### **Public Comments at Board Meetings**

The agenda shall provide members of the public the opportunity to address the Board regarding agenda items before or during the Board's consideration of the item. The agenda also provides members of the public an opportunity to testify at regular meetings on matters which are not on the agenda but which are within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board.

Individual speakers are allowed three minutes to address the Board on agenda or nonagenda items. The Board may limit the total time for public input on each item to 20 minutes. With the Board's consent, the Board President may increase or decrease the time allowed for public presentation, depending on the topic and the number of persons wishing to be heard. The Board President may take a poll of speakers for or against a particular issue and may ask that additional persons speak only if they have something new to add.

The Board urges that complaints and derogatory remarks against a District employee be made in writing on forms available in the Office of the Superintendent. This allows the District and the Board to examine more carefully the complaint and to initiate the appropriate investigation.

Persons wishing to address the Board on an item on the agenda or an item of business in the Board's jurisdiction are requested to complete a card. This card is to be submitted to the Recording Secretary. The *Request to Address the Board of Education* cards are located on the table in the foyer.

### **SCOPE:**

Board of Education

The Superintendent or designee shall designate an employee at the district office and/or school site to develop, implement, and coordinate an integrated pest management (IPM) program that incorporates effective, least toxic pest management practices. The IPM coordinator shall prepare and regularly update a districtwide or school site IPM plan based on the template provided by the California Department of Pesticide Regulation (DPR)

### **POLICY:**

The Superintendent or designee shall designate a staff person to develop, implement, and coordinate an IPM program that incorporates effective, least toxic pest management practices. The district's program shall include all current State and Federal laws and guidelines. Strategies shall include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Carefully monitoring and identifying the pest population levels and identifying practices that could affect pest populations. Strategies for managing the pest shall be influenced by the pest species and whether that species poses a threat to people, property, or the environment.
- 2. Setting action threshold levels to determine when pest populations or vegetation at a specific location might cause unacceptable health or economic hazard that would indicate corrective action should be taken.
- 3. Modifying or eliminating pest habitats to deter pest populations and minimize pest infestations.
- 4. Selecting nonchemical pest management methods over chemical methods whenever such methods are effective in providing the desired control or, when it is determined that chemical methods must be used, giving preference to those chemicals that pose the least hazard to people and the environment.
- 5. Ensuring that persons applying pesticides follow label precautions and are trained in the principles and practices of IPM. (cf. 4231 Staff Development)
- 6. Limiting pesticide purchases to amounts needed for the year. Pesticides shall be stored at a secure location that is not accessible to students and unauthorized staff. They shall be stored and disposed of in accordance with state regulations and label directions registered with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) as well as any disposal requirements indicated on the product label. (cf. 3514.1 Hazardous Substances)

### **DESIRED OUTCOME:**

Integrated Pest Management (IPM) means a strategy that focuses on long-term prevention or suppression of pest problems through a combination of techniques such as monitoring for pest presence and establishing treatment threshold levels, using nonchemical practices to make the habitat less conducive to pest development, improving sanitation, and employing mechanical and physical controls. Pesticides that pose the least possible hazard and are effective in a manner that minimizes risks to people, property, and the environment are used only after careful monitoring indicates they are needed according to pre-established guidelines and treatment thresholds. (Food and Agricultural Code 13181)

### **SCOPE:**

The Superintendent or designee may assign vehicles to certain employees, either solely for the use during normal working hours or as a conditional use vehicle to transport students or employees to authorized locations, consistent with the standards as provided. District-owned vehicles shall be exclusively used to conduct official school district business for purposes such as attending personal business, social engagements, going to lunch or unapproved commuting is strictly prohibited. The use of fleet vehicles is a privilege, not a right. Any use of the take home vehicle other than driving between the employees' residence and approved work center is prohibited. Unauthorized use of a District vehicle will be handled through employee discipline up to and including dismissal.

### **POLICY:**

### **District Owned Vehicles:**

Board of Education

The following represents the Santa Ana Unified School District (SAUSD) Board Policy regarding the use of District owned vehicles.

### **Definition of District (SAUSD) Vehicles:**

A District vehicle is defined as a motorized device for land, purchased, owned, leased, or rented by the District, including and not limited to automobiles, trucks, equipment, golf carts, utility carts, tractors, lawn mowers, etc.

### Motorcycles & Bicycles:

Motorcycles and bicycles shall not be used in carrying out District business except for police motorcycles and District Safety Officer bikes. Bicycles that are used solely on campus are contingent upon completion of P.O.S.T Certification Training provided by the SAUSD School Police Department. Use of a helmet is mandatory.

### **Definition of Authorized District (SAUSD) Employees:**

"Authorized District Employees" are defined as those persons who are employed full time, part time, or employees whom are recognized on Santa Ana Unified School Districts payroll, and must meet all of the District driving requirements. Drivers must have an acceptable driving record, clean from any gross vehicle violations or two point violations based on the DMV point system. Example: (DUI's in a 10-year period)

Persons who are not District employees, are not authorized to drive any District vehicle.

Permanent District employees who are authorized to drive a District vehicle for daily work, must familiarize themselves with and adhere to District policies, procedures, and responsibilities regarding the appropriate use of District-owned vehicles.

Authorized employees may only use District-owned vehicles for official business and work related activities. Cars, vans, and trucks used to transport employees or students on District business may not be taken home.

No unauthorized passengers or pets.

### Employees Assigned a Take Home Vehicle Fringe Benefit:

Employees assigned a take home vehicle may only use those vehicles for commuting to and from work. The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) considers personal use of an employer's vehicle, including commuting to and from work, and fuel for commuting, a taxable fringe benefit. The IRS requires the provider of these fringe benefits (SAUSD) to report the value of the fringe benefits as additional compensation on form W-2. All travel logs must be completed daily.

### Pre Employment/ Post Accident Drug and Alcohol Testing:

The District's testing program for drivers shall include pre-employment drug testing and reasonable suspicion, post-accident, return-to-duty, and follow-up drug and alcohol testing of drivers. (49 USC 31306; 49 CFR 382.301-382.311)

### Safety, and Driving Requirements:

Every driver shall be familiar with and observe all State of California Vehicle Codes, and local traffic laws and ordinances, including traffic control signals, posted speed limits, parking restrictions, and other laws covering the operation of any motor vehicle. Seat belts must be worn at all times, and cell phones cannot be used when the vehicle is in motion.

Drivers must keep their Driving Record in good standing or they can lose their driving privileges, and be subjected to disciplinary action up to and including termination. See District Driving Requirements and Guidelines.

Safety of the students and employees shall be the prime factor in the establishment of any policy and procedure.

All complaints and allegations of sexual harassment shall be kept confidential to the extent necessary to carry out the investigation or to take other subsequent necessary actions. (2 CCR 11023)

Any district employee who feels that he/she has been sexually harassed or who has knowledge of any incident of sexual harassment by or against another employee, shall immediately report the incident contact his/her supervisor, the principal, district administrator, or the Superintendent.

A supervisor, principal, or other district administrator who receives a harassment complaint shall promptly notify the Superintendent or designee.

Complaints of sexual harassment shall be filed in accordance with AR 4030 - Nondiscrimination in Employment. An employee may bypass his/her supervisor in filing a complaint where the supervisor is the subject of the complaint.

### **SCOPE:**

The Governing Board recognizes that health and welfare benefits are essential to promote employee health and productivity and are an important part of the compensation offered to eligible employees. The district shall provide health and welfare benefits for eligible employees in accordance with state and federal law and/or pursuant to negotiated employee agreements.

### **POLICY:**

Certificated and Classified Management/Supervisory/Confidential/Police Command employees who are not in bargaining units shall receive the same health and welfare benefits as those specified in the collective bargaining agreement for certificated employees. Contribution percentages will be negotiated. Superintendent and Cabinet Members will have the option to waive health benefits in lieu of the cash value of the District's contribution for medical and dental paid at the 2 party tier level.

Employees who are not in bargaining units shall receive health and welfare benefits as specified in Board Policy and Administrative Regulation.

For purposes of granting benefits, a registered domestic partner and his/her child shall have the same rights, protections, and benefits as a spouse and spouse's child.

### Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act

The Federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act requires the District to offer full-time equivalent employees and their dependents (not including spouses) the opportunity to enroll in an affordable district-sponsored group health plan or health insurance coverage that provides minimum "essential coverage," as defined in Health and Safety Code. In addition, the district must ensure that the employee's contribution toward the cost of the coverage does not exceed 9.5 percent of his/her household income; see the accompanying administrative regulation for further information about the calculation of the employee's contribution.

With respect to eligibility to participate in the health benefits plan or the level of health benefits provided, the district shall not discriminate in favor of employees who are among the highest paid 25 percent of all district employees.

### **Continuation of Coverage**

The District shall offer continued health and dental care benefits for retired certificated employees and their spouses/domestic partners at the Retirees' expense.

### **Other Post Employment Benefits**

Board of Education

Pursuant to Governmental Accounting and Standards Board Statement 45, "other postemployment benefits" (OPEBs) (i.e., medical, dental, vision, hearing, life insurance, long-term care, long-term disability, and other non pension benefits for retired employees) must be reported by the district as a current expense over the working years of an employee. To the extent that OPEBs are not prefunded in a designated fund or irrevocable trust, they must be reported as a liability on the district's financial statements. Retired certificated employees, other employees who would otherwise lose coverage due to a qualifying event specified in law and administrative regulation, and their qualified beneficiaries may continue to participate in the district's group health and welfare benefits in accordance with state and federal law.

Covered employees and their qualified beneficiaries who elect continuation coverage are required to pay all costs of the insurance plan(s). Any district contribution to retired employee health costs is a negotiable item.

Unless otherwise provided for in the applicable collective bargaining agreement, covered employees and their qualified beneficiaries may receive continuation coverage by paying the premiums, dues, and other charges, including any increases in premiums, dues, and costs incurred by the district in administering the program.

### Confidentiality

The Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) specifies actions that a health plan, health care provider, or health care clearinghouse must take to protect the privacy of an individual's health information. Generally, entities covered by HIPAA may release or receive "protected health information" about an individual only if that individual gives permission or the Act expressly permits its release. It is the District's responsibility to maintain the confidentiality of medical information it receives.

The Superintendent or designee shall not use or disclose any employee's medical information the district possesses without the employee's authorization except for the purpose of administering and maintaining employee benefit plans and for other purposes specified in law or as requested as part of a criminal investigation.

### **RATIONALE:**

### **ITEM SUMMARY:**

Board adoption of the ASL 2 Course is in accordance with Board Policy (BP) 6141 – the Board shall adopt a District curriculum which reflects District philosophy, responds to student needs and abilities and is consistent with the requirements of law.

The purpose of the American Sign Language 2 Course, for year two, is to build upon the basic understanding of the language and cultural norms of the American deaf population, established during year one of the continuum, and begin to incorporate more real-life applications of the language with real opportunities to communicate comfortably in a wide variety of situations. The skills to be learned include language expression and reception, use of proper ASL grammar, reading and writing in ASL "gloss", critical thinking, and empathy for members of the deaf community who must function in a hearing world. The new ASL 2 Course will increase opportunities for high school students to meet A-G and the Seal of Biliteracy requirements upon graduation.

### **Brief Course Description**

The purpose of American Sign Language year 2 is to build upon the basic understanding of the language and cultural norms of the American Deaf population established during year 1 of the continuum. The skills to be learned include language expression and reception, use of proper ASL grammar, reading and writing in ASL "gloss", critical thinking, and empathy for members of the Deaf community who must function in a hearing world.

### **Context for Course**

American Sign Language 2 is the second course in a proposed continuum with the purpose of learning ASL as a second language. In this second year of the continuum, the first and foremost goal is to build upon the basic level of communicative competency fostered in year 1, and begin to incorporate more real-life applications of the language. While the program is designed to continue to promote interaction in ASL with the teacher and among students, the aim in this second year is and provide them with not just the skills needed, but incorporate some actual opportunities to communicate comfortably in a wide variety of situations in the Deaf community. Cultural information taught throughout the class allows students to interact with the Deaf community in a way that is respectful and aware. The curriculum and the lessons meet the five areas of Communication, Cultures, Connections, Comparisons and Communities outlined by the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL) as well as support the World Language Content Standards for California Public Schools.

### **History of Course Development**

For a number of years, SAUSD has housed the county program for Deaf and Hard of Hearing (DHH) students in grades Pre Kindergarten through 12<sup>th</sup> grade. It has been a long held desire to include American Sign Language (ASL) among the A – G qualified World Languages offerings within SAUSD for a few key reasons:

- 1. It provides students with a broader selection of A G approved world language courses in their journey towards college and career readiness.
- 2. Having the DHH programs within our district provides our hearing able students with a unique opportunity to not only learn American Sign Language, but practice these skills through meaningful interactions with their DHH peers as an integral part of the ASL continuum.
- 3. The interaction with their DHH peers interwoven throughout the continuum of the ASL coursework fosters a sense of empathy with the Deaf community: A life skill which reaches well beyond the classroom and will serve students well in the college and career world outside of secondary education.
- 4. As American Sign Language is a recognized world language in the state's Seal of Biliteracy program, SAUSD will include ASL among the world languages available for students to prove proficiency to earn the Seal of Biliteracy.

#### Course Goals:

American Sign Language II is an intermediary course to American Sign Language; as it is used within the deaf culture. Instruction includes new vocabulary, construction of complex sentences, as well as a deeper look into the history and the culture of deaf people. The following are the main goals of this second year of the ASL course continuum:

- 1. Function successfully in Deaf culture
- 2. Advance in both receptive and expressive skills
- 3. Advance in understanding American Sign Language grammar and syntax
- 4. Acquire a greater vocabulary in American Sign Language
- 5. Develop a fluid delivery style in American Sign Language
- 6. Advanced skills in writing and reading the coded form (gloss) of American Sign Language
- 7. Explore opportunities for advanced training, both educational and employment, in American Sign Language

Explore opportunities for advanced training, both educational and employment, in American Sign Language

#### **Course Objectives:**

#### Reception

Students will:

- Demonstrate comprehension of a short passage, dialogue or conversation
- Describe in American Sign Language the characters, situation and action after viewing a lecture
- Participate actively in post video discussion
- Distinguish between the four parameters of sign

#### Delivery

#### Students will:

- Naturally sign dialogues including parameters of rhythm, body expressions, facial expressions, and sign.
- · Ask questions that demonstrate comprehension of dialogues.
- · Sign plays, stories, and songs.
- Prepare and present four prepared speeches.
- Give impromptu talks on given subjects.
- Fluently sign the alphabet.
- Initiate conversations and effectively participate in class discussion.
- Discuss current events, families, and themselves using grammatical structures and vocabulary from assigned chapters.

#### Reading

#### Students will:

- Understand and demonstrate the coded markers and the written form of American Sign Language.
- Translate a written text into signing using coded markers.
- Distinguish between correctly and incorrectly coded markers.
- · Discriminate among similar coded markers of implied meaning.

#### Writing

#### Students will:

- Use coded markers when writing complex dialogues.
- Write accurate dictations in coded American Sign Language and conversational English translations.
- After viewing a signed dialogue, use coded markers to translate it into written American Sign Language.

#### **Grammar Skills**

#### Students will:

- Identify correct topic-comment (topicalization) sentence structure of ASL
- Correctly use pronominalization in ASL: the process or fact of using a pronoun instead of another sentence constituent (such as a noun or noun phrase)

**Expected Student Outcomes:** Upon successful completion of American Sign Language 2, students will

- Meet the World Language Content Standards for California Public Schools
- Be prepared to enter the American Sign Language (ASL) 3 course
- Continue on the path to obtain the California Seal of Biliteracy for ASL

#### **Course Content: Introduction**

The course of study for American Sign Language 2 utilizes the Signing Naturally, Level 2 text. This program incorporates engaging and interactive activities which provide real-life contexts for language learning and expression using ASL. Specific ASL skills are supported through the contextual incorporation of literature and expository texts with the goals of supporting

- Comprehension
- Reception
- Production/Expression

The Signing Naturally, Level 2 text is divided into six units, (7 – 12) with those six units broken down into 11, smaller, sub units with a central theme and deaf culture emphasis. Each unit and sub unit includes reading selections, homework, key assignments which include classroom signing activities and exercises, grammar activities, along with communicative and vocabulary development that allow students to engage in collaborative conversations, dialogues and presentations reflective of the theme of each unit using the signs and markers taught in that unit. Supplemental materials may be used to enhance the learning of grammar and themes as needed.

**Assessments:** As ASL is a wholly visual language, traditional notions of assessments are not always appropriate to assess mastery of ASL skills. There are a variety of formats, a few traditional, but predominantly presentation based, which are facilitated to assess students' mastery of the skills emphasized in each unit. The following is an overview of the assessments employed throughout the course of study for ASL 2:

- Teacher-signed quizzes on ASL finger spelling, vocabulary, and syntax
- Written quizzes on readings
- Tests on ASL grammar and Deaf culture units from textbooks
- Video-taped performances of expressive skills
- Both teacher and peer evaluations of performances/oral reports
- Students' responses to questions to demonstrate comprehension of signed presentation

#### **SEMESTER I: Weeks 1-3**

Unit 1 Theme: Giving Directions

**Unit 1 Objectives:** By the end of unit one, students will be expected to and be assessed on their ability to use ASL to:

- o Give directions to locations using vocabulary in unit
- Confirm information
- Correct information
- o Interpret and evaluate signed dialogues
- Write in ASL using coded markers
- o Review cardinal and ordinal numbers

#### **Unit 1: ASL Skills Focus and Key Assignments**

- Performance Based Language Practice
  - View and repeat two conversations that focus on giving directions
  - o Role play two scenarios about providing directions
    - How to get to the nearest bus stop
    - Where certain rooms are located in a large building complex
- Grammar and Vocabulary Focus
  - Cardinal and ordinal numbers
  - Giving directions using a common reference point
- Cultural and Literary Emphasis
  - o Understanding the "Deaf experience." Students select one item from list of approved activities. Students then prepare and present a signed summary of what they learned about the challenges of a deaf person living in a hearing world.

- o Interpret and evaluate signed dialogues
- o Transcribe signed story using ASL code markers
- o Take the signer's perspective
- o Describe a combination of shapes
- Ask/state preferences
- o Produce correct form for names with double letters
- Use a variety of strategies to ask for a sign

#### Unit 2: ASL Skills Focus and Key Assignments

- Performance Based Language Practice
  - View and repeat/summarize two conversations describing objects and people

# STAY utilizes the Recovery Model

• The Recovery Model refers to the process of recovery from mental disorder or substance dependence, and/or from being labeled in those terms. It can be described as a deeply personal, unique process of changing one's attitudes, values, feelings, goals, skills, and/or roles. It is a way of living a satisfying, hopeful, and contributing life, even with limitations caused by the illness. Recovery involves the development of new meaning and purpose in one's life as one grows beyond the catastrophic effects of mental illness. A more broad definition of recovery, is one that not only focuses on the management of the illness, but also highlights the consumers' notions of empowerment and self-directedness. The model emphasizes that responsibility and control of the recovery process must be given in large part to the person with the condition. 

### Mental Health in Schools

- Students with positive mental health are more successful in school with truancy, discipline, absenteeism drop when supports are provided.
- Interventions that strengthen students' social, emotional, and decision-making skills positively affect their academic achievement (test scores and grades). (Fleming, et al., 2005)
- Just as physical health impacts learning and performance, so does mental health. When students are stressed, anxious, distracted, or depressed it is difficult to pay attention, concentrate, and focus on their school work.



# Crisis Response is Emotional/Psychological "First Aid", NOT Therapy

- Decrease post trauma signs that are mental/cognitive, emotional, physical, and/or behavioral.
- Decrease absenteeism and sustain academic performance at pre-trauma levels.
- Prevent maladaptive behaviors (i.e. drug and alcohol abuse, suicide) due to lack of coping skills.
- Prevent early stress related retirement and illness.
- Prevent feelings of loss of control or helplessness.
- To lessen the effects of wear and tear on the body.
- Speed the process of recovery to normal functioning after the incident and restore person to pre-trauma functioning.

# **BACKGROUND INFORMATION:**

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board approval of the Summer Enrichment Programs for the 2017-18 school year.

# **ITEM SUMMARY:**

Students need opportunities such as the Summer Enrichment Programs to support their learning and increase motivation during the school year.

### **RATIONALE:**

For the past four years the District has used Title I Core Set Aside funds to provide enrichment opportunities to K-12 students via teacher-created proposals. The goal is to build off of the success of the past Enrichment Programs and continue to provide teachers with unique opportunities to develop engaging and interactive-summer programs to accelerate student achievement.

Teachers have submitted their proposal through a competitive application process utilizing a collaborative-scoring process between the District and the Santa Ana Educators Association staff. Enrichment timing will mirror the other summer school programs and be held from June 26-July 28. The enrichment programs will be similar to last year's with approximately 8,000 students receiving enrichment.

The recommended instructional program, Core Connections, is aligned to the detailed instructional shifts and the pedagogical principles within the CSSM. Furthermore, it is aligned with the classroom constructs that is detailed in the District's framework for Teaching and Learning.

The adoption process began in Fall of 2016 with a committee consisting of teachers, parents, District curriculum and program specialists, and site administrators who participated in extensive review of three math instructional programs. The Committee identified two programs that deemed viable options for piloting and evaluation, and identified the areas of focus that would be used to evaluate the programs. Feedback was also elicited from all teachers, administrators, and parents. The Committee used this feedback data, which consisted of the pilot survey data, pilot observation survey data, and the material analysis questionnaire data, along with the CSSM and District framework for Teaching and Learning to inform their recommendation.

The current materials used in Santa Ana Unified School district were aligned with the previous state standards for mathematics; these outdated materials are not aligned with the new California State Standards in Mathematics in content and pedagogy. From the review process, the committee identified three programs deemed viable options for piloting and evaluation, and identified the areas of focus to evaluate the programs. Feedback was elicited from all teachers, administrators, and parents; the committee used these feedback data, pilot survey data, pilot observation survey data, the California Mathematics Framework and SAUSD Framework for Teaching and Learning to inform their recommendation.

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board authorization to replace the current, outdated facilities maintenance (work order) system with an industry-leading state-of-the-art cloud-based software system.

#### **RATIONALE**:

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board approval to award a contract to SchoolDude, pursuant to a Request for Proposals (RFP) No. 09-17, for the purchase of a Facilities Maintenance Software System in the amount of \$51,035.

The RFP was advertised, as legally required, in the *Orange County Register*. Additional direct vendor outreach was performed to vendors listed with Onvia, BisSync, BidNet, and the Contractors Bluebook. Thirty-six firms received RFP documents and five submitted proposals. Staff recommends award of a contract to SchoolDude based on the outcome of the objective initial qualification screening and technical interview. Vendor selection is in compliance with requirements within Board Policy 3311(a) - <u>Bids</u> and Public Contract Code Sections 22030-22045.

Each proposal was reviewed and scored using an objective rubric requiring eighty percentage points or higher to be invited to an in-person interview. Then, twenty percentage points were available during the technical in-person interview. The outcome of the panel's evaluation is as follows:



# **BACKGROUND INFORMATION:**

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board approval to adopt Resolution No. 06/17-3171 to authorize the fourth amendment to Standardize District Facility Components to replace the outdated Building Automation System (BAS) /Energy Management System (EMS). The original resolution to Standardize District Facility Components was Board approved on September 28, 2010.

# **RATIONALE:**

Western Powers, one of the District's current BAS EMS control systems is proprietary and does not allow District staff, or contractors, to program the system. Western Powers closed for business, no other local firm was able to provide support for SAUSD EMS. Niagra AX Framework is also used by SAUSD as a control system, is well known to the energy industry, and has been proven to reduce costs associate with managing energy consumption. Also, parts are readily available which reduces repair time and improves Building Services' client service. Niagra is currently in 20 percent schools and facilities within SAUSD. The 6 different EMS products currently used within SAUSD create training problems, material stocking challenges, and results in poor service to our students/clients. Niagra is a non-proprietary system, but is the only one used by SAUSD which interfaces with the remaining five (5)

#### **ITEM SUMMARY**

# **BACKGROUND INFORMATION:**

Submitted for Board consideration is a staff recommendation to authorize a Second Amendment to the lease between the Santa Ana Unified School District (District) and the City of Santa Ana (City) for the water tank located on the Davis Elementary School campus.

#### **RATIONALE:**

The original lease agreement for a period of ninety-nine (99) years was approved on September 19, 1917 for certain real property located at 595 East 14<sup>th</sup> Street to be leased to the City of Santa Ana for well water pumping, as well as to install and maintain a water tank for domestic water use.

The First Amendment to the lease agreement was approved by the Board at its September 13, 2016 meeting, which extended the lease to April 19, 2017. The City originally offered 3 parcels to trade in exchange for the water tower parcel, however, during our vetting of these 3 properties, the

parcel, however, during our vetting of these 3 properties, the City sold 2 of these parcels without prior notice.

This Second Amendment to the lease agreement allows the parties to further negotiate and agree upon terms for a land exchange or other consideration. The proposed agreement now adds a rental rate of \$7,500.00 per month on a month-to-month basis until such time as the lease or land trade agreement is resolved between the City and District. Staff recommends the Board approve the term extension of the lease for an additional eight (8) months, which shall expire on December 19, 2017.

# SECOND AMENDMENT TO CONTRACT OF AGREEMENT (LEASE) BETWEEN SANTA ANA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AND CITY OF SANTA ANA

THIS SECOND AMENDMENT TO CONTRACT OF AGREEMENT ("Second Amendment") is made as of \_\_\_\_\_\_\_, 2017 ("Effective Date"), by and between the Santa Ana Unified School District, a California public school district ("District"), and the City of Santa Ana, a charter city and California municipal corporation ("City"). District and City may be referred to herein individually as "Party" and collectively as "Parties."

#### **RECITALS**

**WHEREAS**, District and City entered into that certain Contract of Agreement, dated September 19, 1917, which was subsequently amended by that certain First Amendment, dated September 13, 2016 (collectively "Lease"), whereby District leased to City, and City leased from District, certain real property located at 595 East 14<sup>th</sup> Street, in the City of Santa Ana, to be used for well purposes and for the placement of a water tank occupied and enclosed by the City ("Premises"); and

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to effectuate an exchange of real property where the City would acquire ownership of the Premises in return for the District acquiring ownership of a City-owned parcel that is to be determined ("Exchange"), and the Parties are currently in negotiations regarding the Exchange; and

**WHEREAS**, if the Exchange is not effectuated, the Parties may agree to some other mutually-agreed upon disposition of the Property to the City, as authorized by applicable law ("Disposition"); and

**WHEREAS**, the original term of the Lease was for a period of ninety-nine (99) years, which was subsequently extended by the Parties and is set to expire as of April 19, 2017 ("Term"); and

**WHEREAS**, District and City desire to further extend the Term of the Lease, and provide for monthly rent for City's continued use of the Premises, to allow the Parties to continue to explore and agree upon terms for the Exchange and/or Disposition; and

**WHEREAS**, the Parties now mutually intend to amend the Lease's provisions as set forth herein this Second Amendment.

**NOW THEREFORE**, for valuable consideration, receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, District and City agree as follows:

#### 1. Extension of Term.

- 1.1. The Parties acknowledge and agree that the Term of the Lease is hereby extended for an additional <u>eight (8) months</u>, and shall expire on <u>December 19, 2018</u>, in order for the Parties to continue pursuing and finalize the Exchange and/or Disposition.
- 1.2. In the event the Parties determine that additional time is needed to effectuate the Exchange and/or Disposition, the Parties shall mutually agree in writing to extend the Term of the Lease for an additional period to be agreed upon by the Parties and effectuated in a subsequent written amendment to the Lease approved by the Parties.

1.3. During the extended Term of the Lease, the City may maintain the cell tower equipment on the Premises pursuant to a separate agreement therefor. Unless the City acquires ownership of the Premises pursuant to the Exchange and/or Disposition, upon termination of the Lease, all equipment must be removed from the Premises, and the Premise shall be returned to the District in good order, condition, and repair except ordinary wear and tear, and free and clear of all liens, claims, and encumbrances.

#### 2. **Rent**.

- 2.1. During the extended Term of the Lease, for and in consideration of the continued use of the Premises, City agrees to pay District rent in the amount of <u>Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars</u> (\$7,500) per month ("Rent").
- 2.2. The Rent for any fractional month at the beginning or at the end of the Term of the Lease shall be prorated. Rent shall be due on the first of each month until the expiration or earlier termination of the Lease. City shall promptly pay to District the Rent on the first day of each month in advance during the Term of the Lease, without deduction, setoff, prior notice, or demand.
- 2.3. City acknowledges that late payment by City to District of the Rent and other sums due hereunder will cause District to incur costs not contemplated by the Lease, the exact amount of which will be extremely difficult to ascertain. Those costs include, but are not limited to, processing and accounting charges. Accordingly, if District does not receive any installment of the Rent or any other sum due from City by 4:00 p.m. within ten (10) days after the Rent is due, City shall pay to District, as additional sums due, a late charge equal to five percent (5%) of the overdue amount or the maximum amount allowed by law, whichever is less. The Parties hereby agree that any late charge assessed to City shall represent a fair and reasonable estimate of the costs District will incur by reason of late payment by City. Acceptance of any late sums by District shall in no event constitute a waiver of City's default with respect to any overdue amount or other covenant, nor prevent District from exercising any of its other rights and remedies granted by the Lease and applicable law.
- 3. <u>Miscellaneous</u>. This Second Amendment may be executed in any number of counterparts all of which when taken together shall constitute one and the same document. Except as expressly modified by this Second Amendment, all other terms and provisions of the Lease are and remain in full force and effect. This Second Amendment shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION:**

The purpose of this agenda is to seek Board approval to eliminate 24.25 full-time equivalent classified positions for the 2017-2018 school year. The specific reductions listed in this Resolution have been identified to reduce personnel costs without impacting classroom services.

Education Code section 45117 permits the Board to lay off classified employees as a result of a bona fide reduction or elimination of service due to lack of work or lack of funds. Section 45117 requires written notice to affected employees at least 60 calendar days before the effective date of the layoff.

Following Board action, Administration will send layoff notices to the affected classified employees. Pursuant to Education Code section 45308, the least-senior employee in the classification is laid off first. Those employees with seniority in their classification, or in lower classifications, will be offered "bumping" rights. Less senior employees who are displaced (bumped) by more senior employees will then be given layoff notices and, if applicable, bumping rights based on their seniority.

Pursuant to Education Code section 45298, classified employees who are laid off have reemployment rights for 39 months. Employees who voluntarily accept demotions or reductions in assigned time (e.g., through bumping) have restoration rights for a total of 63 months.

Unlike a certificated layoff, no hearing occurs and no final resolution is required.

#### **RATIONALE:**

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board authorization to reduce or eliminate positions in the classified service, which authorization will result in the layoff of classified employees.

#### **FUNDING:**

Approximate Savings: \$4,890,000

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

The Board of Education desires to provide a safe school environment that allows all students equal access and opportunities in the District's academic and other educational support programs, services, and activities. The Board prohibits, at any District school or school activity, unlawful discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying of any student based on the student's actual race, color, ancestry, national origin, ethnic group identification, age, religion, marital or parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, or gender expression; the perception of one or more of such characteristics; or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics.

#### **POLICY:**

This policy shall apply to all acts related to district school activity or to school attendance occurring within a District school or district activity.

Prohibited discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying includes physical, verbal, nonverbal, written, or cyber conduct based on one of the categories listed above that is so severe or pervasive that it affects a student's ability to participate in or benefit from an educational program or activity; creates an intimidating, threatening, hostile, or offensive educational environment; has the effect of substantially or unreasonably interfering with a student's academic performance; or otherwise adversely affects a student's educational opportunities.

#### **DESIRED OUTCOME:**

The Superintendent or designee shall facilitate students' access to the educational program by publicizing the District's nondiscrimination policy and related complaint procedures to students, parents/guardians, and employees. The Superintendent or designee shall provide training and information on the scope and use of the policy and complaint procedures and take other measures designed to increase the school community's understanding of the requirements of law related to discrimination.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly review the implementation of the District's nondiscrimination policies and practices and, as necessary, shall take action to remove any identified barrier to student access to or participation in the educational program. Education Code 48950 provides that no district with one or more high schools shall make or enforce any rule subjecting a high school student to disciplinary sanctions solely on the basis of speech or other communication that would be constitutionally protected if engaged in outside of campus.

Education Code 48950 specifically states that it does not prohibit discipline for harassment, threats or intimidation unless constitutionally protected. As a general rule, harassment, threats and intimidation directed at an individual or group are not constitutionally protected, and whether such speech might be entitled to constitutional protection would be determined on a case-by-case basis, with consideration for the specific words used and the circumstances involved.

The Board prohibits intimidation or harassment of any student by any employee, student or other person in the district. Staff shall be alert and immediately responsive to student conduct which may interfere with another student's ability to participate in or benefit from school services, activities or privileges. (cf. 5145.2 - Freedom of Speech/Expression: Publications Code) (cf. 5145.7 - Sexual Harassment)

Students who harass other students shall be subject to appropriate counseling and discipline, up to and including expulsion. An employee who permits or engages in harassment may be subject to disciplinary action, up to dismissal. (cf. 4118 — Suspension/Disciplinary Action) and ( c f. including 4218 Dismissal/Suspension/Disciplinary Action) (cf. 5144.1 Suspension and Expulsion/Due Process)

#### **DESIRED OUTCOME:**

The Superintendent or designee shall facilitate students' access to the educational program by publicizing the District's nondiscrimination policy and related complaint procedures to students, parents/guardians, and employees. The Superintendent or designee shall provide training and information on the scope and use of the policy and complaint procedures and take other measures designed to increase the school community's understanding of the requirements of law related to discrimination.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly review the implementation of the District's nondiscrimination policies and practices and, as necessary, shall take action to remove any identified barrier to student access to or participation in the educational program. Any student who feels that he/she is being harassed should immediately contact the principal or designee. If a situation involving harassment is not promptly remedied by the principal or designee, a complaint can be filed in accordance with administrative regulations. SUBJECT: Sexual Harassment

CATEGORY: Student EFFECTIVE: 4/2017

RESPONSIBLE OFFICE(S): Educational Services REVIEWED: 3/2017

#### **SCOPE:**

The Governing Board recognizes maintaining a safe school environment that is free from harassment and discrimination at school or at school-sponsored or school-related activities.

#### **POLICY:**

The Governing Board is committed to maintaining a safe school environment that is free from harassment and discrimination. The Board prohibits, at school or at school-sponsored or school-related activities, sexual harassment targeted at any student by anyone. The Board also prohibits retaliatory behavior or action against any person who reports, files a complaint or testifies about, or otherwise supports a complainant in alleging sexual harassment.

The District strongly encourages any student who feels that he/she is being or has been sexually harassed on school grounds or at a school-sponsored or school-related activity by another student or an adult who has experienced off-campus sexual harassment that has a continuing effect on campus to immediately contact his/her teacher, the principal, or any other available school employee. Any employee who receives a report or observes an incident of sexual harassment shall notify the principal or a District compliance officer. Once notified, the principal or compliance officer shall take the steps to investigate and address the allegation, as specified in the accompanying administrative regulation.

#### Instruction/Information

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all District students receive age-appropriate information on sexual harassment. Such instruction and information shall include:

- 1. What acts and behavior constitute sexual harassment, including the fact that sexual harassment could occur between people of the same sex and could involve sexual violence.
- 2. A clear message that students do not have to endure sexual harassment under any circumstance.
- 3. Encouragement to report observed incidents of sexual harassment even where the alleged victim of the harassment has not complained.

4. A clear message that student safety is the district's primary concern, and that any separate rule violation involving an alleged victim or any other person reporting a sexual harassment incident will be addressed separately and will not affect the manner in which the sexual harassment complaint will be received, investigated, or resolved.

- 5. A clear message that, regardless of a complainant's noncompliance with the writing, timeline, or other formal filing requirements, every sexual harassment allegation that involves a student, whether as the complainant, respondent, or victim of the harassment, shall be investigated and prompt action shall be taken to stop any harassment, prevent recurrence, and address any continuing effect on students.
- 6. Information about the District's procedure for investigating complaints and the person(s) to whom a report of sexual harassment should be made.
- 7. Information about the rights of students and parents/guardians to file a civil or criminal complaint, as applicable, including the right to file a civil or criminal complaint while the District investigation of a sexual harassment complaint continues.
- 8. A clear message that, when needed, the District will take interim measures to ensure a safe school environment for a student who is the complainant or victim of sexual harassment and/or other students during an investigation and that, to the extent possible, when such interim measures are taken, they shall not disadvantage the complainant or victim of the alleged harassment.

#### **Complaint Process and Disciplinary Actions**

Any student who feels that he/she is being or has been subjected to sexual harassment shall immediately contact his/her teacher or any other employee. A school employee to whom a complaint is made shall, within 24 hours or as soon as reasonably possible, of receiving the complaint, report it to the principal or designee.

Any school employee who observes any incident of sexual harassment involving a student shall report this observation to the principal or designee, whether or not the victim files a complaint.

In any case of sexual harassment involving the principal or any other District employee to whom the complaint would ordinarily be made, the employee who receives the student's report or who observes the incident shall report to the nondiscrimination coordinator or the Superintendent or designee.

The Board prohibits, at school or at school-sponsored or school-related activities, sexual harassment targeted at any student by anyone. The Board also prohibits retaliatory behavior or action against any person who reports, files a complaint or testifies about, or otherwise supports a complainant in alleging sexual harassment.

The district strongly encourages any student who feels that he/she is being or has been sexually harassed on school grounds or at a school-sponsored or school-related activity by another student or an adult who has experienced off-campus sexual harassment that has a continuing effect on campus to immediately contact his/her teacher, the principal, or any other available school employee. Any employee who receives a report or observes an incident of sexual harassment shall notify the principal or a district compliance officer. Once notified, the principal or compliance officer shall take the steps to investigate and address the allegation, as specified in the accompanying administrative regulation.

**SUBJECT:** Extracurricular and Cocurricular Activities

CATEGORY: Instruction EFFECTIVE: 4/18/2017

RESPONSIBLE OFFICE(S): Educational Services REVIEWED: 3/28/2017

#### SCOPE:

The Governing Board recognizes that extracurricular and cocurricular activities enrich the educational and social development of students and enhance students' feelings of connectedness with the schools. The district shall encourage and support student participation in extracurricular and cocurricular activities without compromising the integrity and purpose of the educational program.

#### **POLICY:**

No extracurricular or cocurricular program or activity shall be provided or conducted separately on the basis of any actual or perceived characteristic listed as a prohibited category of discrimination in state or federal law, nor shall any student's participation in an extracurricular or cocurricular activity be required or refused on those bases. Prerequisites for student participation in extracurricular and cocurricular activities shall be limited to those that have been demonstrated to be essential to the success of the activity. (5 CCR 4925).

Any complaint alleging unlawful discrimination in the district's extracurricular or cocurricular programs or activities shall be filed in accordance with BP/AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures.

Unless specifically authorized by law, no fee shall be charged to students for participation in extracurricular and cocurricular activities related to the educational program, including materials or equipment related to the activity.

#### **Eligibility Requirements**

To be eligible to participate in extracurricular and cocurricular activities, students in grades 7-12 must demonstrate satisfactory educational progress in the previous grading period, including, but not limited to: (Education Code <u>35160.5</u>)

- 1. Maintenance of a minimum of 2.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale in all enrolled classes
- 2. Maintenance of minimum progress toward meeting high school graduation requirements

The Superintendent or designee may grant ineligible students a probationary period not to exceed one semester. Students granted probationary eligibility must meet the required standards by the end of the probationary period in order to remain eligible for participation. (Education Code <u>35160.5</u>)

Any decision regarding the eligibility of any child in foster care or a child of an active duty military family for extracurricular or cocurricular activities shall be made by the Superintendent or designee in accordance with Education Code <u>48850</u> and <u>49701</u>.

#### **SCOPE:**

The Governing Board recognizes that extracurricular and cocurricular activities enrich the educational and social development and experiences of students and enhance students' feelings of connectedness with the schools. The District shall encourage and support student participation in extracurricular and cocurricular activities without compromising the integrity and purpose of the educational program.

#### **POLICY:**

No extracurri cul ar or cocurri cul ar program or acti vi ty shal l be provi ded or conducted separately and no District sstudent participation in extracurricular and cocurricular activities shall be required or refused based on t he s t udent s gender s exual or i ent at i on et hni c gr oup i dent i fi cat i on race ancestry national origin religion color or ntal or physical disability Rneqtusire for participation in extracurricular and cocurricular activities shall be liaited to those that are essential to the success of the activity 5 CCR 4925

No extracurricular or cocurricular program or activity shall be provided or conducted separately on the basis of any actual or perceived characteristic listed as a prohibited category of discrimination in state or federal law, nor shall any student's participation in an extracurricular or cocurricular activity be required or refused on those bases. Prerequisites for student participation in extracurricular and cocurricular activities shall be limited to those that have been demonstrated to be essential to the success of the activity. (5 CCR 4925)

Any coaplaint regarding the Dsistrict extracurricular and cocurricular programs or activities shall be filed in accordance with BAPR 13312 L7niform Coaplaint Procedures

Any complaint alleging unlawful discrimination in the district's extracurricular or cocurricular programs or activities shall be filed in accordance with BP/AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures.

No student shall be prohibited from participating in extracurricular and cocurricular activities related to the educational program because of inability to pay fees associated with the activity.

Unless specifically authorized by law, no fee shall be charged to students for participation in extracurricular and cocurricular activities related to the educational program, including materials or equipment related to the activity.

#### **Eligibility Requirements**

To be eligible to participate in extracurricular and cocurricular activities, students in grades 7-12 must demonstrate satisfactory educational progress in the previous grading period, including, but not limited to: (Education Code <u>35160.5</u>)

1. Maintenance of a minimum of 2.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale in all enrolled classes

2. Maintenance of minimum progress toward meeting high school graduation requirements

The Superintendent or designee may grant ineligible students a probationary period not to exceed one regular grading period semester. Students granted probationary eligibility must meet the required standards by the end of the probationary period in order to remain eligible for participation. (Education Code 35160.5)

Any decision regarding the eligibility of any child in foster care or a child of an active duty military family for extracurricular or cocurricular activities shall be made by the Superintendent or designee in accordance with Education Code 48850 and 49701.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide the necessary assistance to help ineligible students achieve the academic standards required by law. A student who does not meet the above requirement shall be required to participate in mandatory tutoring in order to raise the grade.

The Superintendent or designee may revoke a student's eligibility for participation in extracurricular and cocurricular activities when the student's poor citizenship is serious enough to warrant loss of this privilege.

#### Student Conduct at Extracurricular/Cocurricular Events

When attending or participating in extracurricular and cocurricular activities on or off campus, district students are subject to district policies and regulations relating to student conduct. Students who violate district policies and regulations may be subject to discipline including, but not limited to, suspension, expulsion, transfer to alternative programs, or denial of participation in extracurricular or cocurricular activities in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation. When appropriate, the Superintendent or designee shall notify local law enforcement.

#### **Annual Policy Review**

The Board shall annually review this policy and implementing regulations.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all persons employed to provide school counseling, school psychology, and/or school social work services shall possess the appropriate credential from the Commission on Teacher Credentialing authorizing their employment in such positions. Responsibilities of each position shall be clearly defined in a job description.

- 1. Engaging with, advocating for, and providing support for all students with respect to learning and achievement
- 2. - 3. Using multiple sources of information to monitor and improve student behavior and achievement

- 6. Intervening to ameliorate school-related problems, including issues related to chronic absences

#### **Educational Counseling**

Beginning in grade 7, parents/guardians shall receive a general notice at least once before career counseling and course selection so that they may participate in the counseling sessions and decisions.

The educational counseling program shall include academic counseling in the following areas:

- 1. Development and implementation, with parent/guardian involvement, of the student's immediate and long-range educational plans
- 2. Optimizing progress towards achievement of proficiency standards
- 3. Completion of the required curriculum in accordance with the student's needs, abilities, interests, and aptitudes
- 4. Academic planning for access and success in higher education programs, including advisement on courses needed for admission to public colleges and universities, standardized admissions tests, and financial aid
- 5. Career counseling, in which students are assisted in doing all of the following:
- a. Planning for the future, including, but not limited to, identifying personal interests, skills, and abilities, career planning, course selection, and career transition
- b. Becoming aware of personal preferences and interests that influence educational and occupational exploration, career choice, and career success
- c. Developing realistic perceptions of work, the changing work environment, and the effect of work on lifestyle
- d. Understanding the relationship between academic achievement and career success, and the importance of maximizing career options
- e. Understanding the value of participating in career technical education and work-based learning activities and programs, including, but not limited to, service learning, regional occupational centers and programs, partnership programs, job shadowing, and mentoring experiences

f. Understanding the need to develop essential employable skills and work habits

g. Understanding the variety of four-year colleges and universities and community college career and technical preparation programs, as well as admission criteria and enrollment procedures

The district's educational counseling program also may include, but not be limited to, identification of students who are at risk of not graduating with the rest of their class, development of a list of coursework and experience necessary to assist students to satisfy the curricular requirements for college admission and successfully transition to postsecondary education or employment, and counseling regarding available options for a student to continue his/her education if he/she fails to meet graduation requirements.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish and maintain a program of guidance, placement, and follow-up for all high school students subject to compulsory continuation education.

No counselor shall unlawfully discriminate against any student. Guidance counseling regarding school programs and career, or higher education opportunities shall not be differentiated on the basis of any protected category specified in BP 0410 - Nondiscrimination in District Programs and Activities.

In addition, counselors shall affirmatively explore with students the possibility of careers, or courses leading to careers, without regard to a student's gender.

For assessing or counseling students, the district shall not use testing or other materials that permit or require impermissible or unlawful differential treatment of students.

Note: 20 USC 7908 requires districts receiving funds under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) to provide military recruiters with the same access to students as is provided to colleges and prospective employers. Districts that do not grant similar access may lose those funds and may be subject to specific interventions, such as notification to the Governor and Congress, so that public officials can work with the district. Districts that do not receive ESEA funds and that choose to grant access to college and employment recruiters should do so on a nondiscriminatory basis. Education Code 49603 provides that military service recruiters may not be denied on-campus access to students in grades 9-12 if the district provides such access to other employers. For information regarding military recruiter access to student directory information, see BP/AR 5125.1 - Release of Directory Information.

OPTION 1: Colleges and prospective employers, including military recruiters, shall have the same access to students for recruiting purposes

#### **Personal or Mental Health Counseling**

A school counselor, school psychologist, or school social worker may provide individualized personal, mental health, or family counseling to students in accordance with the specialization(s) authorized by his/her credential. Such services may include, but are not limited to, support related to the student's social

and emotional development, behavior, substance abuse, mental health assessment, depression, or mental illness. As appropriate, students and their parents/guardians shall be informed about community agencies, organizations, or health care providers that offer qualified professional assistance.

Written parent/guardian consent shall be obtained before mental health counseling or treatment services are provided to a student, except when the student is authorized to consent to the service pursuant to Family Code 6920-6929, Health and Safety Code 124260, or other applicable law.

Any information of a personal nature disclosed to a school counselor by a student age 12 years or older or by his/her parent/guardian is confidential and shall not become part of the student record without the written consent of the person who disclosed the confidential information. The information shall not be revealed, released, discussed, or referred to except under the limited circumstances specified in Education Code 49602.

A counselor shall consult with the Superintendent or designee and, as appropriate, with the district's legal counsel whenever unsure of how to respond to a student's personal problem or when questions arise regarding the possible release of confidential information regarding a student.

#### **Crisis Counseling**

The Board recognizes the need for a prompt and effective response when students are confronted with a traumatic incident. School counselors shall assist in the development of the comprehensive school safety plan, emergency and disaster preparedness plan, and other prevention and intervention practices designed to assist students and parents/guardians before, during, and after a crisis.

In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall identify crisis counseling resources to train district staff in effective threat assessment, appropriate response techniques, and/or methods to directly help students cope with a crisis if it occurs.

Early identification and intervention plans shall be developed to help identify those students who may be at risk for violence so that support may be provided before they engage in violent or disruptive behavior.

#### **Educational Counseling**

Beginning in grade 7, parents/guardians shall receive a general notice at least once before career counseling and course selection so that they may participate in the counseling sessions and decisions.

- 1. Development and implementation, with parent/guardian involvement, of the student's immediate and long-range educational plans
- 2. Optimizing progress towards achievement of proficiency standards
- 3. Completion of the required curriculum in accordance with the student's needs, abilities, interests, and aptitudes
- 4. Academic planning for access and success in higher education programs, including advisement on courses needed for admission to public colleges and universities, standardized admissions tests, and financial aid
- 5. Career counseling, in which students are assisted in doing all of the following:
- a. Planning for the future, including, but not limited to, identifying personal interests, skills, and abilities, career planning, course selection, and career transition
- b. Becoming aware of personal preferences and interests that influence educational and occupational exploration, career choice, and career success
- c. Developing realistic perceptions of work, the changing work environment, and the effect of work on lifestyle
- d. Understanding the relationship between academic achievement and career success, and the importance of maximizing career options
- e. Understanding the value of participating in career technical education and work-based learning activities and programs, including, but not limited to, service learning, regional occupational centers and programs, partnership programs, job shadowing, and mentoring experience.
- f. Understanding the need to develop essential employable skills and work habits
- g. Understanding the variety of four-year colleges and universities and community college career and technical preparation programs, as well as admission criteria and enrollment procedures

For assessing or counseling students, the district shall not use testing or other materials that permit or require impermissible or unlawful differential treatment of students.

Colleges and prospective employers, including military recruiters, shall have the same access to students for recruiting purposes

#### **Personal or Mental Health Counseling**

A school counselor, school psychologist, or school social worker may provide individualized personal, mental health, or family counseling to students in accordance with the specialization(s) authorized by his/her credential. Such services may include, but are not limited to, support related to the student's social and emotional development, behavior, substance abuse, mental health assessment, depression, or mental illness. As appropriate, students and their parents/guardians shall be informed about community agencies, organizations, or health care providers that offer qualified professional assistance.

Written parent/guardian consent shall be obtained before mental health counseling or treatment services are provided to a student, except when the student is authorized to consent to the service pursuant to Family Code 6920-6929, Health and Safety Code 124260, or other applicable law.

Any information of a personal nature disclosed to a school counselor by a student age 12 years or older or by his/her parent/guardian is confidential and shall not become part of the student record without the written consent of the person who disclosed the confidential information. The information shall not be revealed, released, discussed, or referred to except under the limited circumstances specified in Education Code 49602.

A counselor shall consult with the Superintendent or designee and, as appropriate, with the district's legal counsel whenever unsure of how to respond to a student's personal problem or when questions arise regarding the possible release of confidential information regarding a student.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION:**

Effective January 1, 2017, per Senate Bill 1029, the district must adopt a board policy regarding the use of debt. The District does not currently have a Board Policy in place that provides guidelines on the issuance of debt, management of the debt portfolio, and adherence to relevant laws and regulations.

#### **ITEM SUMMARY:**

- Board Policy (BP) 3461 Debt Management (New: First Reading) is a new requirement for districts.
- Effective January 1, 2017, per Senate Bill 1029, the district must adopt a board policy prior to the issuance of debt.

#### **RATIONALE:**

The purpose of this agenda item is to present for first reading a new Board Policy (BP) 3461 – <u>Debt Management</u>. This agenda item is the result of Senate Bill 1029, that requires districts to have a debt policy in place prior to issuing debt, and to ensure any new issuance of debt conforms to the policy. The District has taken the Fiscal Crisis & Management Assistance Team (FCMAT) Debt Management Policy's as its model.

#### **SCOPE:**

The District recognizes that the foundation of a well-managed debt program is a comprehensive debt policy that guides the issuance of debt, management of the debt portfolio, and adherence to relevant laws and regulations.

The purpose of this policy is to improve the quality of decisions, articulate policy goals, provide guidelines for the structure of debt issuance, and demonstrate a commitment to long-term capital and financial planning.

#### **POLICY:**

#### **Short-Term Operating Debt Policy**

The expenditures associated with the District's day-to-day operations will be covered by current revenues. However, the District may experience temporary cash shortages because it does not receive its revenues in equal installments each month, yet the largest operating expenditures occur regularly in equal amounts. To finance these temporary cash shortfalls, the District may incur short-term operating debt, typically in the form of temporary transfers from the county treasury or county superintendent of schools, or tax and revenue anticipation notes (TRANS). The District will base the amount of the short-term operating debt on cash flow projections for the fiscal year and will comply with applicable federal and state regulations. The District will pledge operating revenues to repay the short-term debt in one year or less. The District will minimize the cost of the short-term borrowing to the greatest extent possible. As allowed by Education Code Section 42603, the District should first consider using interfund transfers before pursuing external borrowing.

#### **Long-Term Capital Debt Policy**

The following will apply to the issuance of long-term debt:

- 1. The District will not use long-term obligations for operating purposes.
- 2. The term of the long-term obligations will not exceed the useful life of the projects financed.
- 3. The District will strive to minimize increases in debt service from year to year.
- 4. When any long-term debt is issued, the governing board will make findings as to the repayment source(s) and the sufficiency of the repayment source(s) until the debt is fully repaid.

#### **Internal Interim Financing**

When sufficient funds are available, per Education Code section 42603, the District will consider appropriating them to provide interim financing until long-term financing can be completed, usually within the fiscal year. When the long-term debt obligation is subsequently issued, the funds will be repaid. Use of this strategy requires specific advance notification to the governing board.

#### Responsibilities of the Chief Business Official

The chief business official will have the primary responsibility for developing financing recommendations and ensuring implementation of the debt policy.

- 1. The chief business official will review the operating cash flow monthly to determine the need for internal borrowing to maintain progress on the capital improvement program.
- 2. The chief business official will review the District's capital improvement program at least annually, including the need for financing to maintain the progress on the capital improvement program. This review will be presented to the school board annually. Best practice is to do so in documented form either as part of the adopted budget or in the District's *Management*, *Discussion and Analysis* prepared for the annual audit report.
- 3. Because issuing debt is a periodic endeavor and the capital markets constantly change, at least 30 days prior to consideration of any financing the chief business official will review all current GFOA best practices, advisories and guidance documents (found at GFOA.org) and identify to the governing board those relevant to the current capital improvement program and/or operating cash flow needs. This will be done before any governing board action item on the topic of financing.
- 4. The chief business official will supervise all details of financing endeavors, including a careful review of the documents (e.g., contracts, resolutions, agreements, financial tables).
- 5. The chief business official will administer the investment of debt proceeds, with the advice of the county treasurer.
- 6. The chief business official will oversee the expenditure of the debt proceeds and ensure that the debt payments are made on time.
- 7. The chief business official will ensure that any initial and periodic reporting needed such as to investors, credit rating agencies, trustees, federal (e.g., the Internal Revenue Service, the Securities and Exchange Commission) and state agencies (e.g., the California Debt and Investment Advisory Commission), and the county superintendent of schools is timely and accurate.
- 8. Before any financing is submitted to the governing board for approval, the chief business official will take into consideration the District's internal control procedures, and consult with the District's external auditor regarding fiscal controls needed to ensure that the proceeds of the proposed debt issuance will be directed to the intended use.

#### **Engagement of Professionals**

The policy recognizes that public finance professionals (e.g., financial advisors, bond counsels, brokers/dealers, and other consultants) market their services extensively. Furthermore, per Public Contract Codes 20110-20118.4, such services are usually exempt from public bidding. To ensure that the District receives appropriate services at a fair price, and to avoid the appearance of conflict of interest, extra caution will be taken when engaging the services of public finance professionals.

- Selecting and Managing Underwriters for Negotiated Bond Sales
- Issuer's Role in Selection of Bond Counsel

The chief business official (and the District's purchasing agent) will report to the governing board on a recommended process for determining which professionals are needed, how they will be identified (e.g., request for proposal, or bid), and how their contracts will be developed before being submitted to the governing board for approval. Emphasis will be placed on competition, openness, clarity, and avoiding conflicts of interest. The process recommended may be for a period of time, or for a particular financing or set of financings.

The chief business official (and the District's purchasing agent) will report to the governing board on a recommended process for determining which professionals are needed, how they will be identified (e.g., request for proposal, or bid), and how their contracts will be developed before being submitted to the governing board for approval. Emphasis will be placed on competition, openness, clarity, and avoiding conflicts of interest. The process recommended may be for a period of time, or for a particular financing or set of financings.

#### **DESIRED OUTCOME:**

This debt policy sets forth comprehensive guidelines for financing capital expenditures, as well as for addressing short-term cash flow needs. The objectives of this policy are that:

- 1. The District obtain financing only when necessary.
- 2. The District use any type of debt financing allowed by California law (e.g., general obligation bonds, revenue bonds, special tax bonds, certificates of participation, lease-purchase financings, tax and revenue anticipation notes, temporary transfers from the county treasury or county superintendent of schools, bond anticipation notes), so long as the financing meets the standards for appropriateness and efficiency described below.
- 3. The District use a process for identifying the most appropriate and efficient timing, amount and structure of debt.

Factors to consider when determining the appropriateness of debt are to include the following:

- Why debt rather than cash expenditure is appropriate.
- Annual debt service and debt administration costs.
- The District's financial condition.

Factors to consider when determining efficiency are to include the following:

- Up-front cost plus long-term costs.
- Future flexibility.
- 4. The District operate with extreme caution, and thoroughly investigate all possible conflicts of interest.
- 5. The District ensure that any required initial and periodic reporting to investors, credit rating agencies, trustees, federal and state agencies, and the county superintendent of schools is timely and accurate.

The governing board will review this policy at least annually and update it as needed. Such a review will include a review of the then-current Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA's) best practices on debt management policy.
