cause upon thirty (30) days written notice served upon the other party. Notice shall be deemed served on the date of mailing. Upon termination, or notice thereof, the parties agree to cooperate with one another in the orderly transfer of service responsibilities, active case records, and pertinent documents.

The obligations of RSCCD under this Agreement are contingent upon the availability of Federal and/or State funds, as applicable, for the reimbursement of SAUSD's expenditures, and inclusion of sufficient funds for the services hereunder in the budget approved by the RSCCD Board of Trustees each fiscal year this Agreement remains in effect or operation. In the event

that such funding is terminated or reduced, RSCCD shall provide SAUSD with written notification of such determination. SAUSD shall immediately comply with RSCCD's decision.

TOTAL AGREEMENT

35. This Agreement, together with the attachments hereto, expresses the total understanding of the parties. There are no oral understandings of the parties or terms and conditions other than as are stated herein. SAUSD acknowledges that it has read and agrees to all terms and conditions included in this contract.

AMENDMENTS

36. This Agreement may be modified or revised at any time by the parties as long as the amendment is made in writing and signed by both parties.

NOTICES

37. All notices, reports and correspondence between the parties hereto respecting this Agreement shall by in writing and deposited in the United States Mail, postage prepaid, addressed as follows:

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is to provide the Board revisions to current Administrative Regulation (AR) 5111.1 – <u>District Residency</u>. These revisions are recommended pursuant to a review of the current Administrative Regulation with the assistance of the Orange County Department of Education Legal Services. The last revision occurred April 1998.

At the regular Board meeting of December 13, 2011, this agenda item was presented for first reading.

RATIONALE:

AR 5111.1 – District Residency has been updated in accordance with federal law and California Education Code in accordance with Assembly Bill (AB) 207 to include:

- A list of acceptable documents to prove district residency including provisions for an Affidavit of Residency
- Proposed change for AR 5111.1 District Residency requests parent/guardian to execute Affidavit of Residency pursuant to the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act: Section 1032 Education for Homeless Children and Youth (42 USC 11432)

Implementation of recommended revisions will bring the District into compliance with federal law and California Education Code.

Students

District Residency

Prior to admission, students living within the district must provide proof of residency. (cf. 5111 - Admission) Proof of district residency shall be established by one of the following:

- (1) The parent/guardian provides a valid California driver's license or government-issued photo identification showing a current address in the relevant attendance area; or
- (2) The parent/guardian provides one of the following documents, dated within the past two months (unless otherwise indicated), showing a current address in the relevant attendance area:
 - (a) Utility Service Contract, Statement, or Payment Receipt (e.g., water, gas, electric, or waste management);
 - (b) Telephone Bill (land line or cellular bill);
 - (c) Mortgage/Rental Contract, Lease, or Payment Receipt;
 - (d) Property Tax Bill or Payment Receipt past year;
 - (e) Pay Stub;
 - (f) Voter Registration;
 - (g) Correspondence from a Government Agency;
 - (h) Car Registration (dated within the past year);
 - (i) Car Insurance Statement (dated within the past year);
 - (j) Bank Statement;
 - (k) Federal or State Income Tax Forms (dated within the past year); or
 - (1) Declaration from Primary Resident/Owner indicating that student is living with Primary Resident/Owner.

If none of the above documents are submitted, the parent/guardian is required to execute an Affidavit of Residency. However, pursuant to the McKinney-Vento Act, homeless students must be enrolled even if they are unable to produce records normally required for enrollment, such as residency documentation.

A student may establish residency by documenting that he/she has a parent/guardian that lives within the district, is an emancipated minor living in the district, is in the court-appointed care of a licensed foster home, family home, or children's institution within the district, or lives in the home of a care-giving adult within the district. Upon enrollment of a student residing in the home of a care-giving adult within district boundaries, the care-giving adult shall execute, under penalty of perjury, the affidavit specified in Family Code 6552. (E.C. 48204) (cf. 5111.11 - Residency of Students with care-giver) (cf. 5111.12 - Residency Based on Parent/Guardian Employment) (cf. 5111.13 - Residency for Homeless Children)

The Superintendent or designee shall annually notify parents/guardians of all existing attendance options available in the district, including but not limited to all options for meeting residency requirements for school attendance. When a student or parent/guardian participating in the Safe at Home program requests that the district use the substitute address designated by the Secretary of State, the Superintendent or designee may request the actual residence address for the purpose of establishing residency within district boundaries. The Superintendent or designee shall not include the actual address in the student's file or any other public record and shall instead use the substitute address for all future communications and correspondence. (Govt. Code 6206, 6207)

The district shall retain a copy of the document or written verification offered as proof of residency. In addition, the district may annually verify the student's residency and retain a copy of the document or written statement offered as verification. (Code of Regulations, Title 5, Section 432) (cf. 5125 - Student Records)

If a district employee reasonably believes that a parent/guardian has provided false or unreliable evidence of residency, the Superintendent or designee shall make reasonable efforts to determine whether the student resides in the district.

A student not residing within the district shall be deemed a district resident if admitted through the district's interdistrict attendance program of if the student resides in a state hospital in the district or is confined to a district area hospital or residential care facility in the district for treatment of a temporary disability. (E.C. 48206.3-48208) (cf. 5117 - Interdistrict Attendance) (cf. 6183 - Home and Hospital Instruction)

District residency is not required for enrollment in a regional occupational center or program *if there are openings in the program or class*. (E.C. 52317)

Revocation of Enrollment

If the Superintendent or designee, upon investigation, has determined that a student's enrollment is based on false evidence of residency, he/she shall revoke the student's enrollment. Before any such revocation, the parent/guardian shall be sent written notice of the facts leading to the decision. This notice shall state the parent/guardian's right, within 10 school days, to schedule a meeting with a hearing officer to inspect supporting documents, rebut district evidence, question any district witnesses, and present oral and/or documentary evidence, including witnesses, on the student's behalf. For good cause, the hearing officer may extend the meeting date for an additional 10 days to permit the parent/guardian to obtain required documentation.

If the parent/guardian fails to schedule to the above meeting, the student's enrollment shall be revoked 11 school days after the date of the notice.

If the above meeting is held, the hearing officer shall prepare a written decision describing his/her findings. If this decision upholds the revocation, the parent/guardian shall be informed of his/her right to appeal to the Governing Board within 10 days. The hearing officer's decision shall be final unless appealed.

AR 5111.1(c)

A parent/guardian who appeals to the Board shall have the right to have a representative present and to rebut district evidence, question any district witnesses, and present oral and/or documentary evidence, including witnesses, on the student's behalf. Except in cases where good cause is shown, the Board will not reopen the record to consider evidence or argument which was not presented to the hearing officer. The student may continue to attend school during the period of the appeal. The Board's decision shall be final.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board approval to adopt Resolution No. 11/12-2907 – requesting the Board of Supervisors of the County of Orange to Sell 2011-12 Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes of the District in a principal amount not to exceed \$65,000,000 and approving certain other matters related thereto.

RATIONALE:

Due to the ongoing financial crisis, the State has deferred approximately \$9.3 billion of apportionment payments to school districts from fiscal year 2011-12 into 2012-13. The State continues to defer more than 38 percent of Revenue Limit apportionments into the following year. As a result of these deferrals, the District anticipates that it will incur cash flow shortages in the General Fund late in fiscal year 2011-12.

Allowable methods to address the anticipated cash flow shortfall in the General Fund include a) borrowing from other District funds, b) borrowing from the County of Orange, or c) issuing tax and revenue anticipation notes (TRANs). The District does not anticipate that it will have sufficient available cash in other funds to address the projected General Fund cash flow shortage, while program limitations prevent borrowing from the County of Orange from being a viable option.

This agenda item requests the Supervisors of the County of Orange to issue TRANs on behalf of the District in an amount not to exceed \$65,000,000 to address the projected General Fund cash flow shortages. The exact amount of the TRANs will be determined later this fiscal year based upon updated General Fund cash flow projections. The amount of the TRANs cannot exceed the projected cash flow deficit plus a working capital reserve as determined by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). The District will be working with Governmental Financial Strategies, Inc., a financial advisor to offer the TRANs to the market.

AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF 2011-12 TAX AND REVENUE ANTICIPATION NOTES FOR THE DISTRICT AND REQUESTING THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF ORANGE TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF THE NOTES

WHEREAS, the Board of Education ("the District Board") desires to authorize the issuance of its 2011-12 Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes (the "Notes") by requesting the Board of Supervisors (the "County Board") of the County of Orange (the "County") to issue the Notes on behalf of the Santa Ana Unified School District (the "District"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Sections 53850 et seq. of the Government Code of the State of California (the "Act") contained in Article 7.6 thereof, entitled "Temporary Borrowing" that provides for temporary borrowing by certain local agencies on or after the first day of any fiscal year (being July 1), the District may borrow money by issuing notes for any purpose for which the District is authorized to use and expend moneys, including but not limited to current expenses, capital expenditures, investment and reinvestment and the discharge of any obligation or indebtedness of the District; and

WHEREAS, Section 53853 of the Act provides that, since the District has not been accorded independent fiscal accountability status under Section 42647 or Section 42650 of the California Education Code, the Notes must be issued in the name of the District by the board of supervisors of the county, the county superintendent of schools of which has jurisdiction over the District, as soon as possible following the receipt of a resolution of the governing board of the District requesting the borrowing; and

WHEREAS, the County Superintendent of the County of Orange has jurisdiction over the District, and the District Board, hereby requests a borrowing of not to exceed Sixty-Five Million Dollars (\$65,000,000) at an interest rate not to exceed six percent (6.0%) per annum, through the issuance by the County Board of the Notes in the name of the District to be sold by negotiated sale; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the Act, such Notes shall be payable no later than fifteen months after their date of delivery, and shall be payable only from revenue received or accrued during the fiscal year 2011-12; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 53856 of the Act, the District may pledge any taxes, income, revenue, cash receipts or other moneys, including moneys deposited in inactive or term deposits (but excepting certain moneys encumbered for a special purpose); and this Resolution specifies that certain unrestricted revenues which will be received or accrued by the District for the General Fund of the District during fiscal year 2011-12 are pledged for the payment of the Notes; and

WHEREAS, the Notes shall be a general obligation of the District, and to the extent not paid from the taxes, income, revenue, cash receipts and other moneys of the District pledged for the payment thereof shall be paid with interest thereon from any other moneys of the District lawfully available therefor, as required by Section 53857 of the Act; and

WHEREAS, the Notes shall be in denominations of \$5,000, or integral multiples thereof, as permitted by Section 53854 of the Act; shall be issued on a date to be designated and shall be substantially in the form and executed in the manner prescribed in this Resolution, all as permitted and required by Section 53853 of the Act; and

WHEREAS, the District Board finds and determines that, as required by Section 53858 of the Act, the \$65,000,000 maximum principal amount of Notes authorized to be issued in the name of the District by the County Board in fiscal year 2011-12, when added to the interest payable thereon, does not exceed eighty-five percent (85%) of the estimated amount of the uncollected taxes, income, revenue (including but not limited to revenue from state and federal governments), cash receipts and other moneys of the District which will be available for the payment of the Notes and interest thereon; and

WHEREAS, the Notes will not be issued in an amount greater than the sum of the maximum anticipated cumulative cash flow deficit to be financed by the anticipated tax or other revenue sources for the period for which such taxes or other revenues are anticipated and during which such Notes are outstanding plus a permitted working capital reserve, all as provided in Section 1.103-14(c) of the Income Tax Regulations of the United States Treasury, or in such other amount as is permitted by the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, as determined by Stradling Yocca Carlson &

Rauth, a Professional Corporation, acting in its capacity as bond counsel to the District; and

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE SANTA ANA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT DOES HEREBY, RESOLVE, DETERMINE AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

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Section 1. Authorization of Issuance of Notes; Terms Thereof; Paying Agent. The District Board hereby requests the County Board to issue in the name of the District, an amount not to exceed \$65,000,000 principal amount of Notes under the designated "Santa Ana Unified School District, Orange County, State of California, 2011-12 Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes" (the "Notes"); to be numbered from 1 consecutively upward in order of issuance; to be in the denominations of \$5,000, or integral multiples thereof; to be dated the date of delivery thereof; to mature (without option of prior redemption) on the date set forth in the official statement pertaining to the Notes (the "Official Statement"), but in no event later than fifteen months after the date of issuance, or if such date is not a day on which banks in New York or California are open for business, on the last day such banks are open for business prior to such date; and, unless otherwise provided for in the Notes or the Official Statement, to bear interest, payable on or before the twelve month anniversary following the date of issuance and at maturity and computed on a 30-day month/360-day year basis at the rate or rates determined at the time of sale thereof, but not in excess of six percent (6%) per annum. Both the principal of and interest on the Notes shall be payable, only upon surrender thereof, in lawful money of the United States of America at the office of The Bank of New York Mellon, N.A., which, in accordance with the provisions of Section 53853(b) of the Act, is hereby designated to be the paying agent for the Notes, or at the office of any successor thereto appointed by the Superintendent, or her designee (the "Paying Agency"). No interest shall be payable on any Note for any period after maturity during which the registered owner thereof fails to properly present such Note for payment. The District Board hereby approves the payment of the reasonable fees and expenses of the Paying Agent as they shall become due and payable.

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The District acknowledges that the Notes do not constitute a debt of the County of Orange (the "County") and that the County is not responsible for, and makes no assurance regarding, the use or application of the proceeds of the Notes by the District.

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Section 2. Form of Notes. The Notes shall be issued in registered form and shall be substantially in the form set forth in Exhibit A attached hereto and by reference incorporated herein, the blanks in said form to be filled in with

appropriate words and figures. The Notes shall be initially registered in the name of "Cede & Co." as nominee of The Depository Trust Company, and shall be evidenced by one note in the full principal amount of the Notes. The Depository Trust Company, New York, New York is hereby appointed depository for the Notes. Registered ownership may not thereafter be transferred except as set forth in Section 4 hereof. There shall be attached to each Note, the legal opinion of Stradling Yocca Carlson & Rauth, a Professional Corporation, respecting the validity of said Notes.

Section 3. Deposit of Note Proceeds; Tax Covenants.

- The moneys received by the District from the issuance of the Notes shall be deposited in the General Fund of the District. The District hereby covenants that it will make no use of the proceeds of the Notes that would cause the Notes to be "arbitrage bonds" under Section 148 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"); and, to that end, so long as any of the Notes are outstanding, the District, and all of its officers having custody or control of such proceeds, shall comply with all requirements of Section 148 of the Code, including restrictions on the use and investment of proceeds of the Notes and the rebate of a portion of investment earnings on certain amounts, including proceeds of the Notes, if required, to the Federal government, and of the Income Tax Regulations of the United States Treasury promulgated thereunder or under any predecessor provisions, to the extent that such regulations are, at the time, applicable and in effect, so that the Notes will not be "arbitrage bonds." District further covenants that it shall at all times do and perform all acts and things necessary and within its power and authority, including complying with each applicable requirement of Section 103 and Sections 141 through 150 of the Code, to assure that interest paid on the Notes shall, for the purposes of federal income taxes, be excludable from the gross income of the recipients thereof.
- (B) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Resolution to the contrary, upon the District's failure to observe, or refusal to comply with, the covenants contained in this Section, no one other than the owners or former owners of the Notes or the Paying Agent shall be entitled to exercise any right or remedy under this Resolution on the basis of the District's failure to observe, or refusal to comply with, such covenants.
- (C) The covenants contained in this Section 3 shall survive the payment of the Notes.
- (D) Notwithstanding any provision of this Section, if the District shall provide to the Paying Agent an opinion of nationally recognized bond counsel that any specified action required under this section is no longer required or that some

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further or different action is required to maintain the exclusion from gross income for federal income tax purposes of interest on the Notes, the Paying Agent and the District may conclusively rely on such opinion in complying with the requirements of this Section 3, and the covenants hereunder shall be deemed to be modified to that extent.

Section 4. Payment of Notes.

- Source of Payment. The principal amount of the Notes, together with the interest thereon, shall be payable from taxes, income, revenue, cash receipts, and other money of the District as provided in Section 53856 of the Act, which are received or accrued during fiscal year 2011-12 for the General Fund of the District and which are lawfully available for the payment of current expenses and other obligations of the District (the "Unrestricted Revenues").
- The Notes shall be a general obligation of the District, and, to the extent the Notes and the interest thereon are not paid from the Unrestricted Revenues transferred to the Repayment Fund (as defined in Section 4(E) below), the Notes shall be paid with interest thereon from any other moneys of the District lawfully available therefor, as provided in Section 4(C) below.
- (B) Pledged Revenues. As security for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Notes, the District hereby pledges to transfer to the Repayment Fund (i) the first Unrestricted Revenues received by the District during the month ending July 31, 2012, until an amount equal to 75% of the aggregate principal amount of the Notes is on deposit therein, and (ii) the first Unrestricted Revenues received by the District in the month ending August 31, 2012, until an amount equal to the aggregate principal amount of and interest due on the Notes at maturity is on deposit therein; provided, however, that the foregoing dates and deposit amounts may be changed to other dates and amounts as provided for in the Notes upon their delivery and in the Official Statement and such dates shall be the operative dates for this Section 4(B) as if set forth in this paragraph and shall be binding on the District (such pledged amounts being hereinafter called the "Pledged Revenues").
- The principal of the Notes and the interest thereon shall be a first lien and charge against and shall be payable from such Pledged Revenues, as provided in Section 53856 of the Act, and upon amounts in the Repayment Fund.
- Other Pledged Moneys. In the event that there are insufficient Unrestricted Revenues received by the District to permit the deposit into the Repayment Fund of the full amount of Pledged Revenues to be deposited into the Repayment Fund from Unrestricted Revenues in a month, then the amount of any deficiency shall be satisfied and made up from any other moneys of the District lawfully available for repayment of the Notes and the interest thereon, all as

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provided in Sections 53856 and 53857 of the Act (the "Other Moneys"). Such Other Moneys and any Unrestricted Revenues shall be transferred to the Repayment Fund on a daily basis, as such amounts are received by the District, until the required deposits to the Repayment Fund for such month and any prior month have been made.

- Deposit of Pledged Revenues and Other Moneys in Repayment Fund. The Pledged Revenues, identified and transferred by the District in accordance with Section 4(B) above and any Other Moneys identified and transferred by the District in accordance with Section 4(C) above shall be held by the Paying Agent or the Treasurer-Tax Collector in trust for the holders of the Notes in a special fund designated as the "Santa Ana Unified School District, Orange County, State of California, 2011-12 Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes Repayment Fund" (herein called the "Repayment Fund") and applied as directed in this Resolution. moneys deposited into the Repayment Fund are pledged to secure and shall be for the exclusive benefit of the holders of the Notes, and until the Notes and all interest thereon are paid or until provision has been made for the payment of the Notes at maturity with interest to maturity, the moneys in the Repayment Fund shall be applied only for the purposes for which the Repayment Fund is created, and the District shall have no right to transfer moneys out of the Repayment Fund. Treasurer-Tax Collector shall not be responsible or liable for sufficiency of the Repayment Fund.
- (E) Disbursement and Investment of Moneys in Repayment Fund. From the date this Resolution takes effect, all Pledged Revenues and Other Moneys required to be transferred to the Repayment Fund in accordance with Section 4(B) and 4(C) above shall, when received, be accounted for in the Repayment Fund and shall remain in the Repayment Fund until the principal of and interest on the Notes is paid in full. On the maturity date of the Notes, the moneys in the Repayment Fund shall be used, to the extent necessary, to pay the principal of and interest on the Notes and any moneys in excess of such amount remaining in or accruing to the Repayment Fund shall be transferred to the General Fund of the District.

 Moneys accounted for in the Repayment Fund shall be invested at the request of the

District either in the Treasurer-Tax Collector's Investment Pool or in other investment securities permitted by California law, as it is now in effect and as it may be amended, modified or supplemented from time to time, and of the type specified in Section 9 below to be held by Paying Agent; provided that no such investments shall have a maturity date later than the maturity date of the Notes.

Section 5. Sale of the Notes; Execution of Notes. The Notes are authorized to be sold upon the terms provided in the County Resolution; provided that the

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aggregate principal amount of the Notes does not exceed Sixty-Five Million Dollars (\$65,000,000) and the interest rate does not exceed six percent (6.0%) per annum. The District hereby requests the Chairman of the County Board to sign the Notes manually or by facsimile signature, the Treasurer-Tax Collector to sign the Notes manually or by facsimile signature and the Clerk of the County Board (the "Clerk") to countersign the Notes manually or by facsimile signature, provided that at least one of the foregoing or the Paying Agent shall sign manually, and for the Clerk to affix the seal of the County thereto by facsimile impression thereof. Each of the foregoing officers is authorized and requested to cause the blank spaces in the form of the Notes attached hereto as Exhibit A to be filled in with the appropriate information and for such other changes to be made to the Notes so as to conform them to the terms upon which they are sold.

Section 6. Appointment of Bond Counsel; Authorization of Preliminary Official Statement and Official Statement. Stradling Yocca Carlson & Rauth, a Professional Corporation ("Bond Counsel"), is hereby designated as bond counsel to the District in connection with the issuance of the Notes. The form of Agreement for Legal Services between the District and Bond Counsel, substantially in the form presented to this meeting and on file with the Clerk of the District Board, is hereby approved. Any one of the Superintendent or a the Deputy Superintendent of the District or a designated deputy thereof (each, an "Authorized Officer"), is hereby authorized to execute and deliver the Agreement for Legal Services, and any one of the Authorized Officers, acting alone, is hereby authorized and requested to acknowledge such Agreement for Legal Services, if necessary, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by his or her execution and delivery thereof. the Preliminary Official Statement, substantially in the form presented to this meeting and on file with the Clerk of the District Board, is hereby approved, and such Preliminary Official Statement, together with such changes thereto as are approved by any one of the Authorized Officers, is authorized to be used in connection with the offering and sale of the Notes. Any one of the Authorized Officers, acting alone, is hereby authorized to execute and deliver a final Official Statement; such execution shall conclusively evidence the District's approval of such Official Statement. Any one of the Authorized Officers, acting alone, is also authorized to deem the Preliminary Official Statement "final" pursuant to Rule 15c2-12 of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 prior to its distribution

Section 7. Approval of Contract of Purchase. The Notes shall be sold at negotiated sale to the underwriting firm submitting the lowest cost conforming bid as determined by Government Financial Strategies, Inc., financial advisor to the

District, who is authorized to solicit bids on behalf of the District. event no conforming bids are received, any one of the Authorized Officers, acting alone, is hereby authorized to select one or more underwriting firms to purchase The Contract of Purchase for the Notes is hereby approved, the Notes. substantially in the form presented to this meeting and on file with the Clerk of the District Board. Any one of the Authorized Officers, acting alone, is hereby authorized to execute and deliver the Contract of Purchase, and any one of the Authorized Officers, acting alone, is hereby authorized and requested to acknowledge such Contract of Purchase, if necessary, such approval conclusively evidenced by the execution and delivery thereof; provided, however, that the maximum interest rate on the Notes shall not exceed six percent (6%) per annum and that the discount paid to the purchaser or purchasers of the Notes (the "Underwriter"), exclusive of original issue discount, shall not exceed two percent (2%) of the par amount of the Notes. Any one of the Authorized Officers, acting alone, is hereby further authorized to determine the maximum principal amount of Notes to be specified in the Contract of Purchase, up to \$65,000,000, and to enter into and execute the Contract of Purchase with the Underwriter, if the conditions set forth in this Resolution are satisfied.

Section 8. Delivery of Notes. All actions heretofore taken by the officers and agents of the District Board with respect to the Notes are hereby approved, confirmed and ratified, and the officers of the District, including the Authorized Officers, are hereby authorized and directed to do any and all things and take any and all actions which they, or any of them, may deem necessary or advisable in order to consummate the lawful issuance and delivery of the Notes in accordance with this Resolution and the County Resolution and any other resolution hereafter adopted by the County Board with respect to the Notes.

Section 9. Proceeds of Notes Conditionally Pledged; Investment of Note Proceeds. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein, any unexpended proceeds of the Notes are hereby pledged to the payment of the Notes in the event and to the extent sufficient Pledged Revenues of the District and Other Moneys are not deposited into the Repayment Fund as required by Sections 4(B) and 4(C) above. In addition to investments in the Treasurer-Tax Collector's Investment Pool, pursuant to Section 53601(1) of the Government Code of the State of California, the following are hereby designated as additional authorized investments for the proceeds of the Notes and the Repayment Fund: (i) a guaranteed investment contract with a financial institution or insurance company which has, or its guarantor has, at the date of execution thereof one or more outstanding issues of unsecured, uninsured and unguaranteed debt obligations or a claims paying ability rated not

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lower than the second highest rating category (without regard to subcategories) by Standard & Poor's Ratings Services and Moody's Investors Service (in which case, the District Board hereby authorizes any one of the Authorized Officers, acting alone, to execute a certificate of indemnity holding the Treasurer-Tax Collector and the County, its officers, employees and servants harmless and indemnifying them from any costs, liabilities, claims or damages, including but not limited to attorneys' fees, caused by or arising from the investment of the funds in such an instrument, or, alternatively, a written agreement to pay for any costs, liabilities, claims or damages, including but not limited to attorneys' fees, to the Treasurer-Tax Collector, the County, its officers, employees and servants, caused by or arising from the investment of the funds in such an instrument); or (ii) the Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF) administered by the State of California.

Section 10. Continuing Disclosure. The District Board hereby covenants and agrees that it will comply with and carry out, and authorizes and directs each of the Authorized Officers to comply with and carry out, all of the provisions of that certain Continuing Disclosure Certificate to be dated the date of issuance and delivery of the Notes, as originally executed and as it may be amended from time to in accordance with the terms thereof (the "Continuing Certificate"). Notwithstanding any other provision of this Resolution, failure of the District to comply with the Continuing Disclosure Certificate shall not be considered an event of default under this Resolution; however, any Noteholder may take such actions as may be necessary and appropriate, including seeking mandate or specific performance by court order, to cause the District to comply with its obligations under this Section. The form of the Continuing Disclosure Certificate, substantially in the form presented to this meeting and on file with the Clerk of the District Board, is hereby approved. Any one of the Authorized Officers, acting alone, is hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver the Continuing Disclosure Certificate, with such changes therein as any such official may require or approve, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution and delivery thereof.

Section 11. Transmittal of Resolution. The Superintendent or her designee is hereby directed to send a certified copy of this Resolution to the County Board, which shall constitute the request of the District Board that the County Board issue and sell the Notes on behalf of the District as soon as practicable, and to simultaneously provide certified copies of this Resolution to the Treasurer-Tax Collector and the County Superintendent of Schools.

1	Section 12. Further Actions Authorized. The District Board hereby covenants
2	that the District and its appropriate officials will take all proceedings necessary

Purpose:
