Public Comments at Board Meetings

The agenda shall provide members of the public the opportunity to address the Board regarding agenda items before or during the Board's consideration of the item. The agenda also provides members of the public an opportunity to testify at regular meetings on matters which are not on the agenda but which are within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board.

Individual speakers are allowed three minutes to address the Board on agenda or nonagenda items. The Board may limit the total time for public input on each item to 20 minutes. With the Board's consent, the Board President may increase or decrease the time allowed for public presentation, depending on the topic and the number of persons wishing to be heard. The Board President may take a poll of speakers for or against a particular issue and may ask that additional persons speak only if they have something new to add.

The Board urges that complaints and derogatory remarks against a District employee be made in writing on forms available in the Office of the Superintendent. This allows the District and the Board to examine more carefully the complaint and to initiate the appropriate investigation.

Persons wishing to address the Board on an item on the agenda or an item of business in the Board's jurisdiction are requested to complete a card. This card is to be submitted to the Secretary of the Board. The *Request to Address the Board of Education* cards are located on the table in the foyer.

REGULAR MEETING SANTA ANA BOARD OF EDUCATION

April 24, 2012

CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 5:10 p.m. by President Richardson. Other members in attendance were Mr. Hernández and Mr. Palacio.

Dr. Meléndez greeted all present.

Dr. Meléndez introduced the Segerstrom High School Dance Team, who recently placed first in the Song/Pom Division at the USA Nationals at the Anaheim Convention Center.

Dr. Meléndez had the pleasure of honoring all of the Santa Ana Unified students that participated in their high school's Winter sports, and excelled by reaching the CIF playoffs or post-season in basketball, soccer, water polo and wrestling. Dr. Meléndez welcomed Ms. Dawn Miller, Assistant Superintendent of Secondary Education, who introduced each school's athletic director, and recognized athletes.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board approval of the submission of Form J-7 Class Size Reduction (CSR) for the K-3 Class Size Reduction Report of Enrollment for 2011-12 fiscal year.

The CSR program was established in 1996-97 to improve the educational program, especially in reading and mathematics for children in grades K-3. The CSR program provides incentive money to school districts and charter schools to operate specified reduced-size classes in grades K-3. The funding rates are \$1,071 per pupil for Option One and \$535 per pupil for Option Two.

On September 27, 2011, the Board of Education approved the submission to the California Department of Education (CDE) of the District's intent to participate in the Class Size Reduction program for grades K-3 for the 2011-12 school year.

RATIONALE:

The District is required to complete and submit to the CDE Form J-7, which reports the number of classes in grades K-3 who participate in the CSR program, as well as indicating under which of the two models (Option One and Option Two) the participation occurs. The Option One model, class size reduction for the full school day, is the model in which grades 1-3 participate. Option Two is for CSR participation for 50% of the instructional day and is the model in which our Kindergarten students participate.

The District's 2011-12 CSR participation reflects the CSR flexibility afforded by the CDE as pursuant to the California Education Code, Sections 52124.3 and 52124.5, which provide for a 70% reimbursement up to a 30:1 student to teacher ratio for a six-year period from 2008-09 through 2013-14 fiscal years only.

The reimbursement funds will provide teacher stipends and substitute costs for trainings as outlined in the service agreement.

Project Description

The Year 2 project will build on activities accomplished in Year One to continue to effect changes in teacher instructional practices at Lathrop and Spurgeon Intermediate Schools in SAUSD by raising expectations about what students can accomplish academically and incorporating exemplary research-based practices to prepare students to meet the rigorous new Common Core College and Career Readiness Standards in English Language Arts. Partners will combine their expertise to deepen teachers' understanding and ability to teach to the CaCCSS-ELA by integrating the Pathway cognitive strategies approach to text-based analytical writing, vocabulary development, and academic English with the district's Thinking Maps initiative, with a specific focus on writing extended evidencebased arguments about complex literary nonfiction and informational texts. In Year 2, 27 E/LA teachers and 11 H/SS, representing all of the English and History teachers at both schools, will participate in all project PD sessions. Students will take a pre/post analytical writing assessment in both disciplines and thus receive a double dose of writing instruction. A variety of measures will be used to assess changes in teacher efficacy, knowledge, and classroom practices and student reading, writing, vocabulary development, and strategy use.

The project is requesting \$250,000 to serve 38 teachers (5 more than were served in 2010-11). Funds will be used for released days, teacher stipends, curriculum materials, faculty and staff salaries, etc. Our prior research indicates that it takes long-term, sustained, ongoing PD in order for teachers to take up a complex intervention and implement it effectively. We expect to see significant growth in student outcomes based on teachers' enhanced expertise in Year 2 and on students' exposure to CACCSS- ELA-aligned instruction in two disciplines.

1. Activities Accomplished to Date in Year One

a. Partnership Status and Progress:

Dr. Carol Booth Olson, Director, UCI Writing Project (UCIWP), Catherine D'Aoust, Co-Director, UCIWP, Dr. Josh Lawrence, UCI Department of Education, Dr. Robin Scarcella, UCI School of Humanities, Darlene Messinger, Administrator, Academic Content, Orange County Department of Education (OCDE), Tracey Gaglio, Reading Language Arts Specialist, OCDE, Edward Winchester, Director of Secondary Student Achievement, Santa Ana Unified School District (SAUSD), Adrian Ayala, Principal, Lathrop Intermediate, Lillian Soto, Principal, Spurgeon Intermediate, and Becky Aten and Katie Berger, Secondary Language Arts Curriculum Specialists, SAUSD, have all collaborated on an ongoing basis on the planning and implementation of the Year 1 project. OCDE has been responsible for introducing, rolling out, and helping teachers "unpack" components of the CaCCSS-ELA at our professional development sessions. The UCIWP/School of Humanities faculty have taken the lead on integrating the Pathway Project cognitive strategies approach to reading, writing, and vocabulary development into Common Core curriculum modules; SAUSD Curriculum Specialists have modeled how to integrate Thinking Maps into CaCCSS-ELA-aligned writing instruction, grades 6-8. Both principals have attended PD with their teachers, have hosted the afterschool workshops on their campuses, and have focused on the CaCCSS-ELA during PLC activities. All partners will continue to participate equally in Year 2. However, Darlene Messinger has left OCDE and Tracey Gaglio has been reassigned. Therefore, Christine Olmstead will serve as OCDE Co-Director and Mary Funaoka will replace Tracey Gaglio.

b. Enhanced Goals and Anticipated Outcomes:

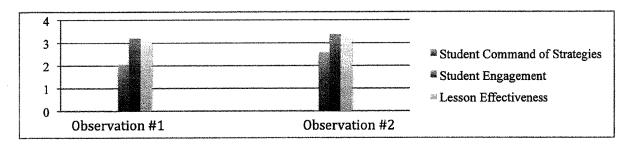
The Year 2 project will build on activities accomplished in Year One to continue to effect changes in teacher instructional practices at Lathrop and Spurgeon Intermediate Schools in SAUSD by raising expectations about what students can accomplish academically and incorporating exemplary research-based practices to prepare students to meet the rigorous new Common Core College and Career Readiness Standards in English Language Arts. The key enhanced goal is to include all H/SS teachers from Lathrop and Spurgeon in all CaCCSS-ELA PD for the full Year 2 (along with all E/LA teachers) and to administer a pre/post writing assessment in H/SS as well as in E/LA so that students will receive a double dose of CaCCSS-ELA-aligned curriculum and instruction in text-based analytical writing. Another enhanced goal is to promote shared responsibility for literacy instruction between E/LA and H/SS teachers by engaging them in collaborating on the development and implementation of CaCCSS-ELAaligned text-based reading/writing lessons for grades 6-8. (This will begin in our upcoming Summer Curriculum Institute). The project-developed PD and curriculum, coupled with the training of teachers in how to design their own integrated literacy curriculum materials, will enable us to achieve our third enhanced goal - - to groom a cadre of teacher leaders to serve as role models and trainers of other teachers as the CaCCSS-ELA are implemented district-wide in all nine intermediate schools as well as to contribute integrated English/History Common Core lessons to the district Writing Notebook, grades 6-8. Anticipated outcomes for teachers include: increased efficacy in CaCCSS-ELA-aligned reading and writing instruction between September 2012 and June 2013 as measured by the Tschannen, Moran, & Hoy (2002) efficacy scale; increased time spent on CaCCSS-ELA-aligned reading and writing instruction as measured by the Teacher Practices Inventory (NELS, 1988); increases in the range & quality of pedagogical practices demonstrating teacher knowledge of and ability to teach to CaCCSS-ELA College and Career Readiness Anchor Standards including: greater use of explicit strategy instruction; more emphasis on higher level meaning of complex text, including literary nonfiction and informational texts; specific attention to strategies for argumentative writing including evidence and

commentary; and strategies to improve the academic vocabulary and formal academic English of at-risk students and ELs as measured by a Likert-scale teacher quality/fidelity observation instrument (Kim et al., 2011). Anticipated outcomes for students include: statistically significant growth on pre/post on demand writing assessments administered in October (E/LA), November (H/SS), April (E/LA), and May (H/SS) as a result of a double dose of writing instruction and two years of exposure to the treatment for both teachers and students; increased growth in CST scores in 2012-13 as compared to 2011-12; increases in SAUSD benchmarks and Spring District writing assessment as compared with 2011.

c. Progress Towards Year One Goals:

E/LA teachers have gone from being completely unfamiliar with the CaCCSS-ELA to developing a deep understanding of the rationale and research-base behind the standards, and have been guided through "unpacking" and learning how to teach to all strands of the standards. They have actively implemented a wide range of CaCCSS-ELA-aligned curriculum materials throughout the year and have analyzed student work throughout the year. An example of the detailed and rigorous curriculum focused on the centerpiece of the Pathway intervention, the revision of students' pre-tests on literary nonfiction into multiple draft essays, is appended to this proposal. H/SS have had a two-day introduction to the standards and have begun to integrate cognitive strategies and thinking maps into CaCCSS-ELA-aligned history curriculum. One early indication of the impact of the PD is the movement we have seen on our Likert scale ratings between Classroom Observation #1 and Classroom Observation #2 in three areas: 1) the degree to which students in the teacher's class demonstrate command of and effective use of strategies exhibited by readers and writers when they construct meaning from and with complex texts; 2) the degree to which students in the teacher's class were engaged and participated fully in classroom activities; and 3) the overall effectiveness of the teacher's lesson (knowledge of subject matter, planning and delivery of lesson, student use of language arts strategies, on-task behavior, engagement and participation). On a 1 to 5 point scale, the overall average for all teachers demonstrated an upward trend from 2.06 to 2.56 on student command of reading/writing strategies; 3.21 to 3.37 on student engagement; and 3.09 to 3.23 on overall lesson effectiveness. (See Table 1).

In our previous research (Kim et al., 2011; Olson et al., 2012), we have only been able to detect significant changes in growth between Observation #1 and Observation #3. We are just beginning the third round of observations. Appended to the proposal are three letters for a CPEC/Pathway teacher (Code # 7S18) who demonstrated a 27% gain from Observation #2 (overall average = 2) to Observation #3 (overall average = 2.57). These detailed letters document the areas in which this teacher grew and illustrate the kind of feedback teachers receive.

1. Primary Activities to Date:

To date, we have conducted 5 full-day PD released days (5 x 7 = 35 hours) and 5 afterschool workshops on (5 x 3 = 15 hours). The chart on the next page identifies topics and presenters for each of the PD sessions. Additionally, 14 PLC/Department Common Core bi-monthly meetings have been held at Lathrop and Spurgeon (dates at both schools vary) (14 hours). All data to date have been collected by the UCIWP and include teacher consent forms, teacher efficacy pre survey, teacher practices pre survey, two (one-hour) classroom observations, Likert-scale observation ratings, and personal letters to teachers, teacher-designed instructional materials influenced by PD, 5 evaluations of PD sessions, and 5 evaluations of afterschool

workshops. For students, we have collected: pre strategy use reading and writing survey, pretest writing assessment, baseline CST, pre-test feedback by UCI English Credential students, revised pre-tests, and other samples of student work.

- ii. We have not encountered any problems collecting the data.
- iii. To date, we have served 33 E/LA teachers and 9 H/SS teachers. This number is slightly higher than we projected.
- d. Both principals report that the STAR Direct Writing Assessment went more smoothly than ever. They attribute this to the project's influence on the students' preparation.

2. Exemplary Instructional Models to Continue to Effect Change in Teacher Practice

- a. <u>Current and Proposed Cohort of Teachers:</u> The teachers at Lathrop and Spurgeon voted unanimously to continue with the project. Lathrop will have all 17 E/LA and 7 H/SS in the project. Because Spurgeon is losing their QEIA funding, they will have fewer language arts teachers, but some of those E/LA teachers will become H/SS teachers. They will have 10 E/LA teachers and 4 H/SS teachers. Therefore, a total of 38 teachers will participate from both schools.
- b. <u>Project Staff and Proposed Roles:</u> Our only change is that Darlene Messinger and Tracey Gaglio from OCDE will not participate and both Christine Olmstead and Mary Funaoka from OCDE have joined the project. Their resumes are attached. Also, Becky Aten is retiring from SAUSD, and we do not know if she will be replaced.

3. Evaluation Plan for Year 2

The Evaluation Plan will focus on two research questions: 1) To what extent will teachers' involvement in the Pathway to Academic Success PD model enhance teachers' self-efficacy and change observed teaching practices of interpretive reading and text-based analytical writing in ways that meet the rigorous new CaCCSS-ELA standards? 2) To what extent will teachers' implementation of the Pathway to Academic Success Common Core intervention improve academic outcomes for intermediate school students on measures of students' reading and writing, including two on-demand direct writing assessments, district benchmark assessments, and standardized state assessments of English language arts and history/social studies? Teachers: To measure teacher efficacy, we will administer the Tschannen, Moran, & Hoy (2000) efficacy scale to all E/LA and H/SS teachers in October 2012 and again May 2013; To determine whether the training has impacted the amount of time spent teaching writing, we will administer the Teacher Practices Inventory (NELS, 1988) in October and again in May. To measure teacher fidelity/quality, we will use a Likert-scale instrument developed by Olson (Kim et. al, 2011) which includes specific CaCCSS-ELA items and make three observations per teacher throughout the duration of the project. Students: To measure the impact of the PD for teachers on student outcomes, we will administer a pre/post on-demand writing assessment in October 2012 and April 2013 to one class of each participating E/LA teacher and in November 2012 and May 2013 to one class of each H/SS teacher that will be scored by trained UCIWP readers under blinded conditions to determine growth over time. Essays will also be analyzed using the VocabProfile (Cobb, 2002). Further, we are analyzing student writing by grade level (6, 7, 8) and by the ability levels mandated by the state for Program Improvement: Honors, Benchmark, Strategic, and Intervention. We will look for growth between Year 1 and Year 2 of the project. From our previous research (Olson et. al, 2012), we expect much greater gains in Year 2. For example, in a recent randomized field trial to study the efficacy of the Pathway Project in SAUSD funded by the Institute of Education Sciences, treatment teachers' students

outscored controls in Year I on the analytical writing assessment with an effect size of .35. In Year 2, they nearly doubled the significance, with an effect size of .67. The magnitude of this effect size indicates that the average student grew in writing from the 50th to the 75th percentile. Additionally, we found small but statistically significant gains on the ELA CST scores of <u>all</u> students of experimental teachers, not just the one class participating in the research study, with an effect size of .10 (Olson, et al., 2012). We believe a complex-intervention like ours takes long-term, sustained, ongoing PD for teachers to internalize and implement effectively with students – hence, the greater growth in Year 2. We will also collect ELA benchmark scores (3 CST-like multiple choice tests and one direct writing assessment) and compare 2012-13 scores with 2011-12 scores. Additionally, we will compare CST/ELA scores for <u>all</u> students at Lathrop and Spurgeon and compare performance on the ELA portion of the CSTs with the schools' performance in 2011.

Research Methods: In order to understand student level outcomes from participation in this project, we intend to use a longitudinal cohort design with a value-added analysis of program effects at school level for student achievement data. That is, we are going to use existing standardized data for students in the study to create a longitudinal growth model for student achievement. We will then add a dummy variable into the model that indicates the year that the treatment began to determine if the start of the program is associated with improved student learning trajectories. We will examine differences in the amount and quality of student writing controlling for teacher effects using a hierarchical linear model examining outcomes for students nested in classrooms. Via a longstanding agreement between UC Irvine and SAUSD, the UCIWP has access to the district data files and can electronically retrieve school site data. Evaluation results will be shared with district partners, with all participating teachers in a sealed envelope using code numbers for both students and teachers to ensure confidentiality, with all secondary principals at a Fall 2013 administrators' meeting, with CPEC officials, and through scholarly articles.

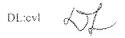

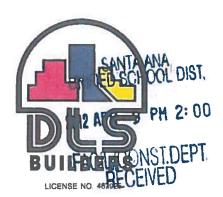

- Access to accounts, passwords, or restricted resources.
- Online resources developed or used by District employees is subject to guidelines for online publication.
- Education social media sites and personal social media sites are maintained as separate entities, with access provided exclusively to education social media sites.
- Employees shall not direct students to sign up for internet services without parent permission and District authorization.
- Appropriate cell phone and mobile communications device use.
- Responsible use of technology.

Employee Use Of Technology

The Governing Board recognizes that technology can enhance employee performance by improving access to and exchange of information, offering effective tools to assist in providing a quality instructional program, and facilitating operations. The Board expects all employees to learn to use the available electronic resources that will assist them in their jobs. As needed, staff shall receive training in the appropriate use of these resources. (cf. 0440 - District Technology Plan) (cf. 4032 - Reasonable Accommodation) (cf. 4131 - Staff Development) (cf. 4231 - Staff Development)

Employees shall be responsible for the appropriate use of technology and shall use the District's electronic only resources primarily for purposes related to their employment. Incidental personal use of District technology shall not interfere with job duties or District operations. Such as Use of District technology is a privilege which may be revoked at any time. (cf. 4119.25/4219.25/4319.25 - Political Activities of Employees)

Employees should be aware that computer files and communications over electronic networks, including e-mail, Internet and voice mail, are not private. This technology should not be used to transmit confidential information about students, employees, or District affairs without authority.

To ensure proper use, the Superintendent or designee may monitor the District's technological resources, including but not limited to, e-mail and voice mail systems, stored files and text messages, at any time without advance notice or consent. If passwords are used, they must be known to the Superintendent or designee so that he/she may have system access when the employee is absent. Employees are reminded that employee e-mails and other electronic communications pertaining to the business of the District are generally deemed to be public records and must be disclosed to members of the public upon request unless the records are specifically exempt from disclosure by law.

Employees are cautioned to follow all applicable laws and District policies in releasing student or personnel information electronically or otherwise. Disclosure of such information is generally prohibited. Employees shall not allow students to access employee accounts, passwords, grading programs or other restricted resources.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish administrative regulations which outline employee obligations and responsibilities related to the use of technology. Employees who fail to abide by these regulations shall be subject to disciplinary action, revocation of the user account, and legal action as appropriate. (cf. 4118 - Suspension/Disciplinary Action) (cf. 4218 - Dismissal/Suspension/Disciplinary Action)

The Superintendent or designee may establish guidelines and limits on the use of technological resources. He/she shall ensure that all employees using these resources receive copies of related policies, regulations and

guidelines. Employees shall be asked to acknowledge in writing that they have read and understood these policies, regulations and guidelines. (cf. 4112.9/4212.9/4312.9 - Employee Notifications)

In the event that the use of an electronic resource affects the working conditions of one or more employees, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the employees' exclusive representative. (cf. 4143/4243 - Negotiations/Consultation)

Employee Use Of Technology

User Obligations and Responsibilities

Employees are authorized to use the District's on line services technology in accordance with user obligations and responsibilities specified below.

- 1. The employee in whose name an on-line services account is issued is responsible for its proper use at all times. Users shall keep personal account numbers, home addresses and telephone numbers private. They shall use the system only under their own account number.
- 2. Employees shall use the system only primarily for purposes related to their employment with the District. Incidental personal use is permitted provided it does not interfere with the performance of job duties or District systems or operations. Commercial and/or political and/or personal use of the system District technology is strictly prohibited. The District reserves the right to monitor any use of its technology, including but not limited to, on-line communications, for improper use and for maintenance and security purposes.
- 3. Users shall not use the system for any illegal activities or to promote unethical practices or any activity prohibited by law or District policy, or administrative regulations. (cf. 4119.25/4219.25/4319.25 Political Activities of Employees)
- 4.Users shall not access, post, submit, publish, or display matter harmful or inappropriate matter material that is threatening, intimidating, obscene, vulgar, harmful to minors (as defined in 47 USC 254), disruptive, or sexually explicit, or that could be construed as harassment or disparagement of others based on their race, national origin, sexgender, sexual orientation, age, disability, religion or political beliefs harassing, or a violation of the District's policies against discrimination and harassment. (cf. 4030 Nondiscrimination in Employment) (cf. 4031 Complaints Concerning Discrimination in Employment) (cf. 4119.11/4219.11/4319.11 Sexual Harassment)
- 5.Copyrighted material may not be placed on the system without except with the author's permission or when otherwise in accordance with applicable copyright laws. Users may download copyrighted material for their own use only and only in accordance with copyright laws. (cf. 6162.6 Use of Copyrighted Materials)
- 6. Vandalism is not permitted and will result in the cancellation of user privileges. Vandalism includes uploading, downloading or creating computer viruses and/or any malicious attempt to harm or destroy District equipment or materials or the data of any other user.
- 7.Users shall not read other users' mail or files; they shall not attempt to interfere with other users' ability to send or receive electronic mail, nor shall they attempt to read, delete, copy, modify or forge other users' mail.
- 8. Users are encouraged to keep messages brief.

- 9.Users shall report any security problem or misuse of the network to the Superintendent or designee. (cf. 6163.4 Student Use of Technology)
- 10. Any on-line resources developed or used by a District employee using District technology shall be subject to rules and guidelines established for District on-line publishing activities including, but not limited to, copyright laws, privacy rights, and prohibitions against obscene, libelous, and slanderous content. The District retains the right to delete material on any such on-line communications. (cf.1113-District and School Web Sites)
- 11. Employees are reminded that if they choose to grant students access to their social media site(s), the site(s) should be professional and appropriate for students. It is suggested that employees maintain a separate social media presence for their personal use as opposed to any social media presence they have for school- or student-related purposes.
- 12. Employees shall not direct students to sign up for Internet services, such as e-mail accounts, without District authorization. Written permission from the parent/guardian shall be required in a form prescribed by the District.
- 13. Any employee who uses a District cell phone or mobile communications device (or a personal device during work time) in violation of law, Board policy, or administrative regulation shall be subject to discipline and may be referred to law enforcement officials as appropriate. Driving while using a cell phone without a hands-free device is unlawful.(cf.3513.1 Cellular phone reimbursement) (cf.3542 School bus drivers) (cf. 4156.3/4256.3/4356.3 Employee property reimbursement)
- 14. Employees shall use District technology responsibly. For example, employees shall not:
 - modify or attempt to repair District computers or other hardware without prior authorization;
 - connect any personal device in the network such as a wireless access point, router or hub, etc.;
 - use web based proxies/anonymizers or software that attempts to make on-line activity on the Internet untraceable;
 - employ, either directly or by implication, a false identity when using an account or other electronic resource; or
 - distribute, post, or otherwise make available to those without authority any confidential or private information.
