Public Comments at Board Meetings

The agenda shall provide members of the public the opportunity to address the Board regarding agenda items before or during the Board's consideration of the item. The agenda also provides members of the public an opportunity to testify at regular meetings on matters which are not on the agenda but which are within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board.

Individual speakers are allowed three minutes to address the Board on agenda or nonagenda items. The Board may limit the total time for public input on each item to 20 minutes. With the Board's consent, the Board President may increase or decrease the time allowed for public presentation, depending on the topic and the number of persons wishing to be heard. The Board President may take a poll of speakers for or against a particular issue and may ask that additional persons speak only if they have something new to add.

The Board urges that complaints and derogatory remarks against a District employee be made in writing on forms available in the Office of the Superintendent. This allows the District and the Board to examine more carefully the complaint and to initiate the appropriate investigation.

Persons wishing to address the Board on an item on the agenda or an item of business in the Board's jurisdiction are requested to complete a card. This card is to be submitted to the Recording Secretary. The *Request to Address the Board of Education* cards are located on the table in the foyer.

RESOLUTION NO. 15/16-3086 BOARD OF EDUCATION SANTA ANA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT ORANGE COUNTY, CALIFORNIA

Body Worn Camera Program

WHEREAS, the Santa Ana Unified School District (hereinafter District) is a public school district enrolling over 56,000 kindergarten through twelfth grade students, with an educational program of exceptional quality due to the professionalism and dedication of its employees;

WHEREAS, the District has a valued relationship with all the communities surrounding its various schools within the District;

WHEREAS, the District, in order to maintain the quality of education, requires and promotes a safe learning environment at all its school sites and surrounding communities;

WHEREAS, the District has one of the few school police departments in the State of California;

WHEREAS, the District's Police Department employs 25 officers who were recruited by the Santa Ana Unified School District, are full-time employees of the District, and are California Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) certified;

WHEREAS, the District has determined that in order to provide a safe and secure learning environment for its students, employees and its police officers, the District is considering a body worn camera program for its police officers which will have both video and audio capabilities;

WHEREAS, the District is not aware of any such program in the K-12 school environment in the State of California;

WHEREAS, Public Contract Code section 20111 requires that a public school district competitively bid contracts exceeding \$87,800 and to award the contract to the lowest responsive and responsible bidder;

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WHEREAS, the estimated initial cost for the body worn camera program with full video and audio capabilities is estimated to be between \$250,000 to \$500,000;

WHEREAS, District staff has determined that an alternative procurement process would be a more viable solution based upon the highly technical nature of a body worn video and audio camera system, and the need to have the most advanced technology behind the program;

WHEREAS, Public Contract Code section 20118.2 provides the District an alternative procurement process, which will allow the District to consider the unique and highly specialized nature of technology in the acquisition of the body worn video and audio camera system for its police officers;

WHEREAS, Public Contract Code section 20118.2 emphasizes the fact that due to the highly specialized and unique nature of technology, telecommunications, related equipment, software, and services, and because products and materials of that nature are undergoing rapid technological changes and in order to allow for the introduction of new technological changes, it is in the public's best interest to allow a school district to consider, in addition to price, factors such as performance reliability, standardization, life-cycle costs, delivery timetables, support logistics, the broadest possible range of competing products and materials available, manufacturer warranties, and similar factors in the award of contracts for such technology;

WHEREAS, Public Contract Code section 20118.2 requires that the District make findings supporting this alternative procurement process before the process begins;

WHEREAS, the alternative procurement process authorized by Public Contract Code section 20118.2 requires seven steps in order to justify an award of a contract, all of which the District will follow in order to provide the best possible solution for the District; and

WHEREAS, this alternative procurement process requires the following: (1) the preparation of a request for proposal by the school district which is submitted to an adequate number of qualified sources, as determined by the school district, to permit reasonable competition consistent with the nature and requirement of the procurement; (2) the publication of a notice of the request for proposal at least twice in a newspaper of general circulation at least ten (10) days before the date

for receipt of the proposals; (3) every effort by the school district to generate the maximum feasible number of proposals from qualified sources and a finding to that effect before proceeding to negotiate if only a single response to the request for proposal is received; (4) the request for proposal shall identify all significant evaluation factors, including price and their relative importance; (5) reasonable procedures provided by the school district for the technical evaluation of the proposals received, the identification of qualified sources, and the selection for the award of the contract; (6) the award of a contract shall be made to the qualified source whose proposal meets the evaluation standards and will be most advantageous to the school district with price and all other factors considered; and (7) if an award is not made to the source whose proposal contains the lowest price, the school district shall make a finding setting forth the basis for the award of any contract;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE SANTA ANA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT FINDS, DECLARES, RESOLVES AND ORDERS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. The Board of Education hereby finds that the recitals set forth above are true and correct.
- 2. The Board of Education hereby finds that it intends to proceed under Public Contract Code section 20118.2 in order to award a contract for a body worn video/audio camera program for its police officers.
- 3. The Board of Education finds that the safety and security on the District's school sites is of paramount importance necessitating such a program.
- 4. The Board of Education finds that the deployment of body worn video and audio cameras is a commitment to its police officers to ensure (a) accurate documentation of official duty-related activity of its officers in the field; (b) safety of its officers; and (c) positive relations with the District employees, students and communities surrounding the school sites.
- 5. The Board of Education finds that the deployment of body worn video and audio cameras is a commitment to its employees, students and the communities surrounding the school sites to ensure

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- (a) accountability of its police officers for their actions;(b) proper evaluation of school incidents; and (c) better monitoring of the school environment.
- 6. The Board of Education finds that transparency, accountability and community trust in the District's police officers is imperative, and the need for the most advanced technology is required to support the body worn video/audio camera program.
- 7. The Board of Education finds that the body worn video/audio camera program will accomplish the following: a strong partnership between the District's police officers and its certificated and classified employees to enhance a positive school environment; assist the police officers to collaboratively work with the employees and students at the school sites to deal with problems before they occur; prevent excessive use-of-force incidents; and assist in crime and juvenile delinquency prevention, crisis intervention and mediation of disputes.
- 8. The Board of Education finds that a body worn video and audio camera program will involve the following: (a) the deployment of lightweight cameras worn on the front of an officer's uniform, typically on the chest or on the belt depending on body type, while on duty in the field; (b) cameras with both video and audio capabilities utilizing only the most advanced technology in the law enforcement industry; (c) a mobile device used to review and tag video in the field; (d) an evidence transfer manager or docking station to upload the video and perform various technical functions such as synching the date and time and protecting the integrity and confidentiality of the data; (e) continual updating of camera hardware and software with the latest technology; (f) retention of all the video and audio data requiring unlimited storage of all the video and audio data on District servers at the District office; (g) a data management solution used to access and review video along with audio as well as share video and audio evidence with local authorities; (h) additional staffing to adequately manage the data; (i) full maintenance support; (j) training and consulting services for its officers and employees involved in the management of all the

data generated pursuant to the program; and (k) a long-term program to ensure its success in the District that will involve the development of clear and comprehensive objectives, policies and procedures.

- 9. The Board of Education hereby appoints the Superintendent as the District's administrator for the body worn video and audio camera program in order to ensure that the process utilized to select a successful contractor for this program follows the guidelines and directions set forth herein.
- 10. The Board of Education also authorizes the Superintendent to execute any documents required and to take whatever additional actions are necessary to ensure that the District's goals, objectives, policies and procedures in relation to this program are adhered to as directed by the Board of Education of the District.

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board acceptance of gifts, grants, and bequests on behalf of school sites and the District. For purposes of determining the estimated value of a gift, the District does not perform an appraisal or other such valuation, rather simply reports the value of the gift as provided by the donor.

ITEM SUMMARY:

If the value of a gift exceeds \$500, the Superintendent shall bring the nature of the gift, with a specific recommendation, to the Board of Education for approval. The gifts under this item are all valued at more than \$500.

RATIONALE:

The Board may accept any bequest or gift of money or property on behalf of the District. While greatly appreciating suitable donations, the Board discourages any gifts which may directly or indirectly impair its commitment to provide equal educational opportunities for all District students. The Board shall carefully evaluate any conditions or restrictions imposed by the donor in light of District philosophy and operations. If the Board believes the District will be unable to fully satisfy the donor's conditions, the gift shall not be accepted. Gift books and instructional materials shall be accepted only if they meet District criteria. At the Superintendent or designee's discretion, a gift may be used at a particular school.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board approval of the Project Lead The Way (PLTW) Aerospace Engineering course for high school students. In the 2014-15 school year, Segerstrom High School started their Engineering Pathway following the PLTW curriculum. Aerospace Engineering will be the third course in the four course sequence in our Engineering Pathway. The two courses previously approved include Introduction of Engineering Design and Principles of Engineering.

ITEM SUMMARY

RATIONALE:

This year long course expands students' learning in the fundamentals of atmospheric and space flight. Student instruction includes the physics of flight and the design of an airfoil, propulsion systems, and rockets. The foundation of orbital mechanics are discussed and student competency is demonstrated through project based learning (PBL) using industry-standard software. Students will develop skills in coding robotic systems through PBL such as remotely operated vehicles.

COURSE OUTLINE

Course Title: Aerospace Engineering District Course #:

Department: CTE/ Science Grade Level: 9-12

Course Length: 180 Hours

Prerequisites: None

Course Description:

This year long course expands students' learning in the fundamentals of atmospheric and space flight. Student instruction includes the physics of flight and the design of an airfoil, propulsion systems, and rockets. The foundations of orbital mechanics are discussed and student competency is demonstrated through project based learning (PBL) using industry-standard software. Students will develop skills in coding robotic systems through PBL such as remotely operated vehicles.

Santa Ana Unified School District

Unit 1: Introduction to Aerospace

The goal of this unit is to excite students about aerospace engineering while providing a foundation of knowledge related to flight. In this unit students explore the rich history of aerospace achievement that advanced the industry. Students are introduced to the physics that allow flight within the atmosphere and the systems which provide safe coordination for aircraft.

Lesson 1.1 Evolution of Flight

Performance Objective

In this lesson students will develop a foundational understanding of aerospace accomplishments. Achievements in aerospace engineering are set within the context of applying science, technology, math, and engineering to solve problems. Students develop their skills of working with a team and then within a larger group of the entire class while researching and discussing achievements in aerospace.

Lesson 1.2 Physics of Flight

Performance Objective

In this lesson students will build a foundational understanding of how flight within the Earth's atmosphere is possible. Students learn about the parts of an aircraft, how aircraft are controlled, and how the four forces of flight interrelate. Each of the forces of flight is explored individually to emphasize their impact. Students use a simulator to design an airfoil and analyze performance under changing conditions. An option is included for students to design, build, and test an airfoil in a wind tunnel if available. Students apply their knowledge and skills through a series of activities and projects to design, optimize, build, and test a competitive glider.

Lesson 1.3 Flight Planning and Navigation

Performance Objective

In this lesson students fly an aircraft using simulation software and learn how aircraft are safely coordinated. In this lesson students use a flight simulator to experience how aircraft respond to control systems. Students are introduced to navigation systems such as the Global Positioning System (GPS). Students apply their knowledge of GPS to plan a route and exchange this plan with another group to evaluate the plan's accuracy. Students learn how aircraft are safely coordinated through Air Traffic Control (ATC). Students apply this knowledge to scenarios where students make decisions in a simulated environment.

Unit 2: Aerospace Design

The goal of this unit is for students to learn about factors which affect aircraft design. Students develop knowledge and skills in this unit through the use of software design, simulation tools, and hands-on construction of composites.

Lesson 2.1 Materials and Structures

Performance Objective

In this lesson students will identify aerospace materials and their application. In this lesson students will explore properties of some aerospace materials. Students will design an aircraft structural component in computer aided design (CAD) simulation software. Students will create and test composite samples which represent structural components used in aircraft construction.

Lesson 2.2 Propulsion

Performance Objective

In this lesson is students develop a deeper understanding of one of the four forces of atmospheric flight – thrust – while understanding the foundation of spacecraft propulsion. In this lesson students will learn about ways thrust is produced for aircraft and spacecraft. Students design and test aircraft propulsion systems using simulation software. Students design, build, and test their own model rockets.

Lesson 2.3 Flight Physiology

Performance Objectives

In this lesson is students learn how the human body is affected by flight conditions and its impact on aircraft design. Students will measure various parameters of their vision, reaction time, and communication effectiveness. Students research and present aircraft accident investigation resources.

Unit 3: Space

In this unit students will focus on space related-concepts defined in aerospace engineering. Students will appraise governance of space and the impact of exploration of space. Students will identify orbital mechanics and apply these concepts to modeling orbiting systems with software used by aerospace engineers.

Lesson 3.1 Space Travel

Performance Objectives

In this lesson students gain a perspective of the immense scale of the universe and our exploration of space. In this lesson students are oriented to the dimensions of space by relating it to distances which they can see in the world close to them. Students learn about the accomplishments in space exploration and the legal system which governs these activities. Students explore the growing space debris problem and design and mock up a space junk mitigation system.

Lesson 3.1 Space Travel

In this lesson students gain a perspective of the immense scale of the universe and our exploration of space. In this lesson students are oriented to the dimensions of space by relating it to distances which they can see in the world close to them. Students learn about the accomplishments in space exploration and the legal system which governs these activities. Students explore the growing space debris problem and design and mock up a space junk mitigation system.

Lesson 3.2 Orbital Mechanics

Performance Objectives

In this lesson students identify the need for various types of satellite orbits and how different orbits are well-suited for different satellite missions. This lesson will provide students with an introduction to and basic understanding of laws governing and describing satellite orbits. Students will learn about the Keplerian Element Set and Kepler's Laws of Motion. Students apply what they learned by creating a model of the International Space Station orbit using Satellite Tool Kit (STK). STK is a powerful software package used by aerospace engineers.

Unit 4: Alternative Applications

The goal of this unit is for students to consider applications of aerospace concepts beyond the design of aircraft and spacecraft and to explore career opportunities in the field of aerospace engineering. Students simulate a progression of operations to explore a planet. Students build and operate a remote sensing model to measure a physical terrain similar to the satellite overflight of an unexplored planet. Students transform the data into a topographical map that students will use to plan an autonomous planetary rover mission.

Lesson 4.1 Statistics

Performance Objectives

In this lesson students will identify aerospace engineering concepts and how they can be applied beyond the design of aircraft and spacecraft. Students apply concepts related to airfoils and wind turbines to determine efficiency. Students apply the airfoil drag equation to design a parachute which they build and test.

Lesson 4.2 Remote Systems

In this lesson students will integrate mechanical, electrical, and software systems in the context of accomplishing a sequence of objectives to explore a new planet. In this lesson students design, create, and test using a robot modeling system which includes input sensors and output devices. This system provides students a platform to model systems such as a robot and satellite. Students will use the robot system to create a satellite model to gather elevation data of a terrain. This data is processed to generate a topographical map that they use as an input to planning a rover mission to that terrain. Students use a modeling system to design, build, program, and test an autonomous vehicle which simulate a rover sent to explore a remote location such as a planet or moon. Students use the modeling system to create a physical simulation of an autopilot system. Students create a program to use an accelerometer input to control the output of an aircraft control surface.

Lesson 4.3 Aerospace Careers

In this lesson students will develop the skills to identify and differentiate the opportunities for a career in aerospace engineering. In this lesson students envision themselves as future aerospace professionals and propose the major steps to achieve that vision.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board approval of the Film, Literature, and Composition course outline for 12th grade students.

ITEM SUMMARY

The Film, Literature, and Composition course is a blended learning senior English course that will meet UC "b" requirements

RATIONALE:

The proposed Film, Literature, and Composition course is a blended learning senior English course that will meet UC "b" requirements in order to provide an additional rigorous core English course option for 12th grade students. Film, Literature, and Composition is a year-long writing, text-based, English 12 course aimed at enriching the experience of textual literary study and expository, critical, and analytical writing through the medium of film. Additionally, this course can be used as an enrichment course opportunity for students in the arts conservatory or other Vision And Performing Arts Career Technical Education pathways. As an integrated course, it combines the content and skills of traditional academics with contextualized learning in career technical education.

<u>LCAP Goal 1.1</u>: Provide equitable access to rigorous, standards-based instructional programs that includes, but is not limited to, high quality instruction, instructional materials, academic support and technology-based resources.

COURSE OUTLINE

Course Title: Film, Literature, and Composition District Course #: TBD

Department: CTE/ English Grade Level: 12

Course Length: 180 Hours

Prerequisites: English 9, 10, 11

Course Description:

Film, Literature and Composition is a year-long writing, text-based, English 12 course aimed at enriching the experience of textual literary study and expository, critical, and analytical writing through the medium of film. This blended course of study will be designed around film genres and their elements (including comedy, western, world cinema, noir, horror, documentary, and musical). In addition, each unit will explore a variety of central themes (such as good vs. evil, the individual vs. the collective, triumph over adversity, love conquers all, etc.) common to both film and literature. The course literary texts include but are not limited to "A Midsummer Night's Dream," *Frankenstein*, and *The Sorrow of War: A Novel of North Vietnam*. The course films include but are not limited to *Citizen Kane, Metropolis, Rashomon*, and *The Sixth Sense*. All course films, including films on the approved homework lists, will be rated NR, G, PG, or PG-13, and will reflect diverse actors, directors, and screenwriters.

Learning Objectives:

- 1. Students will learn to view, study, and interpret film (visual image) as a literary medium.
- 2. Students will learn the analytical tools needed to study film, including the elements of film art and the terminology that film scholars and filmmakers use to describe film techniques.
- 3. Students will develop the critical reading, analytical and rhetorical skills to describe, interpret and evaluate film at the textual level and to engage current issues in film and media studies by moving beyond the individual text to consider the broader cultural significance of film.
- 4. Students will heighten their ability to think critically through literary analysis and interpretation of both literary texts and film.
- 5. Students will sharpen their ability to do close readings and interpretations of literary texts and find new, variable meanings when this analysis is juxtaposed with intensive scrutiny and analysis of film.

- 6. Students will develop their writing skills through reflective, analytical, expository, and argumentative writing.
- 7. Students will study and gain a deeper understanding of and perceptiveness to the varied elements of theme and genre as it applies to both film and literature.
- 8. Students will enhance their oral communication skills through active, regular classroom discussion and formal and informal presentations.

Assignment Overview:

- For each film watched in class, students will be given 5-7 short answer questions to guide them in applying the unit lessons to the film and analyzing the content, message, and cinematic elements of the film.
- For each film watched in class, students will have to write an analysis of how the filmmaker develops one or more key literary elements, such as theme, characterization, plot, setting, etc.
- For each unit, students will access the online resources in LaunchPad Solo for *The Film Experience* to enhance their understanding of the important film concepts covered in the course textbook. These resources feature a collection of short videos, including both film clips and unique annotated video essays, along with focus questions, quizzes, and writing prompts.
- For each unit, students will be given a list of approved movies to watch at home. They will be required to watch 1-2 of these and write an expository/analytical essay.
- For the course reading, each unit uses an assignment template to guide students through the following processes: reading rhetorically, connecting reading to film (visual image), connecting reading to writing, and writing.
- For each major work and many of the smaller texts, students will write a reflective, analytical, expository, or argumentative essay.
- In unit six, students will read a non-fiction book on their own and watch a movie that connects to it. These two materials will serve as two of five sources required for a research paper they will write. Students will be required to do extensive research online and in the library, using note and source cards to organize their research. They will also be required to do an outline and an MLA formatted Works Cited Page with parenthetical citations throughout.
- In unit six, students will present their research paper to the class through a persuasive speech.
- In unit two, students will be required to work in groups to perform a short scene from Shakespeare's "A Midsummer Night's Dream." The focus of the performance should be bringing to the forefront one or more of the comedic elements of the play.

Assessments include the following:

- Reading quizzes
- Film quizzes
- Short answer responses to critical questions
- Essays
- Informal, daily assessment
- Unit finals

- Research paper (MLA)
- Oral and multimedia presentations

(Rubrics will be used to assess all writing assignments and oral presentations.)

Instructional methods include the following:

- Group-based, whole-class, and teacher-led discussion of the films and texts studied
- Direct, explicit, and written instructions, including modeling
- Group work (whole and small)
- Structured questions
- Oral presentations (group and individual)
- Independent reading and viewing of films
- AVID strategies, such as Cornell Notes and Inquiry
- Peer editing
- Online and library research

Brief Unit Overview:

- This course is separated into units based around film genres; the only exception to this is the first unit, which serves as an introduction to film criticism and the elements and terminology for the study of film. Each unit incorporates lecture and note-taking on elements of genre, theme, textual readings (both non-fiction and literary texts are examined throughout the course), viewing of films, class discussion, film and literary analysis and criticism, and short answer responses to both film and course readings. Additionally, each unit will require the student to watch a film at home and respond to it through a structured, unassisted writing assignment that incorporates the themes, genres, and/or literary elements studied in the unit and/or class.
- Students will be required to write a minimum of two analytical papers per unit, one for the film they watch at home and one for unit literary text(s). Some units require additional essays, depending on the film we watch and the texts we read in class. The essays tend to be 1 ½ to 2 pages in length. Some of these assignments will be completed at home, while others will be completed in class under time constraints. Specific information about these assignments can be found below:
 - O Unit one: Students will write a paper in which they analyze the film's narrative structure, mise-en-scène, cinematography, editing, or sound and how the element is used to create meaning.
 - Unit two: Students will be given two lists of approved movies to watch at home and write two essays (one for each film) categorizing the humor and subgenre of the film. Furthermore, students will evaluate and write responses addressing humor in the written works studied in class.
 - Unit three: Students will be given a list of approved westerns to watch at home and write a paper on how the core western theme of the individual vs. the collective is addressed in the film of their choice.
 - Unit four: Students will be given a list of approved horror films to watch at home;
 they will categorize their chosen film as well as address the cinematic components
 (including the elements of German Expressionism) that serve to increase the horror

- of the film. In our study of *Frankenstein*, students will be journaling and writing written responses to short answer and full essay questions.
- O Unit five: Students will choose a movie from the approved homework list and write an in-class essay analyzing its elements of noir and the hard-boiled detective. Using Raymond Chandler's literary criticism "The Simple Art of Murder" as an example, students will write their own "The Art of..." papers.
- O Unit six: Students will be responsible for writing an analytical essay in which they define reality for themselves while referencing the unit texts. In addition, students will be required to write a 5-10 page research paper.
- Unit seven: Students will write a critical analysis of the film and literature of one
 of the continents studied in class. Furthermore, students will watch an approved
 foreign film on their own and write a critical review of it.
- O Unit eight: Students will watch a musical form an approved list, explore the type of musical they watched, analyze the use of music in the film, and finally, they will choose a song and analyze its poetic elements, as if it were a poem. Students will also be given the opportunity to write their own ballads.

First Semester

Unit Title: Unit 1 – Introduction to Film

Unit Description: This unit is designed to introduce the elements and terminology necessary for film study and criticism. Students will learn about narrative form and structure (including diegetic and non-diegetic elements, as well as character perspective and subjectivity), mise-enscène (focusing on setting, the human figure, lighting, and composition), cinematography (the camera in time and space, the frame in depth, and special visual effects), editing (collage, montage, tempo, timing, transitions, etc.), and sound (relationship between sound and image, dialogue, sounds effects, and music). We will view films in order to demonstrate and study these cinematic elements. Additionally, we will discuss, analyze, and write about these films in terms of literary merit, theme, and message. Finally, students will be given a list of acceptable films to watch at home and will write a paper in which they analyze the film's narrative structure, mise-en-scène, cinematography, editing, or sound, and how the element is used to create meaning. All other units will reinforce and further develop the elements and terminology learned in this first unit.

Unit Title: Unit 2 – Comedy

Unit Description: This unit is designed to introduce the comedy genre, focusing on the six major subgenres of film comedies and their elements: slapstick, screwball, satire, parody, romantic comedy, and black comedy. In addition to critical analysis and interpretation, literary texts will be used to study comedy in and comedic elements of literature, as well as theater. Some historical context regarding Shakespearean theater and comedy, early cinema and vaudeville will be discussed in order to gain a better understanding of both the films and texts we will be studying. Furthermore, the literary texts and films will be critically viewed, read, and analyzed to engage students in written and oral discussions of the broader cultural significance of the pieces. Students will also be given two lists of approved movies to watch at home and write two essays

(one for each film) categorizing the humor and subgenre of the film. In addition, students will write an in-class essay about the satire in Swift's "A Modest Proposal" and the elements of comedy in Allen's "The Kugelmass Episode." Finally, students will work in groups to perform a short scene from Shakespeare's "A Midsummer Night's Dream." The focus of the performance should be to bring to the forefront one or more of the comedic elements of the play.

Unit Title: Unit 3 – Westerns

Unit Description: This unit focuses on the narrative and visual conventions of a western, such as setting (expansive, remote, untamed wilderness), character (lone cowboy, ranchers, villains, Native Americans, damsels in distress), costume (cowboy hats, jangly spurs, dusty work-wear), prop (six-shooters, horses, whiskey glasses), plot/conflict (good vs. evil, nature vs. culture, freedom vs. restriction), symbol (villains in black hats, heroes in white hats), and theme (individual vs. the collective, conquest of the wilderness in the name of civilization, codes of honor other than the law, American individualism, obsolete ways of life vs. modern technology). Most importantly, students learn that westerns aren't just stories with cowboys, gunfights and horses but are rather concerned with the tension between the contradictory impulses of individual liberty and communal responsibility. They will learn that the thematic core of the genre is the tension between the longing for the unencumbered freedom of the wilderness and the physical security promised by civilization. This theme will be addressed and analyzed in both the films we watch and the texts, both fiction and non-fiction, we read. Once again, students will be given a list of approved westerns to watch at home and write a paper on how the core western theme of the individual vs. the collective is addressed in the film.

Unit Title: Unit 4 – Horror

Unit Description: This unit will focus on the three main types of horror films (Horror of Personality, Horror of Armageddon, and Horror of the Demonic) and the elements of horror, including the film conventions and techniques that build tension, suspense and fear. The four core plot components of horror will also be addressed: isolation, desperation, lost cause, and redemption. In order to understand the roots of horror we will also explore the visual rhetoric of German Expressionism: low-key lighting, chiaroscuro, extreme camera angles, and distorted lines. In class, we will complete a close reading, various class discussions, and extensive verbal and written analysis of *Frankenstein* and "The Masque of the Red Death," focusing on the themes of the works, the elements of horror, and their continued influence on the genre. Finally, students will be given a list of approved horror films to watch at home; they will categorize their chosen film as well as address the cinematic components that serve to increase the horror of the film.

Second Semester

Unit Title: Unit 5 – Film Noir and the Hard-boiled Detective Film

Unit Description: Throughout the film noir unit, students will study the elements and conventions of noir, as well as its source material, pulp fiction. The historical roots of noir will be addressed, focusing on why some consider it the most American film genre. The elements of film noir that will be discussed include lighting (such as low-key lighting, chiaroscuro, etc.), camerawork (Dutch angles, distortion), narrative structure and devices (convoluted story lines, voiceover, flash forward), plot (false suspicions, betrayals, con games), character (hard-boiled detective, femme fatale), setting (urban, night, seedy bars), themes (honorable working class vs. maliciously deceitful upper class, cultural paranoia, loss of moral compass), and tone (pessimistic, "black"). Students will also read and analyze short crime stories from the golden age of pulp: 1930s, 1940s, and 1950s. We will spend some time characterizing hard-boiled detectives by reading and studying Chandler's definition in his essay of literary criticism, "The Simple Art of Murder." In addition to the other course readings, students will read a Dashiell Hammett short story and various excerpts from his novel The Maltese Falcon and compare/contrast them to the film. The unit final will allow students to choose a movie from the approved homework list and write an in-class essay analyzing its elements of noir and the hardboiled detective.

Unit Title: Unit 6 – Documentary

Unit Description: This unit explores the history, characteristics, and formal organization of documentary films and emphasizes the way they differ from narrative, feature-length commercial fiction films in their purpose, mode of production, exhibition venues, and visual style. In studying the formal mode of organization, we will study the framework developed by film scholar Bill Nichols. The specific documentary types we will study are voice of authority/propaganda films, "talking heads" documentaries, direct cinema/Cinéma vérité, self-reflexive documentary, and mockumentaries. Documentary films will serve as a springboard to read about, study, and discuss logical fallacies, philosophy, and ethics. Our overarching philosophical question will be: What is reality? This question will be explored in our class discussions, films, and unit readings. Students will also be responsible for writing an analytical essay in which they define reality for themselves while referencing the unit texts. Finally, students will be given a list of approved documentaries paired with non-fiction books. These will serve as two sources for a research paper they will write and eventually present to the class.

Unit Title: Unit 7 - World Cinema

Unit Description: This unit focuses on both world literature and cinema. Students will have the opportunity to study and observe world cultures through the viewing of important films and assigned readings. The unit will be divided into four continents of study: Asia, Europe, Africa, and South America. For Asia, we will watch Rashomon and read The Sorrow of War: A Novel of North Vietnam. In addition to critical analysis of the book and film, we will focus our class discussions and assignments on points of view. The film presents shifting points of view in the narrative and the novel is unique because it presents the point of view of a North Vietnamese soldier during the Vietnam War. Surrealism will be studied when we watch The Seventh Seal and read "The Tunnel." Mapantsula presents the realities of growing up black in Johannesburg, South Africa; this film will be juxtaposed and compared/contrasted with the short story "Night Calls," which recalls growing up white in a South African suburb. Finally, magical realism will be studied in *The Sea Inside* and Marquez's "A Very Old Man with Enormous Wings." Students will write a critical analysis of the film and literature of one of the continents we study in class. In addition to the literary texts, students will read various critical reviews of the films we watch in class. At home, students will watch an approved foreign film on their own and write a critical review of it.

Unit Title: Unit 8 – Musicals

Unit Description: Students will study the most cinematic of genres, the musical, in this unit. This unit showcases cinema's magic with its uncanny ability to integrate character-driven romances with visual and aural sensation. To this end, we will study the core elements of the genre, the narrative structure of American musicals, the various types of musicals, and the purpose, use, and placement of musical numbers. Furthermore, we will study the genre's challenge of integrating song and dance numbers into the narrative, while focusing on the importance of music in setting a film's mood and tone. Finally, by studying the history of movie musicals, students will begin to interpret the sociological factors that affect box office receipts. The literary connection will be our study of poetry, specifically the musical devices of poetry: alliteration, assonance, consonance, rhyme, repetition, rhythm, meter, and feet. Each of the poems under study will be critically read and analyzed. Students will complete a unit final wherein they watch a musical from an approved list, explore the type of musical they watched, analyze the use of music in the film and finally, they will choose a song and analyze its poetic elements as if it were a poem. Students will also be given the opportunity to write their own ballads.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board approval of the data-sharing agreement between Harvard's Center for Education Policy Research (CEPR) Proving Ground Network and the Santa Ana Unified School District for February 24, 2016 through December 31, 2017. CEPR, through a project

ITEM SUMMARY:

New state and federal laws require data sharing agreements between District and external service providers.

entitled "The Proving Ground", is creating a collaborative research network of schools committed to developing a new approach to achieving better student outcomes at lower cost through the use of collectively generated evidence.

RATIONALE:

The District data will be used by the research team at CEPR and its contractor, Applied Predictive Technologies (APT), to determine the impact of different blended learning software packages. This will assist the District in evaluating the strengths and weaknesses of its instructional program and in developing strategies for improvement. The ultimate purpose of the project is to provide analytic findings about the relative effectiveness of different interventions, products, and implementation patterns in raising student achievement. These findings will allow leaders to make future decisions that are likely to improve student achievement. Because findings will be shared across the network, we expect learning to occur at a higher rate than typical.

This agreement supports LCAP goal 1.2 "Implement progress monitoring assessments for all academic programs."

This event is a high-energy race with each team given their "Rules of the Road", explaining the event and exactly what each team will need to do to score points throughout the morning. The teams will decipher puzzles that will lead them to various locations where they will compete in mental or physical challenges. They will receive point cards for their efforts and for the order in which they completed each task. The tasks can range from relatively simple challenges like building a five foot tower with given supplies or racing through an obstacle course, to more strenuous activities. The specific challenges will depend on the area chosen for the event, our budget, and the District's comfort level regarding the athleticism of the group and risk.

Independent Contractor Agreement

This AGREEMENT is hereby entered into between the **Santa Ana Unified School District**, hereinafter referred to as "DISTRICT," and **Feet First Eventertainment, Inc., 10736 Jefferson Blvd, #409, Culver City, CA 90230** hereinafter referred to as "CONTRACTOR."

WHEREAS, DISTRICT is authorized by Section 53060 of the California Government Code to contract with and employ any persons for the furnishing of special services and advice in financial, economic, accounting, engineering, legal or administrative matters, if such persons are specially trained and experienced and competent to perform the special services required;

WHEREAS, DISTRICT is in need of such special services and advice; and

WHEREAS, CONTRACTOR is specially trained and experienced and competent to perform the special services required by the DISTRICT, and such services are needed on a limited basis;

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

1. Services to be provided by CONTRACTOR: Through the Districts Health Benefit Authority Feet First will provide a HBA sponsored wellness event. This event will be a high-energy race with each team given their "Rules of the Road", explaining the event and exactly what each team will need to do to score points throughout the morning. The teams will decipher puzzles that will lead them to various locations where they will compete in mental or physical challenges. They will receive point cards for their efforts and for the order in which they completed each task. - 3. <u>Compensation:</u> DISTRICT agrees to pay the CONTRACTOR for services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this AGREEMENT a total fee not to exceed **Six Thousand Dollars** (\$6,000).

DISTRICT shall pay CONTRACTOR according to the following terms and conditions:

- 4. <u>Expenses:</u> DISTRICT shall not be liable to CONTRACTOR for any costs or expenses paid or incurred by CONTRACTOR in performing services for DISTRICT, except as follows: **N/A**
- 5. <u>Independent Contractor</u>: CONTRACTOR, in the performance of this AGREEMENT, shall be and act as an independent contractor. CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that he/she and all of his/her employees shall not be considered officers, employees or agents of the DISTRICT, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of the DISTRICT and/or to which DISTRICT's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Workers' Compensation. CONTRACTOR assumes the full responsibility for the acts and/or omissions of his/her employees or agents as they relate to the services to be provided under this AGREEMENT. CONTRACTOR shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to CONTRACTOR's employees.
- 6. <u>Materials:</u> CONTRACTOR shall furnish, at its own expense, all labor, materials, equipment, supplies and other items necessary to complete the services to be provided pursuant to this AGREEMENT, except as follows: N/A CONTRACTOR's services will be performed, findings obtained, reports and recommendations prepared in accordance with generally and currently accepted principles and practices of his/her profession.
- 7. <u>Originality of Services:</u> CONTRACTOR agrees that all technologies, formulae, procedures, processes, methods, writings, ideas, dialogue, compositions, recordings, teleplays, and/or video productions prepared for, written for, submitted to the DISTRICT and/or used in connection with this AGREEMENT, shall be wholly original to CONTRACTOR and shall not be copied in whole or in part from any other source, except that submitted to CONTRACTOR by DISTRICT as a basis for such services.

- 8. <u>Copyright/Trademark/Patent:</u> CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that all matters produced under this AGREEMENT shall become the property of DISTRICT and cannot be used without DISTRICT's express written permission. DISTRICT shall have all right, title and interest in said matters, including the right to secure and maintain the copyright, trademark and/or patent of said matter in the name of the DISTRICT. CONTRACTOR consents to use of CONTRACTOR's name in conjunction with the sale, use, performance and distribution of the matters, for any purpose and in any medium.
- 9. Termination: DISTRICT may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this AGREEMENT and compensate CONTRACTOR only for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by DISTRICT shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services by CONTRACTOR. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the CONTRACTOR or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner. DISTRICT may terminate this AGREEMENT upon giving of written notice of intention to terminate for cause. Cause shall include: (a) material violation of this AGREEMENT by the CONTRACTOR; or (b) any act by CONTRACTOR exposing the DISTRICT to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or (c) CONTRACTOR is adjudged a bankrupt, CONTRACTOR makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors or a receiver is appointed on account of CONTRACTOR's insolvency. Written notice by DISTRICT shall contain the reasons for such intention to terminate and unless within TEN (10) days after service of such notice the condition or violation shall cease, or satisfactory arrangements for the correction thereof be made, this AGREEMENT shall upon the expiration of the **TEN** (10) days cease and terminate. In the event of such termination, the DISTRICT may secure the required services from another contractor. If the cost to the DISTRICT exceeds the cost of providing the service pursuant to this AGREEMENT, the excess cost shall be charges to and collected from the CONTRACTOR. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to DISTRICT. Written notice by DISTRICT shall be deemed given when received by the other party, or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.

 - (a) Liability for damages for: (1) death or bodily injury to person; (2) injury to, loss or theft of property; or (3) any other loss, damage or expense arising out of (1) or (2) above, sustained by the CONTRACTOR or any person, firm or corporation employed by the CONTRACTOR, either directly or by independent contract, upon or in connection with the services called for in this AGREEMENT, however caused, except for liability for damages referred to above which result from the negligence or willful misconduct of the DISTRICT or its officers, employees or agents.
 - (b) Any injury to or death of any person(s), including the DISTRICT's officers, employees and agents, or damage to or loss of any property caused by any act, neglect, default, or omission of the CONTRACTOR, or any person, firm or corporation employed by the CONTRACTOR, either directly or by independent contract, arising out of, or in any way connected with, the services covered by this AGREEMENT, whether said injury or damage occurs either on or off DISTRICT's property, except for liability for damages which result from the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the DISTRICT or its officers, employees or agents.
 - (c) Any liability for damages which may arise from the furnishing or use of any copyrighted or uncopyrighted matter or patented or unpatented invention under this AGREEMENT.
- 11. <u>Insurance</u>: Pursuant to Section 10, CONTRACTOR agrees to carry a comprehensive general and automobile liability insurance with limits of **ONE MILLION Dollars** (\$1,000,000) per occurrence combined single limit for bodily injury and property damage in a form mutually acceptable to both parties to protect CONTRACTOR and DISTRICT against liability or claims of liability which may arise out of this AGREEMENT. In addition, CONTRACTOR agrees to provide an endorsement to this policy stating, "Such insurance as is afforded by this policy shall be primary, and any insurance carried by DISTRICT shall be excess and noncontributory." No

later than **TEN** (10) days from execution of this AGREEMENT by the DISTRICT and CONTRACTOR, CONTRACTOR shall provide DISTRICT with certificates of insurance evidencing all coverages and endorsements required hereunder including a thirty (30) day written notice of cancellation or reduction in coverage. CONTRACTOR agrees to name DISTRICT and its governing board, officers, agents and employees as additional insureds under said policy.

- 12. <u>Assignment:</u> The obligations of the CONTRACTOR pursuant to this AGREEMENT shall not be assigned by the CONTRACTOR.

This Grant Agreement, dated December 11, 2015 between Santa Ana Unified School District and Orange County United Way ("OCUW"), is for the explicit purpose described below and is subject to Santa Ana Unified School District's acceptance of the following conditions:

GRANT PURPOSE: The purpose of the grants is to support the implementation of Santa Ana Unified School District's Santa Ana Reads Initiative, Innovations for Learning Internet-based online tutoring program, TutorMate to meet the literacy needs of 250 at-risk first grade students in 25 classrooms in 6 school, as outlined in Attachment A.

GRANT AWARD: Santa Ana Unified School District has been approved to receive the following grant award for OCUW's FACE 2024 grant program. This commitment is contingent upon fulfillment of grant objectives and funding availability.

Santa Ana Reads Initiative

*Please be aware, all unspent funds remaining at the end of the GRANT TERM must be returned to OCUW by July 15, 2016.

GRANT TERM & PAYMENT SCHEDULE: The FACE 2024 Grant Term is from <u>07/01/2015</u> through <u>06/30/2016</u> unless sooner terminated by the provisions herein by either party. Grant Award payments shall be issued by OCUW on the following dates, contingent upon Santa Ana Unified School District's compliance with all grant requirements at the time payments are scheduled to be released.

100% of total allocation - Upon receipt of signed grant agreement

GRANT COMPLIANCE – OCUW GRANT FUNDING POLICIES: Failure to maintain grant compliance may result in Santa Ana Unified School District's placement in OCUW's Monitoring and Support program and may result in the withholding of grant allocations and/or cancellation of Santa Ana Unified School District's grant at the discretion of OCUW's Community Impact Cabinet and/or Board of Directors. Specific areas may include, but are not limited to, the development of shared and individual outcomes for programmatic performance, standards for service delivery and assessment tools.

FINANCIAL REVIEW AND AUDIT: Santa Ana Unified School District Financial Statements will be reviewed by OCUW's Financial Review Committee (FRC).

Santa Ana Unified School District agrees to submit required financial statements/documents (listed below) to OCUW no later than SIX (6) months after Santa Ana Unified School District's fiscal year end, unless Santa Ana Unified School District has requested and been approved for a one-time 30 day extension. All financial statements must be prepared on an accrual basis according to the Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants (AICPA) for non-profit agencies. Financial statement requirements are based on Santa Ana Unified School District total revenue as follows:

Santa Ana Unified School District Revenue of \$300,000 and above must submit:

- Board approved independent Financial Audit
- Corresponding management letter SAS 115 (regardless of whether or not any material weaknesses are found)

Santa Ana Unified School District Revenue of \$100,000 up to \$299,000 must submit:

- Board approved independent Financial Review may be submitted in lieu of an independent Financial Audit
- Corresponding management letter SAS 115 (regardless of whether or not any material weaknesses are found)

Santa Ana Unified School District Revenue Less than \$100,000 must submit:

A Financial Compilation with full disclosures may be submitted in lieu of an independent Financial Audit or a Financial Review

If Santa Ana Unified School District does not request an extension and submits a late audit or submits the necessary information after the OCUW approved extension, Santa Ana Unified School District will be placed on Monitoring and Support and may include a non-compliance fee of 25% of its total annual grant - subject to approval by OCUW's CIC. Santa Ana Unified School District's failure to provide required statements can lead to termination of the funding partnership.

PROGRAM SITE VISITS: Santa Ana Unified School District agrees to schedule and provide program site visits/tours for OCUW staff, leadership and/or community stakeholders throughout the grant term, during mutually agreeable times.

Santa Ana Reads Initiative

Substantial Need for Santa Ana Reads: The Santa Ana Reads Initiative addresses the critical need to build literacy levels in Santa Ana. According to the 2013 US Census, the city of Santa Ana has a total population of 324,528 with Latinos representing the largest ethnic population at 78.2%, 9.2% White, 10.5% Asian, 1.5% African American, 1.3% other. City leaders predict the actual population is closer to 500,000, as opposed to 325,000. According to the 2010 US Census, among all the cities in Orange County, Santa Ana has the highest population density coupled with a low per capita income of \$15,243 in 2010, which is roughly half of that of Orange County. Additionally, Santa Ana's unemployment rate as of April 2012 was 11.8 percent, significantly higher than Orange County's unemployment rate of 7.4 percent.

Santa Ana Unified School District (SAUSD), the 6th largest public K-12 school district in California, serves nearly 54,000 students — with 95% Hispanic, 91% economically disadvantaged and 82% English Learners. Students who do not speak, read or write English fluently face serious limitations in Orange County's current and future job market. SAUSD's 12th grade graduates who completed all courses required for UC/CSU entrance was only 34%, compared to 43% in Orange County and 38% statewide. (CalPADs) Santa Ana Reads is designed to build the strong literacy skills for students early in their education, so that will result in a foundation so that they succeed academically and are well prepared for the college and career pathway of their choice.

Ensuring that students are reading on grade level by 3rd grade is a concern on a national level. The 2009 NAEP 4th grade reading test results show that 67% of all students,83% of low income students, and 83% of Hispanic students were not proficient in reading. While more than half of all 4th grade students were not reading on grade level, it is alarming that over 4/5th of Latino and impoverished students do not have the basic literacy skills they need to succeed academically. Schoenbach, asserts that improved literacy is key to supporting low achieving students because, "to a greater degree than any other skill, the inability to read at grade level impedes student success in all other academic areas." (Schoenbach et al. 1999) Leila Fiester says it best, "If we don't get dramatically more children on track as proficient readers, the United State will lose a growing and essential proportion of its human capital to poverty, and the price will be paid not only by individual children and families, but by the entire country." Santa Ana Reads is designed to intervene early so that literacy gaps are prevented rather than remediated.

Purpose: SAUSD is pleased to partner with Innovations for Learning, Orange County United Way in the Santa Ana Reads. In support of SAUSD's goal that all students are reading on grade level by third grade, this initiative will provide on-line tutoring to support 250 at-risk first grade students in 25 classrooms in 6 schools through the TutorMate program.

The goals of the Santa Ana Reads Initiative are:

- 1) Build awareness of the importance of reading by third grade to the public
- 2) Leverage strong partnerships and community support
- 3) Accelerate student literacy achievement for 250 at-risk first grade students

Program Design: Through Santa Ana Reads, community volunteers will use Innovations for Learning internet-based online tutoring program, TutorMate to meet the literacy needs of 250 at-risk first grade students in 25 classrooms in 6 schools (Remington, Madison, Jackson, Garfield, Harvey and Wilson Elementary). The program will start the third week of school. The identified first grade teachers will receive training and technical support to ensure effective implementation of the program. Each classroom will be supplied with technology that will be used exclusively for the TutorMate program to ensure that the students have access to technology at their tutoring time.

Each week, the volunteers will meet virtually with their student for 30 minutes to use TutorMate. The tutor shares the screen with the student but they are unable to see each other's faces. In other school districts, there has been end-of-year tutor gatherings so that the students may meet their tutor. If and when the end of year gathering will occur will be determined by the site administrator. To support the community tutors, they will receive training from Innovations for Learning, have access to a TutorMate help desk and receive district level support.

To kick off the event, SAUSD will be holding a volunteer luncheon where Orange County professionals can make a difference by remotely tutoring first grade students for just 30 minutes once a week. Together we can make a difference.

Evaluation of Program Effectiveness: The effectiveness of the program will be monitored through the Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills (DIBELS) assessment, which is administered to all first grade students three times a year in the fall, winter and spring. DIBELS is comprised of seven measures to function as indicators of phonemic awareness, alphabetic principle, accuracy and fluency with connected text, reading comprehension, and vocabulary. DIBELS is designed for use in identifying children experiencing difficulty in acquisition of basic early literacy skills in order to provide support early and prevent the occurrence of later reading difficulties. The goal of the program will be that all participating students are reading at "core support" level which will indicate that the students are performing above grade level at the end of first grade. Students will continue to be monitored into third grade to determine if the support had lasting effect and the students continued to read at grade level.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board approval of the amendment for the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the California College Guidance Initiative and Educational Services (CCGI) and the Santa Ana Unified School District.

At its June 9, 2015 meeting, the Board approved the MOU between CCGI and the District.

ITEM SUMMARY:

Amended MOU for education records uploaded on the California Colleges website and use of this data for research purposes to evaluate CCGI's impact.

RATIONALE:

This amended MOU will allow the District to cease obtaining active parent/guardian consent for students whose education records are uploaded into their portfolios on the California Colleges website for use in college and career planning and guidance activities. This also allows CCGI to use the data for research purposes to evaluate its impact, and to support broader efforts to advance college access among first generation students by informing conversations about college guidance, college readiness, and student eligibility for higher education.

The District is completing its second year of a partnership with CCGI with the express purpose of supporting students, counselors, parents, and community-based organizations with technological tools that can help guide students as they prepare for success in high school and then college. The goal of this partnership has been to ensure that all District grade 6-12 students have access to the tools and information they need to plan, prepare, and successfully transition to college.

In the Santa Ana Unified School District, CCGI has introduced tools and resources to students via in-class workshops, grade-specific conferences, and Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) lessons. These tools include college and career interest surveys for exploration of potential careers, information on which college majors are best for which careers, and a four-year plan via a

"Plan of Study" tool which helps students plot their own path to graduation and check in real-time for a-g progress and completion.

This amended MOU supports LCAP goal 1.1 "Ensure success for low-income pupils by providing transition support", LCAP goal 2.3: "Increase resources to schools to support extracurricular programs for students, instructional materials, and other programs and supplies", and LCAP goal 1.2 "Implement progress monitoring assessments for all academic programs."

Effective July 1, 2015, the California College Guidance Initiative ("CCGI"), which operates under the auspices of the Foundation for California Community Colleges ("Foundation"), a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, and **Santa Ana Unified School District** ("District"), entered into a Memorandum of Agreement for the purpose of setting forth roles and responsibilities of the parties related to District's uploading of Education Records to the CaliforniaColleges Website and Foundation's provision of account support services on the CaliforniaColleges Website.

The effect of this amended and restated agreement is to enable District to cease obtaining active parent/guardian consent for students who's Education Records are uploaded into their portfolios on the CaliforniaColleges Website for use in college and career planning and guidance activities. Additionally, this amended and restated agreement allows CCGI to use the data for research purposes to evaluate its impact, and to support broader efforts to advance college access among first generation students by informing conversations about college guidance, college readiness and student eligibility for higher education in the state of California.

The parties hereby amend the Agreement by deleting it in its entirety and replacing it with the following:

This Amended and Restated Memorandum of Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into and shall be effective as of **February 24, 2016**, ("Effective Date"), by and between the Foundation for Community Colleges, a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization ("Foundation") which operates the California College Guidance Initiative ("CCGI") project as a fiscal sponsor and **Santa Ana Unified School District** ("District"). For the purposes of this Agreement the "Party" shall mean either Foundation or District and "Parties" shall mean both Foundation and District. For the avoidance of doubt, CCGI is not a designated corporate entity and is not a party to this Agreement.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, Foundation is the official nonprofit organization supporting the California Community College Chancellor's Office and the California Community Colleges Board of Governors and its mission to benefit, support and enhance the California Community College system;

WHEREAS, CCGI is a campaign ("CCGI Program") operated by Foundation in order to ensure (a) the awareness and utilization of online planning tools in K-12 districts (b) systematic baseline guidance and support for 6th-12th grade students as they plan, prepare and finance college (c) the continued evolution of www.CaliforniaColleges.edu or hereinafter ("CaliforniaColleges Website");

WHEREAS, the purpose of this Agreement is to set forth the roles and responsibilities of the Parties related to District's uploading of Education Records to the CaliforniaColleges Website and Foundation's provision of account support services on the CaliforniaColleges Website;

WHEREAS, Foundation has entered into a third party licensing and services agreement with XAP Corporation ("XAP") for the express purposes of the design, development, implementation, operation and maintenance of the CaliforniaColleges Website to carry out the purpose of this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, Foundation and District desire and agree to enter into this Agreement in furtherance of the purpose stated above;

AGREEMENT

NOW, THERFORE in consideration of the foregoing recitals (which are incorporated into and made part of this Agreement by this reference); each Party's respective representations, warranties and covenants contained herein; and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, Foundation and District do hereby agree as follows:

1. General Terms.

1.1 <u>Captions and Interpretation.</u> Paragraph headings in this Agreement are used solely for convenience, and shall be wholly disregarded in the construction of this Agreement. Paragraph headings shall not be deemed to define, limit or extend the scope or intent of the paragraphs to which they appertain.

2. <u>Definitions</u>

The following capitalized terms when used in this Agreement shall have the meanings ascribed to them respectively, in this Definitions section, unless such term is otherwise expressly defined in this Agreement.

- 2.1 "Agreement" shall have the meaning set forth in the preamble above and includes all exhibits, schedules and other attachments hereto, as each may be amended in a writing signed by both Parties from time to time.
- 2.2 "Authorized Third Party" shall mean a person or entity, identified on Exhibit A to this agreement, attached hereto and incorporated by reference, authorized by the District to utilize the Services in accordance with this Agreement.
- 2.3 "Business Day" shall mean a Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday or Friday, but excluding (i) any day on which national banks having banking offices in either Sacramento or Los Angeles, California are authorized by law to remain closed and (ii) those days, not to exceed eleven (11) in any calendar year, which Foundation and/or District treats as a holidays but would otherwise be Business Days.

- 2.4 "Confidential Information" shall mean any and all information, data, Software (as defined in Section 2.15), know-how and intellectual property of a confidential or proprietary nature, including but not limited to, information, data, Software, know-how and intellectual property relating to (a) technical, scientific, developmental, marketing, manufacturing, sales, operating, performance and cost matters, (b) processes, (c) designs and (d) techniques, in any and all forms in which the foregoing may appear including, but not limited to, all record-bearing media containing or disclosing any of the foregoing. Confidential Information shall include, but not be limited to, all information, data, Software, know-how, and intellectual property that is (a) marked as "confidential" or "proprietary" at the time it is provided by or on behalf of the Party providing it, (b) expressly stated by or on behalf of the Party providing it to the Party receiving it at the time of disclosure to be considered confidential or proprietary, or (c) would under the circumstances be recognized by someone generally experienced in business affairs to be confidential or proprietary.
- 2.5 "CCGI Program" shall have the meaning set forth in the Recitals above.
- 2.6 "CaliforniaColleges Website" shall mean the Internet website located at www.CaliforniaColleges.edu and owned by the Riverside County Superintendent of Schools as fiscal agent of public funds for the Foundation. The Foundation is responsible for directly contracting and compensating XAP for the continued operation and maintenance of www.CaliforniaColleges.edu under a separate agreement. This definition shall also include any successor website thereto including any such site established on some other form of interactive digital or electronic communications offered over or via any alternative or successor broad band or narrow band network or method of broadcast including wireless, intranets, extranets and interactive television or cable.
- 2.7 "Database" shall mean the combined list CCGI/XAP Electronic Transcript Technical Specifications attached to this Agreement as Exhibit C.
- 2.8 "Data Breach" shall mean actual evidence of the loss or unauthorized access to or unauthorized use of Student Data (as defined below in Section 2.13) uploaded to the CaliforniaColleges Website.
- 2.9 "Education Record" shall have the meaning as set forth in 34 CFR §99.3 or under applicable state law. Education records are those records that directly relate to a student and are maintained by an education agency or institution or by a party acting for the agency or institution. The term Education Records shall not include records that are otherwise excluded under 34 CFR §99.3 or applicable state laws.
- 2.10 "Effective Date" shall have the meaning set forth in the preamble above.
- 2.11 "Eligible Student" shall mean a student who has reached 18 years of age or is attending an institution of postsecondary education.
- 2.12 "Misuse" shall have the meaning as set forth in Section 7 of this Agreement.
- 2.13 "Student Data" shall mean any personally identifiable information (a) contained in a student's Education Record maintained by or for the District and provided to the CaliforniaColleges Website by an employee or agent of the District; or (b) acquired directly from a student or parent or legal guardian of the student by the

CaliforniaColleges Website if that site is assigned to the student by a teacher or other employee of the District and shall include, by way of example, demographic information, course enrollment, performance and completion data, standardized test scores and enrollment and graduation dates.

- 2.14 "Services" means the services and levels of support offered by Foundation and accepted by District, as agreed to in a separate fee-based service agreement entered into by the Parties. A description of the Services is attached hereto as Exhibit B, and is hereby incorporated by reference.
- 2.15 "Software" shall mean the computer programs, in machine-readable object code and source code, created and owned by XAP and licensed by Foundation in order to develop, operate and maintain the CaliforniaColleges Website and to facilitate the acquisition, retention, and retrieval of System User data via the Internet. "Software" shall include, but not be limited to, computer programs, in machine-readable object code and source code, created and owned by XAP and licensed by Foundation for use in connection with the CaliforniaColleges Website, or that comprises the CaliforniaColleges Website.
- 2.16 "Personally identifiable information" shall have the meaning specified in FERPA regulations, 34 CFR §99.3.
- 2.17 "System User" shall mean any student or parent whose Student Data are disclosed to the CaliforniaColleges Website by the District or by a student (or parent) who is assigned to use the CaliforniaColleges Website by the District.

Any other capitalized terms used in this Agreement that are not defined in this Section 2 or in any exhibit, schedule or other attachment that is expressly incorporated into this Agreement, shall have the meaning given to them in this Agreement.

3. Term, Termination

- 3.1 <u>Term</u>. The term of this Agreement shall begin on the Effective Data and shall continue until terminated by either Party ("Term") in accordance with this Section 3.
- 3.2 <u>Termination for Convenience</u>. The Parties shall have the right to terminate this Agreement for any reason or no reason, without penalty, at any time by providing the other with written notice of termination in accordance with Section 20 of this Agreement at least thirty (30) calendar days in advance.
- 3.3 <u>Termination for Cause</u>. Either party shall have the right to terminate the Agreement immediately upon written notice to the other Party upon the occurrence of a material breach of this Agreement, including a material breach with respect to the any representations and warranties which remain uncured for more than sixty (60) days after the non-breaching Party provides notice of such material breach to the other Party.
- 3.4 Effect of Expiration or Early Termination. In the event of an early termination under Section 3.2 or 3.3, access to the CaliforniaColleges Website and participation in the CCGI Program shall immediately terminate ("Termination Date"). District acknowledges and agrees that Foundation may upon the Termination Date disable District's and System Users's access to the CaliforniaColleges Website.

- 3.4.1 <u>Deletion of Student Data.</u> Student Data provided under the Agreement shall be destroyed by Foundation upon termination of this agreement or within thirty (30) days from the date on which the District requests destruction of the data or determines that such student data are no longer needed for the purposes of this Agreement, subject to section 3.4.3. Except as provided in section 3.4.3, the Foundation agrees to use reasonable commercial efforts to certify within thirty days (30) after the Termination Date that Student Data are no longer retained or accessible to the Foundation or Authorized Third Parties.
- 3.4.2 Requests for Return of Student Data to District. In lieu of destruction of the Student Data, as provided in sec. 3.4.1, the District may request return of the data. In the event of such a request, the District shall provide thirty days (30) advance written notice to the address listed in Section 20 of this Agreement to the Foundation. Upon request and notice by District in accordance with this Section 3.4.2, Foundation shall provide assistance with the migration and conversion of historical data in a flat file or other format reasonably requested by District and reasonably acceptable to Foundation and XAP. District shall be responsible for all costs and expenses associated with such requests including but not limited to costs for migration and data conversion and shall otherwise cooperate with Foundation and XAP to transfer such data to the District.
- 3.4.3 Retention of Student Data by the System User after Termination. The Parties acknowledge and agree that the requirements provided in Section 3.4.1 shall not apply to Student Data if the student or the student's parent supplied such Student Data to CaliforniaColleges Website and elects upon termination of the Agreement to continue to maintain a personal account with Foundation: (1) for the purpose of storing their individual data; (2) in the event the student or parent elects to retain their data in the CCGI Program for purposes of continuing to obtain the benefits of participation in the CCGI Program; or (3) if the student or parent elects to continue to obtain the service offerings from any other Authorized Third Party with which the supplying System User has elected to share their Student Data through the CCGI Program for the educational purposes set forth under the Agreement.

4. Responsibilities of Foundation

- 4.1 Account Support Services.
 - 4.1.1 Foundation shall provide the necessary support for the integration of Education Records and Student Data into individual student accounts on the CaliforniaColleges Website. Foundation agrees to cooperate with representatives from the District to ensure data is properly uploaded in CCGI's file format and in accordance with the requirements and instructions as more fully set forth and incorporated herein as Exhibit C to this Agreement.
 - 4.1.2 Foundation shall permit access to Authorized Third Parties such as participating institutions of higher education to request and receive Student Data where the individual student already has applied for admission to the particular institution.
 - 4.1.3 Foundation will enable System User's transcript data, to be uploaded directly into individual student accounts by Districts and will be maintained and processed by CCGI on behalf of the District in a manner that meets the standards of the

- California State University and University of California systems for verified transcript data.
- 4.1.4 Foundation will provide an audit report of District's A-G course listings in the UC Course Management Portal database to identify discrepancies. Foundation agrees to provide support to District staff for purposes of reconciliation of any identified discrepancies.
- 4.1.5 Foundation agrees to provide support to District on the integration of the CaliforniaColleges Website's tools and content into various instructional and counseling experiences.
- 4.1.6 Foundation shall provide District an ability to generate System User accounts on the "Professional Center" counselor facing portal linked to the CaliforniaColleges Website for all System Users who participate in counseling or have any other reasonable need to access student data and reporting functionality.
- 4.1.7 Foundation shall provide District an ability to select a function that allows the autogeneration of accounts for System Users to submit Student Data to CCGI.
- 4.1.8 Foundation agrees to provide support to System Users consistent with applicable law in use of the CaliforniaColleges Website including but not limited to technical advice and guidance in order to enable the System Users and Authorized Third Parties to use the Student Data for recruitment, admissions and first year academic placement from high school to college and for any other use permissible under the terms of this Agreement.
- 4.1.9 Foundation agrees to support efforts between System Users and Authorized Third Parties by training and supporting those Authorized Third Parties in those districts and by adding them as optional "sites" to which System Users' individual portfolios can be connected for support in college planning and preparation.
- 4.1.10 Upon request by District and in accordance with the applicable legal requirements set forth under this Agreement, Foundation shall provide Student Data to institutions of higher education or financial or scholarship providers for System Users who have applied for admission to such institution or for financial aid to such provider, or as otherwise permitted by the written consent of the student's parent or guardian (or an Eligible Student as provided in Section 5.1 of this Agreement for the purposes of admissions, academic placement, and education guidance, advising, and planning.

5. Responsibilities of District

- 5.1 District shall provide Foundation with a list of all approved Authorized Third Parties including but not limited to any non-profit organizations that provide student support services, youth development and college planning or preparation services under a service and data-sharing agreement with the District.
- 5.2 District shall make staff, appropriate technology resources and space available for ongoing professional development and user support.

- 5.3 District shall upload course location and course catalog files to enable the use of A-G progress analysis tools.
- 5.4 District agrees to verify accuracy of Student Data entered by District into the UC Course Management Portal at the University of California Office of the President.
- 5.5 District agrees to upload Education Records from the local SIS system into the CaliforniaColleges Website using a standard data format with naming conventions, and using a pre-defined protocol, and as follows:
 - 5.5.1 Review all data specifications with Foundation team for Phase 1 data files (upload of school code, creation of student portfolios and counselor accounts).
 - 5.5.2 Prepare and post Phase 1 data files to an FTP site.
 - 5.5.3 Make any necessary fixes to Phase 1 data files to meet upload requirements.
 - 5.5.4 Conduct final review of testing on beta site to ensure accuracy of Phase 1 upload.
 - 5.5.5 Review all data specifications with CCGI team for Phase 2 data files (enrolled/completed courses).
 - 5.5.6 Prepare and post Phase 2 data files to an FTP site.
 - 5.5.7 Make any necessary fixes to Phase 2 data files to meet upload requirements.
 - 5.5.8 Conduct final review of testing of beta site to ensure accuracy of Phase 2 upload.
- 5.6 District agrees to collaborate with Foundation staff to provide both individual user experience and technical feedback in order to improve implementation for all System Users.
- 5.7 District agrees to designate a responsible individual; (1) to assist the Foundation during implementation phase including providing any necessary support to XAP; (2) to navigate or immediately report any issues regarding availability of the CaliforniaColleges Website; and (3) to immediately report any issues regarding availability of the CaliforniaColleges Website.
- 5.8 District agrees to upload Education Records from the local SIS system into the CaliforniaColleges Website on a monthly basis. District may conduct these uploads more frequently if desired, however at least one upload per month is required.

6. Privacy and Data Security Compliance Obligations of the Parties

- 6.1 Foundation agrees to maintain policies and procedures for the designation and training of responsible staff members to ensure the confidentiality and security of Student Data.
- 6.2 Foundation shall not sell or use or permit any third party to use Student Data for commercial purposes or for targeted advertising.
- 6.3 Foundation agrees to maintain commercially reasonable policies and procedures to ensure Student Data are secured in the Database.
- 6.4 Foundation shall require any Authorized Third Parties that may be granted access to Student Data to agree to terms not less restrictive than those set forth under this Section 6. Authorized Third Parties shall designate and train individuals authorized to review or receive Student Data from the CaliforniaColleges Website in order to ensure the security and confidentiality

- of the Student Data. Compliance with this requirement shall not, in itself, absolve the Authorized Third Party of liability in the event of an unauthorized disclosure of Student Data.
- 6.5 Foundation agrees to comply with the Children's Online Privacy Protection Act of 1998, 15 U.S.C. Sec. 6501-6506 ("COPPA") and consistent with the privacy policy located on the CaliforniaColleges Website, agrees that no Student Data shall be collected from persons under the age of thirteen unless provided by District in accordance with purposes as set forth under this Agreement.
- 6.6 Foundation shall maintain Student Data for and on behalf of District in accordance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act ("FERPA"), 20 U.S.C. § 1232g(a)(4)(A)(ii), 1232g(b)(1) and Section 49073.1 of the California Education Code. Student Data may be disclosed only to the Authorized Third Parties as set forth on Exhibit A, and only to Foundation employees or employees of contractors who have a legitimate education interest in maintaining, organizing, or analyzing the Student Data for uses authorized in this Agreement.
- 6.7 Foundation shall provide Student Data only: (1) to officials or employees of the District who have a legitimate interest in the Student Data in order to assist System Users to prepare for college; (2) to contractors of the District and their employees who have a parallel interest in the Student Data; (3) to colleges to which a System User has applied for admission; (4) to appropriate financial aid organizations to which a System User has applied for aid in connection with certain determinations concerning the eligibility and conditions for an award of financial aid to the System User; (5) in aggregate, non-personally identifiable form, to Foundation contractors for research and evaluation purposes; and (6) to other Authorized Third Parties with which the District has contracted for services – or which under California law has authority for oversight or providing services to the District (such as a County Office of Education) for purposes consistent with this Agreement. District shall ensure that any Authorized Third Party under the Agreement shall not use any Student Data obtained from the CaliforniaColleges Website for any purpose other than those required or permitted by this Agreement. District shall ensure that any third party service provider shall not use any Student Data obtained from the CaliforniaColleges Website for any purpose other than providing the service contracted for with the District or Foundation and may not disclose the Student Data to subsequent third parties.
- 6.8 The Foundation agrees to maintain an incident response program for purposes of memorializing Foundation's obligations under applicable law in the event Foundation detects any loss due to a Data Breach, or unauthorized access or use of Education Records or Student Data. Upon confirmation of a Data Breach, Foundation will notify District in accordance with its obligations under applicable law.
- 6.9 District is responsible for any notices to parents as may be required under applicable law and for providing the parent(s), guardian(s) or student(s) with an opportunity to inspect and challenge the contents of the Student Data in question. The Foundation shall cooperate with the District in providing such notices and opportunities to review and challenge the content of the Student Data.
- 6.10 District shall be responsible for secure transmission of Education Records from District to XAP via a secure FTP. District acknowledges and agrees that District is responsible for

- coordinating directly with XAP during the implementation of the Software to ensure the availability of the secure FTP site to District in accordance with this Section 6.10.
- 6.11 District agrees to cooperate fully with Foundation to ensure Foundation can comply with any notification obligations Foundation may have to System Users or any other parties for which notification by Foundation may be required under applicable law.
- 7. Misuse of CaliforniaColleges Website. District acknowledges and agrees that this Section 7 shall set forth the certain acts which shall either singularly or collectively constitute ("Misuse") under this Agreement. The Parties agree that the below Sections 7.1 through 7.8 shall not be construed to limit Foundation with respect to a determination of any other acts which may constitute Misuse under this Agreement and which may not otherwise be included in this Section 7 in Foundation's sole discretion. District agrees that it shall not, nor allow any System Users under the direct control of District to engage in any of the acts as set forth below:
 - 7.1 Access or use CaliforniaColleges Website in breach of the terms of this Agreement;
 - 7.2 Access or use CaliforniaColleges Website in violation of applicable federal, foreign, international, provincial, state and local laws, rules and regulations or any applicable privacy or data protection laws, rules, regulations or directives;
 - 7.3 Access or use CaliforniaColleges Website for any unauthorized, fraudulent or malicious purpose;
 - 7.4 Access or use CaliforniaColleges Website in a manner that could damage, disable, overburden or impair the CaliforniaColleges Website so as to diminish or destroy Foundation or XAP's ability to provide CaliforniaColleges Website to System Users;
 - 7.5 Share, obtain or use, or attempt to share, obtain or use, CaliforniaColleges Website related access codes or passwords;
 - 7.6 Engage in any act that would cause Foundation or XAP's failure in maintaining the integrity of CaliforniaColleges Website;
 - 7.7 Engage in any use of CaliforniaColleges Website or engage in any acts which could substantially interfere with or substantially degrade the website and impact System Users;
 - 7.8 Violate the CaliforniaColleges Website Terms of Use, or violate the terms of use for any Foundation or Authorized Third Party applications hosted by or accessible within CaliforniaColleges Website for utilization by System Users.

8. Data Rights of the Parties

- 8.1 Foundation acknowledges and agrees that Education Records provided by the District continue to be the property of and under the control of the District.
- 8.2 The Parties shall (i) comply with all data protection legislation applicable to Student Data; (ii) encrypt all Student Data in transmission; (iv) password protect Student Data when it resides on server; and (v) ensure that all personnel having access to Student Data have been

- instructed regarding the confidentiality, security, and use requirements with respect to such data.
- 8.3 Except as set forth in this Agreement, Foundation is prohibited from using or transmitting to a third party any Student Data. Without limiting the foregoing, to the extent Foundation shall be required to permit access to XAP for the purposes of carrying out the terms of this Agreement, such access shall not be deemed to be a violation of this Section 8.3.
- 8.4 Foundation agrees to ensure XAP maintains certain functionality on the CaliforniaColleges Website to allow System Users to update, modify, or delete any of the Student Data provide to Foundation by the District or System User through to the CaliforniaColleges Website.
- 8.5 Foundation may only use the Student Data entered into the CaliforniaColleges Website (i) as needed to perform its obligations under this Agreement, (ii) in accordance with the relevant directions provided by the System User in order to facilitate the utilization of functionality offered by the CaliforniaColleges Website or to which the System User can link directly from the CaliforniaColleges Website or which the System User can access directly utilizing the user name and password assigned to the System User in connection with the CaliforniaColleges Website (such links to be subject to Foundation's prior approval), or (iii) in aggregate, non-personally identifiable form, specifically for research and evaluation activities.
- 8.6 Foundation may not initiate or permit any Authorized Third Parties to make commercial contacts with System Users or make other commercial use of the CaliforniaColleges Website or Education Records or Student Data collected on the CaliforniaColleges Website.
- 8.7 District is responsible for communicating to Foundation such updates, modifications or deletions to Student Data as may be requested or otherwise necessary. If Foundation receives a request either in writing or orally from a System User challenging the content of Student Data maintained by Foundation, Foundation shall contact the District to validate the identity of the System User and request instructions regarding any corrective action that needs to be taken, if any. Once validated, District shall upload corrected Student Data as part of a comprehensive replacement file.
- 8.8 Upon termination of the Agreement, District shall use commercially reasonable efforts to notify System Users enrolled in the District that they may at System User's election create a new account for purposes of continuing to access their Student Data on the CaliforniaColleges Website after the Termination Date.
- 8.9 The Parties agree to cooperate with XAP to ensure that the original uploaded Student Data provided by a System User enrolled in the District will be merged into the newly created System User account. District shall coordinate with XAP to ensure that all Education Records are deleted from the System User's account and that all Student Data is otherwise retained and merged into a newly created System User account.
- 8.10 System Users may at their own election provide Student Data to Authorized Third Parties for the express purposes of obtaining the various service offerings of such Authorized Third Parties for educational purposes and in accordance with the requirements of this Agreement.

9. Indemnification Obligations of the Parties in the Event of A Data Breach

9.1 Foundation

- 9.1.1 Foundation's indemnification obligations under this Section 9 of this Agreement shall continue in full force and effect during the Term of this Agreement.
- 9.1.2 Foundation shall, at its own expense, indemnify, defend, and hold harmless District from any expense, cost, claim, loss, or liability (collectively, "Loss") resulting from any Data Breach provided that:
 - 9.1.2.i the Loss arises solely from Foundation's loss or unauthorized access or use of Student Data and does not arise as the result of: (1) any Misuse by District as defined in Section 7 of this Agreement; (2) any action or inaction by District or any officer, director, employee, affiliate, contractor, or subcontractor of District, (3) any action or inaction by an Authorized Third Party or System User.
- 9.1.3 District shall promptly (and in no event more than ten (10) calendar days after District receives notice of a potential or actual Loss notifies Foundation of such Loss that may give rise to an obligation of Foundation under this Section 9.1.
- 9.1.4 Foundation promptly takes reasonable actions, if any, to mitigate the harm caused as a result of the data loss or disclosure.

9.2 District

- 9.2.1 District's indemnification obligations under this Section 9 of this Agreement shall continue in full force and effect during the Term of this Agreement
- 9.2.2 District shall, at its own expense, indemnify, defend, and hold harmless Foundation from any expense, cost, claim, loss, or liability (collectively, "Loss") resulting from any Data Breach provided that: the Loss arises solely from District's Misuse of the CaliforniaColleges Website or System or any action or inaction by District or any officer, director, employee, affiliate, contractor, or subcontractor of District including any Authorized Third Party.

10. Mutual Indemnification

- 10.1 Each Party to this Agreement ("Indemnitor") agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the other, and its directors, trustees, officers, employees, agents (collectively "Indemnitees") against any and all liability, claims, demands, suits, losses, costs, legal fees including reasonable attorneys' fees, personal injury or illness and/or death, resulting from, arising out of, or connected with (a) Indemnitor's performance or omissions related to same under this Agreement, except as otherwise provided in Section 9 above; (b) any breach by Indemnitor of this Agreement.
- 10.2 The Indemnitee must approve the extension of all settlement offers proposed by the Indemnitor and Indemnitee's approval shall not be unreasonably withheld. The Indemnitor shall furnish Indemnitees with all related evidence in its control.

10.3 Nothing in this Agreement shall constitute a waiver of limitation of any rights which Indemnitees may have under applicable law.

11. Confidential Information

- 11.1 District and Foundation each agrees that (i) it shall receive and use the Confidential Information it receives (in such capacity a "Recipient") in connection with this Agreement from the other Party (in such capacity a "Discloser") solely for the purposes contemplated by this Agreement, (ii) it shall not use any such Confidential Information for any other purpose, and (iii) it shall receive and hold such Confidential Information in trust and confidence for the benefit of the Discloser. All Confidential Information provided in connection with this Agreement:
 - 11.1.1 Shall not be distributed, disclosed, or disseminated in any way or form by the Recipient to anyone except those of its own employees and professional advisors who have a reasonable need to know said Confidential Information for the purpose or purposes described above, who are informed of the confidential and proprietary nature of the Confidential Information, and who have agreed in a writing in favor of the Recipient to protect the confidentiality of the Confidential Information with terms at least as restrictive as those in this Section 11;
 - 11.1.2 Shall be treated by the Recipient with at least the same degree of care utilized by Recipient to protect its own confidential and proprietary information of a similar nature, but in no event with less than reasonable care;
 - 11.1.3 Shall not be used by the Recipient for its own purposes, except as otherwise expressly provided in this Agreement; and
 - 11.1.4 Shall remain the property of and be returned to the Discloser or, at the Discloser's election, destroyed (along with all copies or other embodiments thereof) immediately upon the termination or expiration of this Agreement for any reason and by either Party.
- 11.2 The obligations of a Recipient pursuant to this Section 11 hereof shall not apply, however, to any Confidential Information which (i) at the time it is delivered to the Recipient hereunder is already in the public domain or subsequent to such delivery comes into the public domain in a manner that does not involve a breach of this Agreement by the Recipient or its employees or advisors; (ii) at the time it is delivered to the Recipient hereunder is already in the Recipient's possession free of any obligation of confidentiality; (iii) is received independently by the Recipient from a third Party who is entitled to disclose such information to the Recipient; (iv) is subsequently independently developed by the Recipient without use of or benefit from or reference to the Confidential Information of Discloser.
- 11.3 Notwithstanding anything to the contrary herein, the Recipient may disclose Confidential Information if required to be disclosed by a court or regulatory or other governmental agency of competent jurisdiction, provided that in connection with any such requirement the Recipient shall (A) if legally permitted, promptly notify the Discloser of such requirement in writing, (B) cooperate with the Discloser, at the Discloser's request and expense, to obtain a protective order or other confidential treatment or to contest such required disclosure, (C) shall afford the Discloser all available opportunities to obtain a

protective order or other confidential treatment or challenge such required disclosure, including the opportunity to challenge it in the name and with the standing of the Recipient, (D) shall comply with any protective order or other confidential treatment obtained by the Discloser, and (E) shall disclose only the minimum amount of information that the Recipient is required to disclose.

12. Representation, Warranties and Covenants of the Parties

- 12.1 <u>Exchange of Information</u>. The Parties represent and warrant that all information that each Party presently knows or reasonably should recognize to be materially relevant to the other Party's understanding of their obligations under the Agreement has been provided to that Party.
- 12.2 <u>Compliance with Laws</u>. The Parties agree to comply with all applicable national, state, and local laws and regulations in the performance of their obligations under the Agreement, including but not limited to the observance of all applicable laws and regulations related to the privacy and security of the Student Data provided by any System User.
- 12.3 Relationship of the Parties. Foundation is acting as an independent non-profit organization to facilitate the Services under this Agreement for the purposes as set forth in the Recitals. Foundation is neither an employee, subcontractor, nor an agent of District. Foundation shall have no right or authority to enter into agreements on behalf of or otherwise bind, District, and District shall have no right to enter into agreements or otherwise bind Foundation.
- Due Authorization. Each of the Parties represents and warrants that (i) it has all requisite power, authority, and capacity to enter this Agreement and to perform its obligations herein; (ii) the execution and delivery of this Agreement by such Party and the consummation of the transactions contemplated herein by such Party have been duly and validly authorized by all necessary action, including all approvals and consents required from any other person or governmental authority; and (iii) this Agreement constitutes a valid, legally binding Agreement of such Party, enforceable against such Party in accordance with its terms.
- Other Instruments. Each of the Parties hereto represents and warrants that the execution, delivery, and performance of this Agreement by such Party, its compliance with the terms hereof, and the consummation by it of the transactions contemplated herein will not violate, conflict with, result in a breach of or constitute a default under its certificate of incorporation or other charter instrument, by-laws, or any instrument or agreement to which it is a Party or by which it is bound, any state or federal law, rule or regulation, or any judicial or administrative decree, order, ruling or regulation applicable to it.
- 12.6 Covenant of Further Assistance. In the event that at any time after the date hereof any further action is necessary or desirable to carry out the purposes of this Agreement, each Party will cooperate with the other Party and take such further action for such purposes (including the execution and delivery of such further instruments and documents) as the other party reasonably may request and to which the recipient of the request has no reasonable objection

13. Disclaimer of Warranties.

FOUNDATION MAKES NO WARRANTIES RELATED TO THE SERVICES PROVIDED BY FOUNDATION OR XAP HEREUNDER, AND HEREBY DISCLAIMS ALL WARRANTIES, EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, INCLUDING WITHOUT LIMITATION, WARRANTIES OF MERCHANTABILITY, FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE AND NONINFRINGEMENT. DISTRICT ASSUMES TOTAL RESPONSIBILITY FOR ITS USE OF THE RESULTS OBTAINED FROM THE SERVICES. FOUNDATION DOES NOT WARRANT THAT THE SERVICES MEET DISTRICT'S REQUIREMENTS OR WILL BE UNINTERRUPTED OR ERROR FREE.

14. Limitations of Liability.

IN NO EVENT WILL FOUNDATION (INCLUDING ITS SUBSIDIARIES, ITS PARENT AND SUBSIDIARIES OF ITS PARENT, ITS SERVICE PROVIDERS AND LICENSORS, AND THE EMPLOYEES, OFFICERS, DIRECTORS AND AGENTS THEREOF) BE LIABLE FOR ANY CONSEQUENTIAL, INDIRECT, SPECIAL, INCIDENTAL, EXEMPLARY OR PUNITIVE DAMAGES UNDER THIS AGREEMENT OR IN CONNECTION WITH ANY SERVICES PROVIDED BY FOUNDATION HEREUNDER, INCLUDING WITHOUT LIMITATION, DAMAGES FOR DISTRICT'S MISUSE OF THE CALIFORNIA COLLEGES WEBSITE, LOSS OF BUSINESS PROFITS, BUSINESS INTERRUPTION, LOSS OF INFORMATION. Coverage required will not limit any liability of Foundation and will include: commercial general liability insurance with a combined single limit of no less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) per occurrence and automobile liability insurance for all owned, scheduled, or hired automobiles with a combined single limit of no less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) per accident; and workers' compensation as required under the Workers' Compensation and Safety Act of the State of California, as amended from time to time. Foundation, upon the execution of this Agreement, shall cause their insurance carrier(s) to furnish District with a properly executed Certificate(s) of Insurance and endorsements effecting coverage as required herein. All insurance required to be carried by Foundation and/or Indemnitor shall be primary, and not contributory, to any insurance carried by District.
- **16.** <u>Mutual Audit Rights of the Parties</u>. The Parties shall be entitled to upon reasonable notice to the other party an opportunity to conduct compliance audits under 20 U.S.C. Section 1232g. The Parties shall negotiate the scope, length and terms of such audits in good faith between each Party's representatives.
- **17.** <u>Independent Status</u>. Foundation is an independent non-profit entity, in business for itself, which shall perform the specific tasks relative to providing technical support and related Services to fulfill the terms of this Agreement. Foundation does not have the authority to incur any obligation, contractual or otherwise, in the name or on behalf of District.

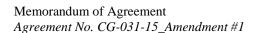

This Participation Agreement is for the 2016 Angels RBI League (the "RBI Program") and is an understanding of participation between Santa Ana Unified School District (the "SAUSD") and the RBI program.

As	a participant in the 2016 RBI Program the SAUSD agrees to the following:
•	The SAUSD agrees to hold the Angels RBI League and all respective officers, directors, employees, volunteers and representatives harmless from all Bodily Injury and Property Damage caused by or related to the RBI Program. The SAUSD agrees to name the Angels RBI League as additional insured with minimum limit of \$1,000,000 Each Occurrence, General Aggregate and Products/Completed Operations Aggregate on their General Liability policy. The GC2010 11/85 edition additional insured endorsement must be attached to the certificate of insurance. The SAUSD will provide written proof of such to the RBI Coordinator prior to the first game of the season. Failure to provide proof by the deadline will cause the SAUSD and all teams representing the SAUSD to be removed from the RBI Program for the season or until such proof is presented.
•	The SAUSD will assign a paid employee of the SAUSD to act as RBI Representative for the SAUSD and to serve as liaison between the SAUSD and the RBI Program. The RBI Representative will attend all meetings, trainings and other required activities and/or events of the RBI Program.
•	The SAUSD will recruit all necessary coaches for their RBI teams. All coaches must have a general understanding of the mission and philosophy of youth development and the RBI Program, whether volunteer or staff.
•	The SAUSD will have their RBI Representative and a minimum of one (1) coach per team attend the scheduled Mandatory Coach's Meeting (March 9 or 10) and Coach's Training (March 5 or 12). Any team not represented by a minimum of one (1) coach at the scheduled Meeting & Training will be removed from the 2016 season. It is recommended that SAUSD require all of their coaches to attend.
•	All SAUSD staff, coaches and volunteers will be required to pass a background check conducted by the RBI Program. The RBI program will cover the fee associated with each background check it conducts. This background check will be in addition to any fingerprint and background policy applied by the SAUSD, including the SAUSD RAPTOR system. An individual's failure to pass or refusal to allow a background check will constitute an ineligible status and said individual will not be allowed to participate in the 2016 RBI Program.

The SAUSD agrees to provide at least one CPR/First Aid certified person for each team at every team

The SAUSD agrees to open the RBI Program to its members and place players on a team in the appropriate league division <u>based solely upon age</u>: Senior Boys ages 16-18, Senior Girls ages 16-18,

Junior Boys ages 12-15, and Junior Girls ages 12-15, Jr, RBI age 10 – 12 (4th & 5th Grade)

- The SAUSD understands and agrees to follow the RBI Program CIF Player Eligibility Rule. Any violation of this rule will result in immediate removal from the RBI Program and all previous results will be forfeited.
- The SAUSD agrees to turn in all necessary paperwork and reports on or before each specified deadline as requested by the RBI Program. Failure to do so will result in a Technical Forfeit (\$75.00) and/or game suspension per each occurrence and could result in removal from the RBI Program for the balance of the season.
- The SAUSD must provide for each team a minimum of 10 completed Player Packages (**RBI Player Release Form, RBI Program Application & Medical Consent Form, Age Verification Document, two**(2) digital photos for each player), along with a completed **Team Roster Form** to the RBI Coordinator no later than Friday, February 26, 2016. <u>Failure to submit properly completed paperwork by deadline may</u> result in a team's/player's removal from the RBI Program.
- The SAUSD must complete the *Game Sign-In Form* prior to the start of each game. This form must be emailed (everykid@angelsrbi.org) by the proceeding Monday after each Saturday game date. <u>Failure to submit *Game Sign-In Form* to the RBI Office may result in a Technical Forfeit and a forfeit fee of \$75.00.</u>
- The SAUSD agrees to follow all RBI Program rules & regulations, code of ethics, league philosophy, game procedures, and take responsibility for educating all its players and coaches as to the RBI Program policies and rules. Failure to do so may result in a Technical Forfeit (\$75.00) and/or game suspension per each occurrence and could result in removal from the RBI Program for the balance of the season.
- The SAUSD and its staff, coaches, volunteers and players will display good sportsmanship at all times when participating in the RBI Program. Failure to comply will subject the individual(s) to disciplinary action set forth by the Angels RBI League Board of Directors.
- The SAUSD agrees to abide by all decisions delivered by the Angels RBI League Rules Committee
 regarding game protests, violations in the RBI Program rules & regulations, code of ethics, league
 philosophy and game procedures.
- The SAUSD agrees to bring any concerns or grievances directly to the RBI Coordinator within 24 hours of incident.
- The SAUSD agrees to contact both the RBI Coordinator and the opposing team's RBI representative immediately as soon as the need to forfeit a game is known. <u>Failure to submit proper notice (minimum 36 hrs.)</u> to the RBI Coordinator may result in a Technical Forfeit (\$75.00).
- The SAUSD agrees to abide by the Equipment/Uniform Agreement Form. Any violation of this agreement will result in a charge to the SAUSD to replace said uniform(s) and equipment. This charge must be paid before the SAUSD will be allowed to participate in the RBI Program.
- The SAUSD agrees to coordinate arrival and dismissal expectations (or procedures, either one) to and from all games, practices and RBI related events for its players.
- The SAUSD agrees to assist RBI Coordinator in the procurement of playing fields for games and practices in accordance with the RBI Field Usage Policy.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

At its March 24, 2015 meeting, the Board authorized staff to award a contract for the installation of structured cabling system and network equipment under E-Rate Districtwide to Federal Technology Solutions Inc. pursuant to Bid No. 10-15. The installation of network equipment at these sites is necessary to allow current District computers to be connected to the District's wired and wireless network and to provide improved network infrastructure and wireless network access.

ITEM SUMMARY:

- Extend contract through June 30, 2017
- Bid Approved on March, 24, 2015
- Provides for wired and wireless networking
- Vendor serves all school sites
- Bid extension 1 of 4
- Work funded under E-Rate

The E-Rate funding process changed for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2015, for the projects covered under Bid No. 10-15. These projects are classified by the E-Rate program as "Category 2" Internal Connections. In previous years the District was funded for Category 2 projects based on the number of students participating in the National School Lunch Free and Reduced program, typically the District would receive 90% of project funding from the E-Rate program and provide a 10% match of budgeted funds. That funding could be spent at any E-Rate eligible site through the District and was not site specific.

Under the new Category 2 funding system the District will be eligible for \$30 per-student, per-site, per-year, in E-Rate funding of which 10% is anticipated to be required matching funds from the District. These funds are allocated by school site and cannot transfer between schools. The per-site funding rate is determined by the District's student enrollment data reported to the State of California. The site funding information for the 2016-17 fiscal year is based on the November 2015 CBEDS data. Under the new funding system the District was eligible for and applied for upfront funding authority for the next five fiscal years. This funding request was approved in September 2015.

The contract scope that was bid included all school site technology projects necessary to fulfill the District's current network technology goals. These primary goals are, a complete 1-to-1 wireless network infrastructure, upgraded network switching gear, and 10GB WAN access network equipment. These goals are established by Technology Innovation Services and are prioritized at each site based on work previously completed and the immediate needs of each site to meet the established network technology goals. Currently only projects that will be funded by E-Rate contributions and District matching funds will be completed under this bid award. The District has no obligation to initiate additional work with the awarded bidder above the E-Rate contribution limit.

RATIONALE:

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board authorization to extend the contract awarded to Federal Technology Solutions, Inc. pursuant to Bid No. 10-15, at E-Rate eligible sites Districtwide for the 2016-17 fiscal year. This contract may be extended with Board approval yearly while projects under the bid are still in process.

The District has received E-Rate funding approval for all school sites for fiscal years 2015-20. Funding was made available for work to be started after July 1, 2015. Additional funds will be budgeted for fiscal years 2016-17 to cover the District's matching funds responsibility for the E-Rate projects planned at school sites. BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is to update the Board of Education on the energy and water saving achieved as part of the District's conservation efforts.

RATIONALE:

As the cost of energy and water rises, and mandatory water restrictions were implemented state-wide, the District implemented a variety savings measures which have resulted in significant reductions in our usage. SAUSD continues to be good stewards of the environment for the

students and community while also reducing costs in a fiscally responsible manner.

To date, the District has leveraged QZAB funds to install solar panels at 10 schools. The District has also capitalized on Proposition 39 funds, SCE incentives, and Gas Co. rebates to install new air conditioning (HVAC) equipment at 9 schools and pool pump motor controls at the 4 pools. The District has leveraged Metropolitan Water District rebates to install synthetic turf with an underground rainwater recovery system. Finally, the District has hired Cenergistic to implement energy education and conservation efforts District-wide. All of these efforts have resulted in significant savings to the District, which equates to greater resources for school programs.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is for the Board to approve the implementation of the Public Agency Retirement Services (PARS) Employee Retirement Plan for Eligible Certificated Non-Management Santa Ana Educators' Association (SAEA) Employees for the 2015-16 fiscal year.

ITEM SUMMARY:

- Provide a retirement incentive to eligible employees
- Minimum 10 years of service
- STRS/PERS retirement eligible
- 110 employees enrolled as of February 5, 2016

RATIONALE:

At its December 8, 2015 meeting, the Board adopted Resolution No. 15/16-3083 - Public Agency Retirement Services to provide a retirement incentive program for only eligible certificated non-management SAEA employees with a minimum of 10 years of service. PARS will provide services to implement a plan to establish an early retirement incentive program through contributions to purchase an IRC 403(b) fixed annuity for eligible employees and their beneficiaries.

As of February 5, 2016, 110 certificated employees have enrolled in the program, while we anticipate up to 50% of these employees will be replaced this program will significantly reduce 2016-17 projected overstaffing. The plan as designed would yield each participant a total of \$40,000 over the next 5 years in addition to their STRS/PERS retirement benefit.

LCAP Goal 3.10: Support the enhancement of school climate through smooth operations and processes.

FUNDING:

Notwithstanding the cost of this incentive benefit, the District estimates the net savings to be \$10 million over the next 5 years.

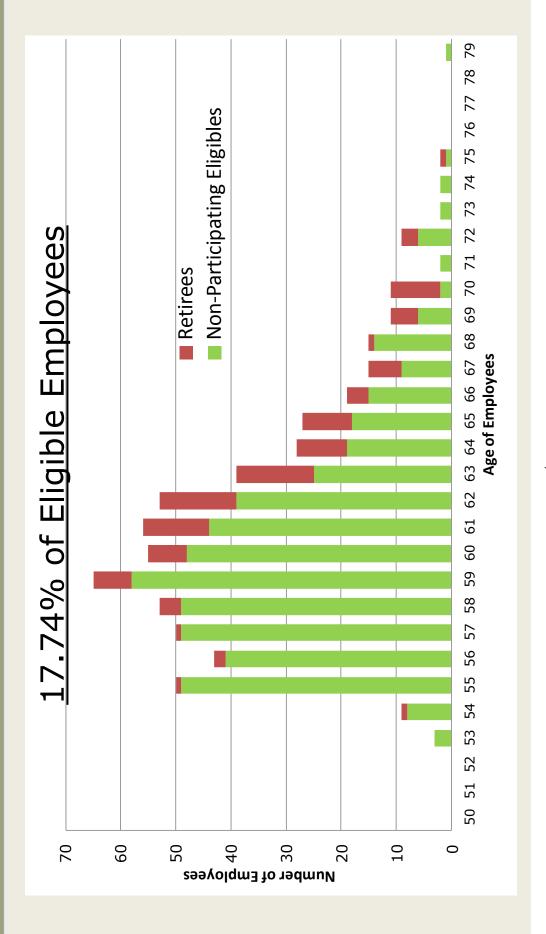

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

Staff has been working to develop a vehicle replacement plan for the current fleet of cars, trucks, and vans utilized daily by District staff in the performance of their work duties. Many of the Districts vehicles have reached the end of their useful life cycle and are in need of replacement. This bid award will allow for staff to begin replacement of District vehicles in a process that is expected to span the next three fiscal years.

ITEM SUMMARY:

- Award Bid No. 06-16 through June 30, 2017
- Provides for new vehicles Districtwide
- 3 year replacement program
- 1 year award with two possible 1 year extensions

Replacement of these older vehicles will lead to long term fuel and maintenance cost reductions and provide District staff with the benefits of the most current vehicle safety standards.

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board approval of the revised job description: Food Service Field Supervisor. This position reports to the Director of Nutrition Services or designee. This position will provide general supervision to, coordinate with, and monitor Nutrition Services programs at assigned school sites; assess kitchen and food serving area operations; prepare a variety of records and reports related to assigned activities; recruit, train, and evaluate personnel.

RATIONALE:

The proposed revisions to the representative duties reflect the changes that have occurred in the federal and state requirements of school nutrition programs as well as the Department's clarification of the food service job roles and responsibilities.

The current job description requires four (4) years of experience in a school or institutional food service program. Institutional food service includes hospitals and correctional facilities only. The revision allows the District to consider candidates that have food service experience in other private sector food service industries such as hotels and restaurants.

The current job description requires college-level courses in nutrition, safety and sanitation, basic food preparation, and supervision. The proposed revision clarifies the educational requirements and better aligns to the needs of the District's School Nutrition Programs. It is furthermore being requested that due to the higher level education and work experience requirements, the salary grade be increased from grade 37 to a grade 40.

These revisions will allow SAUSD to align to the similar job descriptions in other large urban school districts.

This job description was previously revised in 2001.

NEGOTIATIONS PREAMBLE

It is undeniable that there is a wide gap between the educational outcomes achieved by students of color and/or students from disadvantaged backgrounds and the results achieved by students who are from non-minority or more affluent backgrounds. Statewide economically disadvantaged students show an 11.5% gap in English Language Arts and 9.2% in Mathematics. English learners show an even greater gap.

Eliminating the "achievement gap" is a **moral** imperative which the State of California has now **legally** obligated the Santa Ana Unified School District to eliminate. The legislation and regulations establishing the Local Control and Accountability Plans (LCAP) system specify the funding and accountability mechanisms to accomplish this goal. Simply put, the law requires that the District use its State funding, especially the additional funding it the District receives on account of the disadvantaged backgrounds of its students, to directly address achievement gap issues. Public Sschool districts, through their LCAPs are given great flexibility so that each community can address its particular needs – and each school district is accountable for the effectiveness of its plans and the use of the extra monies the State provides.

This is a new paradigm/model of State funding and accountability. It requires the District to think, plan and act differently to achieve better educational outcomes on an immediate and ongoing basis.

Accordingly, the District has prepared this initial proposal to commence a discussion with the Santa Ana School Police Officers Association on changes to the collective bargaining agreement needed for the Santa Ana educational community to collaboratively eliminate the achievement gap at the Santa Ana Unified School District. The particular areas the District proposes for discussion at this time are set forth below:
