Individual speakers are allowed <u>three minutes</u> to address the Board on agenda or nonagenda items. The Board may limit the total time for public input on each item to 20 minutes. With the Board's consent, the Board President may increase or decrease the time allowed for public presentation, depending on the topic and the number of persons wishing to be heard. The Board President may take a poll of speakers for or against a particular issue and may ask that additional persons speak only if they have something new to add.

The Board urges that complaints and derogatory remarks against a District employee be made in writing on forms available in the Office of the Superintendent. This allows the District and the Board to examine more carefully the complaint and to initiate the appropriate investigation.

Persons wishing to address the Board on an item on the agenda or an item of business in the Board's jurisdiction are requested to complete a card. This card is to be submitted to the Recording Secretary. The *Request to Address the Board of Education* cards are located on the table in the foyer.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board certification of the Third Interim. Education Code Section 42130 requires district superintendents to prepare and submit two interim financial reports to governing boards. A third interim financial report is also required for those districts with a "qualified" or "negative" certification at second interim. A certification by the Governing Board concerning the financial status of the District is required to be submitted to the County Superintendent of Schools.

RATIONALE:

Education Code Section 42131 requires the Board to determine and certify whether or not the District is able to meet its financial obligations for the remainder of this fiscal year and for the subsequent two fiscal years based on the financial information known as of April 30, 2013.

The report shows that, given the magnitude of recent State Budget reductions, the District may <u>not</u> be able to meet its financial obligations through the remainder of this fiscal year or for the subsequent two years.

The Third Interim Report, upon acceptance by the Board, will be forwarded to the Orange County Department of Education. The detailed General Fund schedules for attendance, revenues, expenditures, cash flow, and multi-year projections will also be forwarded.

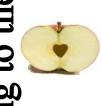

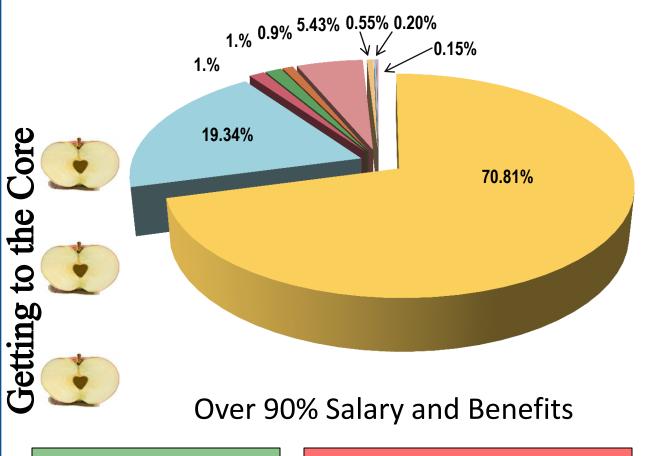




How is the Money Spent?

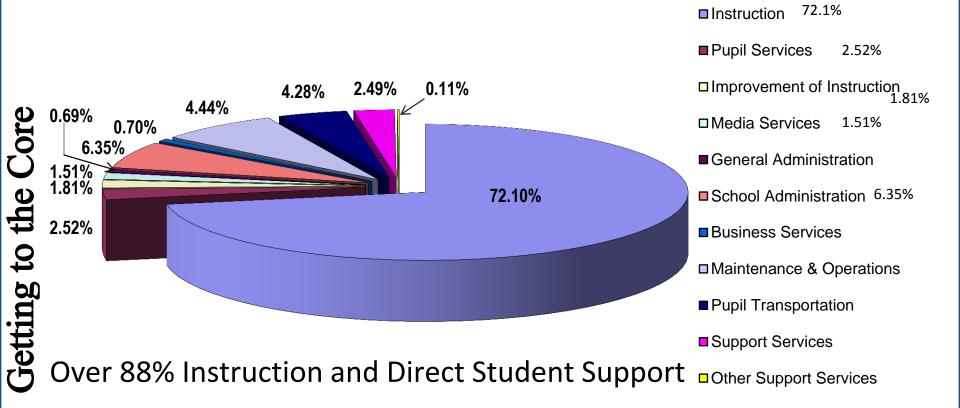
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Purposes of Our Spending

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What is the Third Interim Report?



- Districts that submit a "Qualified" certification must also submit a Third Interim report
 - ➤ SAUSD filed a "Qualified" certification to the Second Interim report as required under Education Code Section 42130 [1240] AB1200 Provisions
 - SAUSD will provide no later than June 1, financial statement projections of the District's general fund and cash balances through June 30 for the period ending April 30 to:
 - The Orange County Department of Education (OCDE)
 - The State Controller Office
 - The California Department of Education

- Authorization to submit Financial Report to OCDE:
 - ➤ Staff request that the governing board certify the District financial status as "Qualified" as part of the Third Interim report submission to the Orange County Department of Education
 - The Qualified certification is due primarily to the current Governor's May Revision Budget and the determination that SAUSD may not be able to meet all financial obligations in the budget year or **one of the two following years** based on the District's current revenue projections

- The Governor continues to propose a sweeping reform of the state's school finance system with the LCFF
- The Governor's Budget makes no reference to current law and revenue limit funding
 - There is no direct reference to the statutory COLA
 - However, the Budget acknowledges providing a **1.565%** COLA for selected categorical programs and sufficient funding to increase support for LEAs by 4.5% under the LCFF
 - There is no reference to the current 22.272% deficit factor
 - If LCFF is not adopted it is likely that current law will have some deficit reduction...this is built into our revised plan B at 18.997% per the Dartboard
- Nevertheless, until state law is changed, revenue limits are the means by which state apportionment aid is distributed to LEAs statewide







LCFF Developments



- Governors Proposal
 - The Governor has maintained this as the hallmark of the budget
- Senate and Assembly Democrats Proposal
 - Delay implementation until 14-15
 - Remove concentration grants and add to the base
- The new accountability provision in both proposals may make the LCFF more restrictive and limit the ability of LCFF funds to mitigate the structural deficit in SAUSD.









- Base funding for core services will decrease because current categorical programs that support specific needs (i.e., deferred maintenance, instructional materials) disappear under the formula
- Of the \$3.9 billion in categorical funding that will be absorbed by the LCFF, \$2 billion, or roughly half already, supports general purpose categorical programs (these are our Tier III funded positions)
- School Districts must <u>absorb the costs of these services</u> within the revenue limit equivalent dollars provided by the LCFF the base grant
 - CSR funds currently flexible will become restricted with severe penalties
 - EIA funds used for supplemental positions may be more restricted when part of the supplemental and concentration grants







Common Core Block Grant



- The Governor proposes a one-time Block Grant for Common core
 - \$170/ADA approximately \$9 million for SAUSD (May Revise)
- The District will be required to create a plan to use the funds over 2 years to address the technology and instructional needs of Common Core implementation.
 - These funds will likely be restricted and will be reserved while developing the plan

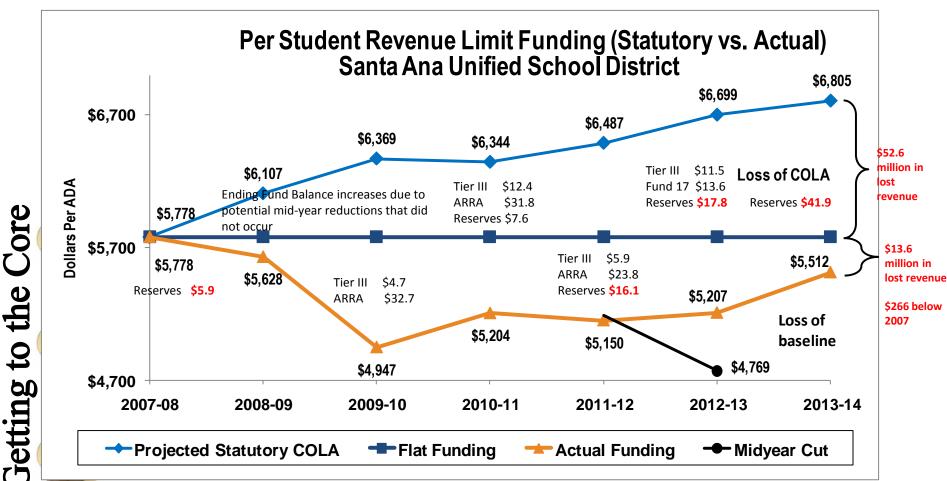

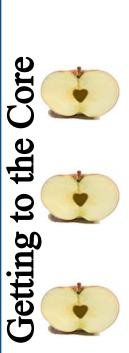

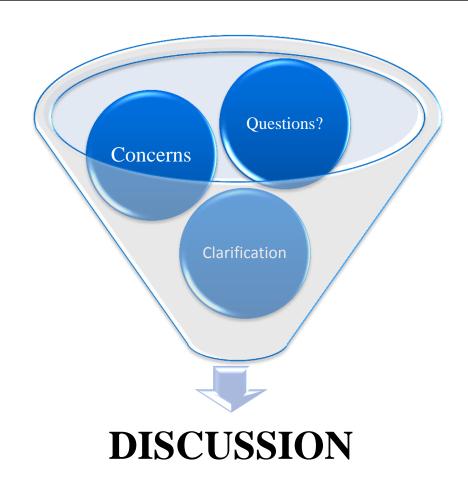

ANNOUNCEMENT

Mr. Hernández announced the retirement of Dr. Thelma Meléndez de Santa Ana at the end of the summer, of this year. While the Board would prefer to have Dr. Meléndez stay with the District longer, Mr. Hernández stated that the Board respects and supports her desire to spend more time with her family. The role of the Superintendent requires extensive hours and sacrifice of time with loved ones. Family is important, so the Board certainly supports her desire to spend more time with her husband, parents, and other family members that live in Los Angeles County. Dr. Meléndez will continue to serve the Santa Ana Unified School District until her retirement, at the end of summer. The Board of Education recognizes that Superintendents as CEO's, make many sacrifices when serving in the top leadership role of a school district. DENYING THE PROPOSED CHARTER PETITION FOR ODYSSEY CHARTER ACADEMY SCHOOL

WHEREAS, pursuant to Education Code Section 47605 et seq., the Governing Board of the Santa Ana Unified School District ("SAUSD" and/or "District") is required to review and consider authorization of charter schools; and

WHEREAS, on or about October 4, 2012, Expedition Charter Academy, Inc. ("Expedition") submitted to SAUSD a charter school petition ("1st Charter Petition") for the proposed Odyssey Charter Academy ("Odyssey" and/or "Charter School"); and

WHEREAS, District staff recommended that the Governing Board deny the 1st Charter Petition, and prepared a proposed draft resolution denying the 1st Charter Petition, including specific factual findings supporting that denial, which resolution specified that approving the 1st Charter Petition was not consistent with sound educational practice based upon grounds and factual findings including, but not limited to, the factual findings set forth in that resolution; and

WHEREAS, on January 15, 2013, the date scheduled for District Governing Board action on the $1^{\rm st}$ Charter Petition, Odyssey/Expedition withdrew the $1^{\rm st}$ Charter Petition from consideration by the District Governing Board; and

WHEREAS, on or about February 20, 2013, Expedition submitted to SAUSD a revised charter school petition ("Charter Petition") for the proposed Odyssey Charter Academy; and

WHEREAS, the District and Expedition both recognize that the Charter Petition is a new submission, subject to new review and new timelines for SAUSD Governing Board action thereon; and

WHEREAS, upon receipt of the Charter Petition, the District requested that Expedition provide a redline of the Charter Petition, comparing it to the 1st Charter Petition, in order to reduce the burden on the District in reanalyzing provisions which had previously been reviewed and analyzed during the District's

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consideration of the 1st Charter Petition and to clarify the revisions that had been made by Expedition, but Expedition declined to provide such a redline document. Expedition indicated that it had "addressed the deficits that were noted in the resolution" that District staff had prepared supporting denial of the 1st Charter Petition; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the Charter Schools Act of 1992, the Charter Petition was brought to the SAUSD Governing Board meeting of March 12, 2013, at which time it was received by the SAUSD Governing Board, thereby commencing the timelines for SAUSD Governing Board action thereon; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing on the provisions of the Charter was conducted on March 26, 2013, pursuant to Education Code Section 47605, at which time the District Board considered the level of support for this Charter Petition by teachers employed by the District, other employees of the District, and parents; and

WHEREAS. at that public hearing, the petitioners parents/guardians spoke on behalf of the Odyssey Charter Academy, and no District teachers or other District employees spoke in support of the Odyssey Charter Academy;

WHEREAS, in reviewing the Charter Petition for the Odyssey Charter Academy, the Governing Board has been cognizant of the intent of the Legislature that charter schools are and should become an integral part of the California educational system and that establishment of charter schools should be encouraged; and

WHEREAS, the District staff, working with an independent evaluator and District legal counsel, have reviewed and analyzed all of the information received with respect to the Charter Petition, including information related to the operation and potential effects of Odyssey, and made a recommendation to the District Governing Board that the Charter Petition be denied based on that review; and

WHEREAS, the District staff and consultants noted in the review of the Charter Petition that it appears that Expedition's revisions from the 1st Charter Petition were limited only to attempts to respond directly to the findings set forth in the draft resolution of denial for the 1st Charter Petition (including simply eliminating in their entirety some components that were found to be

deficient, rather than actually remedying the deficiencies), but that those revisions did not adequately address the issues raised in the prior resolution of denial and, further, Expedition did not undertake an overall review and revision to the Charter Petition, despite the fact that that resolution specifically indicated that the findings set forth therein did not address all of the deficiencies in the 1st Charter Petition; and

WHEREAS, the District Governing Board has fully considered the Charter Petition submitted for the establishment of Odyssey and the recommendation provided by District staff;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED AS FOLLOWS:

- I. That the Governing Board of SAUSD finds the above listed recitals to be true and correct and incorporates them herein by this reference.
- II. That the Governing Board, having fully considered and evaluated the Petition for the establishment of the proposed Odyssey Charter Academy, hereby finds that it is not consistent with sound educational practice, based upon grounds and factual findings including, but not limited to, the following, and hereby denies the renewal pursuant to Education Code Section 47605:
 - A. The Charter School presents an unsound educational program for the pupils to be enrolled in the Charter School. [Education Code Section 47605(b)(1)]
 - B. The petitioners are demonstrably unlikely to successfully implement the program set forth in the petition. [Education Code Section 47605(b)(2)]
 - C. The Petition does not contain reasonably comprehensive descriptions of all of the required elements. [Education Code Section 47605(b)(5)]
- III. That the Governing Board of the Santa Ana Unified School District hereby determines the foregoing findings are supported by specific facts, including but not limited to the following:
 - A. THE CHARTER SCHOOL PRESENTS AN UNSOUND EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM FOR THE PUPILS TO BE ENROLLED IN THE CHARTER SCHOOL. [Education Code Section 47605(b)(1)]

An overall analysis of the Charter Petition makes clear that the 1. revisions made by Expedition from the 1st Charter Petition did not thoughtfully, adequately, and substantively respond to all of the factual findings set forth in the proposed resolution of denial prepared by District staff for the 1st Charter Petition. appears that Odyssey/Expedition made a hurried attempt nominally to address the deficiencies and issues set forth in that prior resolution without substantively addressing each of the concerns, or reviewing and improving the Charter Petition in its entirety to address the deficiencies therein. Charter Petition is a new submission, the District will not consider and review it in a vacuum, and it is the District Governing Board's expectation that in a case in which there previously has been a recommendation of denial, including specification of certain factual findings supporting denial, and the petitioners have withdrawn that petition from District Governing Board consideration, that prior to resubmitting a charter for the same or similar school the petitioners would carefully and thoughtfully review the charter and remediate all of the concerns and deficiencies therein, including, but not limited to, those deficiencies that were individually noted by District staff. It is the petitioners' task to submit their final and best product to the District for Governing Board consideration, and is not the duty of the District to develop, write, or otherwise guide charter petitioners in developing a legally and educationally adequate charter, but the Charter Petition as submitted is deficient and is educationally unsound. These concerns arise specifically in relation to the Charter

The previously proposed resolution of denial specified:

Petition's description of the proposed educational program.

The Charter's discussion of the proposed educational program includes references to many terminologies and phrases, however, these numerous terminologies and phrases collectively do not constitute an actual educational program and/or curriculum that would be offered by Odyssey. The Petition does not describe, explain, or provide back up for these terminologies and phrases and how they would be

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implemented at Odyssey with any actual Odyssey curricula, lesson plans, related rubrics, or sample projects. Furthermore, the materials in the appendices to the Charter consist primarily of externally produced materials and do not directly tie in to any actual curriculum to be offered The appendices are composed of copies of at Odyssev. proprietary materials, which are not cross-walked or aligned to any actual Odyssey curricula. A lengthy chart labeled "Instructional Delivery Models and Approaches to Learning" contains no specific curricula, but appears to be more of a series of philosophical statements combined together in matrix format. The Charter provides no sense of how these various "Instructional Delivery Models and Approaches to Learning" would be woven together into a coherent educational program that would produce measurable Odyssey has included no actual curricula and there is no evidence in either the Charter narrative or in the appendices that would support the requirement that Odyssey would provide a sound educational program.

The major difference with regard to the educational program between the 1^{st} Charter Petition and the current Charter Petition is the addition of voluminous photocopies of commercial instructional materials, not created by or directly related or tied to Odyssey's proposed educational program and presented in no particular context. The narrative continues to reference many philosophies, terminologies, and phrases, (although some of the prior discussion was removed from the Charter Petition) along with the additional photocopied proprietary materials, but they do not hold together as a cohesive description of an educational program and/or curriculum that would be offered at Odyssey. philosophies, terminologies, and phrases are not backed up with any unified curriculum, lesson plans, or related rubrics that have not been photocopied from another source. The many pages of copied commercial products do not, in and of themselves, demonstrate a coherent or sound curriculum. There is no attempt to tie any of these proprietary documents together into a cohesive whole. They appear simply to be added without clearly

relating them back to the many phrases, terminologies, philosophies, matrices, and statements throughout the Charter Petition's narrative discussion of the proposed educational program.

Ultimately, the description of the proposed educational program is very broad and confusing, using mixed terminology and references that are not successful in conveying a clear depiction of the actual educational program and curriculum to be offered by Odyssey Charter Academy. Materials referenced in the description of the educational program and curriculum and included in the related appendices are not specifically identified as or directly tied to any actual curriculum to be offered at the proposed charter school.

- 2. The lack of a clearly defined description of the educational curriculum program and raises the question whether Odyssey/Expedition and the District could or would have a mutual understanding of the terms, statements, goals and plans in the Charter Petition, and whether Odyssey/Expedition's compliance with the Charter Petition and its obligations thereunder could be determined. The lack of definition and clarity extends to the discussion of measurable pupil outcomes and the methods by which pupil progress in meeting those pupil outcomes would be measured, which are central to the educational soundness of the proposal. Many of the terms, phrases, standards and outcomes set forth in those provisions of the Charter are confusing, undefined, and not subject to clear interpretation or measurement. For example, the outcomes reference the "local geographic area," which is undefined and subject to a variety of interpretations, as well as "most" areas tested and "improvement," neither of which terms are defined nor can they be measured for success.
- 3. The Charter Petition states: "We have created a school that is focused on the student's needs and allows us to bring forward the very best elements of the Montessori program, which we believe will help hundreds of students to thrive and find their voice."

 Thus, this statement indicates that the overriding purpose and educational philosophy to be served at Odyssey is the provision

of the Montessori program to students. Notably, this language is a change from that included in the 1st Charter Petition, which referenced "the very best practices in education today," but did not refer to the Montessori program. Thus, this new statement, with its emphasis on the Montessori program, is interpreted by the District as an intentional statement referencing a recognized and specific educational approach meant to clarify and improve the Charter Petition from its prior version. Nowhere else in the Charter Petition, however, is the term, "Montessori" used, nor is there any description of a "Montessori program" under Elements I, II or III setting forth the educational program and the means of measuring pupil progress.

THE PETITIONERS ARE DEMONSTRABLY UNLIKELY TO SUCCESSFULLY IMPLEMENT THE В. [Education Code Section FORTH IN THE PETITION. PROGRAM SET 47605(b)(2)]

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The above-described concerns regarding the unsoundness of the 1. educational program and the inadequacy of the Charter's description thereof are hereby incorporated herein by this The failure to adequately develop and describe the educational program establishes that the program set forth in the Charter Petition will not be successfully implemented.

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In response to some of the factual findings supporting denial set 2. forth in the proposed resolution of denial for the $1^{\rm st}$ Charter Petition, Odyssey/Expedition did not actually remediate the concerns, but instead simply attempted to delete the provisions For example, the prior resolution included the of concern. following:

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Odyssey has attached its Conflict of Interest Policy as an appendix to the Charter, and it specifically provides that it is being adopted in compliance with the Political Reform Act of 1974 ("PRA," Gov. Code § 87100 et seq.). The Policy itself, however, is not in compliance with the PRA's specific requirements for the contents of an adopted conflict of interest policy. Furthermore, the Policy as

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written by Odyssey/Expedition would violate the because the means of defining a conflict of interest, determining whether a conflict exists, and proceeding in the case of a conflict, are all violative of the PRA's It is particularly troubling that requirements. petitioners have developed and adopted a Conflict of Interest Policy, purportedly in direct response to the requirements of the PRA, but which evidences a complete lack of knowledge and understanding of the PRA and conflict rules governing Odyssey/Expedition. Additionally, while the Charter specifies some types of trainings that will be presented to Expedition's board members, it fails include training on conflicts of interests, which are significant and complicated and which the Charter itself clear Odyssey/Expedition does not understand. Further, Expedition's bylaws reflect conflict generally applicable to nonprofit corporations, but which do not comply with the PRA or Government Code Section 1090, again evidencing a lack of understanding of the special rules that apply to this corporation since it will be operating public charter schools.

Rather than addressing these concerns through revision to its proposed Conflict of Interest Policy, Odyssey/Expedition simply deleted the Conflict of Interest Policy and any reference thereto. Far from causing the District to believe that Odyssey/Expedition now understands and will comply with conflict of interest prohibitions, this deletion had precisely the opposite effect. It appears now that Odyssey/Expedition either does not understand or is unwilling to comply with these important legal requirements and protections for the public benefit. Ironically the Charter now states that the charter board will be trained on conflict prohibitions, though it is entirely unclear of what such training would consist.

3. There is considerable disparity between the proposed budget and the actual establishment of the proposed instructional program and the required training and staff development necessary to implement the program as described.

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- C. THE PETITION DOES NOT CONTAIN REASONABLY COMPREHENSIVE DESCRIPTIONS OF ALL OF THE REQUIRED ELEMENTS. [Education Code Section 47605(b)(5)]
 - The Charter Petition appears to have been "cut and pasted" from a variety of sources, resulting in contradictions and inconsistencies in and between the written content of the Charter Petition and the stated intentions of the petitioners.
 - Some interpretations and references to applicable statutes and 2. legal requirements are inaccurate and used in error, strongly suggesting a lack of clear understanding of the law and Odyssey/Expedition's legal obligations. For example, the Charter references compliance with the "Family and Maternity Leave Act (FMLA)." The FMLA, however, is the Family and Medical Leave Act, and the use of the wrong name causes concern regarding Odyssey/Expedition's understanding of that law and, therefore, its capacity to comply therewith. This mistake was also included in the 1st Charter Petition, but not remediated Odyssey/Expedition's revision process. The District views this as more than simply a typographical error. The FMLA is a highly technical and complex law with which Odyssey/Expedition must comply, and its failure to even know the correct name of the law does not inspire confidence in its ability properly to comply therewith.
 - 3. DESCRIPTION OF THE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM OF THE SCHOOL. [Ed. Code \$47605(b)(5)(A)(i)]
 All of the above-described concerns regarding the unsoundness of the educational program and the inadequacy of the Charter's description thereof are hereby incorporated herein by this reference.
 - DESCRIPTION MEASUREABLE PUPIL OUTCOMES. 4. OF (Ed. Code §47605(b)(5)(B)] Effective January 1, 2013, a charter's description of measurable pupil outcomes that the charter school identifies specifically must include outcomes that address increases in pupil academic achievement both school-wide and for the school's numerically significant pupil subgroups.

§ § 47605(b)(5)(B) and 47607(a)(3)(B).) While the Charter Petition discusses several numerically significant pupil subgroups proposed to be served at Odyssey, the Charter Petition fails to include the required measurable pupil outcomes for those subgroups.

5. DESCRIPTION OF THE GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE. [Ed. Code \$47605(b)(5)(D)]

All of the above-described concerns relating to conflicts of interests are hereby incorporated herein by this reference.

THIRD AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT FCI-SD-22

BY AND BETWEEN

CHILDREN AND FAMILIES COMMISSION OF ORANGE COUNTY

AND

SANTA ANA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

FOR THE PROVISION OF SERVICES

This **THIRD AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT** ("Third Amendment") is entered into as of the 7th day of March, 2012 ("Date of Amendment"), which date is enumerated for the purpose of reference only, by and between the **CHILDREN AND FAMILIES COMMISSION OF ORANGE COUNTY**, a public body and legal public entity ("COMMISSION") and **SANTA ANA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT**, a school district organized and existing under the laws of the State of California ("CONTRACTOR"). The Original Agreement, the First Amendment, the Second Amendment and this Third Amendment are and shall continue to be administered by the Executive Director of COMMISSION or his/her authorized designee ("ADMINISTRATOR").

RECITALS

- A. The COMMISSION and CONTRACTOR previously entered into that certain Agreement for the Provision of Project Services dated June 1, 2011, under which the COMMISSION granted funds for the "Project" described in Exhibits A, A-1 and B therein ("Original Agreement").
- **B.** Pursuant to the Original Agreement, COMMISSION granted to CONTRACTOR funds to further the purposes of and implement COMMISSION's Strategic Plan.
- C. On May 4, 2011, COMMISSION awarded \$425,100 to CONTRACTOR for the period July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2012 (\$175,100 for Early Learning Specialist Services and \$250,000 for School Readiness Nurse Services).
- **D.** On June 1, 2011, COMMISSION awarded \$400,000 for additional School Readiness Services for the period July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2012.
- **E.** On June 1, 2011, COMMISSION awarded an additional \$19,832.23 to CONTRACTOR to provide services implementing the Early Development Index (EDI) project for the period July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2012, and entered into a First Amendment to Agreement.
- **F.** On March 7, 2012, COMMISSION awarded additional funding not to exceed \$1,650,200 for the period July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2014 and entered into a Second Amendment to Agreement (\$350,200 for Early Learning Specialist Services, \$500,000 for School Readiness Nurse Services, and \$800,000 for additional School Readiness Services).
- **G.** On March 7, 2012, COMMISSION authorized a total of \$135,000 to the school districts participating in the EDI project for the period July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013.

- **H.** COMMISSION hereby awards an additional \$13,191 to CONRACTOR in order to provide increased or additional Services for the EDI project for the period July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013, and CONTRACTOR desires to accept the additional funding in order to provide increased or additional services pursuant to the terms and conditions of the Original Agreement, as amended by this Third Amendment. The Original Agreement, the First Amendment, the Second Amendment and this Third Amendment are referred to collectively as the "Agreement."
- **I.** The parties desire by this Third Amendment to amend and restate COMMISSION's Maximum Payment Obligation.
- **J.** The parties desire by this Third Amendment to amend and restate Exhibit B, Project Budget. This restated Exhibit B shall replace the existing Exhibit B in the Original Agreement. A copy of the restated Exhibit B is attached herein and incorporated by reference.
- **K.** Capitalized terms in this Third Amendment are as set forth in the Original Agreement, or as specifically defined herein.
- L. The parties desire by this Third Amendment to set forth certain modifications, and clarifications to the terms and conditions of the Original Agreement.
- **NOW, THEREFORE**, based upon the foregoing Recitals, which are hereby a substantive part of this Third Amendment, and in consideration of the covenants contained herein, COMMISSION and CONTRACTOR hereby agree as follows:
- 1. Maximum Payment Obligation. Additional funding of \$13,191 is provided by COMMISSION to CONTRACTOR by this Third Amendment for a cumulative total of Two Million, Five Hundred Eight Thousand, Three Hundred Twenty Three Dollars and Twenty Three Cents (\$2,508,323.23). Paragraph 16 of the Original Agreement, Maximum Payment Obligation, with respect to CONTRACTOR is hereby amended to read as follows: "The 'Maximum Payment Obligation' of COMMISSION to CONTRACTOR under this Agreement shall be TWO MILLION, FIVE HUNDRED EIGHT THOUSAND, THREE HUNDRED TWENTY THREE DOLLARS AND TWENTY THREE CENTS or the actual reasonable cost incurred and paid for performance of the services whichever is *less*," which amount is the sum of (a) the first allocation of \$425,100 on May 4, 2011, (b) the second allocation of \$400,000 on June 1, 2011, (c) the third allocation of \$19,832.23 on June 1, 2011 for EDI implementation, (d) the fourth allocation of \$1,650,200 on March 7, 2012, (e) and this fifth allocation of \$13,191 on March 7, 2012 for EDI implementation, as specified in the amended and restated Exhibit B to Third Amendment to Agreement attached hereto and fully incorporated herein by this reference.
- **2.** <u>No Other Changes</u>. Except as amended by this Third Amendment, the terms of the Original Agreement, as previously amended by the First Amendment and Second Amendment, shall remain in full force and effect as written and entered into between COMMISSION and CONTRACTOR.

Based on the October 2012 California Longitudinal Pupil Achievement Data System (CALPADS) data submission, the District has an unduplicated percentage of approximately 91% of students who are eligible to receive free and reduced price meals and are English Language Learners. LCFF, if it becomes law, would provide additional revenue to the District that could be utilized to reduce the current structural budget deficit of approximately \$27 million, primarily resulting from the current base revenue limit deficit.

Consultant Agreement

This AGREEMENT is hereby entered into between the **Santa Ana Unified School District**, hereinafter referred to as "DISTRICT," and Leadership Associates, hereinafter referred to as "CONSULTANT."

WHEREAS, DISTRICT is authorized by Section 53060 of the California Government Code to contract with and employ any persons for the furnishing of special services and advice in financial, economic, accounting, engineering, legal or administrative matters, if such persons are specially trained and experienced and competent to perform the special services required;

WHEREAS, CONSULTANT is specially trained and experienced and competent to perform the special services required by the DISTRICT, and such services are needed on a limited basis;

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. Services to be provided by CONSULTANT are described in Attachment A to this AGREEMENT.
- Term. CONSULTANT shall commence providing services under this AGREEMENT on May 8, 2013, and will diligently perform as required and complete performance within an agreed-upon calendar, which shall be incorporated into this document upon agreement.
- 3. <u>Compensation</u>. DISTRICT agrees to pay the CONSULTANT for services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this AGREEMENT at a total fee not to exceed thirty-one thousand five hundred dollars (\$31,500) as described in Attachment B, titled Cost Analysis. Payment is to take place in two increments: (1) \$15,750 upon the close of applications, and (2) \$15,750 upon completion of the search. CONSULTANT will submit invoices to DISTRICT for each of the payment increments.

DISTRICT shall pay CONSULTANT 30 days after receipts of consultant invoice and with approval of a DISTRICT representative.

- 4. <u>Expenses</u>. DISTRICT shall not be liable to CONSULTANT for any costs or expenses paid or incurred by CONSULTANT in performing services for DISTRICT.
- 5. Independent Contractor. CONSULTANT, in the performance of this AGREEMENT, shall be and act as an independent contractor. CONSULTANT understands and agrees that he/she and all his/her employees shall not be considered officers, employees or agents of the DISTRICT, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of the DISTRICT and/or to which District's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Workers' Compensation. CONSULTANT assumes the full responsibility for the acts and/or omissions of his/her employees or agents as they relate to the services to be provided under this AGREEMENT. CONSULTANT shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to CONSULTANT's employees.
- 6. <u>Materials</u>. CONSULTANT shall furnish, at his/her own expense, all labor, materials, equipment, supplies and other items necessary to complete the services to be provided pursuant to this AGREEMENT. CONSULTANT's services will be performed, findings obtained, reports and recommendations prepared in accordance with generally and currently accepted principles and practices of his/her profession.
- 7. <u>Termination</u>. Either party may terminate this AGREEMENT by providing the other party with ten (10) days written notice. Upon such termination, fees will be determined on a pro rata basis.
- 8. <u>Hold Harmless</u>: CONSULTANT agrees to and does hereby indemnify, hold harmless and defend the DISTRICT and its governing board, officers, employees and agents from every claim or demand made and every liability, loss, damage or expense, of any nature whatsoever, which may be incurred by reason of:
 - (a) Liability for damages for (1) death or bodily injury to person. (2) Injury to, loss or theft of property; or (3) any other loss, damage or expense arising out of (1) or (2) above, sustained by the CONSULTANT or any person, firm or corporation employed by the CONSULTANT, either directly or by independent contract, upon or in connection with the services called for in this

- AGREEMENT, however caused, except for liability for damages referred to above which result from the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the DISTRICT or its officers, employees or agents.
- (b) Any injury to or death of any persons, including the DISTRICT or its officers, employees and agents, or damage to or loss of any property caused by any act, neglect, default, or omission of the CONSULTANT, or any person, firm or corporation employed by the CONSULTANT, either directly or by independent contract, arising out of, or in any way connected with, the services covered by this AGREEMENT, whether said injury or damage occurs either on or off DISTRICT's property, except for liability for damages which result from the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the DISTRICT or its officers, employees or agents.
- 9. <u>Insurance</u>. Pursuant to Section 10, CONSULTANT agrees to carry a comprehensive general and automobile liability insurance with limits of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence combined single limit for bodily injury and property damage in a form mutually acceptable to both parties to protect CONSULTANT and DISTRICT against liability or claims of liability, which may arise out of the AGREEMENT.
- 10. <u>Assignment</u>. The obligations of the CONSULTANT pursuant to this AGREEMENT shall not be assigned by the CONSULTANT.
- 11. <u>Compliance with Applicable Laws</u>. The services completed herein must meet the approval of the DISTRICT and shall be subject to the DISTRICT's general right of inspection to secure the satisfactory completion thereof. CONSULTANT agrees to comply with all federal, state and local laws, rules, regulations and ordinances that are now or may in the future become applicable to CONSULTANT, CONSULTANT's business, and personnel engaged in operations covered by this AGREEMENT or accruing out of the performance of such operations.
- 12. <u>Permits/Licenses</u>. CONSULTANT and all CONSULTANT's employees or agents shall secure and maintain in force such permits and licenses as are required by law in connection with the furnishing of services pursuant to this AGREEMENT.

13. <u>Employment with Public Agency</u>. CONSULTANT, if an employee of another public agency, agrees that CONSULTANT will not receive salary or remuneration, other than vacation pay, as an employee of another public agency for the actual time in which services are actually being performed pursuant to this AGREEMENT.

14. Entire Agreement/Amendment. This AGREEMENT, and any exhibits attached hereto, constitute the entire agreement among the parties to it and supersedes any prior or contemporaneous understanding or agreement with respect to the services contemplated, and may be amended only by a written amendment executed by both parties to the AGREEMENT.

15. <u>Affirmative Action Employment/Nondiscrimination</u>. CONSULTANT agrees that it will not engage in unlawful discrimination in employment of persons because of race, color, religious creed, national origin, ancestry, physical handicap, medical condition, marital status, or sex of such persons.

16. <u>Non-waiver</u>. The failure of DISTRICT or CONSULTANT to seek redress for violation of, or to insist upon, the strict performance of any term or condition of this AGREEMENT, shall not be deemed a waiver by that party of such term or condition, or prevent a subsequent similar act from again constituting a violation of such term or condition.

17. Notice. All notices or demands to be given under this AGREEMENT by either party to the other, shall be in writing and given either by: (a) personal service or (b) U.S. Mail, mailed either by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, with postage prepaid. Service shall be considered given when received, if personally served or if mailed, on the third day after deposit in any U.S. Post Office. The address to which notices or demands may be given by either party may be changed by written notice given in accordance with the notice provisions of this section. BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board approval of the Collective Bargaining Agreements with the Santa Ana Educators' Association for the 2012-13 school year. Under the provisions of Government Code Section 3457.5, local educational agencies are required to publicly disclose the provisions of all collective bargaining agreements before entering into a written agreement.

RATIONALE:

Under AB 2756, the school district superintendent and chief business official are required to certify that costs incurred under the collective bargaining agreements can be met during the term of the agreements, along with the corresponding budget reductions.

These agreements culminate a lengthy process that allowed both parties to address many contractual language concerns as listed in the attached agreements.

FUNDING:

General Fund

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve the Collective Bargaining Agreements with the Santa Ana Educators' Association for the 2012-13 school year.



Tentative Agreement Between Santa Ana Unified School District And Santa Ana Educators' Association February 15, 2013

Article I: Duration

- This Collective Bargaining Agreement (CBA) is made and entered into this ______ day of ____, 2013 between the Santa Ana Unified School District, 1601 East Chestnut Avenue, Santa Ana, California, 92701, hereinafter referred to as the "District", and the Santa Ana Educators' Association/CTA/NEA, 2107 North Broadway, Suite 305, Santa Ana, California, 92706, hereinafter referred to as the "Association".
- 1.2 The term of this Agreement is for **one (1)** three (3) years commencing July 1, 2010 2012 and terminating June 30, 2013. This agreement shall be entered into upon ratification by the Association and the District. and shall become effective July 1, 2010.
- 1.5 Upon ratification of the 2010 2013 Collective Bargaining Agreement (CBA), but no later than October 1, 2011 each party shall present proposals for reopeners on Article VII: Wages and Wage Provisions; Article V: Evaluation Procedures; Article VIII: Hours of Work; Article XV: Benefits; and Article XXVI: Special Services. In addition, the District and the Association will submit proposals to clean-up and update the CBA.
- 1.6 No later than May 31, April 1, 2013 each party shall present proposals for a successor agreement.

Article V: Evaluation

- 5.1.1 D. Task-Oriented unit members shall submit the Task-Oriented Evaluation Plan (Appendix D). The task-oriented unit member and the evaluator shall meet and agree upon three (3) objectives based upon the unit member's job description and/or the professional standards for that unit member's area of specialty.
- 5.1.2 H. Permanent Task-Oriented unit members with at least ten (10) years of District service who meet standards in three (3) objective areas may be evaluated every five (5) years, per Ed. Code 44664. The Task-Oriented unit member or evaluator shall be permitted to rescind this voluntary agreement and return to the evaluation process outlined in the CBA Article 5.1.1 D prior to November 30th of that school year.
- 5.1.3 The unit member being evaluated and the evaluator shall select observation times, dates, conferences, and final evaluation dates. Task-Oriented unit members being evaluated and the evaluator shall select mutually agreed upon meeting dates and times to review progress toward agreed upon objectives in the evaluation plan.
- 5.4.2 A. In preparing the Evaluation Form for placement in a Task-Oriented unit member's personnel file, the evaluator shall rely primarily upon observations of, and evidence collected by, the Task-Oriented unit member. Any deficiencies that may have been brought to the attention of the Task-

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Oriented unit member and subsequently corrected shall not be included in the final evaluation. Commendation for growth demonstrated by the Task-Oriented unit member shall be included.

5.5.3 Source of Evaluative Data – No information or material gathered from sources other than formal classroom observations shall be utilized in a formal observation of evaluation. Task-Oriented unit members are exempt from this provision. Disciplinary memos/notes/actions shall not be used in the Evaluation Form or process except for actions shall not be used in the Evaluation Form or process except for actions related to the element(s) of Standard 6: Develops as a Professional Educator.

Article VIII: Hours of Work

- 8.1.4 The specific dates of Open House, Back to School Night, and parent conferences shall be determined by the District Joint-Calendar Committee. Alterations of these dates may be made by sites with mutual agreement between administration and a majority of site-assigned unit members. The site administration shall notify the District in writing no less than 20 duty days prior to the changes. The District shall, on a timely basis, forward a copy of all changes to the Association.
- 8.2.3 The instructional day for unit members shall conform with the required minutes provided in Education Code, Section 46201. Additional minutes per year (listed in the chart below by level) shall be used as provided for in 8.2.3 B, and 8.2.3 E and 8.2.3 F and any minute not used for these purposes shall be automatically used for instruction:

GRADES 1, 2, 3, 4, AND 5: 1200 MINUTES PER YEAR GRADES 6, 7, AND 8: 2000 MINUTES PER YEAR GRADES 9, 10, 11, AND 12: 300 MINUTES PER YEAR

8.2.3 E. Elementary and Intermediate schools shall have one modified day per week which shall be used for staff/faculty meetings, department meetings, grade level meetings, collaboration professional learning communities, staff development activities, inservices, and curriculum meetings. Two (2) meetings per month shall be administratively driven, and shall be limited to no more than one (1) hour per meeting. The remaining collaboration meetings shall be directed by classroom teachers, and shall be limited to no more than one (1) hour per meeting. Staff development, in-services, curriculum meetings, or other called meetings in addition to those listed above shall be paid at their appropriate factors as listed in Article VII of this CBA.

F. Kinder Equity Model

- Four days per week (Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday) shall have 307 minutes of student contact where the teacher is not with all students for greater than 207 minutes. Wednesdays shall have 280 minutes of student contact where the teacher is not with all the enrolled students for greater than 180 minutes. The total annual instructional minutes shall be 36,018.
- Kinder teachers shall participate in Wednesday modified days which shall be used for staff/faculty meetings, department meetings, grade level meetings, collaboration, professional learning communities, staff development activities, in-services, and/or curriculum meetings. Administratively called meetings on modified Wednesdays shall be

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limited to no more than an hour per meeting, and be limited to no more than two administratively called meetings per month.

- Early-bird/Late-bird shall be the default Kinder instructional model.
 Teachers shall be permitted to utilize the AM/PM instructional Kinder model according to the following criteria:
 - a. Both teachers agree to sign the AM/PM Kinder agreement.
 - The AM/PM Kinder agreement is provided to the site administrator prior to the beginning of the school year.
- Daily physical education instruction shall occur for 20 minutes per day during the instructional time when all students are present.
- The professional duty day shall begin when the student instructional day begins, and the Kinder teacher's required time at the school facility shall be completed when the Kinder instructional day ends.
- On regular days, each Kinder teacher shall be provided with a fifteen (15)
 minute duty-free recess and a minimum of a 30 minute duty-free lunch.
 On modified days, the duty free recess will be 10 minutes.
- Each year SAEA and the District will agree upon the bell schedule for regular and modified days.
- 8. This Kinder Equity Model program shall be reviewed each semester by SAEA and the District.
- 9. The daily schedule may be modified by joint agreement between site administration, Kinder teachers at the site, and SAEA if the following applies:
 - a. Site has bussing schedules.
 - Site does not provide lunch to Kinder students.
 - c. Site has insufficient classrooms for the Early/Late-bird model.
 - d. On modified days only, the difference between the end of school day for Kinder and Grades 1-5 is more than fifteen (15) minutes.
- 8.2.8 A. Unless otherwise directed or approved, on in-services, staff development, or other duty days when assigned students are not in attendance, unit members shall be expected to report to their work assignment(s) or their assigned location(s) no later than when they would report if regular classes were in session with assigned students.
- 8.3.1 Reasonableness shall prevail in calling required meetings and extending meetings (including Department meetings) beyond one hour after the end of the instructional day for the majority of unit members on that site. Whenever possible, Reasonable efforts will be made to end meetings and activities involving unit members before dark.
- 8.3.4 As of July 1, 2013, Regular General Education- Fourth and fifth grade Kindergarten through fifth (K-5) grade teachers and sixth-eighth (6-8) teachers working at Kinder

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through sixth (K-6) and Kinder through eighth (K-8) schools with no preparation periods shall be provided two (2) an on-site release days per school year each trimester for report card preparation, parent-teacher conferences, or preparation for their academic program. Up to one-half (0.5) of one (1) of these two (2) release days shall be used for teachers to individually identify at-risk students and complete Academic Improvement Plans to identify specific interventions. The schedule for release days shall be determined by the principal and teachers involved with the approval of the site administrator.

- 8.3.5 The utilization of new instructional models shall not be required of unit members assigned to special education positions until the District has provided appropriate training regarding the use of such models and necessary materials. (Move to Article XXVI Special Services)
- 8.4.3 For the 2011-2012 school year: one-half (.5) professional development day shall occur on Thursday, August 18, 2011; one (1) professional development day shall occur on Friday, August 19, 2011; and one (1) professional development day shall occur on Monday, August 22, 2011. Beginning with the 2012-2013 school year, the Pprofessional development days shall be scheduled on an annual basis by the Joint-Calendar Committee as described in Article 8.1.2.

Article XV: Employee Benefits

15.5.3 Employee and retiree tenthly contributions shall be based on the three tiered rates (employee/retiree, two-party, and family) as follows (except during the collective bargaining process as referenced in 15.5.6A4b) effective July 1, 2013:

15.5.7 The benefit plans provided during retirement will be the same as, or comparable to, those provided to active employees at the same time excluding life insurance, as is set forth in IN 6.2 and Appendix F. The Health Benefits Authority (HBA) shall determine comparability. Retirees eligible for benefits shall sign the retiree benefits agreement with the District attached as Appendix G.

Article XXVI: Special Services

The utilization of new instructional models shall not be required of unit members assigned to special education positions until the District has provided appropriate training regarding the use of such models and necessary materials.

IN 6.2.2 The benefits provided during retirement will be the same as, **or comparable to**, **those** provided to active employees at that same time (excluding life insurance) (i.e., benefits provided retirees on May 3, 2002 shall be the same benefits provided active employees on May 3, 2002). **The Health Benefits Authority (HBA) shall determine comparability.**

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This agreement shall be entered into upon the ratification by the Association and approved by the SAUSD Board of Education.

	In 2012-13 the District provides three release days to four hundred and three teachers (Kindergarten, fourth and fifth grades). The substitute cost per day is approximately \$121.18 including statutory benefits. Thus, the total substitute cost is estimated at \$146,507. This amount is currently budgeted. The tentative agreement between the SAUSD and the SAEA dated February 15, 2013 section 8.3.4 provides two release days to eight hundred and seventy-one teachers (Kindergarten through eight grades) effective July 1, 2013 and it's ongoing. The total substitute cost is estimated at \$211,096. This AB1200 shows the increase substitute cost of approximately \$64,589 effective July 1, 2013 and the out years. The MYPs at second interim includes this cost increase.

SAEA contract language also stipulates that if the increases are not addressed in the HBA, the District and SAEA Members will share the 50% increase retroactive. The projected cost increase is approximately \$209,399, however, the District broker suggest that the renewal cost on Blue Shield PPO and HMO would be furtherly reduced. The MYPs at second interim includes a three percent increase in the Health & Welfare cost for 2013-14 which is enough to cover this projected cost increase.

- 7.5.2 For **the 2012 2013** school year, 2011–2012 the teachers' work year calendar shall be 185.5 days (180 instructional days, 3 duty days, 2.5 professional development days) and psychologists' work year calendar shall be 188 days.
- 7.5.3 Beginning in 2001-2002 the psychologists' salary schedule shall be modified so that Step 11 is reached during year 11 of eligible service and Step 16 is reached during year 16 of eligibility service.
- 7.5.43 Salary schedule shall reflect Class I (credential); Class II (BA + 24 units); Class III (BA + 45 units); and Class IV (Master/*Doctorate).
 *Doctorate receives an additional 1% of their step and column.
 (Appendix A attached)
- 7.5.54 An ROP Salary Study Committee shall be convened with the purpose of creating a salary schedule for ROP teachers which will be incorporated into this Agreement if ratified. The Committee will consist of four (4) members appointed by the Association and four (4) members appointed by the District.
- 7.5.65 Part-Time Employment Unit members employed on a part-time basis shall be paid in accordance with Education Code 45025.
- 7.5.76 Extended Work Year Unit members whose regular assignment is extended beyond their normal work year shall be paid for the additional days at their regular daily rate and shall be credited with additional sick leave as indicated in 8.1.5.

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- 7.6.1 Unless otherwise set forth, Extra Service Assignments shall be remunerated based on the product of the assigned factor times Class II, Step 5 of the regular salary schedule. All remuneration which is based on a percentage of a salary schedule step will be rounded off to the nearest dollar, except for the Hourly Rate Factors of **7.6.8 7.7.8**.
- 7.6.3 Department Chairperson (basis of Class II, Step 5)
 - A. Department Chairpersons shall be remunerated based upon the number of classes with their departments, and the group to which they are assigned, as set forth below:

1. Any Department Chairperson serving since 1981-1982 whose factor has been retrogressed because of the new ranking of job responsibilities shall continue with the 1981-1982 rate of pay until the current factor results in an increase.

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- 2. Unit members serving as department chairs in 1987-88 and who continue in that position shall continue to be remunerated as appropriate at factor E or F.
- 3. High school librarians shall be given stipends at the 1-6 level.
- B. Effective July 1, 2009, the principal shall designate a Lead Counselor at each Secondary School (excluding alternative education schools). A job description for the Lead Counselor shall be implemented by June 30, 2009.
 - 1. Lead counselors at the high schools shall receive a \$2,000 annual stipend.
 - 2. Lead counselors at the intermediate schools shall receive a \$1,000 annual stipend.

7.6.8 Hourly Rate Factors

- G. Summer School Summer School teachers shall be paid at the rate of hourly Factor D for the time of assigned duties on site times (multiplied by) their placement on the teacher's salary schedule as of June 1 preceding the assignment. Summer School extra-service assignments shall be paid at the rate of hourly Factor D on the teacher's salary schedule in effect June 1 preceding the assignment. Special Education Extended School Year (ESY) shall be paid at the same rate as regular summer school, except as listed under 7.6.8.G1.
 - 1. Beginning in the 2010 2011 school year and continuing through the 2014 - 2015 school year the following compensation rates shall be in effect: Teachers placed on the teacher's salary schedule in Class I as of June 1 preceding the assignment shall be paid an hourly rate Factor C (.000765 multiplied by Class II, Step 5 of the salary schedule); Teachers placed on the teacher's salary schedule in Class II as of June 1 preceding the assignment shall be paid an hourly rate Factor D (.000833 multiplied by Class II, Step 5 of the salary schedule); Teachers placed on the teacher's salary schedule in Class III as of June 1 preceding the assignment shall be paid an hourly rate Factor E (.000905 multiplied by Class II, Step 5 of the salary schedule): Teachers placed on the teacher's salary schedule in Class IV as of June 1 preceding the assignment shall be paid an hourly rate Factor F (.000975 multiplied by Class II, Step 5 of the salary schedule). Beginning the 2015 - 2016 school year, summer school wages shall return to the levels listed under article 7.6.8.G of the 2008 - 2010 CBA.

Settlement of all pending disputes between SAEA and SAUSD regarding summer school pay for the 2008 school year; SAUSD agrees to pay teachers who held a summer school/ESY assignment, during any of the years in dispute, thirty (30) minutes of pay at the hourly rate which they were paid for summer school per day worked in a summer school assignment to be paid no later than June 30, 2011.

Settlement of all pending disputes between SAEA and SAUSD regarding summer school pay for the 2009 school year; SAUSD agrees to pay teachers who held a summer school/ESY assignment, during any of the years in dispute, thirty (30) minutes of pay at the hourly rate which they were paid for summer school per day worked in a summer school assignment to be paid no later than June 30, 2011.

Settlement of all pending disputes between SAEA and SAUSD regarding summer school pay for the 2010 school year; SAUSD agrees to pay teachers who held a summer school/ESY assignment, during any of the years in dispute, thirty (30) minutes of pay at the hourly rate which they were paid for summer school per day worked in a summer school assignment to be paid no later than June 30, 2011.

Article VIII: Hours of Work

8.1 Work Year

8.1.3 Change of Calendar

- A. When the staff of a specific site or the District wishes to implement a calendar change to a different District-approved calendar, the following shall occur:
 - 1. Representatives of all employees unit members at a site and the administration shall analyze the impact of the proposed changes and develop written pros and cons.

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- 2. All employees unit members shall be presented the analysis and the pros and cons and given an opportunity to discuss and offer input.
- 3. A secret ballot (prepared by the District and the Association) vote shall be conducted among employees at a site.
- 4. District and Association representatives shall count the ballots. If 70% + 1 of the staff vote to change the calendar, the results of this vote and the parent input shall be submitted to Cabinet for review and considerations for approval.
- 5. If the Cabinet approves the site request to change the calendar, it shall be recommended to the Board for approval.
- 6. Parents shall be provided the same information and opportunity as stated in 8.1.3-A-1 through 8.1.3-A-3 above.
- 7. If the calendar changes are approved, transfer priority shall be given to unit members who will be adversely affected.

Article XI: Transfer/Reassignment Provisions

11.6 Reassignment: Unit Member-Initiated

- As openings occur at each site, they shall be made known to all unit members of the site. Notification shall be made electronically, through District mail, or by U.S. mail. Unit members off cycle, on summer recess, or on leave of absence shall provide stamped self-addressed envelopes if they want to be notified of openings by U.S. mail. The opening notice shall include the position, level or subject matter of assignment, special credential if applicable, or other pertinent needs or requirements, and the closing date of such position which shall be a minimum of five (5) duty days after the initial posting date of the opening.
 - A. Between April 15 and the first day of instruction, three (3) calendar days initial posting at each site shall take place. All site unit members shall be noticed of openings both electronically and by hard copy. Unit members may apply for the vacancy subject to the provisions of 11.6.3.

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- 11.7 Reassignment: District-Initiated
- 11.7.1 Prior to making a District-initiated assignment caused by declining enrollment, enrollment shifts, or budgetary considerations, the District shall seek qualified volunteers at the site including an attempt to notify those off cycle and those on leave of absence. In the event District-initiated reassignments must be made, they shall not be made arbitrarily or capriciously.
- 11.8 Transfer: Unit Member-Initiated Transfer
- 11.8.2 Requesting a Transfer Unit members may request a transfer under the following procedures:
 - A. Unit members may apply for a transfer to any specific vacancy for which they are qualified during the time the vacancy is posted.
 - B. Unit member-initiated transfers shall be reviewed and a decision made prior to filling vacancies.
 - C. If a vacancy occurs during the school year after the first semester or second trimester, and a unit member is selected to transfer to the assignment, such transfer may occur during the school year if both principals and the transferee agree. If both principals do not agree, the selected unit member shall transfer at the end of the school year.
 - D. Unit members may file an on-line request to receive **electronic** notifications of open transfer positions at any number of sites within the District at any time. The unit member is free to apply for any of these transfer positions.
 - E. Permanent unit members requesting to transfer shall be considered between the first day of instruction and April 15, if qualified, prior to considering new hires, per Education Code 35036(b).
- 11.8.5 Unit members on other than **not on a** traditional calendar shall be on a twelve (12) month pay schedule.
- 11.9 Transfer: District-Initiated Transfers
- 11.9.1 District-Initiated transfer caused by declining enrollment, enrollment shifts, or budgetary considerations shall be determined as follows:
 - A. Prior to initiating a District-initiated transfer, the District shall seek appropriate volunteers from within the site or department.

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B. All other factors from 11.8.3 **A, B and C** being equal, the unit member who has the least seniority within the department or site from which a transfer must take place shall be transferred first.

1. In the event of a tie, an impartial drawing shall take place to determine the unit member whom will be transferred.

- C. Unit members subject to transfer under this section shall receive priority over unit member-initiated transfer for existing vacant positions for which they are qualified.
- D. Unit members shall not be subject to a District-initiated transfer more than once during a school year. (NOTE: Applies to transfers for declining enrollment, enrollment shifts, or budgetary considerations.)
- District-initiated transfers caused by curricular modifications, and/or other educationally-related needs of the District, and/or affected schools, may be recommended at any time. Such transfers shall not be arbitrary or capricious. and in making such transfers the Districtinitiated transfers shall refer to the criteria in 11.8.3.
- 11.9.3 A District-initiated transfer shall not result in loss of annual contract salary or any health and welfare benefits negotiated in this Agreement.
- 11.9.4 Unit members transferred under 11.9.1 above shall be given priority consideration over other unit member-initiated transfers to be returned to the original school site when a vacancy is available for which they are qualified and for which they apply.

11.10 General Provisions

- 11.10.1 No emergency-credentialed persons shall be hired by the District until all-credentialed unit members have had an opportunity to apply for a vacancy.
- All transfers and reassignments shall occur in accordance with the provisions of this Article and the California Education Code.
- Displaced unit members and/or District-initiated reassignments (subject to the provision of 11.7.1) shall not be interviewed.

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Article XII: Safety Conditions

- 12.3.2 School nurses and SDC teachers (including but not limited to: infant, preschool, SH, OH, SED, and adult transition) shall be given the option of receiving the Hepatitis B vaccine at District expense as a prevention of Hepatitis B through reasonable anticipated blood-borne exposure. If other unit members reasonably believe that their required job duties include potential for occupational exposure, they shall be given the option of receiving Hepatitis B at District expense.
- 12.4.2 A teacher may suspend any pupil from the teacher's class, per Education Code 48910 and/or Board Policy 5119, for the day of the suspension and the day following.
- C. The pupil shall not be returned to the class from which he/she was suspended during the period of the suspension without the concurrence of the teacher of the class and the principal **or designee**.

Article XIII: Provisions to the Governing Board

- 13.2 In addition to its statutory reserve rights, the District also retains within its sole discretion all rights and powers not expressly limited by the clear and explicit language of this Agreement, including but not limited to the exclusive right and power to determine, implement, supplement, change, modify or discontinue, in whole or part, temporarily or permanently, any of the following:
 - 13.2.1 Staffing patterns.
 - The administration of all employee health and benefit plans, including the selection of all carriers of health and benefit plans, and including the manner and sources methods of funding such plans.

Article XVI: Summer School

- 16.2 Summer school personnel shall be limited to unit members currently employed in the District. Unit members submitting resignations to be effective at the end of a school year will be eligible for summer school employment for the summer immediately following the end of that school year. If fully credentialed unit members are not available from the unit, the District has the discretion to employ non-credentialed unit members and then teachers from outside the District.
- 16.2.1 Traditional School Teacher Selection Procedure
 - A. A listing of all tentative position openings for summer school teachers will be adequately publicized by the office of Human

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Resources by posting such positions in all schools within ten (10) duty days after the date of Board approval of a summer school program.

- B. Unit member's applications will be submitted within ten (10) duty days of the date of the posting of the summer school positions; tentative selection and notification of candidates shall occur within fifteen (15) duty days of the close of applications, but no later than five (5) calendar days before the end of the school year.
- C. Priority consideration for summer school assignments shall be given to unit members fully credentialed/certified for the summer school assignment.
- D. The following criteria shall be used for selection of summer school/intersession teachers:
 - 1. Appropriate credential/certification
 - 2. Legal requirements
 - 3. Experience within the last five years teaching in methods, techniques, or programs as publicized in the tentative position openings for a specific site.
 - 4. Subject area experience
 - 5. Grade-level experience
 - 6. Educationally-related needs of the District and/or schools as publicized in the tentative position openings for a specific site
- E. Where two (2) or more qualified unit members apply for the same position, seniority in the District shall govern.
- F. The District shall not be arbitrary, capricious, or unreasonable with respect to summer school intersession assignments.
- G. For elementary traditional summer school, priority shall be given to unit members regularly assigned to the summer school site.
- H. Elementary unit members regularly assigned to sites that do not offer summer school/intersession shall be placed in the

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- eligibility pool at the school where summer school students from their home site are assigned.
- I. Prior summer school/intersession assignments will decrease priority selections after two (2) consecutive years of summer school intersession service.
- J. Teachers who accept assignments and then choose not to work will be considered as if they did work. Teachers who only teach one class or one intersession (except by choice) will be counted as one-half year worked.
- K. If a teacher applies for both regular summer school and driver training in summer school, he/she must choose one or the other. In the event of a shortage of driver training teachers for summer school, he/she may elect to do both.
- The extended year programs of ROP, Special Schools, Phoenix House, Migrant Education, Independent Study, and the summer school and/or intersession program of Special Education are not subject to this Article.

Article XIX: Personnel File

- 19.2 The materials referred to in the foregoing statement (19.1 above) are not to include ratings, reports or records which:
 - A. (a) were obtained prior to the employment of the person involved;
 - **B.** (b) were prepared by identifiable examination committee members;
 - **C**. or (c) were obtained in connection with a promotional examination.
- 19.3 Every unit member shall have the right to inspect such materials upon request, provided that the request to inspect such materials is made at a time when such person is not actually required to render service to the District. **Unit members may have copies made at the employee's expense.**

Article XX: Peer Assistance and Review (PAR)

20.1 The Santa Ana Educators' Association and the Santa Ana Unified School District are continuously striving to provide the highest possible quality of education. Therefore, the parties agree to cooperate in the design and implementation of programs to improve the quality of instruction through Peer Assistance and Review (PAR). Teachers referred to, or who volunteer

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for, the programs are viewed as professionals who deserve to have resources available provided to them in the interest of improving performance to a successful standard.

20.1.1 Time Lines

- A. The parties agree to meet and modify the time lines of this provision as necessary and mutually agreed to.
- B. The Peer Assistance and Review Program shall be implemented July 1, 2000.
- C. The PAR program shall begin for a referred participating teacher at the beginning of his/her next school year (September for traditional schools).
- D. In its inaugural year, the Each year, Peer Review Panel (Panel)
 Members shall be appointed no later than August 1, 2000.
 Thereafter, joint panel members shall be appointed no later than October 1st.
- E. All application materials for potential Consulting Teachers shall be turned in to the District office on or before December 1 for consideration for the next school year.
- F. The Consulting Teacher shall issue to the Panel a final report in the assistance and review year not later than 35 duty days before the end of the Referral Participating Teachers' instructional year.
- G. The Panel shall by majority vote select Consulting Teachers. no later than May 1.
- H. The Panel shall send a list of Consulting Teachers to each Referred Participating Teacher. by May 17.
- I. Evaluators shall refer Participating Teachers to the Panel. by May 15.
- J. The Referred Participating Teacher shall submit his or her Consulting Teacher preferences. by May 20.
- K. The Panel shall assign each Referred Participating Teacher a Consulting Teacher. by May 25.

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L. The Panel shall review applications of voluntary permanent teachers and approve their participation in the PAR Program or refer them to other appropriate District programs.

20.1.2 Peer Review Panel

- The Peer Review Panel shall consist of seven (7) members, four A. (4) of whom shall be certificated classroom teachers who are chosen to serve by the Association SAEA President. They shall possess equal or greater qualifications than Consulting Teachers and shall represent elementary (2), intermediate (1), and high school (1) levels. The District shall choose the three (3) administrators on the Panel. Initially, two (2) classroom teacher Panel Members shall serve three (3) years; the other two (2) for two (2) years, and thereafter All terms are to be two (2) years. In the event of an absence or a resignation of a classroom teacher from the Panel, the Association SAEA President may immediately appoint an alternate. Members may not serve for more than two (2) consecutive terms. Less than 75% of a term served as a result of a resignation or absence shall not be part of the two (2) consecutive terms.
- B. The Panel shall establish its own meeting schedule. To form a quorum, a majority of the Panel Members present shall be SAEA-appointed classroom teachers and there shall be at least one administrator. Such meetings shall take place outside the duty day. SAEA PAR Panel members shall receive \$200 for each meeting attended. Members of the Panel shall be released from their regular duties to receive training subject to the approval of the Associate Superintendent, Human Resources or designee without loss of pay or benefits. The parties agree to evaluate this process and pay arrangement on an annual basis and make adjustments accordingly to meet the needs of the PAR Program and Panel members.
- C. Panel members shall be reimbursed for reasonable and necessary mileage expenses directly related to the performance of Panel duties utilizing the established mileage rate of the District.
- D. Panel members shall be reimbursed for reasonable and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties directly related to the PAR Program.

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- E. The Peer Review Panel shall be responsible for the following:
 - 1. Participating in annual training for Panel members.
 - 2. Establishing its own Rules of and Procedures for effectuating the provisions of this Article. Said rules and procedures shall be consistent with the provisions of the Agreement, and to the extent that there is an inconsistency, the Agreement and ultimately the law shall prevail. Based upon legislative modification or deletion of PAR, the Association and the District agree to renegotiate the PAR Program. (moved to #13)
 - 3. Selecting the panel of Consulting Teachers.
 - 4. Developing and providing in-service training for Panel members and Consulting Teachers shall be done jointly by the Association and the District.
 - 5. Notifying in writing the Referred Participating Teacher, Consulting Teacher, and site principal of their participation in the PAR Program.
 - 6. Making available the list of the panel of Consulting Teachers to the Participating Teacher.
 - 7. Sending a copy of the adopted Rules and Procedures to any bargaining unit member or administrator upon request.
 - 8. Establishing a procedure for application as a Consulting Teacher.
 - 9. Determining the number of Consulting Teachers in any school year, based upon participation in PAR Program, the budget available, and other relevant considerations.
 - 10. Make recommendations to the Governing Board through the Superintendent no later than May regarding referred participants in the program including forwarding the names of teachers who, after one (1) year of sustained assistance, have not demonstrated satisfactory performance. The Panel based upon extenuating circumstances may recommend to the Board of Education through the Superintendent an extension of this period of time.

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- 11. Evaluating annually the impact of the PAR program in order to improve the program and remit a written Report of their findings to the Board and Association.
- **11.** 12. Developing all Application Forms for the Consulting Teachers and Voluntary Participating Teachers.
- **12.** 13. Developing all Consulting Teacher and Peer Review Panel Report Forms.
- 13. Based upon legislative modification or deletion of PAR, the Association and the District agree to renegotiate the PAR Program.
- F. All panel proceedings and material related to personal matters shall be confidential. Conversations and supporting data collected/generated by the Consulting Teacher shall not be used in the evaluator's final evaluation of the Referred Participating Teacher.
- G. Panel Members and Consulting Teachers shall be provided the same liability coverage contained in the Education Code and Government Code as provided administrators and others acting on behalf of the District. This includes District-paid legal defense and settlement awards, if any. If a conflict of interest exists between the Panel Member or Consulting Teacher and the District, the Panel Member or Consulting Teacher may select his/her own attorney. The District shall pay reasonable and necessary legal costs and fees in such actions.
- H. Members of the Panel shall be provided reasonable release time for performing duties which require them to visit classrooms and/or for in-service training. If in-service training takes place outside of work hours, these teachers shall be paid their daily or prorated per diem rate of pay.
- I. Functions performed pursuant to the Article by bargaining unit employees shall not constitute either management or supervisory functions.

20.1.3 Participating Teachers

A. Permanent classroom teachers, who receive an unsatisfactory evaluation, shall be referred to and shall participate in the Peer Assistance and Review Program. For the purposes of this Article, an unsatisfactory evaluation is defined as three (3) or

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more boxes checked in column elements marked "below standard" within a single standard 3 (unsatisfactory) for sections 1.0 – 4.0 of the current evaluation form.

- B. Other permanent classroom teachers may volunteer at any time to participate. Participation by a Volunteer Participating Teacher shall be kept confidential except on a needs-to-know basis. A Volunteer Participating Teacher may discontinue his or her participation in this program at any time. A Volunteer Participating Teacher's participation is for peer assistance only and shall not continue for more than one school year or the balance thereof. The Consulting Teacher shall not participate in the evaluation of the Volunteer Participating Teacher. The Panel shall review Volunteer Participating Teacher applications to approve participating in the Program or refer them to the District for consideration to participate in another District-approved program.
- C. A Referred Participating Teacher may prioritize up to three Consulting Teacher choices from a panel of available Consulting Teachers. The Panel shall assign a Consulting Teacher from this list in the order of the Referred Participating Teacher preference as the Consulting Teacher selections are available. The Referred Participating Teacher may appeal to the Panel for a different Consulting Teacher.
- D. The Referred Participating Teacher has the right to be represented at all formal conferences and meetings.
- E. All Participating Teachers shall receive up to \$250 reimbursement for instructional supplies and materials for participation in the Program with the concurrence of the Consulting Teacher.

Article XXI: Contract Waiver

- 21.2 Waiver proposals with an accompanying ballot and balloting procedure must be approved by the Association and the District.
- 21.2.1 The balloting procedure must provide for the following provisions:
 - A. Site Name
 - B. Secret Ballots
 - C. Neutral Ballot Counting

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- D. Secure Ballot Storage
- E. On and Off Track Voting Off Site Voting
- F. Vacancy Notice Advertisements

Article XXII: Miscellaneous Provisions

22.1 Within thirty (30) duty days of ratification of the Agreement by both parties herein, the District shall have sufficient copies of the CBA prepared and delivered to the sites (i.e. copies for the Principal, SAEA site representatives, and office manager). for distribution to each unit member in the District. The cost shall be equally shared by the District and the Association. The CBA shall be made available on the District's web site.

22.5 Application

- The District and the Association shall apply the provisions of this Agreement (CBA) to all unit members without regard to race, color, creed, age, national origin, gender, disability, sexual orientation, political affiliation, marital status, primary language, exercise of rights provided by this Agreement, and/or membership and/or participation in activities of the Association unless authorized by a provision of this Agreement (CBA).
- 22.5.2 Alleged violations of 22.5.1 may be challenged pursuant to the Grievance Procedure (Article VI) or pursuant to the complaint procedures established by State and Federal agencies, such as DFEH or EEOC.
- Unit members alleging violations under 22.5.1 above must elect to pursue their claim(s) pursuant to the Arbitration procedures outlined in the CBA or pursuant to the complaint procedures established by State and Federal agencies, such as DFEH or EEOC, but not both.

Article XXIII: Retired Teachers

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board approval of the Collective Bargaining Agreement with the California School Employees Association, Chapter 41 for the 2012-13 school year. Under the provisions of Government Code Section 3457.5, local educational agencies are required to publicly disclose the provisions of all collective bargaining agreement before entering into a written agreement.

RATIONALE:

Under AB 2756, the school district superintendent and chief business official are required to certify that costs incurred under the collective bargaining agreement can be met during the term of the agreement, along with the corresponding budget reductions.

This agreement culminates a lengthy process that allowed both parties to address many contractual language concerns as listed in the attached agreement.

FUNDING:

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve the Collective Bargaining Agreement with the California School Employees Association, Chapter 41 for the 2012-13 school year.



Tentative Agreement Between

Santa Ana Unified School District and California School Employees Association (CSEA)

and its Chapter 41

April 10, 2013

Text in italics will not be integrated into the Collective Bargaining Agreement.

11.0 EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

- 11.3.7 All bargaining unit members who receive SAUSD paid health and welfare benefits shall not be entitled to dual coverage. If a spouse and/or registered domestic partner are both employed by SAUSD and receive SAUSD paid benefits, only one party shall be entitled to benefits including either one party, two-party, or family coverage. Said change shall not affect the level of benefits received or the SAUSD contribution level.
- 11.3.7 When two unit members are legally married and/or domestic partners and both are employees of the District and both are eligible for health/dental benefits; one unit member will pay the appropriate rate (two-party, or family). The other unit member shall be covered on the spouse's health/dental benefits plan and shall receive an Employer Funded Flex Account of \$500 per year to be utilized to cover out of pocket medical/dental expenses.
 - Couples lost duel coverage in 2008.

11.5 HEALTH INSURANCE COMMITTEE

- 11.5.1 A joint committee has been established to study and review benefit programs.
- 11.5.2 The Health Benefits Committee shall obtain bids for health and welfare benefits beginning with the 2003-04 school year from providers including a provider of CSEA's choice.
- **This item will not be added to the CBA and is only included as part of the Tentative Agreement and subsequent benefits' documents.**

Beginning July 1, 2012 the following plan design changes will be implemented:

* <u>Drop the stand alone Employee Assistance Plan (EAP) through Optum Health.</u> (approx. \$42,000 annual savings)

Page 1 of 7

- o Current EAP Program:
 - Provided by Optum Health
 - Includes 5 face-to-face sessions and unlimited telephonic sessions
 - Current rate of \$3.56 per employee per month (approx. \$42k annually)
- New EAP Program (effective 7/1/13):
 - Provided by Blue Shield of California
 - Includes 3 face-to-face sessions and unlimited telephonic sessions
 - Cost included with medical plan (no additional cost for program)
- <u>Unit members pay the difference between Dispense as Written (DAW) and/or patient requested brands versus generic.</u>

(approx. \$47,500 annual savings)

- When a brand name drug is dispensed and a generic equivalent is available, members pay the difference in cost between the brand and generic drugs.
- Applies to both situations when:
 - The doctor requests the brand when a generic is available
 - The patient elects to receive the brand name over the generic
- O Generic drugs cost on average six times less than the brand drug
- Implement a Preferred Drug Step Therapy Protocol.

(approx. \$26,000 annual savings)

- Promote generic and preferred brand medications as first-line therapy to increase generic utilization, enhance plan savings, and improve formulary compliance.
- Targets high-cost drug categories where the drugs are considered to be interchangeable
- o Categories:
 - Proton Pump Inhibitors, Osteoporosis, Hypnotics, Migraine Therapies, Angiotensin Receptor Blockers, Glaucoma, Corticosteroid Inhalers, Combo Corticosteroid Inhalers and Intranasal Steroids
- Requires members taking one of the targeted brands to try and fail the generic or preferred-brand before the targeted brand will be covered
- Unless the physician provides clinical support for the targeted drug via a coverage review process
- 11.5.1 A Health Benefit Authority (HBA) shall be established to make decisions regarding:
 - A. medical insurance
 - B. dental insurance
 - C. vision insurance

- D. mental health insurance
- E. life insurance
- F. retiree insurance
- G. carriers/providers
- H. consultants
- 11.5.2 The District shall designate a separate health benefits sub-fund(s)/reserve fund(s) (67-69 and 71-71) for the purpose of all revenues, expenses, and reserves related to the health benefits programs listed in 11.5.1.
- 11.5.3 Each year, no later than ninety (90) calendar days before the end of the health benefits plan year (i.e. March 30th of a fiscal health benefits plan year), an actuarial analysis shall be completed by the HBA's health benefits consultant. The analysis shall reflect renewal rates/expected costs/savings based on a composite percentage increase/decrease per enrollee multiplied by the number of enrollees in the plan at the time of the actuarial analysis using current plan designs. Proposed provider increases/decreases shall be presented to the Health Benefits Authority on or before seventy-five (75) calendar days prior to the end of the health benefits plan year (i.e. April 15th of a fiscal health benefits plan year).
 - A. The annual actuarial analysis shall include the following elements:
 - 1. Utilization
 - 2. Medical trend
 - 3. Experience
 - 4. SAUSD plan document
 - B. If the District's existing health benefits plan year's per enrollee premium/costs is greater than the proposed premium/cost, the Health Benefits Authority shall address any excess health benefits funds (i.e. through plan modifications, etc.) prior to open enrollment. If those excess funds exceed the value of two (2) months of health benefits costs, then those excess funds over the value of the two (2) months shall be made available for health benefits related negotiations.
 - C. If the District's existing health benefits plan year's per enrollee premium/costs level does not cover the proposed increase in premium/costs, the Health Benefits Authority shall, prior to open enrollment, take action to implement or change one or more of the following:
 - 1. Plan modifications
 - 2. Allocate excess funds from the health benefits sub-fund

reserves to offset increased costs; the allocation shall not exceed 75% of the increased cost.

- D. In the event that plan modification(s) are insufficient to cover the entire increased premium/costs, the remaining increases/costs shall be referred to the Collective Bargaining process to determine how remaining increases/costs shall be allocated.
- E. The Health Benefits Authority may make health benefits plan design adjustments when needed during the health benefits plan year. Open enrollment opportunities shall be provided to allow unit members to change plans.
- 11.5.4 The Health Benefits Authority shall provide:
 - A. SAUSD Open Enrollment publication
 - **B.** Summary Plan Description
 - C. Evidence of Health Benefit Coverage
 - D. Trainings on health benefits issues, trends, cost analysis, etc. shall be provided to the Health Benefits Authority. Release time shall be provided by the District.
 - E. Unit members are allowed to attend up to two (2) Health Benefits related informational meetings/trainings per year. If the unit member attends during his/her normally scheduled work hours, the unit member is eligible for 30 minutes of release time with verification of attendance. The current providers for medical, dental and vision will be requested to be present to answer questions.
 - F. Bi-annual informational meetings for retirees to explain the existing health plans will be conducted. The current providers for medical, dental, and vision will be requested to be present to answer questions.
- 11.5.5 The Health Benefits Authority shall have three (3) CSEA voting representatives plus one alternate to be present at all meetings, to be appointed by the Association.
- 11.5.6 The Health Benefits Authority Decision Making/Voting Process

A. Consensus Decision Making Model

- 1. Consensus building regarding the annual actuarial analysis and implementation of needed changes shall be used.
- 2. Following consensus building, a vote shall be taken to implement the recommended changes. District and Labor shall have an equal one (1) District to one (1) CSEA vote.
- 3. If the vote (11.5.5.A2) is 2 0, the recommended changes shall be implemented.
- 4. If the vote (11.5.5.A2) is a 1-1 tie:
 - a. Either side may request mediation.
 - b. If an agreement cannot be reached within one hundred-twenty (120) calendar days after the beginning of the new health benefits plan year (i.e. November 1st of the fiscal health benefits plan year), District and CSEA unit members/enrollees shall equally split CSEA's proportion of the shortfall in health benefits funding retroactive to the first day of the new health benefits plan year District paying 50% of the shortfall; CSEA unit members/enrollees paying 50% of the shortfall). The 50%-50% shortfall split shall be applied to the unblended rate increases at the tier level. Rate increases that stay in effect shall be referred to the Collective Bargaining process to determine how the increases shall be allocated.
- 6. Meetings of the Health Benefits Authority shall be open and public, with agendas and minutes made available.
- 7. Meetings shall be chaired by a voting member of the HBA. The chair shall be appointed and rotate annually between the District and each participating labor group. The District and each participating labor group shall appoint an Assistant Chair annually. CSEA shall appoint the chair for the 2013-2014 school year.
- 8. Meetings shall be conducted using Robert's Rules of Order and an annual review/training of Robert's Rules of Order

shall be held.

- 9. To ensure order and efficiency, bylaws and/or stranding rules shall be developed, adhered to, reviewed, and modified as needed by the HBA.
- 10. The Health Benefits Authority shall review and study health benefits.
- 11. The Health Benefits Authority shall make available health benefits contracts with insurance carriers.
- 12. The Health Benefits Authority shall review benefits documents.
- 13. Daily administration of the health benefits program, and responsibility for implementing the direction of the Health Benefits Authority, shall be the responsibility of the District. All business correspondence, including claim waivers, formal proposals, bids, and correspondence shall be directed to the District for presentation as appropriate to the Health Benefits Authority.
- 14. Authority to enter into contracts with respect to health benefits determined by the Health Benefits Authority shall rest with the District.
- 15. The Health Benefits Authority shall be authorized to select consultants to be paid from budgeted health benefits funds. Labor shall have a health benefits consultant (chosen by Labor) to review the analysis presented by the HBA consultant, paid from the budgeted health benefits funds and not to exceed 20% of the expense of the consultant selected by the HBA. Contracts with firms or individuals shall be under the auspices of the District and shall require the approval of the Board of Education.
- The benefits provided during retirement will be the same as, or comparable to, those provided to active employees at that same time (excluding life insurance) (i.e., benefits provided retirees on May 3, 2002, shall be the same or comparable to those benefits provided active employees on May 3, 2002). The Health Benefits Authority (HBA) shall determine comparability.
