Dear Parents and Guardians of Incoming Tenth-Grade Segerstrom Students:

At Segerstrom, our Instructional Focus is "Read! Write! Learn! Segerstrom has always assigned summer reading to its students as preparation for their work in the fall. Literacy is emphasized throughout the curriculum. This year, we are assigning the same novel to each and every student in grades 9-12: Roland Smith's *Peak*. By ascribing to the "One Book, One Community" theory of reading, we hope to build a community over the summer in which students and staff alike experience the joy of reading a common title and are thus able to discuss the novel across the campus.

In an effort to keep your minds sharp and prepare your critical thinking and reading skills for English 10, we ask that students complete the following assignments.

All incoming tenth-grade students are expected read our schoolwide novel, *Peak* by Roland Smith. Students will complete an examination on this novel by the fifth week of the first six-week grading period in September.

In addition, all incoming honors tenth-grade students are expected to also read George Orwell's 1984. Students will write a mandatory Expository essay and complete an examination to assess their understanding of the novel during the third week of the school year.


