School Description & Mission Statement

Gonzalo and Felicitas Mendez Fundamental Intermediate School ("Mendez Fundamental") is located at the intersection of North Bristol Street and West 17th Street. During the 2007-08 school year, 1,441 students in grades 6-8 were enrolled. Demographic composition of student enrollment includes 3% receiving special education services, 31.1% qualifying for English language learner support, and 71.1% enrolled in the Free or Reduced Price Meal program. In 2007-2008 Mendez was the first intermediate school to exit out of program improvement and was recognized for its accomplishments at the Orange County Department of Education.

As a school of choice, students residing in the district's attendance boundaries are eligible for enrollment through a lottery system. Students attending a fundamental elementary school within the district and siblings of current students are given first priority for enrollment.

Daily class schedules fill an eight-period day. On Wednesdays, students attend all eight classes and on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday they follow a block schedule (80 minutes per period) with 4 periods per day. Math and language arts instruction are provided daily, as they are comprised of 2 periods each. The class schedule is available on the school's web site.

School Mission

Mendez Fundamental Intermediate School, a school of choice, addresses the educational and language needs of all students through standards-based instruction and assessment driven planning. All special education students are served in standard classes and receive special education support by a credentialed teacher or paraprofessional. Staff, parents, and community members provide a caring environment that affords all students access to a technologically enriched curriculum in order to prepare them for the new millennium.

District Profile

Santa Ana Unified School District is the seventh largest district in the state, currently servicing over 57,000 students in grades K-12 and residing in the city of Santa Ana. The district currently operates 38 elementary schools, 9 intermediate schools, 8 high schools, 1 alternative high school, 2 continuation schools, 1 community day school, and 5 charter schools. The student population is comprised of 78.1% enrolled in the Free or Reduced Price Meal program, 55.9% qualifying for English language learner support, and 7% receiving special education services. Our district's schools have received California Distinguished Schools, National Blue Ribbon Schools, California Model School, Title I Academic Achieving Schools and Governor's Higher Expectations awards in honor of their outstanding school programs. Nearly 40 schools have received the Golden Bell Award - the largest number of awards received by any school district.

Each of Santa Ana Unified School District's staff members, parents, and community partners have developed and maintained high expectations to ensure every student's intellectual, creative, physical, emotional, and social development needs are met. The district's commitment to excellence is achieved through a team of professionals dedicated to delivering a challenging, high quality educational program. Consistent success in meeting student performance goals is directly attributed to the district's energetic teaching staff and strong parent and community support.

District Vision

The Santa Ana Unified School District is recognized as one of the leading American urban school districts, notable for the achievement of its students, the quality of its teachers, support staff, and administrators, the engagement of its community, the clarity of its strategies, and the effectiveness and efficiency of its systems. The District is on the cutting edge of equipping all students to succeed in their life goals, in American society, and in the free-market economy.

School Site Safety Plan

The Comprehensive School Site Safety Plan was developed for Mendez Fundamental Intermediate School in collaboration with local agencies and the district office to fulfill Senate Bill 187 requirements. Components of this plan include child abuse reporting procedures, teacher notification of dangerous pupil procedures, disaster response procedures, procedures for safe arrival and departure from school, sexual harassment policy, and dress code policy. The school's most current safety plan was reviewed prior to February 22, 2008 and updated prior to February 29, 2008. The Santa Ana Unified School District's Board of Trustees reviews the safety plans annually by March 1. The most recent staff meeting addressing safety plan components and individual responsibilities associated with the school safety plan was held in January, 2008.

School Inspections

The most recent facilities inspection at Mendez Fundamental Intermediate School took place on December 10, 2008. Schools are required by state law to report the condition of their facilities; the School Site Inspection table illustrated in this report identifies the state required inspection areas and discloses the operational status in each of those areas.

Deferred Maintenance

Santa Ana Unified School District participates in the State School Deferred Maintenance Program which provides dollar-for-dollar matching funds to assist school districts with major repairs or replacement of existing school building components. Deferred maintenance projects generally include roofing, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, interior/exterior painting, and floor systems. During the 2007-2008 school-year, the district has budgeted approximately \$2.2 million for the deferred maintenance program. This represents .5% of the district's general fund budget.

Facilities Maintenance

School custodial staff and the district's maintenance department work together to ensure classrooms and campus grounds are well-maintained and kept safe and functioning for students, staff, and visitors. Maintenance and Operations (M&O) employs an electronic work order system enabling school staff to communicate unscheduled maintenance needs, urgent repairs, or special projects. Most of Mendez Fundamental Intermediate School repairs and maintenance projects are performed by the district's highly qualified, professional trade specialists. Emergency situations are immediately resolved either by the school custodian or district maintenance staff, based upon the nature of the situation.

Day and evening custodians work closely as a team and with the principal for routine maintenance, daily custodial duties, and special events preparations. The principal and day- custodian communicate daily to discuss campus cleaning needs and safety concerns. Every morning before school begins, the day custodian inspects facilities for safety hazards, graffiti, and other conditions that require removal prior to students and staff entering school grounds.

School safety and cleanliness are the custodians' highest priority and strongly emphasized as a component of their daily routines. Custodians are trained by M&O's administrators on proper cleaning procedures, use of chemicals, and use of equipment. The day custodians are responsible for following an established set of cleaning standards and prioritization procedures for general campus maintenance. The day custodian and administrators check restrooms throughout the day as a proactive measure in keeping facilities well stocked, safe, and sanitary. The evening custodians are responsible for thorough cleaning of classrooms, office areas, and restrooms. Groundskeepers are dispatched by the district office to perform general maintenance of landscaping.

Professional Development

All curriculum and instructional improvement activities at Santa Ana Unified School District are aligned to the California State Content Standards and Frameworks. Staff development concentrations are selected and identified based upon student assessment results, NCLB requirements, teacher input, state content standards, and professional development surveys.

All staff development activities at Santa Ana Unified School District are focused on increasing student learning and proficiency. During the 2007-08 school year, our school sponsored three days of staff development. Staff training topics at the individual school sites may have included: Frontloading, Thinking Maps, Guided Language Acquisition Design, effective teaching strategies from Marzano, et al., effective grading practices, common assessments, district benchmark assessments and a standards-based report cards

Santa Ana Unified School District offers supplemental training and support for new and ongoing program implementation. Training activities take place throughout the school year, after school, and during the summer and generally focus on curriculum, teaching strategies, and methodologies. New teachers and teachers not yet fully credentialed are supported by peer coaching and extensive staff development. The BTSA Induction Program (Beginning Teacher Support and Assistance) is a state-approved program that offers additional support and assistance to newly credentialed teachers. All new teachers are assigned to a Support Provider (mentor teacher) and provided individualized support over a two-year period. To support veteran teachers as well as new teachers to the district, Santa Ana Unified School District offers Peer Assistance and Review (PAR) which is easily defined as teachers helping teachers. Experienced and knowledgeable veteran teachers, referred to as Consulting Teachers, provide ongoing assistance to teachers who need to improve their instructional skills, classroom management strategies, subject knowledge, and/or related aspects of their teaching performance.

Staff members are encouraged to attend professional workshops and conferences. New teachers, experienced teachers, mentor/ teacher leaders, administrators, and support staff are encouraged to participate in workshops sponsored by the Orange County Office of Education and courses offered by community colleges and universities. Classified support staff may receive additional job-related training from vendors, department supervisors, and district representatives.

Instructional Materials

All textbooks used in the core curriculum throughout Santa Ana Unified School District are aligned to the California Content Standards and Frameworks. Instructional materials for grades K-8 are selected from the state's most recent list of standards-based materials and adopted by the State Board of Education. Instructional materials for grades 9-12 are standards based and approved by the district's Board of Trustees. The district follows the State Board of Education's six-year adoption cycle for core content materials and the eight-year cycle for textbook adoptions in foreign language, visual and performing arts, and health. District textbook review and adoption activities occur the year following the state's adoption.

On October 9, 2007, the Santa Ana Unified School District's Board of Trustees held a public hearing to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Trustees adopted Resolution No. 07/08-2703 which certifies as required by Education Code §60119 that for the 2007-08 school year, the Santa Ana Unified School District has provided sufficient textbooks or instructional materials, or both, that are consistent with the content and cycles of the curriculum frameworks adopted by the State Board, to each pupil enrolled in a foreign language or health course, and that sufficient laboratory science equipment applicable to science laboratory courses offered in grades 9-12, inclusive, is available to pupils.
