Public Comments at Board Meetings

The agenda shall provide members of the public the opportunity to address the Board regarding agenda items before or during the Board's consideration of the item. The agenda also provides members of the public an opportunity to testify at regular meetings on matters which are not on the agenda but which are within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board.

Individual speakers are allowed three minutes to address the Board on agenda or nonagenda items. The Board may limit the total time for public input on each item to 20 minutes. With the Board's consent, the Board President may increase or decrease the time allowed for public presentation, depending on the topic and the number of persons wishing to be heard. The Board President may take a poll of speakers for or against a particular issue and may ask that additional persons speak only if they have something new to add.

The Board urges that complaints and derogatory remarks against a District employee be made in writing on forms available in the Office of the Superintendent. This allows the District and the Board to examine more carefully the complaint and to initiate the appropriate investigation.

Persons wishing to address the Board on an item on the agenda or an item of business in the Board's jurisdiction are requested to complete a card. This card is to be submitted to the Recording Secretary. The *Request to Address the Board of Education* cards are located on the table in the foyer.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

SANTA ANA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

ORANGE COUNTY, CALIFORNIA

Whereas, the Governing Board of the Santa Ana Unified School District urges the federal government to enact humane comprehensive immigration reform immediately;

Whereas, since the United States Supreme Court decision in Plyler v. Doe in 1982, it has been the law of this country that no public school district can deny access to education on the basis of the child's immigration status without violating the Equal Protection Clause of the 14th Amendment. The Court noted that children have little control over their immigration status and that a complete deprivation of basic education would likely cause these innocent children to suffer a lifelong disadvantage;

Whereas, the Santa Ana Unified School District's student population includes children from immigrant families originating from not only Mexico, South America and Central America, but also Asia, the Middle East, Eastern Europe, and other countries in the world;

Whereas, immigration enforcement affects SAUSD families every day;

Whereas, ICE activities in and around schools, early education centers, and adult transition centers would have the potential of creating a severe disruption to the learning environment and education for students; and

Whereas, currently, ICE's 2011 policy dictates that it will not conduct immigration enforcement activity at any sensitive locations, which includes schools, without special permission by specific federal law enforcement officials; unless exigent circumstances exist;

Whereas, there is no written state or federal law that mandates that local districts assist ICE in the enforcement of immigration laws;

Whereas, the Governing Board of the Santa Ana Unified School District views its purpose is to ensure students receive an education in a safe, non-disruptive, non-threatening, and non-discriminatory learning environment, regardless of the student's or their families' immigration status, as opposed to enforcing, or assisting with the enforcement of federal immigration laws or policies;

The Board declares that any Santa Ana Unified School District site or location is a non-threatening place for its students and their families to seek help, assistance, and information without fear or anxiety about related immigration enforcement efforts;

Resolved further, that the Superintendent shall provide at all K-12, early education centers, adult transition centers, and parent centers resources and information for students and their families about immigration laws and policies and how they impact a student's education and rights to an education in the State of California; and

Resolved further, that the Superintendent increase and enhance continued partnerships with community-based organizations and legal services organizations who provide resources for families facing immigrant relations issues, and that a rapid response network be created by and with these resources to assist children, specifically our students, whose family members have been detained and/or deported. Rapid response services should include at least crisis management and emotional support services for children;

Resolved further, in order to provide a public education, regardless of a child's or family's immigration status, absent any applicable federal, state, or local law, regulation, ordinance, or court decision, the District shall abide by the following conduct:

- 1. District personnel shall treat all students equitably in the receipt of all school services including, but not limited to, free and reduced lunch programs, transportation and educational instruction;
- 2. District personnel shall not inquire about a student's immigration status, including that of family members;
- 3. Any request by ICE for information or to access a school site shall be immediately forwarded to the Superintendent and General Counsel for review and a decision on whether to allow access to the site, and/or the information to ensure District compliance with Plyler and other applicable laws;

Resolved further, that the Superintendent shall ensure that all teachers, school administrators, and other staff will be trained on how to implement this policy and that notification in multiple languages be distributed to families to fully inform them of their rights in the District;

Resolved, the Board instructs the Superintendent to forward a copy of this resolution to SAUSD's representatives of the United States Congress.

WHEREAS, while former redevelopment agencies ("RDAs") were dissolved on February 1, 2012 pursuant to the provisions of ABX1 26 ("RDA Dissolution Law") and replaced by corresponding successor agencies ("Successor Agencies") charged with the wind-down of former RDA activities, the RDA Dissolution Law requires that pass-through payments ("RDA Pass-Throughs") from redevelopment project areas ("Projects") of the former RDAs continue to be paid to affected taxing entities ("ATEs") by the County Auditor-Controller ("A-C") on behalf of the Successor Agencies; and

WHEREAS, Santa Ana Unified School District ("District") is an ATE which is entitled to receive RDA Pass-Throughs from the County A-C on behalf of the Successor Agencies; and

WHEREAS, the former RDAs of the cities of Orange, Santa Ana, and Tustin previously adopted or amended redevelopment plans for a total of four Projects (one in Orange, two in Santa Ana, and one in Tustin) in a manner that requires subsequent ongoing RDA Pass-Throughs to District per AB 1290 ("AB 1290 Payments") pursuant to Health and Safety Code ("HSC") Sections 33607.5, 33607.7, and/or 33492.108; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to HSC Section 33607.5(a)(4)(A), 56.7 percent ("Facilities Share") of AB 1290 Pass-Throughs to District 'shall be available to be used for educational facilities," and 43.3 percent ("Taxes Share) "shall be considered to be property taxes"; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to HSC Section 33607.5(a)(5) "local education agencies that use funds received pursuant to this section for school

facilities shall spend these funds at schools that are: (A) within the Project area, (B) attended by students from the Project area, (C) attended by students generated by projects that are assisted directly by the redevelopment agency, or (D) determined by the governing board of [the] local education agency to be of benefit to the Project area" (emphasis added); and

WHEREAS, for school facilities the usage requirements in HSC Section 33607.5(a)(5) constitute alternative requirements, including (D) above, i.e., determination by the governing board of the local education agency of benefit to the Project, even in the absence of compliance with (A), (B), or (C); and

WHEREAS, District is advised that usage requirements in HSC Section 33607.5(a)(5) may only apply to educational facilities that are school facilities attended by students, and may not apply to educational facilities that are not attended by students; and

WHEREAS, District wishes to comply with the requirements of HSC Section 33607.5(a)(5) with respect to all the educational facilities of the District, whether or not attended by students;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the District's Governing Board hereby finds, determines, declares, orders, and resolves:

Section 1. The foregoing recitals are true and correct.

Section 2. District's existing facilities (collectively "Existing District Sites"), including (i) 63 schools attended by students: 39 elementary schools; nine middle schools; nine high schools; three alternative or community schools; and three other schools (of which four elementary schools and one high school are charter schools); and (ii) other educational facilities that are not attended by students, serve students and city residents who live, work, or live and work, throughout the District, including in the four Projects of the above three former RDAs.

Section 3. In the future the District may, lease, acquire, and/or construct additional facilities at other school and non-school sites where the District offers educational programs ("Future District Sites"), which will serve students and city residents who live, work, or live and work throughout the District, including in the four Projects of the above three former RDAs.

Section 4. Existing District Sites, plus any Future District Sites, are part of an integrated District facilities master plan. Attendance and/or improvements at Existing District Sites or Future District Sites will impact, directly or indirectly, all students, city residents, and the need for improvements at all Existing District Sites or Future District Sites.

Section 5. Based on the findings in Sections 1 through 4, the Facilities Share of AB 1290 Pass-Throughs which District is currently entitled to receive, or may be entitled to receive in the future, from the four Projects of the above three former RDAs may be used to pay for educational facilities at Existing District Sites or Future District Sites, whether or not attended by students, consistent with the requirements of Education Code ("EC") Sections 42238(h)(6), 42238.02(j)(6), and 42238.03(c)(6), including the following capital project or facilities costs: hard costs; soft costs (including consultant and legal costs); costs of fixtures, furnishings, and equipment; and maintenance; and/or related debt service, lease, or lease purchase payments.

Section 6. Based on the findings in Sections 1 through 4, the Facilities Share of AB 1290 Pass-Throughs which District is currently entitled to receive, or may be entitled to receive in the future, from the Projects of the above RDAs which are used for the purposes set forth in Section 4 are hereby determined to be of benefit to the four Projects of the above three former RDAs, consistent with the requirements of HSC Section 33607.5(a)(5).

WHEREAS, it appears to the District that the authorization, approval, execution, and delivery of the agreements described above or contemplated thereby or incidental thereto are desirable and in the best interests of the District.

This policy provides standards and requirements for the competitive solicitation of equipment, supplies and services. The policy ensures that all bids are to be done in the best interest of the District and in compliance with all applicable laws and codes.

POLICY:

The District shall purchase equipment, supplies and services using competitive bidding when required by law and in accordance with statutory requirements for bidding and bidding procedures. In those circumstances where the law does not require competitive bidding, the Governing Board may request that a contract be competitively bid if the Board determines that it is in the best interest of the District to do so.

No work, project, service, or purchase shall be split or separated into smaller work orders or projects for the purpose of evading legal requirements regarding contracting after competitive bidding.

When the Board has determined that it is in the best interest of the District, the Board may piggyback onto the contract of another public agency or corporation to lease or purchase equipment or supplies to the extent authorized by law.

To ensure that good value is received for funds expended, specifications shall be carefully designed and shall describe in detail the quality, delivery and service required.

To assist the District in determining whether bidders are responsible, the Board may require prequalification procedures as allowed by law and specified in administrative regulation.

DESIRED OUTCOME:

Through this policy, the District shall establish and maintain procedures related to competitively soliciting of equipment, supplies and services.

SCOPE:

The Board recognizes its responsibility to enter into contracts on behalf of the district and to ensure that the terms of the contract conform to applicable legal standards.

POLICY:

The Governing Board recognizes its responsibility to enter into contracts on behalf of the district for the acquisition of equipment, supplies, services, and other resources necessary for the achievement of district goals. In exercising this authority to enter into a contract, the Board shall ensure that the district's interest is protected and that the terms of the contract conform to applicable legal standards, including the bidding requirements in Public Contract Code 20111.

The Board may, by a majority vote, delegate to the Superintendent or designee the authority to enter into contracts on behalf of the district. To be valid or to constitute an enforceable obligation against the district, all such contracts must be approved and/or ratified by the Board.

Every contract entered into on behalf of the district shall be made available for public inspection, except when the law prohibits disclosure. No contract shall prohibit a district employee from disparaging the goods or services of any contracting party.

Contracts for Non-Nutritious Foods or Beverages

The district shall not enter into or renew a contract for the sale of foods or beverages that do not meet applicable nutritional standards specified in Education Code 49431-49431.7, 5 CCR 15500-15501 or 15575-15578, or 7 CFR 210.11 or 220.12, unless the contract specifies that such sales will occur off campus or outside the time restriction specified in the applicable law.

Before the district enters into or renews a contract that grants exclusive or nonexclusive advertising or sale of carbonated beverages, non-nutritious beverages or non-nutritious foods as defined in law, the Board shall ensure that the district has sufficient internal controls in place to protect the integrity of public funds and to ensure that funds raised as a result of the contract benefit public education.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop the district's internal control procedures to protect the integrity of public funds. Such internal controls may include, but not be limited to, the following:

- Procedures that produce accurate and reliable financial statements and, at the same time, safeguard the
 assets, financial resources, and integrity of every employee responsible for handling money or property.
 Control systems shall be systematically evaluated and revised to keep pace with the changing
 responsibilities of management.
- Procedures to ensure that district personnel do not handle cash or product at the school site. The contract shall specify that the vendor stock the machines and shall provide cash accounting, along with a check, for district proceeds directly to the control office.

The Superintendent or designee may invite parents/guardians, students, staff, and interested community
members to make recommendations regarding the contract, including recommendations as to how the
funds will be spent in a manner that benefits public education.

- Prior to ratifying the contract, the Board shall designate the specific programs and activities that will be funded by the proceeds of the contract and consider how the contract reflects the district's vision and goals.
- The contract shall specify that the contractor report, on a quarterly basis, to the Superintendent or designee the number of food items or beverages sold within the district and the amount of money raised by the sales. The Superintendent or designee shall report these amounts to the Board on a regular basis.
- 4. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the contract does not limit the ability of student and parent organizations to plan and operate fund-raising activities.

Any contract for the sale or advertisement of non-nutritious foods or carbonated or non-nutritious beverages shall be entered into on a competitive bid basis pursuant to Public Contract Code 20111 or through the issuance of a Request for Proposal.

The Board shall not enter into or renew any contract that grants exclusive or nonexclusive advertising or sale of carbonated beverages, non-nutritious beverages, or non-nutritious foods until parents/guardians, students, and members of the public have had an opportunity to comment on the contract at a public hearing held during a regularly scheduled Board meeting. The Board shall clearly, and in a manner recognizable to the general public, identify in the agenda the contract to be discussed at the meeting.

The public hearing shall include, but not be limited to, a discussion of the nutritional value of foods and beverages sold within the district; the availability of fresh fruit, vegetables, and grains in school meals and snacks, including locally grown and organic produce; the amount of fat, sugar, and additives in the food and beverages discussed; and barriers to student participation in school breakfast and lunch programs.

The contract shall be accessible to the public and may not include a confidentiality clause that would prevent the district or a district school from making any part of the contract public.

Contracts for Electronic Products or Services

The Board shall not enter into a contract for electronic products or services that requires the dissemination of advertising to students, unless the Board:

- 1. Enters into the contract at a noticed, public hearing of the Board.
- 2. Makes a finding that the electronic product or service is or would be an integral component of the education of students.

A request shall be honored for the school year in which it is submitted, or longer if specified, but may be withdrawn by the parents/guardians at any time.

Contracts for Digital Storage and Maintenance of Student Records

The district may enter into or renew a contract with a third party for the purpose of providing services, including cloud-based services, for the digital storage, management, and retrieval of student records and/or to provide digital educational software that authorizes a third-party provider of digital educational software to access, store, and use student records. For these purposes, student records include any information maintained by the district that is directly related to a student and any information acquired directly from the student through the use of instructional software or applications assigned to the student by a teacher or other district employee, and do not include de-identified information.

Any such contract shall contain all of the following:

- 1. A statement that student records continue to be the property of and under the control of the district.
- 2. If applicable, a description of the means by which students may retain possession and control of their own student-generated content, as defined in Education Code 49073.1, including options by which a student may transfer student-generated content to a personal account.
- 3. A prohibition against the third party using any information in the student record for any purpose other than those required or specifically permitted by the contract.
- 4. A description of the procedures by which a parent/guardian or a student age 18 years or older may review personally identifiable information in the student's records and correct erroneous information.
- 5. A description of the actions the third party will take, including the designation and training of responsible individuals, to ensure the security and confidentiality of student records.
- A description of the procedures for notifying the affected parent/guardian, or the affected student if age
 18 years or older, in the event of an unauthorized disclosure of the student's records.
- 7. A certification that a student's records shall not be retained or available to the third party upon completion of the terms of the contract and a description of how that certification will be enforced, except that these requirements shall not apply to student-generated content if the student chooses to establish or maintain an account with the third party for the purpose of storing that content.

- 4. The district's policy, administrative, or legal goals and purposes cannot be accomplished through the utilization of persons selected pursuant to the regular or ordinary district hiring process.
- 5. The nature of the work is such that the criteria for emergency appointments, as defined in Education Code 45103.1, apply.
- 6. The contractor will provide equipment, materials, facilities, or support services that could not feasibly be provided by the district in the location where the services are to be performed.
- 7. The services are of such an urgent, temporary, or occasional nature that the delay that would result from using the district's regular or ordinary hiring process would frustrate their very purpose.

WHEREAS, such financing will be accomplished by (i) the Corporation entering into a site lease (the "Site Lease") with the District, whereby the District will lease property (the "Leased Property") to the Corporation in exchange for an advance rental; (ii) the Corporation leasing the Leased Property back to the District pursuant to a leaseback agreement (the "Lease/Purchase Agreement"), under which the District will be obligated to make Rental Payments to the Corporation; (iii) the Corporation's assignment without recourse of all rights to receive such Rental Payments to a bank or other lending institution; and (iv) the deposit of the advance rental into a fund that will be used to fund the Project and related costs;

WHEREAS, the Site Lease, the Lease/Purchase Agreement, and the Assignment Agreement, which are incorporated herein by reference, have been presented to the Board of Directors of the Corporation (the "Board") for its review and approval; and

WHEREAS, it appears to the Board that the authorization, approval, execution, and delivery of the Site Lease, the Lease/Purchase Agreement and the Assignment Agreement, and other documents contemplated thereby or incidental thereto are desirable and in the best interests of the Corporation.

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NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Directors of the Santa Ana Unified School District Public Facilities Corporation as follows:

This report summarizes the results of the Williams Settlement Legislation reviews of schools with respect to school facilities:

• School Site Facility:

Thorpe Fundamental Elementary: Library, the HVAC technician diagnosed intermittent problems with the EMS system turning the off and on temperature controller, controlling the temperature. The technician repaired the unitary controllers on the system and the air conditioning system.

Thorpe Fundamental Elementary: Room 8, the HVAC technician diagnosed the cooling valve and actuator were not functioning properly, both parts were replaced.

The Williams Uniform Complaints were received on November 16, 2016, and resolved on December 5, 2016, both systems are functioning and operating correctly.

For purposes of determining the estimated value of a gift, the District does not perform an appraisal or other such valuation, rather simply reports the value of the gift as provided by the donor.

ITEM SUMMARY:

If the value of a gift exceeds \$500, the Superintendent shall bring the nature of the gift, with a specific recommendation, to the Board of Education for approval. The gifts under this item are all valued at more than \$500.

RATIONALE:

The Board may accept any bequest or gift of money or property on behalf of the District. While greatly appreciating suitable donations, the Board discourages any gifts which may directly or indirectly impair its commitment to provide equal educational opportunities for all District students. The Board shall carefully evaluate any conditions or restrictions imposed by the donor in light of District philosophy and operations. If the Board believes the District will be unable to fully satisfy the donor's conditions, the gift shall not be accepted. Gift books and instructional materials shall be accepted only if they meet District criteria. At the Superintendent or designee's discretion, a gift may be used at a particular school.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board approval of the agreement with the California Office to Reform Education (CORE) Districts for January 25 through June 30, 2017. CORE Districts is a collaboration of school districts working together to improve student achievement through highly productive, meaningful partnership, and learning between member-school districts.

ITEM SUMMARY:

- Starts: January 25 through June 30, 2017
- CORE school districts are collaborating to address a specific problem of practice based on District priorities through cycles of improvement rooted in improved science.

RATIONALE:

The CORE Districts will support District Improvement Teams and School Improvement Teams made up of district administrators, principals, instructional coaches, and teachers. The CORE hub will assist with:

- Providing infrastructure for collaboration, manage logistics, serve as a steward for improvement community integrity and effectiveness.
- Facilitate connections and coordinate collaborations between districts, connect districts with well-aligned resources, develop and deliver meaningful convenings, and coach districts to ensure coherence with other efforts.
- Develop and manage tools and resources that districts can use to effectively employee improvement science, serve as the analytical engine of the communities and provide analysis, and collect and curate knowledge and best practices from districts across and outside the improvement community.

LCAP goal 1.1: "Provide equitable student access to a rigorous, standards-based, instructional program that includes, but is not limited to high-quality instruction, instructional materials, academic supports, and technology-based resources."

LCAP goal 1.3: "Maintain partnerships with institutions of higher education and community organizations that support desired student-learning outcomes."

LCAP goal 2.1: "Ensure access to the CORE instructional program by providing highly qualified teachers at each site and ongoing professional development for all staff."

Independent Contractor Agreement

This AGREEMENT is hereby entered into between the **Santa Ana Unified School District**, hereinafter referred to as "DISTRICT," and **CORE Districts**, **1107** 9th **Street**, **Suite 500**, **Sacramento**, **CA 95814** hereinafter referred to as "CONTRACTOR."

WHEREAS, DISTRICT is authorized by Section 53060 of the California Government Code to contract with and employ any persons for the furnishing of special services and advice in financial, economic, accounting, engineering, legal or administrative matters, if such persons are specially trained and experienced and competent to perform the special services required; WHEREAS, DISTRICT is in need of such special services and advice; and WHEREAS, CONTRACTOR is specially trained and experienced and competent to perform the special services required by the DISTRICT, and such services are needed on a limited basis;

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

1. Services to be provided by CONTRACTOR:

CORE Improvement Communities for Cross-District Teams

The participating CORE school districts are collaborating to address a specific problem of practice based on district priorities through cycles of improvement rooted in improvement science. The first problem of practice that is being addressed is to improve math proficiency of African-American and Hispanic/Latino students, especially in grades 4-8.

The roles and commitments of both district teams and the hub organization include:

District Improvement Team

- Who: Cross-functional district improvement teams of approximately six to eight individuals per district. Depending on the district structure, problem of practice, and needs, this team may include:
 - o <u>Improvement lead:</u> Project manage the improvement science work of the district through facilitation and coaching at the district and school levels
 - <u>Cabinet officer:</u> Senior team member who serves as executive sponsor and guide the team
 - <u>Principal supervisor:</u> Brings school perspective and integrates with other efforts underway, interfaces with principals
 - o <u>Functional lead(s)</u>: Brings relevant content expertise based on the problem the district has prioritized and helps integrate with other initiatives
 - o <u>Data and accountability lead:</u> Helps problem solve how to measure improvement

- School site leader: Removes competing obligations from teachers weave in improvement work with other initiatives at school level
- **Key role:** Guiding improvement work and building capacity at the district level.
- Commitment: The Improvement Lead's commitment includes attending four inperson convenings, bi-weekly check-ins with the CORE hub organization, and several hours of work per week between convenings. The commitment for the remaining team members includes attending four in-person convenings and one to two hours of work per week between convenings.

School Improvement Team (possible structure as work progresses to the school level in a subset of schools designated by the district)

- Who: Cross-functional school improvement teams of approximately six to eight individuals per school. This team might include:
 - School improvement lead: Facilitating weekly or bi-weekly meetings of the school improvement team, and communicating issues and needs to the district improvement leads
 - <u>Teachers:</u> Tailoring interventions to their individual classroom contexts and gathering data to measure improvement and accountability
 - o <u>Instructional coaches:</u> Problem solving with teachers to help ensure change ideas are tested with fidelity
 - o <u>Principals:</u> Working with district leadership to ensure there is adequate capacity for improvement work in their individual school
- **Key role:** Execute PDSA cycles to test and learn from change ideas at the school level
- **Commitment:** Team members' commitment includes attending four in-person convenings per year and approximately two hours of work per week between convenings.

What the CORE hub will do to support your district

- **Build CORE Improvement Community structure:** Provide infrastructure for collaboration, manage logistics, serve as a steward for improvement community integrity and effectiveness, and listen to feedback and adjust approach.
- **Facilitation and coaching:** Facilitate connections and coordinate collaborations between districts, connect districts with well-aligned resources, develop and deliver meaningful convenings, and coach districts to ensure coherence with other efforts.
- Knowledge management and analytics: Develop and manage tools and resources
 that districts can use to effectively employ improvement science, serve as the
 analytical engine of the communities and provide analysis, and collect and curate
 knowledge and best practices from districts across and outside the improvement
 community.

CORE Districts members will have full access to the active improvement communities, inclusive of costs for traveling to and attending CORE-wide meetings of the improvement communities. The specific problems of practice and number of improvement communities may change over time to meet the needs of the collaborative, and decisions about the active

improvement communities, their meeting budgets, and their focal areas will continue to be made by CORE Board of Directors.

Professional Learning Communities for District Leaders

The participating CORE school districts also work and learn together through inter-connected professional learning communities (PLCs) for district leaders. Teams of approximately two to five individuals per district participate in such PLCs, convening in person two to six times per year per PLC, as well as via regular virtual meetings.

Currently, one such community is active:

Data Leads

- Who: District analytical and research experts
- What: District analytical leads work together and with data experts to further develop and refine CORE's multiple measures accountability system and learn from each other.
- Example of past work and success: Developed a novel and multiple-measures-based accountability calculation called the School Quality Improvement Index. Index reports were released to leaders and educators in Winter 2015 and were publicly released in February 2016. CORE's Index represents the first accountability system in the nation that is fully aligned to the new federal ESSA legislation.

CORE Districts members will continue to have full access to the active district-level PLCs, inclusive of costs for traveling to and attending CORE-wide meetings of the PLCs. The specific type and work of the PLCs may change over time to meet the needs of the collaborative, and decisions about the active PLCs, their meeting budgets, and their focal areas will continue to be made by CORE Board of Directors.

CORE Data Collaborative

Over the past two years, with leadership from and stakeholder engagement in your district, CORE Districts has developed an innovative multiple measures accountability system, called the School Quality Improvement System, as well as an underlying data system. This accountability system is fully compliant with the new federal ESSA legislation and is aligned to LCFF – in fact, the metrics utilized for the Index (the calculation at the heart of the accountability system) can be used for the LCAP.

As a founding member of the CORE Data Collaborative, your district will receive:

- Multi-metric school and district Data Dashboards with performance benchmarked against peers across California;
 - Included metrics: Academic Achievement, Academic Growth, High School Readiness, Graduation, Chronic Absence, Suspension Rates, English Learner Re-Designation Rates, Special Education Disproportionality, Social Emotional Skills, and Student/Staff/Family Climate Surveys;
- Dynamic reporting and opportunities for deeper analysis using the EdVantage platform (e.g., drilling down, filtering, and extracting data and graphs);
- Strategic analytics by CORE Districts' partners at Education Analytics;
- Integration of measures and learnings into CORE District PLC sessions; and

• Additional professional/peer learning opportunities.

Beginning this year, additional LEAs who are not CORE Districts members have had the opportunity to join the CORE Data Collaborative for a fee. Forming this expanded Data Collaborative gives CORE Districts members a better opportunity to influence the accountability system that California adopts, as well as a larger data set for analysis and benchmarking in support of continual improvement and raising student achievement.

As a full CORE Districts member, your district enjoys several additional benefits that these new Data Collaborative members do not have, including:

- Through participation in the Data Leads PLC, the opportunity to influence the refinement of the Index and the inclusion of new metrics;
- By representation on the CORE Board of Directors, the ability to modify and update the Index; and
- By representation on the CORE Board of Directors, the ability to change the fee structure for participation in the Data Collaborative.

CORE-PACE Research Partnership

Policy Analysis for California Education (PACE) is CORE Districts' primary research partner. CORE Districts members have the opportunity to participate in multi-LEA research studies in ways that are designed to impact both policy and practice. The research activity that CORE and PACE are engaged in over the next year is focused on answering two major questions that are most important for both continuous improvement and developing smarter policy:

- 1. What is the effect of including diverse measures in an accountability index?
- 2. Does peer-to-peer collaboration lead to changes in practice?

In future years, CORE District staff and superintendents will be able to prioritize additional research topics for exploration.

State and National Voice:

Together, the CORE Districts members serve more than 1 million students and their families, representing 18% of all California students. Thus, by working together, the CORE Districts members serve a significant proportion of the state's students and have the opportunity to have a much greater voice at both the state and national level.

In addition to the CORE Improvement Community and PLCs described above, participating school district superintendents have the opportunity to participate in a PLC, collaborating and learning from each other around shared problems of practice. These often have state and federal policy implications. Through the power of the group, participating districts have an outsize policy impact. Examples of policy impact thus far include:

- LCAP Released months before the State legislature developed our LCAP process, the School Quality Improvement Index informed much of the policy conversation and the LCAP data metrics have 85% crossover with the SQII Metrics.
- ESSA The Every Student Succeeds Act perfectly aligns with CORE's Index and our multiple measures work helped influence the final bill. In addition, CORE's

- Index is being used as a model for California as the state works to comply with the new federal law.
- NCLB Waiver CORE Districts received the only district-level waiver from NCLB, which allowed the districts to develop a novel and holistic accountability system and receive increased flexibility for the use of their Title 1 funds.
- Accountability a participating CORE superintendent, on behalf of CORE, sits on Superintendent Torlakson's statewide accountability taskforce.
- Great Teachers Along with Linda Darling Hammond, a CORE superintendent, on behalf of CORE and his district, co-chairs the Superintendent's Greatness by Design committee.

- 2. <u>Term:</u> CONTRACTOR shall commence providing services under this AGREEMENT on 1/25/2017 and will diligently perform as required and complete performance by 6/30/2017.
- 3. <u>Compensation:</u> DISTRICT agrees to pay the CONTRACTOR for services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this AGREEMENT a total fee not to exceed Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000). DISTRICT shall pay CONTRACTOR according to the following terms and conditions:

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- 4. <u>Expenses:</u> DISTRICT shall not be liable to CONTRACTOR for any costs or expenses paid or incurred by CONTRACTOR in performing services for DISTRICT, except as follows: N/A.
- 5. <u>Independent Contractor</u>: CONTRACTOR, in the performance of this AGREEMENT, shall be and act as an independent contractor. CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that he/she and all of his/her employees shall not be considered officers, employees or agents of the DISTRICT, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of the DISTRICT and/or to which DISTRICT's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Workers' Compensation. CONTRACTOR assumes the full responsibility for the acts and/or omissions of his/her employees or agents as they relate to the services to be provided under this AGREEMENT. CONTRACTOR shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state and local taxes or contributions,

including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to CONTRACTOR's employees.

- 6. <u>Materials:</u> CONTRACTOR shall furnish, at its own expense, all labor, materials, equipment, supplies and other items necessary to complete the services to be provided pursuant to this AGREEMENT, except as follows: N/A.
- CONTRACTOR's services will be performed, findings obtained, reports and recommendations prepared in accordance with generally and currently accepted principles and practices of his/her profession.
- 7. <u>Invoices:</u> CONTRACTOR will submit monthly invoices to the DISTRICT within 30 days of the services being rendered. The DISTRICT will only reimburse CONTRACTOR for approved services as outlined in section 1, *Services to be provided by CONTRACTOR* at the cost outlined in section 3, *Compensation*.
- 8. <u>Originality of Services:</u> CONTRACTOR agrees that all technologies, formulae, procedures, processes, methods, writings, ideas, dialogue, compositions, recordings, teleplays, and/or video productions prepared for, written for, submitted to the DISTRICT and/or used in connection with this AGREEMENT, shall be wholly original to CONTRACTOR and shall not be copied in whole or in part from any other source, except that submitted to CONTRACTOR by DISTRICT as a basis for such services.
- 9. <u>Copyright/Trademark/Patent:</u> CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that all matters produced under this AGREEMENT shall become the property of DISTRICT and cannot be used without DISTRICT's express written permission. DISTRICT shall have all right, title and interest in said matters, including the right to secure and maintain the copyright, trademark and/or patent of said matter in the name of the DISTRICT. CONTRACTOR consents to use of CONTRACTOR's name in conjunction with the sale, use, performance and distribution of the matters, for any purpose and in any medium.

- 10. *Conflict of Interest*: CONTRACTOR represents and warrants the following:
- (a) **No Current or Prior Conflict of Interest.** That CONTRACTOR has no business, professional, personal, or other interest, including, but not limited to, the representation of other clients, that would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of its obligations under this AGREEMENT.
- (b) **Notice of Potential Conflict.** If any such actual or potential conflict of interest arises under this AGREEMENT, CONTRACTOR shall immediately inform the DISTRICT in writing of such conflict.
- (c) **Termination for Material Conflict.** If, in the reasonable judgment of the DISTRICT, such conflict poses a material conflict to and with the performance of CONTRACTOR's obligations under this AGREEMENT, then the DISTRICT may terminate the AGREEMENT immediately upon written notice to CONTRACTOR; such termination of the AGREEMENT shall be effective upon the receipt of such notice by CONTRACTOR.
- 11. **Termination:** DISTRICT may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this AGREEMENT and compensate CONTRACTOR only for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by DISTRICT shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services by CONTRACTOR. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the CONTRACTOR or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner. DISTRICT may terminate this AGREEMENT upon giving of written notice of intention to terminate for cause. Cause shall include: (a) material violation of this AGREEMENT by the CONTRACTOR; or (b) any act by CONTRACTOR exposing the DISTRICT to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or (c) CONTRACTOR is adjudged a bankrupt, CONTRACTOR makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors or a receiver is appointed on account of CONTRACTOR's insolvency. Written notice by DISTRICT shall contain the reasons for such intention to terminate and unless within TEN (10) days after service of such notice the condition or violation shall cease, or satisfactory arrangements for the correction thereof be made, this AGREEMENT shall upon the expiration of the **TEN** (10) days cease and terminate. In the event of such termination, the DISTRICT may secure the required services from another contractor. If the cost to the DISTRICT exceeds the cost of providing the

service pursuant to this AGREEMENT, the excess cost shall be charges to and collected from the CONTRACTOR. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to DISTRICT. Written notice by DISTRICT shall be deemed given when received by the other party, or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.

- 12. <u>Hold Harmless:</u> CONTRACTOR agrees to and does hereby indemnify, hold harmless and defend the DISTRICT and its governing board, officers, employees and agents from every claim or demand made and every liability, loss, damage or expense, of any nature whatsoever, which may be incurred by reason of:
 - (a) Liability for damages for: (1) death or bodily injury to person; (2) injury to, loss or theft of property; or (3) any other loss, damage or expense arising out of (1) or (2) above, sustained by the CONTRACTOR or any person, firm or corporation employed by the CONTRACTOR, either directly or by independent contract, upon or in connection with the services called for in this AGREEMENT, however caused, except for liability for damages referred to above which result from the negligence or willful misconduct of the DISTRICT or its officers, employees or agents.
 - (b) Any injury to or death of any person(s), including the DISTRICT's officers, employees and agents, or damage to or loss of any property caused by any act, neglect, default, or omission of the CONTRACTOR, or any person, firm or corporation employed by the CONTRACTOR, either directly or by independent contract, arising out of, or in any way connected with, the services covered by this AGREEMENT, whether said injury or damage occurs either on or off DISTRICT's property, except for liability for damages which result from the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the DISTRICT or its officers, employees or agents.
 - (c) Any liability for damages which may arise from the furnishing or use of any copyrighted or uncopyrighted matter or patented or unpatented invention under this AGREEMENT.

- 13. <u>Insurance</u>: Pursuant to Section 10, CONTRACTOR agrees to carry a comprehensive general and automobile liability insurance with limits of **ONE MILLION Dollars** (\$1,000,000) per occurrence combined single limit for bodily injury and property damage in a form mutually acceptable to both parties to protect CONTRACTOR and DISTRICT against liability or claims of liability which may arise out of this AGREEMENT. CONTRACTOR shall provide DISTRICT with certificates of insurance evidencing all coverages and endorsements required hereunder including a thirty (30) day written notice of cancellation or reduction in coverage. CONTRACTOR agrees to name DISTRICT and its governing board, officers, agents and employees as additional insureds under said policy.
- 14. <u>Assignment:</u> The obligations of the CONTRACTOR pursuant to this AGREEMENT shall not be assigned by the CONTRACTOR.
- 15. <u>Compliance With Applicable Laws:</u> The services completed herein must meet the approval of the DISTRICT and shall be subject to the DISTRICT's general right of inspection to secure the satisfactory completion thereof. CONTRACTOR agrees to comply with all federal, state and local laws, rules, regulations and ordinances that are now or may in the future become applicable to CONTRACTOR, CONTRACTOR's business, equipment and personnel engaged in services covered by this AGREEMENT or accruing out of the performance of such services.
- 16. <u>Permits/Licenses:</u> CONTRACTOR and all CONTRACTOR's employees or agents shall secure and maintain in force such permits and licenses as are required by law in connection with the furnishing of services pursuant to this AGREEMENT.
- 17. *Employment With Public Agency:* CONTRACTOR, if an employee of another public agency, agrees that CONTRACTOR will not receive salary or remuneration, other than vacation pay, as an employee of another public agency for the actual time in which services are actually being performed pursuant to this AGREEMENT.

- 18. <u>Entire Agreement/Amendment:</u> This AGREEMENT and any exhibits attached hereto constitute the entire agreement among the parties to it and supersedes any prior or contemporaneous understanding or agreement with respect to the services contemplated, and may be amended only by a written amendment executed by both parties to the AGREEMENT.
- 19. *Nondiscrimination:* CONTRACTOR agrees that it will not engage in unlawful discrimination in employment of persons because of race, ethnicity, religion, nationality, disability, gender, marital status or age of such persons.
- 20. <u>Non Waiver:</u> The failure of DISTRICT or CONTRACTOR to seek redress for violation of, or to insist upon, the strict performance of any term or condition of this AGREEMENT, shall not be deemed a waiver by that party of such term or condition, or prevent a subsequent similar act from again constituting a violation of such term or condition.
- 21. <u>Notice:</u> All notices or demands to be given under this AGREEMENT by either party to the other, shall be in writing and given either by: (a) personal service or (b) by U.S. Mail, mailed either by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, with postage prepaid. Service shall be considered given when received if personally served or if mailed on the third day after deposit in any U.S. Post Office. The address to which notices or demands may be given by either party may be changed by written notice given in accordance with the notice provisions of this section. BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board approval of the data-sharing agreements with Harvard Graduate School of Education and its Center for Education Policy Research (CEPR), Achieve3000, MIND Research

ITEM SUMMARY:

New state and federal laws require data-sharing agreements between district and external service providers.

Institute, and Newsela for January 25, 2017 through June 30, 2018. CEPR, through a project entitled "The Proving Ground", has created a collaborative research network of schools committed to developing a new approach to achieving better student outcomes at a lower cost through the use of collectively generated evidence.

RATIONALE:

These agreements will allow the District to authorize Achieve3000, MIND Research, and Newsela to provide District-data directly to CEPR.

The data will be used by the research team at CEPR and its contractor, Applied Predictive Technologies (APT), to determine the impact of different blended learning software packages. This will assist the District in evaluating the strengths and weaknesses of its instructional program and in developing strategies for improvement. The ultimate purpose of the project is to provide analytic findings about the relative effectiveness of different interventions, products, and implementation patterns in raising student achievement. These findings will allow leaders to make future decisions that are likely to improve student achievement. Because findings will be shared across the network, we expect learning to occur at a higher rate than typical.

COLLABORATION and DATA USE AGREEMENT

This Collaboration and Data Use Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into by and among Santa Ana Unified School District ("Collaborator"), Achieve3000 ("Provider") and the President and Fellows of Harvard College, acting on behalf of The Harvard Graduate School of Education and The Center for Education Policy Research ("Harvard" or "CEPR"). Each of Collaborator, Provider and Harvard may hereinafter be referred to individually as a "Party" or collectively as the "Parties".

WHEREAS, CEPR, through a research project entitled "The Proving Ground", is creating a collaborative research network of schools committed to developing a new approach to achieving better student outcomes at lower cost through the use of collectively generated evidence (the "Project");

WHEREAS, CEPR is conducting the Project on behalf of Collaborator to improve instruction in accordance with 34 CFR § 99.31(a)(6)(i)(C);

WHEREAS, CEPR requires access to certain Data, as defined below, of Collaborator for purposes of the Project;

WHEREAS, Collaborator desires to provide Harvard and Harvard's contractor with access to such Data through Provider, and Provider is willing to provide such Data to CEPR on behalf of Collaborator; and

WHEREAS, the research work contemplated by this Agreement will further the instructional and research objectives of Harvard in a manner consistent with its status as a non-profit, tax-exempt, educational institution.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties hereto agree as follows:

I. STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

As part of its ongoing efforts to improve the quality of instruction and raise student achievement, Collaborator is partnering with CEPR to participate in a research network that will perform rapid cycle evaluations on the usage and implementation of blended learning products and their impact on student achievement.

In order to successfully accomplish the Project, Harvard will, as described in this Agreement, have temporary access to the Collaborator's data identified in this Agreement and any addenda to it. This Agreement sets forth the requirements for the sharing of data contemplated in the Project.

II. OVERVIEW OF PROJECT GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

Collaborator's data will be used by the research team at CEPR and its contractor, Applied

Predictive Technologies (APT), to determine the impact of different blended learning software packages. This will assist Collaborator in evaluating the strengths and weaknesses of its instructional program and in developing strategies for improvement. Throughout the term of this Agreement, the Parties shall consult through their above named contacts involved in the Project regarding the provision of Data hereunder.

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VI. RESPONSIBILITIES

Collaborator will:

- 1. Secure and execute such permissions as is necessary to enable Provider to provide the Data to CEPR.
- 2. Work with Provider and CEPR throughout the term of this Agreement as necessary to ensure the appropriate Data is available and able to be transmitted to CEPR for purposes of the Project.

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- 1. Respond in a timely manner to requests for Data from CEPR.
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- Ensure no specific Collaborator agency or agency school results are disclosed to other members of the Proving Ground network or the larger public without the permission of Collaborator.
- 2. Not disclose individual student-level information. All results will be reported at an aggregated level.
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VII. DATA DISCLOSURE

Harvard is requesting that Provider deliver on behalf of Collaborator the following Data when available:

- 1. **Student-level enterprise data files**. These refer to student-level data files that are generated on a semi-frequent basis (e.g., daily or weekly) that are generated for teachers and schools about student usage of the educational software and any assessments conducted or gathered by the software.
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When any Data are transported outside Provider's systems, all such Data will be encrypted and moved via physical media or secure FTP. No Data will be transferred outside Collaborator's or Provider's systems via email. In order to minimize the amount of personally identifiable information ("PII") transported outside of Collaborator's and Provider's systems, Harvard will generate masked research identifiers before the Data is transported to APT.

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- 2. For purposes of this Project and for ensuring Harvard's compliance with the terms of this Agreement and all applicable state and federal laws, Harvard designates Tom Kane as the temporary custodian of the Data that Provider shares with Harvard. Provider will release all Data for this Project to the named temporary custodian. The temporary custodian shall be responsible for transmitting all requests for Data and maintaining a log or other record of all Data requested and received pursuant to the Agreement, including confirmation of the completion of the Project and the return or destruction of the Data as described below. Collaborator, Provider or their respective agents may upon request review the records required to be kept by Harvard under this Agreement.
- 3. Use the Data shared under the Agreement for no purpose other than the Project, and as authorized under 34 CFR §§ 99.31(a)(6). Nothing in the Agreement shall be construed to authorize Harvard to have access to additional data from Collaborator that is not included in the scope of the Agreement, or to govern access to the Data by entities other than the parties. Except as expressly permitted herein, Harvard further agrees not to share the Data received from Provider under the Agreement with any other entity without prior written approval from Collaborator. CEPR understands that the Agreement does not convey ownership of the Data to CEPR.
- 4. Require all employees, contractors, and agents of any kind to comply with the Agreement and all applicable provisions of FERPA and other laws with respect to the Data shared under the Agreement. Harvard agrees to require and maintain an appropriate confidentiality agreement from each employee, contractor, or agency with access to the Data pursuant to the Agreement. Nothing in this section authorizes Harvard to share the

Data provided under the Agreement with any other individual or entity for any purpose other than completing Harvard's work as authorized by Collaborator consistent with this Agreement.

- 5. Not disclose the Data produced to it under the Agreement in any manner that could identify any individual student, except as authorized by FERPA, to any entity other than Collaborator, Provider or authorized employees, contractors, and agents of Harvard working the Project. Persons participating in the Project on behalf of Harvard shall neither disclose nor otherwise release any Data relating to an individual student, nor disclose information relating to a group or category of students without ensuring the confidentiality of individual students in that group. Publications and reports of these Data and information related to them, including preliminary project descriptions and draft reports, shall involve only aggregate data and no personally identifiable information or other information that could lead to the identification of any student.
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- 7. Upon termination of this Agreement or two years after the publication of reports generated under the Agreements, whichever occurs later, Harvard will purge any copies of the Data from its computer systems in compliance with 34 CFR §§ 99.31(a)(6)(ii)(b). Harvard agrees to require all employees, contractors, or agents of any kind working on the project to comply with this provision. No other entity is authorized to continue research using the Data obtained under the Agreement upon the termination of the Agreement and the Project described herein. Harvard will destroy all Data obtained under the Agreement and addenda to it when no longer needed for the purpose for which it was released by Collaborator. Nothing in this Agreement authorizes Harvard to maintain the Data beyond the time period needed to complete the Project.
- 8. Notwithstanding the above paragraph, upon conclusion of the Project, Collaborator agrees that CEPR may retain a de-identified copy of the Data for research and academic purposes, provided CEPR complies with the following:
 - a. CEPR shall strip all Data so retained of the following information: local student ID, local student name (first, last, and middle) and any other personal identifiers.
 - b. CEPR shall provide Collaborator a cross-walk of the local student ID, local student name, and CEPR's research ID.

For the avoidance of doubt, in no event shall CEPR be permitted to retain PII, or other Data subject to FERPA, obtained under this Agreement once such Data is no longer needed for the purpose for which it was released to CEPR.

9. Provide Collaborator with one electronic and at least one paper copy of the final versions of all reports and other documents associated with the Project.

IX. PUBLICATIONS

Harvard has the right, consistent with scientific standards, to publish, present, or use the study results it has gained in the course of the research under this Agreement but only if the publication, presentation or use does not permit personal identification of parents and students by individuals other than representatives of Harvard. In order to protect the confidentiality of previously identified confidential information disclosed to Harvard, Harvard agrees to provide to Collaborator any proposed publications or presentations which are to make public any findings, data, or results of the research under this Agreement for Collaborator's review and comment at least ten (10) days prior to submission of a manuscript or abstract for publication or the date of the presentation, provided that such review shall be limited to the identification of confidential information contained in the publication At the end of the 10-day review period, Harvard shall have the right to publish. For the avoidance of doubt, once a work has been reviewed, the content may be disclosed in substantially the same form on multiple occasions without additional review by Collaborator.

X. USE OF NAME

Except as expressly authorized in this Agreement, no party shall use (alone or as part of another name) any names, logos, seals, insignia or other words, symbols or devices that identify any other party or any unit, division or affiliate of the other party ("Protected Names") for any purpose in connection with the Project or this Agreement except with the prior written approval of, and in accordance with restrictions required by, the party whose Protected Names are to be used, nor shall any party seek to register any Protected Names of any other party in any manner in any jurisdiction. Without limiting the foregoing, each party shall cease all use of Protected Names of each other party authorized under this Agreement on the termination or expiration of this Agreement, except as otherwise expressly provided herein. These restrictions shall not apply to information required to be disclosed to a government entity.

XI. REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES

HARVARD AND THE HARVARD RESEARCHERS MAKE NO REPRESENTATIONS OR WARRANTIES OF ANY KIND CONCERNING THE PROJECT AND PROJECT RESULTS AND DISCLAIM ALL REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES, EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, INCLUDING, WITHOUT LIMITATION, WARRANTIES OF MERCHANTABILITY, FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE, AND NONINFRINGEMENT OF INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS. IN NO EVENT SHALL EITHER PARTY, MEMBERS OF ITS GOVERNING BOARDS, OR ITS OFFICERS, EMPLOYEES, FACULTY, FELLOWS, STUDENTS AND AFFILIATES, BE LIABLE FOR INCIDENTAL OR CONSEQUENTIAL DAMAGES OF ANY KIND, INCLUDING ECONOMIC DAMAGES OR LOST PROFITS, REGARDLESS OF WHETHER THE PARTY WAS ADVISED, HAD OTHER REASON TO KNOW OR IN FACT KNEW OF THE POSSIBILITY OF THE FOREGOING.

confidentiality, maintenance, publication, and destruction or return of data, and to require compliance by all related or associated institutions, individuals, employees or contractors who may have access to the Data or may own, lease, or control equipment or facilities of any kind where the Data is stored, maintained or use in any way.

XIV. ARBITRATION

In the event of any controversy or claim arising out of or relating to any provision of this Agreement or the breach thereof, the parties shall try to settle such conflicts amicably between themselves. Subject to the limitation stated herein, any such conflict which the parties are unable to resolve shall be settled through arbitration conducted as set forth in this paragraph and otherwise in accordance with the rules of the American Arbitration Association. The demand for arbitration shall be filed within a reasonable time after the controversy or claim has arisen, and in no event after the date upon which institution of legal proceedings based on such controversy or claim would be barred by applicable statute of limitations periods.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board adoption of the High School Advanced Placement (AP) Physics 1 and 2 textbook. The adoption process began April 2016. The AP Physics teachers from all of the comprehensive high schools that currently offer the courses participated in the process. The AP Physics 1 and 2 textbook has gone through the selection, adoption, and 28-day review process.

ITEM SUMMARY:

- Board adoption of the high school AP Physics 1 and 2 textbook
- Adoption of the AP Physics 1 and 2 textbook for all high schools offering the course
- 150 textbooks to be purchased for the high schools offering the AP Physics course

RATIONALE:

College Board revised the AP Physics framework in the 2013-14 school year. The current textbooks used in the Santa Ana Unified School District were copyrighted in 2005 and is not aligned with the new version of AP Physics 1 and 2. AP Physics 1 is an algebra-based, introductory college-level physics course covering Newtonian mechanics (including rotational motion); work, energy, and power; mechanical waves and sound; and introductory, simple circuits. AP Physics 2 covers fluid mechanics; thermodynamics; electricity and magnetism; optics; and quantum, atomic, and nuclear physics. The recommended textbook, College Physics, with MasteringPhysics with Pearson eText by Etkina, Gentile & Van Heuvelen, is designed to cover the entire physics series. Each AP class is usually equivalent to a one-semester college course.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board approval of the academic calendars for the 2017-18, 2018-19, and 2019-20 school years. The student academic calendar will reflect the following: three-day Thanksgiving Recess, two-week Winter Recess, and a one-week Spring Recess.

The recommended multi-year school calendar will provide benefits to the District's students, such as:

- More time for instruction prior to Advanced Placement testing
- Ending the first semester before Winter Recess
- Ending the school year late May:
 - Enrollment into Summer School at desired College or University
 - Ability for our students to compete for summer employment
- The three-year calendar provides consistency
- Focuses on an instructional calendar
- 182 days of instruction
- Less financial impact on less than 12 month classified employees
- Low income students will have greater access to meals during winter months

RATIONALE:

It is the intent that every year, the Calendar Committee will meet and review the out year calendar and provide input to the Board in the spring. The process will allow the District to maintain the operational instructional calendars while planning ahead.

The Calendar Committee, comprised of parents, certificated, classified, and management staff, provided input for the development of the proposed calendar.

Attached is a copy of the survey calendars for 2017-18 (option A and option B).

FUNDING:

No fiscal impact.

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve the recommended calendar "A" for the 2017-18, 2018-19, and 2019-20 school years. The student calendars for 2018-19 and 2019-20 will follow the same format as 2017-18 option "A" calendar (attached).

The District would construct the designed administration and instructional building with available alternate construction funds to meet the DSA deadline, and then be partially reimbursed \$3,220,891 by the State. BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

Staff seeks Board approval of the Facilities Lease Agreement between Santa Ana Unified School District (SAUSD) and Rancho Santiago Community College District (RSCCD) for the college's use of the western portion of the campus. (See diagram attached).

The SAUSD Board has previously approved a similar facilities use agreement with RSCCD for the Middle College High School, as well as the use of classrooms for Santa Ana College (SAC) Adult Education Program throughout the District.

RATIONALE:

Approval of the proposed facilities Lease Agreement will allow SAC to utilize a portion of the property at 1325 E. Fourth St., Santa Ana, for the use of classrooms for college credit courses as well as adult education courses. Doing so would allow SAUSD students to earn college credits

while graduating from high school.

RSCCD/SAC shall have the exclusive occupancy and use of their portion of the property Monday through Friday, from 7:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. The SAUSD expressly reserves its right to exclusive

through Friday, from 7:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. The SAUSD expressly reserves its right to exclusive occupancy and use of the property for its education programs and activities on all other days and times, as well as exclusive occupancy of its facilities on the eastern portion of the campus.

FUNDING:

No fiscal impact anticipated to the General Fund. The rent paid by RSCCD will reimburse the District for utilities and maintenance costs for their portion of the property. Any funds expended from Fund 40 to modify the facility will be reimbursed by RSCCD.

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve the facilities Lease Agreement between Santa Ana Unified School District and Rancho Santiago Community College District for college courses as well as adult education courses.

LEASE AGREEMENT

Between

RANCHO SANTIAGO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT and SANTA ANA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

WHEREAS, Lessor is the fee owner of certain real property and improvements thereon situated at 1325 E. 4th St., Santa Ana, California 92701 and which is referred to hereinafter as the "Property."

WHEREAS, Lessee desires to lease from Lessor the Premises described in Paragraph 1.1 below for the purpose of conducting its daytime college credit classes and evening Adult Education Program.

WHEREAS, Lessor states that at the time of delivery of possession of the Premises, any school classroom buildings defined included in the Premises are not needed and will not be needed for school classroom buildings by Lessor.

WHEREAS, this Lease is made pursuant to and in accordance with California Education Code § 17527, et seq.

1. PREMISES

- 1.1 <u>Description.</u> Lessor hereby leases to Lessee, on the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth, portions of the Property generally described as Classrooms numbered 1110 through 1113 (including all restrooms and storage spaces annexed to said classrooms), library, lounge (classroom), and administrative offices and as more particularly identified in cross-hatched portion of the site drawing of Property attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and incorporated herein by this reference ("the Premises"). For purposes of this Lease, Lessee and Lessor agree that the entirety of the existing building improvements within the Property consists of portables (3,840) square feet, Buildings A & B (15,950) square feet, and the Premises consists of buildings and available parking (85,200) square feet, and that Lessee's Share of Expenses shall be one hundred percent (100%). During the time that it uses or occupies the Premises, Lessee shall be afforded reasonable access to all other areas of the Property, except for other building improvements now or hereafter situated on the Property which are not part of the Premises under this Lease ("the Common Areas").
- 1.2 <u>Hours of Use</u>. Lessee will use and occupy the Premises for the use of classrooms for Lessee's college credit classes and Adult Education Program and for no other use. Lessee shall have the exclusive occupancy and use of the Premises Monday through Friday, from 7:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. Lessor expressly reserves its right to exclusive occupancy and use of the Premises for its education programs and activities on all other days and times.

- 1.3 <u>Condition of Premises</u>. Lessee acknowledges that it has been afforded the opportunity to inspect the physical condition of Premises and the Property. Lessee accepts the Premises, and leases the Premises from Lessor, on an "as-is" basis without any warranty or representation of Lessor relating to the condition of the Premises in its existing condition for Lessee's anticipated use and occupancy thereof. Lessor shall have no obligation to improve, remodel, alter or modify the Premises, or any portion thereof, in any manner; However, agrees to allow lessee to make DSA approved and compliant improvements to the premises.
- 1.4 <u>The Premises; Lessor Rights.</u> Lessor reserves the right to use the roof, exterior walls and areas beneath, adjacent to and above the Premises, together with the right to install, use, maintain or replace equipment, machinery, pipes, conduit, wiring or other similar items/equipment/materials in, on, about or through the Premises to service other areas of the Property, provided that such uses shall not materially and unreasonably interfere with the Lessee's use and occupancy of the Premises.
- 1.5 <u>The Property; Lessor's Rights.</u> The Premises are part of the Property which is a complex consisting of buildings, landscaping, parking and other improvements. Notwithstanding the lease of the Premises to Lessee, Lessor may, in its sole discretion, modify the size, shape, location or extent of other improvements or add/delete improvements in or about the Property without liability to the Lessee or consent of the Lessee, provided that such modifications, additions or deletions shall not materially modify the Premises or materially impair Lessee's use/occupancy of the Premises without Lessee's prior consent which shall not be unreasonably withheld or conditioned.

2. INITIAL TERM; RENEWAL TERMS

2.1 <u>Initial Term.</u> The Initial Term of this Lease is five (5) years, commencing March 1, 2017, and ending June 30, 2022, unless earlier terminated pursuant to the provisions hereof.

Lessee may have early possession of the Premises from and after the date hereof to ready the Premises for occupancy, provided that Lessor shall not be obligated to provide Lessee with such possession and Lessee shall have no right of possession of the Premises until Lessee delivers to Lessor annually the Certificates of Insurance evidencing that Lessee has obtained each of the policies of insurance set forth in Paragraphs 12.1.1, 12.1.2 and 12.1.3 and that each such policy of insurance is in effect as of the date that Lessor delivers possession of the Premises to Lessee. If Lessee totally or partially occupies the Premises prior to March 1, 2017, the obligation to pay rent and Expenses shall be abated for the period of such early possession. All other terms of this Lease shall however, be in effect during such period. Any such early possession shall not affect the expiration date of the Lease.

3. USE

The Premises shall be used by the Lessee solely and exclusively for purposes of providing college credit classes and Adult Education Program.

Lessee acknowledges that Lessor may, in its sole discretion, simultaneously lease, occupy and/or jointly use all other areas of the Property, including other building improvements

now or hereafter situated on the Property which are not part of the Premises under this Lease, for Lessor's District Offices or any other use provided that such use does not conflict or otherwise interfere with the educational programs or activities conducted upon the Premises by Lessee. Any joint use of the Premises by Lessor shall comply with the provisions of California Education Code sections 17527, *et seq.*

4. RENT AND EXPENSES

- 4.1 Rent. The term "Rent" as used herein consists of "Monthly Rent", "Expenses" and Licensing Fees as those terms are used and defined herein. Rent shall be paid by Lessee to Lessor as set forth herein without deduction or offset in lawful money of the United States at the location designated by Lessor or such other location as Lessor may designate from time-to-time.
- 4.2 <u>Monthly Rent.</u> Lessee shall pay to Lessor, on or before the first day of each calendar month, during the Initial Term of this Lease as Monthly Rent for the Premises the sum of Fifteen thousand five hundred eighteen dollars and thirty one cents (\$15,518.31). Monthly Rent shall be due and payable from Lessee to Lessor regardless of whether or not Lessor submits a billing statement for Monthly Rent to Lessee. Pursuant to Education Code § 17535(b), "a [school] district may enter into an agreement to rent or lease vacant classrooms or other space in operating schools to public entities for less than fair market rental for comparable facilities."
- 4.3 Expenses. During the Initial Term Lessee shall pay Lessor's Share of Expenses. For purposes of this Lease, the term "Expenses" shall mean all expenses, costs, fees or charges paid or incurred by Lessor during any calendar year relating to the Premises for: (a) utility services; (b) operation, maintenance, security services, replacement for normal wear and tear, repairs, re-striping or resurfacing of paving and cleaning of the Property; and (c) Property Taxes, if any. Expenses do not include expenses, costs, fees or charges paid or incurred for portions of the Property set aside for the exclusive use of Lessor or other tenants of Lessor. Lessor agrees to submit monthly billing statements to Lessee on a regular basis providing a detailed accounting of Expenses for the prior month that Lessee is obligated to pay. Upon Lessor's submission of a billing statement to Lessee for Lessee's Share of Expenses, Lessee shall make full payment of the amount due pursuant to such billing statement within thirty (30) days of the date thereof. During the Initial Term and any Renewal Term of this Lease, Lessee shall pay Lessee's Share of Expenses. Lessee acknowledges that as of the commencement date of the Initial Term of this Lease, Lessee is the sole occupant of the Premises situated at the Property. Until any portion of other Premises situated at the Property are occupied by others, Lessee's Share of Expenses shall be one hundred percent (100%) of Expenses. If during the Initial Term the Premises at the Property are occupied by others, Lessee's Share of Expenses shall be re-calculated based on the pro-rata allocation of the building square footage within the Premises to the square footage of the building occupied by others.

5. REAL ESTATE TAXES

5.1 <u>Lessor Payment of Property Taxes.</u> Lessor shall pay all of the real estate or possessory interest taxes, general and special assessments, levies and charges (collectively referred to herein as "Property Taxes") levied or assessed against this Lease or the real property and improvements of which the Premises are a part. The foregoing notwithstanding, unless exempt from the payment of Property Taxes, Lessee shall be

responsible for payment of Lessee's Share of Property Taxes as part of the Expenses component of Rent.

5.2 <u>Taxes Payable Solely By Lessee</u>. Lessee shall pay, before delinquency and without prior notice or demand from Lessor, all taxes levied or assessed on and which become payable during the Initial Term or any Renewal Term of this Lease, whether or not now customary and whether or not within the contemplation of Lessee or Lessor as of the date of this Lease, which are based upon, measured or calculated with respect to: (i) the Rent payable under this Lease; (ii) Lessee's equipment, fixtures, furniture, and other personal property of Lessee situated in the Premises; and (iii) the value of any improvements, alterations or additions made by or on behalf of Lessee to the Premises, except for those improvements existing as of the date of this Lease.

6. UTILITY SERVICES

Lessor shall furnish water, gas, solid waste disposal, and electrical utility to the Premises during the Initial Term and Renewal Terms, if any. The foregoing notwithstanding, Lessee shall make payment of the Lessee's Share of utility service charges paid for by Lessor as part of the Expenses component of Rent. Further, notwithstanding the obligation of Lessor to obtain utility services for the Premises as set forth above, Lessor shall not be deemed in default in the performance of Lessor's obligations under this Lease nor shall Rent be abated or any other right or obligation of Lessor or Lessee under this Lease be affected, if any utility service to be obtained and paid for by Lessor shall be interrupted, limited or terminated for any reason other than Lessor's failure to timely pay undisputed amounts due for Lessor obtained utility services.

Lessee shall obtain and pay for all charges for telephone and internet access. Lessee shall be solely responsible for the cost of and completing distributions of telephone/internet services throughout the Premises as necessary for Lessee's use and occupancy of the Premises and paying charges for telephone and internet services along with any equipment or improvements necessary to use or access such services from the Premises and/or distribution of such services through the Premises.

7. MAINTENANCE AND REPAIR

- Tessee Maintenance of Premises. Lessee shall, at its own expense, keep and maintain the Premises in a neat and clean condition at all times of its use and occupancy during the Initial Term of this Lease. Lessee acknowledges that the Premises and all improvements thereon which are included in this Lease are now in good order and condition. Upon the expiration of the Initial Term or Renewal Terms, as applicable, or upon the earlier termination of this Lease, Lessee shall surrender the Premises and improvements therein to the Lessor in the condition received, reasonable use and wear excepted. Lessee further agrees to occupancy of the Premises at its own cost, necessary to comply with federal, state, county, municipal and other governmental agencies having or claiming jurisdiction. Lessee's obligations hereunder shall include providing regular daily janitorial services to the Premises.
- 7.2 <u>Lessor Maintenance</u>. Lessor shall be responsible for general building repairs, maintenance and replacements, including but not limited to maintenance of the structural portions of the Property (foundations, bearing and exterior walls, sub flooring and roof)

within which the Premises are situated, and Lessor installed, plumbing, electrical, mechanical, telephone, fire extinguishing systems, including fire alarms and/or smoke detection, and heating systems. Lessor shall be further responsible for maintenance and repairs to the Common Area of the Property. Lessee agrees to promptly give Lessor written notice of any need for repairs, maintenance or replacements, after which Lessor shall have a reasonable opportunity to repair the same or cure the defect. Lessor shall not be liable for any failure to perform any maintenance unless such failure shall persist for an unreasonable time after written notice of the need for such maintenance is given to Lessor by Lessee. Lessee shall be responsible for Lessee's Share of maintenance, repair or replacement costs, fees, expenses or other charges incurred by Lessor which are not exclusively limited or exclusively used for portions of the Property other than the Premises.

8. <u>IMPROVEMENTS AND ALTERATIONS</u>

- 8.1 <u>California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).</u> Lessee shall not implement any site improvements until the Lessor has complied with all CEQA requirements and Lessor's Board of Education has approved the CEQA document at a regularly scheduled Board meeting.
- 8.2 <u>Lessee Improvements.</u> Lessee shall not commit, nor permit to be committed, any waste of, in or about the Premises, and shall not make, nor permit to be made, any alterations or improvements of the Premises, without first obtaining written consent from Lessor which may be withheld, granted or conditioned in the sole discretion of Lessor. Lessee, at its own cost, agrees to pay for improvements to the Premises, including repairs and replacements that result from normal use including but not limited to new floor coverings, paint and window coverings. All additions to and improvements of the Premises, including locks, bolts and other fixtures, whether made by the Lessee or any other person, save and except movable furniture, fixtures and equipment installed by the Lessee upon the Premises and which can be removed therefrom without injury to the Premises, immediately when made shall become and be the property of Lessor and shall not be removed from the Premises or changed without first obtaining the written consent of Lessor.
- Improvements Standards. Improvements to the Premises completed by or on 8.3 behalf of Lessee shall conform to the standards set forth herein ("Lessee Improvements"). Unless the costs of construction of Lessee Improvements are less than Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), prior to commencing construction of Lessee Improvements, Lessee shall cause plans and specifications setting forth in detail the nature and scope of the proposed Lessee Improvements along with the materials, equipment and other items to be incorporated into the Lessee Improvements to be prepared by a California licensed architect or California registered engineer as necessary or appropriate by the nature and scope of the Lessee Improvements. Prior to commencing construction of the Lessee Improvements, Lessee shall provide Lessor with a full copy of the plans and specifications reflecting the total scope of the proposed Lessee Improvements and obtain Lessor's consent thereto. Lessee shall modify the plans and specifications for Lessee Improvements as necessary to obtain Lessor's consent thereto. No Lessee Improvements to the Premises shall be commenced without the prior consent of Lessor. The Lessee Improvements set forth in such plans and specifications shall be subject to review and approval by all governmental agencies with jurisdiction over any portion of the work indicated therein prior to commencement of construction at or about the Premises.

Notwithstanding any permits or approvals obtained by Lessee for Lessee Improvements depicted in a set of plans and specifications, if required by Lessor as a condition to Lessor's consent to Lessee Improvements, the work reflected in such plans and specifications shall conform with the then existing requirements and standards established by the Division of State Architect for school classroom/educational facilities.

- 8.4 Construction of Lessee Initiated Improvements. Lessee Improvements consented to by Lessee shall be completed only by contractor(s) duly licensed by the California Contractors State License Board. No construction activities at the Property or the Premises relating to Lessee Improvements shall be permitted unless prior to the commencement of such construction activities, Lessee provides to Lessor: (a) the contractor(s)' certificate(s) of insurance evidencing that the contractor(s) and each of its subcontractors have obtained and will maintain for the duration of construction activities at the Premises the following insurance policies in the minimum coverage amounts noted: (i) Workers Compensation Insurance (coverage amount in accordance with applicable law); (ii) Employer's Liability Insurance (coverage amount of at least One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000)); (iii) Commercial General Liability Insurance, including coverages for personal injury, death, property damage and automobile liability (coverage amount of at least Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) per occurrence and Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) in the aggregate). All construction of Lessee Improvements shall be completed in workmanlike manner, and subject to observation by or on behalf of Lessor from time-to-time. Lessee shall, at all times, provide Lessor with access to Lessee Improvements, whether in progress, in place or completed.
- 8.5 Lessee may elect to contract through Lessor for actual project costs of modifications or improvements to Premises. Projected costs will be determined by both Lessee and Lessor in writing prior to commencement of work.

9. LESSOR EQUIPMENT; LESSEE LICENSE TO USE LESSOR EQUIPMENT

- 9.1 <u>Equipment Identification.</u> The equipment identified and described in Exhibit "B" attached to this Lease and incorporated herein by this reference ("Lessor Equipment") is the sole property of Lessor, is located on or about the Premises. Lessee shall furnish all other equipment, materials and supplies necessary for Lessee's use and occupancy of the Premises at the sole expense of Lessee.
- 9.2 <u>Lessee Acceptance of Lessor Equipment</u>. Lessee acknowledges that it has been afforded the opportunity to inspect Lessor Equipment and accepts use of Lessor Equipment in the existing "as is" condition of each item of Lessor Equipment.
- 9.3 <u>Lessee License to Use Lessor Equipment</u>. Lessor hereby grants to and Lessee accepts a license to use Lessor Equipment in connection with Lessee's use and occupancy of the Premises and without additional cost or charge to Lessee. Lessee's license to use Lessor Equipment shall be solely and exclusively in connection with operations and activities conducted by Lessee in the Premises and only during such times as such operations and activities are being conducted by Lessee in the Premises. Lessee acknowledges that its use of Lessor Equipment shall be at the sole risk of Lessee; Lessee expressly releases Lessor from any loss, damage, injury or other harm arising out of or related to the use of Lessor Equipment. Lessee shall be responsible for repairing, replacing or restoring all damage to Lessor Equipment, as directed by Lessor. Lessee's license to use Lessor Equipment shall terminate, without further action of Lessee or

Lessor, concurrently with expiration of the Initial Term or Renewal Term, as applicable, or the earlier termination of this Lease.

10. PROPERTY PARKING LOT; LESSEE EXCLUSIVE PARKING LICENSE.

- 10.1 <u>Lessee Non-Exclusive License to Parking Spaces</u>. During the Initial Term, Lessee shall be granted a non-exclusive license to park motor vehicles of Lessee's employees, agents and invitees in the cross-hatched portion of the Property Parking Lot and noted as "Lessee Parking" in the Property Site Drawing attached to this Lease as Exhibit "A." [For purposes of this Lease, Lessee and Lessor agree that the area of the Property Parking Lot noted as Lessee Parking consists of twenty (20) automobile parking spaces, two (2) of which shall be designated for exclusive use as a disable parking space. During the Term Lessor may relocate Lessee's parking spaces to another nearby Parking Lot without modification of any other right or obligation of Lessee or Lessor relating to Lessee's exclusive parking license.
- 10.2 <u>Parking Rules and Regulations</u>. At all times during Lessee's use of the Lessee parking license, Lessee shall require strict compliance with the Parking Lot Rules and Regulations attached to this Lease as Exhibit "C" and incorporated herein by this reference. Lessee shall comply with all non-discriminatory modifications to the Parking Lot Rules and Regulations implemented from time-to-time by Lessor. Lessor may, without liability to Lessee, prohibit any employee, agent or invitee of Lessee who persistently violates Parking Lot Rules and Regulations from using or parking in the Property Parking Lot.
- 10.3 <u>Lessor Maintenance of, and, Improvements to Parking Area</u>. During the Initial Term at its sole cost and expense, Lessor shall routinely maintain the area of the Property Parking Lot in which Lessee's non-exclusive parking spaces are situated in a neat, clean, safe and sanitary condition.
- 10.4 <u>Termination of Non-Exclusive Parking License</u>. Lessee's non-exclusive parking license shall terminate, without further action of Lessor or Lessee, concurrently with expiration of the Initial Term, as applicable, or the earlier termination of this Lease.

11. <u>INDEMNITY</u>

11.1 <u>Lessee's Indemnity of Lessor</u>. To the fullest extent permitted by law, Lessee shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless Lessor and its Board of Education, individual members of the Board of Education, officers, directors, employees, agents and representatives (collectively "the Indemnified Parties") from any and all third-party claims, actions, demands, losses, responsibilities or liabilities (except to the extent of the Indemnified Parties' negligence, the negligence of other tenants or licensees of the Indemnified Parties, or arising from a default by the Lessor under this Lease) for: (i) injury or death of Lessee's employees; (ii) injury or death of persons; (iii) damage, loss or destruction of property; (iv) other costs, losses or charges arising out of or attributable, in whole or in part, to the negligent, willful acts and/or other conduct of Lessee, or its employees, agents and representatives; or (v) any breach or default in the performance of any obligation to be performed by Lessee under this Lease. The foregoing shall include without limitation, reasonable attorneys' fees and costs incurred by the Indemnified

Parties and shall survive the termination of this Lease or expiration of the Initial Term or Renewal Term, as applicable, until any such claim, demand, loss, responsibility or liability covered by the provisions hereof is barred by the applicable Statute of Limitations.

11.2 Lessor's Indemnity of Lessee. To the fullest extent permitted by law, Lessor shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless Lessor and its Board of Trustee, individual members of the Board of Trustees, officers, directors, employees, agents and representatives (collectively "the Indemnified Parties") from any and all third-party claims, actions, demands, losses, responsibilities or liabilities (except to the extent of the Indemnified Parties' negligence, the negligence of other tenants or licensees of the Indemnified Parties, or arising from a default by the Lessee under this Lease) for: (i) injury or death of Lessee's employees; (ii) injury or death of persons; (iii) damage, loss or destruction of property; (iv) other costs, losses or charges arising out of or attributable, in whole or in part, to the negligent, willful acts and/or other conduct of Lessor, or its employees, agents and representatives; or (v) any breach or default in the performance of any obligation to be performed by Lessor under this Lease. The foregoing shall include without limitation, reasonable attorneys' fees and costs incurred by the Indemnified Parties and shall survive the termination of this Lease or expiration of the Initial Term or Renewal Term, as applicable, until any such claim, demand, loss, responsibility or liability covered by the provisions hereof is barred by the applicable Statute of Limitations.

12. <u>INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS</u>

- 12.1 <u>Lessee Insurance</u>. Lessee shall at its own expense maintain the following insurance coverages at all times during the Initial Term of this Lease, hereof:
 - 12.1.1 <u>Lessee Comprehensive General Liability Insurance</u>. Lessee shall obtain and maintain a comprehensive general liability insurance, with coverages to include, but not be limited to, premises liability, personal injuries, death of persons, product liability, property damage and completed operations, with a combined single limit of not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence and not less than \$2,000,000 in the aggregate. Comprehensive general liability and automobile liability policies shall provide an endorsement naming the Lessor, its officers, agents, and employees as Additional Insureds and shall further provide that such insurance is primary insurance of self-insurance maintained by the Lessor and that the insurance of the Additional Insureds shall not be called upon to contribute to a loss covered by Lessee's insurance.
 - 12.1.2 <u>Lessee Comprehensive Automobile Liability Insurance</u>. Lessee shall obtain and maintain a comprehensive automobile liability covering all motor vehicles, including owned, leased, non-owned and hired vehicles, used by Lessee in providing services under this Agreement, with a combined single limit of not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence.
 - 12.1.3 <u>Lessee Workers Compensation/Employers Liability Insurance</u>. Lessee shall obtain and maintain workers' compensation insurance with coverage amounts in accordance with applicable law. As an additional endorsement under Lessee's workers compensation insurance or as a separate policy of insurance,

Lessee shall maintain Employers Liability insurance with coverage amount of at least One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000).

- 12.2 <u>Lessor Insurance</u>. Lessor shall obtain and maintain fire and property damage insurance insuring the Property, the Premises and the Lessor's Equipment against loss caused by fire and other risks, including steam boiler insurance, if applicable, vandalism, windstorm, sprinkler leakage and malicious mischief, insuring the structures and improvements for not less than 90% or the full replacement cost of the insurable value. Lessor shall be deemed to have complied with the foregoing obligations by self-insuring against such risks or obtaining such policy of insurance through a Joint Powers Authority.
- 12.3 <u>Lessee's Property Insurance</u>. Lessee shall obtain and maintain fire and property damage insurance insuring Lessee's personal property and equipment located on the Premises against loss caused by fire and other risks, vandalism, windstorm, sprinkler leakage and malicious mischief. Lessee acknowledges and agrees that it alone assumes fully liability and responsibility for its personal property and Lessor shall have no liability to Lessee for any damage to or loss of Lessee's personal property and equipment, regardless of the cause of such damage or loss.

13. DAMAGE TO OR DESTRUCTION OF PREMISES.

- 13.1 <u>Lessor Completion of Repairs After Damage or Destruction</u>. In the event of damage to or destruction of Premises caused by fire or other casualty without fault or neglect of Lessee, its employees, agents, representatives or invitees, or of the entrances and other common facilities necessary to provide normal access to the Premises or its equipment which portions and equipment are necessary to provide services to the Premises in accordance herewith, Lessor shall undertake to make repairs and restorations as hereinafter provided, within thirty (30) days after such damage, unless this Lease be terminated by Lessee as stated herein.
- Lessee Right to Terminate Lease. If the damage is of such nature or extent, in Lessor's reasonable judgment, that more than one-hundred twenty (120) consecutive days, after commencement of the work, would be required (without premium incurring costs for acceleration or overtime work) to repair and restore the part of the Premises damaged or if Lessor's insurance proceeds are insufficient to restore the Premises, Lessor shall so advise Lessee promptly, and for a period of twenty (20) days thereafter, Lessee shall have the right to terminate this Lease by notice to Lessor, as of the date specified in such notice, which termination date shall be no later than thirty (30) days after the giving of such notice. In addition, in the event of damage by fire or other casualty without fault or neglect of Lessee or its employees, agents, representatives or invitees, Lessee may terminate this Lease upon thirty (30) days written notice to Lessor if Lessor has not completed or cannot complete, or cannot reasonably be expected to complete the making of the required repairs and restorations within four (4) months from the date of such damage or destruction. If any such damage or destruction shall occur during the last year of the Initial Term or Renewal Term, as applicable of this Lease, Lessee may terminate this Lease upon thirty (30) days written notice to Lessor within sixty (60) days after such damage or destruction.
- 13.3 <u>Abatement of Rent</u>. In the case of damage to the Premises which is of a nature or extent that Lessee's continued occupancy is substantially impaired, the Monthly Rent

otherwise payable by Lessee hereunder shall be equitably abated or adjusted for the duration of such impairment.

13.4 Repair/Restoration Costs. If Lessor elects to repair and restore, Lessor shall restore the Premises to substantially its condition prior to the occurrence of the damage, provided that Lessor shall not be obligated to repair or restore any alterations, additions, fixtures, equipment or improvements which have been installed by Lessee (whether or not Lessee has the right or the obligation to remove the same or is required to leave the same on the Premises as of the expiration or earlier termination of this Lease) unless Lessee, in a manner satisfactory to Lessor, assures payment in full of all costs as may be incurred by Lessor in connection therewith. If there be any such alterations, fixtures, additions, equipment or improvements installed by Lessee and Lessee does not assure or agree to assure payment of all cost of restoration or repair as aforesaid, Lessor shall have the right to determine the manner in which the Premises shall be restored so as to be substantially as the Premises existed prior to the damage occurring of this Lease, as if such alterations, additions, fixtures, equipment or improvements installed by Lessee had not then been made or installed.

14. <u>LESSEE COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS</u>

Lessee shall not do, or permit to be done, or keep, or permit to be kept, in or about the Premises, anything which shall be a nuisance or which shall be in violation of any law, ordinance, rule or regulation of any governmental authority having jurisdiction over the Premises or the use/occupancy thereof, and any violation thereof on the part of the Lessee shall constitute a breach of this Agreement.

15. **DEFAULT**

- 15.1 <u>Lessee Defaults.</u> Lessee shall be in default of its obligations under this Lease if any of the following events occur (collectively referred to as "Lessee Defaults"):
- (a) Lessee shall have failed to pay Rent when due and such failure persists for a period of five (5) days after written notice by Lessor to Lessee, provided that such five (5) day period shall be in lieu of, and not in addition to, notice requirements set forth in Code of Civil Procedure §1161 or any similar/successor statute;
- (b) Lessee shall have failed to perform any term, covenant or condition of this Lease except those requiring the payment of Rent, and Lessee shall have failed to cure such breach within ten (10) days after written notice from Lessor specifying the nature of such breach. In the event the act required to cure the non-performance cannot be accomplished within said period, to preclude a default, Lessee must commence the accomplishment of the necessary act within said period and thereafter proceed with diligence and good faith to accomplish the same; or
 - (c) Lessee shall have abandoned the Premises.
- 15.2 <u>Lessor Defaults</u>. Lessor shall be in default under this Lease if Lessor fails to perform obligations required by Lessor within ten (10) days after written notice by Lessee to Lessor specifying what obligations Lessor has failed to perform. If the nature of Lessor's failure to perform is such that more than ten (10) days is required for

performance, Lessor shall not be in default if during said time period Lessor commences performance and thereafter diligently prosecutes the same to completion.

16. <u>TERMINATION; HOLD-OVER</u>

At the expiration of the Initial Term or a Renewal Term, as applicable, or any earlier termination of this Lease, Lessee agrees to quit and surrender the Premises to Lessor, and at Lessee's expense promptly remove all Lessee's property therefrom and leave the Premises in as good condition, order and repair as when Lessee took possession thereof, ordinary wear and tear excepted. If Lessee holds-over after expiration of the Initial Term such tenancy shall be at sufferance only and shall not be deemed a renewal or extension of the Initial Term. In such event, Monthly Rent shall be an amount equal to one hundred twenty percent (120%) of the Monthly Rent due upon expiration of the Initial Term.

17. INSPECTION

Lessor shall have the right to enter the Premises, or any part hereof, at all reasonable times for the purpose of inspecting the same or for any other lawful purpose.

18. ASSIGNMENT AND SUBLETTING

- 18.1 <u>Lessor Consent Required</u>. Lessee shall not sell, encumber, transfer, assign, mortgage, pledge or hypothecate (collectively referred to as "assignment") and shall not sublet the Premises or any portion thereof without the prior written consent and approval of Lessor which shall not be unreasonably withheld or conditioned. Lessee's actual or purported assignment of this Lease or sublet of the Premises without the prior consent and approval of Lessor shall be deemed Lessee's default under this Lease.
- 18.2 Lessee Request to Assign/Sublet. If Lessee desires to assign this Lease or sublet any portion of the Premises, Lessee shall submit a written request to Lessor not more than one-hundred eighty (180) days and not less than sixty (60) days prior to the proposed effective date of the assignment/sublet setting forth: (i) the name of the proposed assignee/sub-tenant; (ii) the nature of the business to be conducted in the Premises by the proposed assignee/sub-tenant; (iii) description of the proposed terms and conditions of the proposed assignment/sublet; and (iv) financial information of the proposed assignee/sub-tenant, including without limitation, current financial statements. Each request shall be accompanied by Lessee's payment to Lessor of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to cover Lessor's fees, costs and expenses to review and respond to Lessee's request to assign/sublet.
- 18.3 Approval/Disapproval Standards. The following are agreed upon by Lessee and Lessor as reasonable basis for Lessor's rejection of a request to assign/sublet: (i) Lessee's failure to comply with the provisions hereof relating to the process for Lessor consent to assign/sublet; (ii) the proposed assignee/sub-tenant does not possess, in the sole reasonable judgment of Lessor, sufficient financial capacity to timely and completely satisfy obligations under the Lease; (iii) use of the Premises by the proposed assignee/sub-tenant is not identical to that set forth in the Lease; (iv) use of the Premises by the proposed assignee/sub-tenant will violate any law, ordinance, regulation or rule; or (v) Lessee is then in default of its obligations under the Lease.

No Release of Lessee. No consent of Lessor to an assignment of the Lease or sublet of any portion of the Premises shall relieve Lessee of any obligation to be performed by Lessee under this Lease, whether such performance is to occur prior to or after consent of Lessor to a proposed assignment/sublet. Lessor's acceptance of Rent from any person or entity other than Lessee shall not be deemed Lessor's waiver of any provision of this Lease, consent to any subsequent assignment/sublet or release Lessee from any obligation of Lessee under this Lease. Each assignee or sub-tenant of Lessee shall assume the obligations of Lessee under this Lease and shall be jointly and severally liable with Lessee for the payment of Rent and performance of Lessee's obligations under this Lease.

19. <u>MISCELLANEOUS</u>

- 19.1 <u>Successors</u>. This Lease and the provisions hereof shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the successors and assigns of Lessee and Lessor.
- 19.2 <u>Notices</u>. Any notice required or desired to be given under this Lease shall be deemed given if in writing sent by United States Mail, Certified, Return Receipt Requested with postage fully prepaid to the addresses of the parties to this Lease as follows:

- 19.3 <u>Captions and Titles</u>. Captions and titles used in this Lease are for convenience only and are not intended to be used in the construction or in the interpretation of this Lease.
- 19.4 <u>Invalid Provisions</u>. In the event any provision of this Lease is deemed void, invalid or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, such provision shall be deemed severed herefrom without affecting enforcement or validity of remaining provisions hereof, which shall continue in full force and effect.
- 19.5 <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Lease and Exhibits "A" (Property Site Plan) "B" (Equipment Identification) and "C" (Parking Rules and Regulations) hereto contains the entire understanding of Lessee and Lessor concerning the subject matter hereof. This Lease may be amended only by written instrument duly executed by Lessor and Lessee.



- 19.8 <u>Counterparts</u>. This Lease may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but such counterparts, when taken together, shall constitute one agreement.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is to request Board approval regarding the surplus portables at McFadden Intermediate School. Construction of a portable-to-permanent (P2P) building is currently underway to replace most of the existing portables with a new single-story classroom building. The P2P building will be completed and occupied in March of 2017, and 12 of the existing portables will become surplus once students are relocated.

RATIONALE:

McFadden Intermediate School has 14 existing portable

classrooms. The State allowed SAUSD to replace 12 portable classrooms with permanent classrooms, and these 12 portables must be removed from the McFadden campus. Rather than demolish all of the surplus portables, staff proposes to relocate 5 of the portables to various sites to accommodate various instructional needs. It will cost the District an estimated \$10,000 to demolish each portable. The cost to relocate the portables, connect utilities, and obtain State Architect approval is approximately \$40,000 per portable. Potential disposition of all 14 portables includes:

2 - Stay at McFadden

The State grant for the P2P building replaces 12 of the 14 portables. Two portables will remain to house the instructional program, and may be relocated on site to improve overall campus security.

5 - Relocated to various sites

Five portables are needed at other facilities to house the District's instructional needs.

7 – Portables Demolished

Due to the State funding, replacement requires (7) portables to be demolished.

ITEM SUMMARY:

- Recommended disposition of 14 portables at McFadden as follows:
 - 2 stay at McFadden
 - 5 relocated to various sites for additional capacity.







It is the policy of the District to comply with Internal Revenue Service (IRS) regulations with regards to the taxation of fringe benefits. The final determination on whether something qualifies as a taxable fringe benefit lies with the IRS. If they find something is a taxable fringe benefit, the employee may be liable for taxes on the benefit.

POLICY:

Taxable fringe benefit – a form of pay, in addition to salary, for the performance of duties; taxable wages unless excluded by the Internal Revenue Code (IRC).

Conveniences of the district – where the personal use was in the best interest of the district.

De minims – an amount where either the cost of determining specific value exceeds the value of use, or the actual cost of the use was negligible at the organizational level.

According to IRC section 61, all income is taxable unless an exclusion applies. They are subject to:

- 1. Federal Income Tax
- 2. Social Security Tax
- 3. Medicare Tax
- 4. Other applicable state taxes

Fringe benefit exclusions must be properly substantiated. If timely documentation is not supplied, the benefit will be considered taxable.

Taxable fringe benefits include but are not limited to the following:

- 1. Awards and Prizes
- 2. Meal reimbursements for local travel
- 3. Personal use of district vehicle
- 4. Working Condition property or services
- 5. Personal use of employer provided equipment
- 6. Work clothes and uniforms worn as ordinary clothing
- 7. Group term life insurance in excess of \$50,000
- 8. Transportation commuting benefits in excess of qualified employer-provided transportation
- 9. Personal use of employer provided cell phones
- 10. Moving Expenses
- 11. Third party sick pay

The Governing Board recognizes that adequate nutrition is essential to child development and learning and that some families may be unable to provide breakfast and lunch for their children. In accordance with law, the district shall provide nutritionally adequate free and reduced price meals for students whose families meet federal eligibility criteria. and as such authorizes collection of free and reduced price meal eligibility data for the purposes of providing free or reduced price meals to students whose families meet federal eligibility criteria. In addition, the Governing Board acknowledges that eligibility for free or reduced price meals is confidential and can only be released as provided by law.

POLICY:

Free or Reduced Price Meals

The district shall provide at least one nutritionally adequate meal each school day, free of charge or at a reduced price, for students whose families meet federal eligibility criteria.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that meals provided through the free and reduced-price meals program meet applicable state and/or federal nutritional standards in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation. recommend for Board approval a plan which ensures that eligible students that receive free or reduced price meals and milk are not treated differently from other students or are easily identified by their peers. (cf. 0410 - Nondiscrimination in District Programs and Activities) (cf. 5145 3 - Nondiscrimination/Harassment)

The Board shall approve, and shall submit Upon approval by the Board, this plan shall be submitted to the California Department of Education for approval, a plan that ensures that students eligible to receive free or reduced-price meals are not treated differently from other students. Education Code 49557)

Confidentiality/Release of Records

All applications and records related to eligibility for the free or and reduced-price meals program shall be confidential and may not be released except as provided by law and authorized by the Board or pursuant to a court order. Education Code 49558)

In accordance with law, to student eligibility for any the free and reduced price meals program solely for the following purposes of:

- 1. Disaggregation of academic achievement data.
- 2. Identification of students eligible for school choice and supplemental educational services alternative supports in any school identified as a Title I program improvement school for program improvement. (c=.0520.2 Title I Program Improvement Schools) (cf. 5!25 Student Records) (df. 6162.5 Standardized Testing and Reporting Program) (cf. 6!71 Title I Programs) (df. 6190 Evaluation of the Instructional Program)

The Board further authorizes the release of information on the school lunch program application to the local agency that determines Medi-Cal program eligibility, provided that the student is approved for free meals and the parent/guardian consents to the sharing of information as provided in Education Code 49557.2.

The Governing Board may reduce the number of probationary and permanent certificated personnel, or their hours and wages, due employees when, in its opinion, to any of the following conditions makes such reduction necessary: (EC. 44955)

- 1. Declining enrollment, provided that the percentage of reduction in probationary and permanent certificated personnel shall not exceed the corresponding percentage of student attendance lost;
- Average daily attendance (ADA) in all of the schools in the district during the first six months of the school year has declined below the level for the same period in either of the previous two school years. (Education Code 44955)
 - 2. Reduction or discontinuance of programs or services;
- 2. A particular kind of service is to be reduced or discontinued not later than the beginning of the following school year. (Education Code 44955)
 - 3. State mandated modification of the curriculum; or
- 3. Attendance in the district will decline in the following year as a result of the termination of an interdistrict tuition agreement. (Education Code 44955)
 - 4. The fiscal crisis that may occur after enactment of the Budget Act when the total revenue limit per ADA has not increased by a least two percent. (ED. 44955.5)
- 4. An amendment of state law requires modification of the curriculum. (Education Code 44955)
- 5. During the time period between five days after the enactment of the Budget Act and August 15 of that fiscal year, the Board determines that the district's total revenue limit per ADA for the fiscal year of that Budget Act has not increased by at least two percent. (Education Code 44955.5)

The Board recognizes that its authority in the reduction of personnel is subject to legal requirements. Except as otherwise provided by statute, a permanent employee who is certificated and competent to render a service shall not be terminated or given a reduction in hours and wages while a probationary employee or other employee with less seniority is retained to render the service. To be considered competent, an employee must have academic training and one year of full-time experience in the specialized area to which the District would be able to assign him/her. The District will also consider the recency of the employee's experience. (ct.

The district shall adhere to the notice, hearing, and layoff procedures in Education Code 44949, 44955, and other applicable provisions of law.

When an employee has requested a hearing before an administrative law judge regarding the reduction or discontinuation of services, the Board shall make a final decision regarding the sufficiency of the cause and disposition of the layoff upon receipt of the administrative law judge's proposed decision. None of the findings, recommendations, or determinations of the administrative law judge shall be binding on the Board. (Education Code 44949)

The Board may adopt the administrative law judge's proposed decision, or reject, or modify the proposed decision and make its own determination based upon its review of the record.

Following the Board's decision, the Superintendent or designee shall give final notice, in the manner specified, to the affected employees before May 15 unless the parties agree otherwise in accordance with procedures required by law. (Education Code 44955)

When layoffs become necessary pursuant to Education Code <u>44955.5</u> as specified in item #5 above, layoff proceedings shall be carried out as required by law but in accordance with a schedule of notice and hearing adopted by the Board. (Education Code <u>44955.5</u>)

Reappointment

If the number of employees is increased or the discontinued service reestablished, permanent certificated employees shall have the right to reappointment, in order of seniority, for 39 months from the date of termination. Probationary certificated employees shall have the same right for 24 months after being terminated, subject to the prior reappointment rights of permanent employees. (Education Code 44846, 44956, 44957)

During the period of the preferred right to reappointment, permanent certificated employees shall, in the order of original employment, be offered first opportunity for substitute service during the absence of any employee who has been granted a leave of absence or who is temporarily absent from duty. Such substitute service may be terminated upon the return to duty of the other employee. Such substitute service shall not affect the retention of the employees' previous classification and rights. Probationary certificated employees shall have the right to

The district shall adhere to the notice, hearing, and layoff procedures in Education Code <u>44949</u>, <u>44955</u>, and other applicable provisions of law.

(cf. <u>4112.9/4212.9/4312.9</u> - Employee Notifications)

When an employee has requested a hearing before an administrative law judge regarding the reduction or discontinuation of services, the Board shall make a final decision regarding the sufficiency of the cause and disposition of the layoff upon receipt of the administrative law judge's proposed decision. None of the findings, recommendations, or determinations of the administrative law judge shall be binding on the Board. (Education Code 44949)

The Board may adopt the administrative law judge's proposed decision, or reject, or modify the proposed decision and make its own determination based upon its review of the record.

Following the Board's decision, the Superintendent or designee shall give final notice, in the manner specified, to the affected employees before May 15 unless the parties agree otherwise in accordance with procedures required by law. (Education Code 44955)

Reappointment

If the number of employees is increased or the discontinued service reestablished, permanent certificated employees shall have the right to reappointment, in order of seniority, for 39 months from the date of termination. Probationary certificated employees shall have the same right for 24 months after being terminated, subject to the prior reappointment rights of permanent employees. (Education Code 44846, 44956, 44957)

During the period of the preferred right to reappointment, permanent certificated employees shall, in the order of original employment, be offered first opportunity for substitute service during the absence of any employee who has been granted a leave of absence or who is temporarily absent from duty. Such substitute service may be terminated upon the return to duty of the other employee. Such substitute service shall not affect the retention of the employees' previous classification and rights. Probationary certificated employees shall have right to substitute service during the period of preferred right to reappointment to the extent required by law, subject to the rights of permanent certificated employees. (Education Code 44918, 44956, 44957)

Before reappointing any certificated employee to teach a subject which he/she has not previously taught and for which he/she does not have a teaching credential or which is not within the employee's major area of postsecondary study, the Board shall require the employee to pass a subject matter competency test in the appropriate subject. Reappointed certificated employees shall not be subject to any requirements that were not imposed on employees who continued in service. Their period of absence shall be treated as a leave of absence and not considered a break in the continuity of their service. (Education Code 44956, 44957)

Bylaw also clarifies that the board may refer a member of the public to an appropriate complaint procedure, but cannot prohibit criticism of district employees, programs, or policies during a board meeting.

Meeting Procedures

All Governing Board meetings shall begin on time and shall be guided by an agenda prepared and delivered in advance to all Board members and to other persons upon request in accordance with Board bylaws and posted and distributed in accordance with the Ralph M. Brown Act (open meeting requirements) and other applicable laws. (cf. 9322 – Agenda/Meeting Materials)

The Board president shall conduct Board meetings in accordance with Board bylaws and procedures that enable the Board to efficiently consider issues and carry out the will of the majority. (cf. 9121 – President) He/she shall:

- 1. Call the meeting to order at the appointed time.
- 2. Announce the business to come before the Board in its proper order.
- 3. Enforce the Board's policies relating to the order of business and the conduct of meetings.
- 4. Recognize persons who desire to speak, and protect the speaker who has the floor from disturbance or interference.
- 5. Explain what the effect of a motion would be if it is not clear to every member.
- 6. Restrict discussion to the question when a motion is before the Board.
- 7. Rule on parliamentary procedure.
- 8. Put motions to a vote, and state clearly the results of the vote.

The president shall have all the rights of any member of the Board, including the right to move, second, discuss, and vote on all questions before the Board.

The Board believes that late night meetings deter public participation, can affect the Board's decision-making ability, and can be a burden to staff. Regular Board meetings shall be adjourned at 11:00 10:30 p.m. unless extended to a specific time determined by a majority of the Board. Unless otherwise provided by law, affirmative votes by a majority of all the membership of the Board are required to approve any action under consideration, regardless of the number of members present. The Board shall act by majority vote of all of the membership constituting the Board. (Education Code 35164) (cf. 9323.2 – Actions by the Board)

In the event only three members are present, a unanimous vote must be received to pass or defeat a motion.

Abstentions

The Board believes that when no conflict of interest requires abstention, its members have a duty to vote on issues before them. When a member abstains, his/her abstention shall not be considered to concur with the action taken by the majority of those who vote, whether affirmatively or negatively counted for purposes of determining whether a majority of the membership of the Board has taken action. (cf. 9270 – Conflict of Interest)

Public Participation

Members of the public are encouraged to attend Board meetings and to address the Board concerning any item on the agenda or within the Board's jurisdiction. So as not to inhibit public participation, persons attending Board meetings shall not be requested to sign in, complete a questionnaire, or otherwise provide their name or other information as a condition of attending the meeting.

In order Tto conduct district business in an orderly and efficient manner, the Board requires that public presentations to the Board comply with the following procedures:

1. The Board may refer such a matter to the Superintendent or designee or take it under advisement, but shall not take action at that time except as allowed by law. The matter may be placed on the agenda of a subsequent meeting for action or discussion by the Board. Without taking action, Board members or district staff members may briefly respond to statements made or questions posed by the public about items not appearing on the agenda. Additionally, on their own initiative or in response to questions posed by the public, a Board or staff member may ask a question for clarification, make a brief announcement, or make a brief report on his/her own activities. Furthermore, the Board or a Board member may provide a reference to staff or other resources for factual information, ask staff to report back to the Board at a subsequent meeting concerning any matter, or take action directing staff to place a matter of business on a future agenda. 4. Without taken action, Board members or district staff members may briefly respond to statements made or questions posed by the public about items not appearing on the agenda. The Board need not allow the public to speak on any item that has already been considered by a committee composed exclusively of Board members at a public meeting where the public had the opportunity to address the committee on that item. 5. A person wishing to be heard by the Board shall first be recognized by the president and shall then proceed to comment as briefly as the subject permits.

Individual speakers shall be allowed three minutes to address the Board on each agenda or nonagenda item. The Board shall limit the total time for public input on each item to 20 minutes. With Board consent, the Board president may increase or decrease the time allowed for public presentation, depending on the topic and the number of persons wishing to be heard. The president may take a poll of speakers for or against a particular issue and may ask that additional persons speak only if they have something new to add.

In order to ensure that non-English speakers receive the same opportunity to directly address the Board, any member of the public who utilizes a translator shall be provided at least twice the allotted time to address the Board, unless simultaneous translation equipment is used to allow the Board to hear the translated public testimony simultaneously. (Government Code 54954.3)

- 6. The Board president may rule on the appropriateness of a topic-, subject to the following conditions:
 - a. If the topic would be more suitabley addressed at a later time, the **Board** president may indicate the time and place when it should be presented.
 - b. The Board shall not prohibit public criticism of its policies, procedures, programs, services, acts, or omissions. (Government Code 54954.3)
 - c. In addition, the Board may shall not prohibit public criticism of district employees. However, whenever a member of the public initiates specific complaints or charges against an individual employee, the Board president shall inform the complainant of the appropriate complaint procedure. (cf. 1312.1 Complaints Concerning District Employees) (cf. 9321 Closed Session Purposes and Agendas)

Whenever a member of the public initiates specific complaints or charges against an employee, the Board president shall inform the complainant that to protect the employee's right to adequate notice before a hearing of such complaints and charges, and also to preserve the ability of the Board to legally consider the complaints or charges in any subsequent evaluation of the employee, it is the policy of the Board to hear such complaints or charges in closed session unless otherwise requested by the employee pursuant to Government Code 54957. When the room is ordered cleared due to a disturbance, further Board proceedings shall concern only matters appearing on the agenda. (Government Code 54957.9) (cf. 9324 – Minutes and Recordings)

When such disruptive conduct occurs, the Superintendent or designee shall contact local law enforcement as necessary.

DESIRED OUTCOME:

Recording by the Public

The Superintendent or designee shall designate locations from which members of the public may broadcast, photograph or tape record open meetings without causing a distraction. Members of the public may record an open Board meeting using an audio or video recorder, still or motion picture camera, cell phone, or other device, provided that the noise, illumination, or obstruction of view does not persistently disrupt the meeting. The Superintendent or designee may designate locations from which members of the public may make such recordings without causing a distraction. (cf. 9324 - Board Minutes and Recordings)

If the Board finds that noise, illumination, or obstruction of view related to these activities would persistently disrupt the proceedings, these activities shall be discontinued or restricted as determined by the Board. (Government Code 54953.5, 54953.6)

Members of the public are encouraged to attend Board meetings and to address the Board concerning any item on the agenda or within the Board's jurisdiction. So as not to inhibit public participation, persons attending Board meetings shall not be requested to sign in, complete a questionnaire, or otherwise provide their name or other information as a condition of attending the meeting.

In order to conduct district business in an orderly and efficient manner, the Board requires that public presentations to the Board comply with the following procedures:

1. The Board shall give members of the public an opportunity to address the Board on any item of interest to the public that is within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board, either before or during the Board's consideration of the item. (Education Code 35145.5, Government Code 54954.3)

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2. At a time so designated on the agenda at a regular meeting, members of the public may bring before the Board matters that are not listed on the agenda. The Board shall take no action or discussion on any item not appearing on the posted agenda, except as authorized by law. (Education Code 35145.5; Government Code 54954.2).

3. Without taking action, Board members or district staff members may briefly respond to statements made or questions posed by the public about items not appearing on the agenda. Additionally, on their own initiative or in response to questions posed by the public, a Board or staff member may ask a question for clarification, make a brief announcement, or make a brief report on his/her own activities. (Government Code 54954.2)

Furthermore, the Board or a Board member may provide a reference to staff or other resources for factual information, ask staff to report back to the Board at a subsequent meeting concerning any matter, or take action directing staff to place a matter of business on a future agenda. (Government Code 54954.2)

- 4. The Board need not allow the public to speak on any item that has already been considered by a committee composed exclusively of Board members at a public meeting where the public had the opportunity to address the committee on that item. However, if the Board determines that the item has been substantially changed since the committee heard the item, the Board shall provide an opportunity for the public to speak. (Government Code 54954. 3) (cf. 9130 Board Committees)
- 5. A person wishing to be heard by the Board shall first be recognized by the president and shall then proceed to comment as briefly as the subject permits.

Individual speakers shall be allowed three minutes to address the Board on each agenda or nonagenda item. The Board shall limit the total time for public input on each item to 20 minutes. With Board consent, the Board president may increase or decrease the time allowed for public presentation, depending on the topic and the number of persons wishing to be heard. The president may take a poll of speakers for or against a particular issue and may ask that additional persons speak only if they have something new to add.

In order to ensure that non-English speakers receive the same opportunity to directly address the Board, any member of the public who utilizes a translator shall be provided at least twice the allotted time to address the Board, unless simultaneous translation equipment is used to allow the Board to hear the translated public testimony simultaneously. (Government Code 54954.3)

- 6. The Board president may rule on the appropriateness of a topic, subject to the following conditions:
 - a. If the topic would be more suitably addressed at a later time, the Board president may indicate the time and place when it should be presented.

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b. The Board shall not prohibit public criticism of its policies, procedures, programs, services, acts, or omissions. (Government Code 54954.3)

- c. The Board shall not prohibit public criticism of district employees. However, whenever a member of the public initiates specific complaints or charges against an individual employee, the Board president shall inform the complainant of the appropriate complaint procedure. (cf. 1312.1 Complaints Concerning District Employees) (cf. 9321 Closed Session Purposes and Agendas)
- 7. The Board president shall not permit any disturbance or willful interruption of Board meetings. Persistent disruption by an individual or group or any conduct or statements that threaten the safety of any person(s) at the meeting shall be grounds for the president to terminate the privilege of addressing the Board.

The Board may remove disruptive individuals and order the room cleared if necessary. In this case, members of the media not participating in the disturbance shall be allowed to remain, and individuals not participating in such disturbances may be allowed to remain at the discretion of the Board. When the room is ordered cleared due to a disturbance, further Board proceedings shall concern only matters appearing on the agenda. (Government Code 54957.9)

When such disruptive conduct occurs, the Superintendent or designee shall contact local law enforcement as necessary.

DESIRED OUTCOME:

Recording by the Public

Members of the public may record an open Board meeting using an audio or video recorder, still or motion picture camera, cell phone, or other device, provided that the noise, illumination, or obstruction of view does not persistently disrupt the meeting. The Superintendent or designee may designate locations from which members of the public may make such recordings without causing a distraction. (cf. 9324 - Board Minutes and Recordings)

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
