REGULAR MEETING SANTA ANA BOARD OF EDUCATION

January 25, 2005

CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 5:00 p.m. by Board President Yamagata-Noji. Other members in attendance were Mr. Richardson, Mr. Tinajero, Mrs. Avila, and Mr. Palacio.

Cabinet members present were Dr. Mijares, Dr. Bennett, Mr. Trigg, Mr. Lopez, Mr. Sharp, Dr. Stainer, Dr. Bratcher, and Mrs. Araujo-Cook.

MEETING RECESSED AND RECONVENED

At 5:01 p.m., the Regular meeting was recessed to Closed Session to consider real estate negotiations, legal matters, personnel matters, special education contracts, and student discipline issues.

The Regular meeting was reconvened at 6:15 p.m.

There were approximately 120 members of the community and District staff in the audience.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance led by Santa Ana High School student Nicole Macias.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Dr. Mijares expressed gratitude to students and staff from Diamond, Franklin, and Martin Elementary and McFadden Intermediate schools for artwork displayed in the Board Room.

Congratulations to Cecilia Aguinaga, SAUSD's School Police Parent Coordinator. She was selected to serve on the City of Santa Ana's Human Relations Commission Committee. According to the charter, Cecilia, who was nominated by Mayor Pulido, will be "making recommendations to the City Council on matters that serve to improve the human environment."

Students at Glenn L. Martin Elementary learned more about their school's namesake in a very exciting way. The South Coast Repertory visited Martin elementary school to provide insight to the play "Birdman... <u>The Amazing Story of Orange County Aviation</u>." A member of the South Coast Repertory Board graciously donated \$800, which allowed students to attend the performance. The lessons student's learned are reflected in the artwork and essays display in the Board Room. Look for more on an upcoming segment of Channel 31's Education First. Mr. Palacio inquired about the presentation from Capital Program Management (CPM). Mr. Sharp stated that the Board had received a draft report and that the presentation would be forthcoming when the new Assistant Superintendent, Facilities/Governmental Relations comes on Board.

PRESENTATIONS

2005-06 Budget and Its Impact By Governor's Proposed Budget

Mr. Trigg stated that the report is intended to inform the Board of the potential impact of the Governor's proposed budget on the SAUSD's 2005-06 Budget, as identified in the First Interim Report. He stated that the proposed budget may be modified. In California, K-12 demographics indicate that schools face long-term enrollment declines due to slowdown in birth rates and high home prices in urban and suburban regions. He said that many Californians are leaving the State and almost half of all school districts are facing enrollment losses. Overall enrollment growth for 2005-06 is projected to be only 0.79%, 469 districts are now losing enrollment, and declining enrollment districts almost always face serious financial problems. He provided enrollment decline projections in urban counties in grades K-12 from 2004-05 through 2013-14. The losses compare

to total enrollment growth of 3.2% statewide for the 10-year period. He said that the effects from California's economy would be with us for the next several years. He stated that the State General Fund Revenues and transfers also rise, he then provided comparisons from 2001-06, which showed an increase from \$72.2 to \$83.8 in revenue. He explained how the revenue picture had improved from 2002-03 (\$882 million) to 2004-05 (\$968 million.) These revisions yielded net new revenues of \$2.0 billion not anticipated when the 2004-05 Budget was signed. He continued discussion on capital gains, stock options, and State expenditures. Mr. Trigg then reviewed the following:

California's Commitment to Education

- Student needs continue to grow
- Progress toward closing the achievement gap comes only at a monetary cost
- California's financial commitment to education is in the last quartile of states (worse than that because costs are higher here)

Operational Issues

- Management of benefit costs is difficult enough but shifting STRS costs to districts will make that worse
- Declining enrollment is a growing issue for almost half of the districts in the State
- Facilities, teacher quality, and instructional materials problems are brought into sharp focus by the *Williams* Lawsuit settlement
- Restoring ending balances will be difficult for many districts

Consequences of Lean Budgets

- Studies show that California is spending less on education than most other states
- According to RAND
 - In 1969-70, California spending was \$400 per student above the national average
 - As of 2001-02, spending was \$600 per student below the national average
 - California has the second highest ratio of students per teachers
- According to Education Newsweek adjusting for regional cost differences, California ranks 43rd in spending per student

Governor fully funds K-12 statutory COLA of 3.93%

- Recognize this is only an estimate
- 2005-06 statutory COLA will not be finalized until May
- Governor's estimate is consistent with other forecasts
- 3.93% (est.) COLA applies to revenue limits, special education, and almost all State categorical programs

K-12 Revenue Limits

- At the 3.93% estimate statutory COLA, the revenue limit increases \$196 per ADA for unified districts
- \$329 million for deficit reduction
- Reduces revenue limit deficit from 2.143% to 1.132%
- No additional funding for equalization aid, but 2004-05 equalization aid is ongoing

Mr. Trigg stated that the 2005-06 proposed Budget summarized funding growth, COLA, revenue limits, categoricals, deficits, and revenue limit deficits (cut by 1.1%). He said that the Governor's approach to 2005-06 is to balance the budget with spending cuts, which significantly affect K-12 education. He has pledged "no new taxes." Because of the impact of the Governor's proposed budget, actual SAUSD changes through December 2004 are as follows:

Revenues

• Increase in COLA:

- 2005-06: From 2.7% to 3.93%
- 2006-07: From 2.6% to 3.20%
- Reduction in deficit:
 - From 2.14% to 1.132%
- Enrollment decline of 1,544
 Based on December 2004 enrollment/ADA statistics

Enrollment Loss Trend is Worsening

- At adopted Budget enrollment decline of 611 and ADA decline of 585
- At First Interim (i.e. Oct. 2004) enrollment decline of 1,003, ADA decline of 961 students
- December 2004 Enrollment decline of 1,544, revised projections to reflect 1,478 ADA loss in 2004-05; assumed 957 ADA loss in 2005-06 and again in 2006-07; further analysis is ongoing and further revisions to the enrollment/ADA projections are very likely.

Mr. Trigg provided newspaper clips from various counties in California in reference to the following headings. Home Prices Set Record, Rents Rise in County, California Cuts its Population Projection, Educators Gearing Up for Budget Battle, Public Schools Enrollment Falls, Worst-Case Cuts, Adjacent School District Selling its Surplus Sites, Another Adjacent School District will Receive Proceeds from McDonalds Restaurant, Los Angeles Targets Truancy, District Approved Parents to Fundraise, School District Raises Class Sizes, Catholic Church Schools to Merge, and in other states schools closed due to lack of students.

Mr. Trigg then reviewed the following:

Financial Impact of ADA Loss - What causes need to cut the budget?

Less Corresponding Teachers

\$120 students requires four teachers at 30:1
Four teachers times cost per "new" teacher yields savings of \$199,108 (\$49,777 each teacher)
Misc. savings(\$400/ADA)\$48,000
Total proportional savings: \$247,108

Less corresponding teachers leaves \$292,892 deficit. In this example, minus 11 teachers would be needed to cover the decline.

Mandated Reserve Level

- The State of California mandates that school districts the size of Santa Ana Unified School District maintain a 2% minimum reserve for economic uncertainties.
- Therefore, our projected negative ending balance of (1.4%) in 2007-08 does not meet the State's financial standards and criteria, and requires SAUSD to reduce its expenses.

APPROVAL OF PERSONNEL CALENDAR

Dr. Yamagata-Noji stated that the Board makes every attempt to be responsive to the community, parents, and staff. She then proposed to take action on Item 7.0 at this time. The Board concurred. She then called for a vote.

It was moved by Mr. Palacio, seconded by Mr. Tinajero, and carried 5-0 to approve the Personnel Calendar, Item 7.0, with the exception of page A-2, renewal of contracts for Dr. Al Mijares, Dr. Helen Stainer, and Dr. Lewis Bratcher, for a number of three-years.

Dr. Yamagata-Noji stated that all three contracts called for a term from July 1, 2005, through June 30, 2008, no salary increases for the 2005-06 school year, that contracts would provide for salary adjustments in subsequent school years equal to the adjustments other certificated management receives, and that the remaining terms of each employee's contract are the same as their previous contract.

Deliberations began and each Board member voiced their opinions and concerns. At the conclusion, Dr. Yamagata-Noji called for a vote.

It was moved by Mr. Richardson, seconded by Mrs. Avila, and carried 4-1, Mr. Palacio dissenting, to approve contracts for Dr. Mijares, Superintendent; Dr. Stainer, Assistant Superintendent, Elementary Education; and Dr. Bratcher, Assistant Superintendent, Secondary Education.

MEETING RECESSED AND RECONVENED

At 9:30 p.m., the Regular meeting was recessed for a brief intermission. The Regular meeting was reconvened at 10:00 p.m.

Review of Annual Audit Report for Fiscal Year 2003-04

Mr. Trigg introduced Ms. Heidi White, with Vavrinek, Trine, Day & Company, LLP Auditors. Ms. White reviewed information contained in the 2003-04 Annual Audit Report. She said that the report was completed and filed prior to the December 15, 2004, deadline. In addition, the findings from the previous year were completed and met. In addition, the results of the Independent Auditor's Report were granted as an "unqualified" opinion, which is the highest level of opinion districts could receive. She said

that not only do auditors focus on financial statement opinions, they also look at compliance. She then reviewed the following results in reference to audit procedures.

<u>Independent Auditor's Report</u> - "Unqualified" Opinion on the Financial Statements:

- All financial statements were fairly presented in all material respects
- Report in conformity with accounting principles and accepted in the United States of America

Report on internal control over financial reporting and compliance in accordance with government audit standards - "Qualified" Opinion on Internal Control:

- Reportable conditions 2004-1 through 2004-10 (financial conditions)
- No instances on noncompliance noted

Report on compliance in accordance with OMB Circular A-133 - "Qualified" Opinion on Federal Compliance:

- Reportable condition 2004-11
 - Cost principles related to personnel activity reports for major federal programs

<u>Report on State Compliance</u> - Unqualified" Opinion on compliance with State Requirements:

• No reportable conditions noted in the over 70 audit procedures mandated by the State Controller's Office

Other Areas of Note:

• The Santa Ana Unified School District maintained the minimum level of Unrestricted Ending Fund Balance reserves required by the State Controller's Office -\$6,889,662/1.46%

General Fund Trends and Analysis - Over the past three years:

- The General Fund Revenues have increased from \$426 million to \$458 million
- The General Fund Expenditures have increased from \$435 million to \$473 million
- Total General Fund Ending Balance has decreased from \$56 million to \$33 million

Other Trends and Analysis:

- Long-term debt has increased from \$133 million to \$210 million primarily due to the issuance of General Obligation Bonds
- The General obligation bonds are being used to fund new sites and construction
- Capital assets have increased from \$297 million to \$422 million over the past two years
- The District's K-12 Average Daily Attendance (ADA) has declined from 57,529 in 2001-02 to 57,271 in 2003-04
- The budget year 2004-05 projects an additional decline of 587 ADA

Dr. Yamagata-Noji inquired about noteworthy remarks the auditors may wish to comment on as it relates to the audit. Ms. White stated that the software system implementation for accounting was a tremendous asset and that there was much greater budget control and reports to support information obtained.

Mr. Richardson inquired about the funding trends concerning charter schools. Ms. White stated that there is no clear direction. This is something for the Board and Administration to look into. She said that the hiring of the Charter Schools Financial Coordinator would also be an asset.

Mr. Richardson inquired about post employment benefits. He asked how employees would better understand costs, how the program would be introduced, and what funding source would pay benefits. Ms. White responded that revenues pay benefits from the General Obligation Fund. She said that the new Gatsby 45, which will be implemented in year 2006-07, is a new accounting mechanism for posting accounting benefits. The program would not be limited to retirees, would include current employees that are working toward retirement. Ms. White stated that an actuarial study is key to putting the new system into perspective. Mr. Richardson stated that an actuarial study is forthcoming. Mr. Richardson then inquired about the tracking process. Ms. White stated that the tracking is a challenge. Mr. Richardson asked how other districts were handling the process. Ms. White stated that not all districts handle the tracking the same. Some are going to time cards and time studies. The Federal government allows for periodic time sheets where employees track time for a month-long period and apply that time to the year, then come back to do a study and update, which may be easier.

Mr. Trigg stated that in terms of findings from the auditors, he would build a matrix describing a plan to make corrections.

Mr. Richardson inquired about findings from the previous year and whether or not they were dealt with. Ms. White stated that some items were carried over such as material weakness and the financial condition, but was pleased to inform the Board that three-quarters of the items were implemented.

Board members asked that the actuarial study be scheduled for the next Board meeting.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

It was moved by Mr. Richardson, seconded by Mr. Palacio, and carried 5-0, to approve the Minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Board of Education of January 11, 2005.
