Carol M. White PEP Grant Awarded to SAUSD

On Wednesday, September 28, 2011, the Special Projects office was notified that the SAUSD had been awarded the Carol M. White Physical Education Program (PEP) grant for a total of \$1.57 million for the next three years. The purpose of this grant, funded by the U.S. Department of Education, is to expand and enhance our current physical education P.E.) program for students in grades kindergarten through 12th. Students will make progress toward meeting State standards in Physical Education as well as help them to increase their physical activity. Schools voluntarily opted in by completing the Healthy School Index survey. The purpose of the survey was to provide information on the school's P.E. and health needs. Based on the surveys and school needs, 22 schools were selected to participate in the grant.

This grant is a collaborative effort between SAUSD, the Orange County Health Care Agency (OCHCA), Kid Healthy and THINK Together. The main objective is to work together to increase the percent of students who will:

- Learn and practice healthy eating choices;
- Participate regularly in physical activities; and
- Follow California physical education, health and nutrition standards.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board authorization to award a contract for Bid Package No. 7 Track and Field at Saddleback High School. The scope of work includes site work and sports field upgrades.

RATIONALE:

At the January 27, 2010, Board meeting, the Board authorized staff to obtain bids for Bid Package No. 7 Track and Field for the Modernization project at Saddleback High School. Legal advertisements of notice calling for bids were placed with the *Orange County Register* on September 23 and 30, 2011. Staff contacted 36 contractors of which 12 picked up plans. On October 18, 2011, bid day, the District received seven bids. The architect and staff are in agreement that Ohno construction, Inc., represents the lowest bidder. This bid amount is within budget. BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board approval of the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) for an Early Notification Incentive Payment for Certificated Retirees.

Under the provisions of Government Code Section 3457.5, local educational agencies are required to publicly disclose the provisions of all agreements before entering into a written agreement.

RATIONALE:

Under AB 2756, the Superintendent and Chief Business Official are required to certify that costs incurred under the MOU can be met during the term of the agreement, along with the corresponding budget reductions.

This agreement is a one-time only agreement for the 2011-12 school year. Certificated Bargaining Unit Member employees will be notifying the District by December 1, 2011, of their intent to retire which will help reduce or eliminate the need for layoffs for the 2012-13 school year.

Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) Between the

Santa Ana Educators' Association (SAEA)

(ONE-TIME ONLY)

Early Notification Incentive Payment for Retirees

In order to prepare for the 2012-2013 school year and to mitigate against the need for layoffs, the SAUSD and SAEA agree that all unit members, eligible for retirement, who elect to retire from their positions with the Santa Ana Unified School District effective no later than June 30, 2012 shall receive an Early Notification Incentive Payment. Once a unit member has completed and submitted the Early Notification Incentive Retirement form, the decision is irrevocable.

If notification is given before <u>December 1, 2011</u>, the unit member shall receive a \$20,000 and shall select from three (3) options:

- 1) \$10,000 paid on 12/16/11 and \$10,000 on 6/29/12,
- 2) \$10,000 paid on 1/3/12 and \$10,000 on 6/29/12, or
- 3) \$20,000 paid on 6/29/12.

If notification is given before <u>March 1, 2012</u>, the unit member shall receive a \$10,000 incentive which shall be paid on 6/29/12.

This Early Notification Incentive Payment is not part of any Supplemental Early Retirement Program (SERP), which is not being offered this year. The Early Notification Incentive Payment shall be subject to all required state and federal withholdings which may result in the actual payment amount received by the unit member being less than \$20,000 or \$10,000.

In order to prepare for the 2012-2013 school year and to mitigate against the need for layoffs, the SAUSD and SAEA agree that all unit members, eligible for retirement, who elect to retire from their positions with the Santa Ana Unified School District effective no later than June 30, 2012 shall receive an Early Notification Incentive Payment. Once a unit member has completed and submitted the Early Notification Incentive Retirement form, the decision is irrevocable.

If notification is given before <u>December 1, 2011</u>, the unit member shall receive a \$20,000 and shall select from three (3) options:

- 1) \$10,000 paid on 12/16/11 and \$10,000 on 6/29/12,
- 2) \$10,000 paid on 1/3/12 and \$10,000 on 6/29/12, or
- 3) \$20,000 paid on 6/29/12.

If notification is given before <u>March 1, 2012</u>, the unit member shall receive a \$10,000 incentive which shall be paid on 6/29/12.

This Early Notification Incentive Payment is not part of any Supplemental Early Retirement Program (SERP), which is not being offered this year. The following constitutes an agreement between the California School Employees Association (CSEA), Chapter 41 and the Santa Ana Unified School District (SAUSD) regarding the increase of the work day by 30 minutes for employees in the classifications of Instructional Assistant Severely Handicapped and Autism Paraprofessional at the six (6) PLAS schools: Century High School, Saddleback High School, Santa Ana High School, Valley High School, Sierra Preparatory Academy. The increase of the work day by 60 minutes for employees at Willard Intermediate School in the classifications mentioned in this MOU.

- 1. Classified employees in the classification of Instructional Assistant Severely Handicapped and Autism Paraprofessional assigned to the six (6) PLAS schools Century High School, Saddleback High School, Santa Ana High School, Valley High School, Sierra Preparatory Academy, and Willard Intermediate School will work and be compensated at their regularly hour rate for <u>an additional</u> thirty (30) minutes <u>or sixty minutes at Willard</u> per day.
- 2. The extension of the day by thirty (30) minutes is not a permanent increase to hours and shall only remain in place for the <u>remainder of the grant which includes the 2011-12 and 2012-13 school year</u> or until the SIG grant or the extension of the student's instruction day comes to an end. <u>Due to the extension of the day, one additional sick day shall be granted for each school year.</u> At the end of the <u>2012-13</u> school year or when the SIG grant or the extension of the student's instructional day comes to an end, the effected unit members will automatically revert to a six (6) hour work day.
- 3. Unit members in the classifications of Instructional Assistant Severely Handicapped and Autism Paraprofessional will only receive the extension of thirty (30) minutes or sixty (60) minutes at Willard to their daily hours if they are assigned to one of the six (6) PLAS schools Century High School, Saddleback High School, Santa Ana High School, Valley High School, Sierra Preparatory Academy, and Willard Intermediate School. If the unit member is transferred from one of these six (6) schools their hours shall revert to six (6) per day one the first day that they are assigned to the new school.
- 4. <u>Unit members shall have their holidays, sick, and vacation days paid equivalent to the hours as described in the MOU.</u>

Memorandum of Understanding Between California School Employees Association (CSEA), Chapter 41 and Santa Ana Unified School District

August 24, 2011

The following constitutes an agreement between the California School Employees Association (CSEA), Chapter 41 and the Santa Ana Unified School District (SAUSD) regarding the increase of the work day by 30 minutes for employees in the classifications of Instructional Assistant Severely Handicapped and Autism Paraprofessional at the six (6) PLAS schools: Century High School, Saddleback High School, Santa Ana High School, Valley High School, Sierra Preparatory Academys The increase of the work day by 60 minutes for employees at Willard intermediate School in the classifications mentioned in this MOU.

- Classified employees in the classification of Instructional Assistant Severely Handicapped and 1. Autism Paraprofessional assigned to the six (6) PLAS schools - Century High School, Saddleback High School, Santa Ana High School, Valley High School, Sierra Preparatory Academy, and Willard Intermediate School will work and be compensated at their regularly hour rate for an additional thirty (30) minutes or sixty minutes at Willard per day.
- The extension of the day by thirty (30) minutes is not a permanent increase to hours and shall 2. only remain in place for the remainder of the grant which includes the 2011-12 and 2012-13 school year or until the SIG grant or the extension of the student's instruction day comes to an end. Due to the extension of the day, one additional sick day shall be granted for each school year. At the end of the 2012-13 school year or when the SIG grant or the extension of the student's instructional day comes to an end, the effected unit members will automatically revert to a six (6) hour work day.
- Unit members in the classifications of Instructional Assistant Severely Handicapped and Autism 3. Paraprofessional will only receive the extension of thirty (30) minutes or sixty (60) minutes at Willard to their daily hours if they are assigned to one of the six (6) PLAS schools - Century High School. Saddleback High School, Santa Ana High School, Valley High School, Sierra Preparatory Academy, and Willard Intermediate School. If the unit member is transferred from one of these six (6) schools their hours shall revert to six (6) per day one the first day that they are assigned to the new school.
- Unit members shall have their holidays, sick, and vacation days paid equivalent to the hours 4. as described in the MOU.
