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During the 2023 Summer Break, all continuing 8th graders will read *The Charmed Children of Rookskill Castle* by Janet Fox. The following response questions are designed to help guide readers through the overall comprehension of the novel as well as focus their understanding on important details such as story elements and literary devices.

All packets will be collected at the start of the 2023-24 school year by each student's ELA teacher. In addition to the packet, students will be provided with the opportunity to take an Accelerated Reader Quiz.

Completing this packet correctly and passing the AR Quiz with a 70% or higher would help ensure a successful beginning to their MacArthur 8th

Grade ELA class for the 2023 - 2024 school year.

Students, please be sure that your work is completed correctly and meets or exceeds the following expectations.

Each response should:

- be legible (readable)
- be written in complete sentences
 (include capitalization, punctuation, etc.)
- be 2 3 sentences in length
- use examples and/or quotes from the text (textual evidence)
- make connections when possible
 (include your thoughts, emotions and/or ideas)

The first question for each section of reading is an open-ended question based on your personal experiences. Completing this question first will help prepare you for the content of the reading.

Then, there will be three text dependent questions, based specifically on the story elements of the book (setting, character, point of view/perspective, plot and theme). Please know that it will help to read the questions before beginning each section in order to know what to read for.

The Charmed Children of Rookskill Castle Chapters 1 - 7

Personal Connection – The book begins with an illustration and a definition of a chatelaine - a metal hoop and chain designed to keep commonly used tools organized and accessible. Imagine you wore a chatelaine. What would you wear on it? Why?
Chapter 2 - London, Fall 1940: The Blitz The Bateson family is preparing for change in an effort to keep safe during World War II. The children are being sent to Rookskill Castle for school while their father, a clockmaker, is making his own plans. Based on what he says and what he does, what other job do you think their father has? Explain your opinion.

Chapter 7 - The Fishing Girl Before Kat left London, her Great-Aunt Margaret gave her the gift of a chatelaine.
What 3 items are attached to it? What information did Great-Aunt Margaret
share with Kat about the origin and purpose of each?

Personal Connection – Through flashbacks, readers begin to learn more about Leonore, her life and her desire to have a child of her own - a desire so strong that she is willing to make sacrifices.

Chapter 9 - The Secret Room
Peter, Kat, Rob and Amelie discuss the discovery of a secret room. This leads to an exploration and examination of what else Rookskill Castle may be hiding. What is the castle like? What descriptive language (adjectives, similes, etc.) does the author use to help you visualize it? What sights do the children see? What sounds do they hear?

Peter, Kat, Rob and Amelie have begun seeing other children throughout the castle Who are these children? Why do Peter, Rob and Amelie believe these children are ghosts? Why does Kat insist that there must be some other explanation for their appearance?	en
Chapter 14 - Chatelaine Other children have arrived at Rookskill Castle. Name the 3 new students. Use character traits to give a brief description of each.

The charmed children are described in greater detail. Identify each of them. Be sure to
include an example of textual evidence used to describe each one.

Personal Connection - Kat watches helplessly as additional children become charmed. She is both overwhelmed by fear as much as she is driven by determination to help them. Share a time when you have also been overwhelmed as well as determined. How were you able to overcome whatever was holding you back? Chapter 26 - Children In time, Kat learns that Cook and Hugo have also been working to help the children. What are some of the ways they have been trying to care for them and protect them?

Chapter 29 - Exhaustion

Lady Leonore serves the children hot chocolate every night - a special treat in the context of World War II when luxuries like chocolate were almost impossible to find. But the children find that there are side effects to their nightly treat. What
happens to the children after they drink the hot chocolate? What do they become aware of once they stop drinking it?
Chapter 32 - Punishment
There are two arrivals at Rookskill Castle - one of a person, another of a very important message.
Who is the person that has arrived at the castle? What is the reason for their visit?
What is the message that arrives at the castle? How does it get there? Explain its importance.

throughout the castle and its grounds. Rob, seeing this figure, decides to pursue it and
discovers a cave by the sea.
What does he find in the cave and why are these items of significance? What
conclusion do the children draw about the mysterious figure based on what Rob has
found?

Chapter 38 - The Cauc of Plato
The instructors at Rookskill Castle are highly skilled and typically quite organized. However, they begin to act in ways that are out of character. Describe how Ms. Gumble and Mr. MacLarren divert from their traditional lessons. What assignments do they give the children instead?
Chapter 39 - Hand & Chapter 42 - The Perfect Heart Magic is beginning to take a toll on all the children in general but on Kat in particular. Describe what is happening to Kat. What is she afraid this will lead to?

The Charmed Children of Rookskill Castle Chapters 43 - 49

Personal Connection – Peter and Kat decide that the time has come to place their trust in one of the adults at the castle. They have thought it through carefully and have selected someone they believe who can and will be willing to help them. Who is someone you have put your trust in? What was it about this person that made you feel you could confide in them? Use character traits to describe them.
Chapter 44 - Spies
Keep Calm and Carry On was a motivational poster produced by the British/English government in 1939 as the country prepared for World War II. The hope was that it would help raise the spirits of the British/English people as they were being threatened with mass air attacks by German Nazis.
What influence does this saying have on the children in general? What impact does it have on Kat in particular?

Chapter 46 - Spies and Magic
Ms. Gumble and Mr. MacLarren are becoming an important part of the children's
investigation of the castle. What does Kat learn about her instructors? Why is this information important
to her understanding of who they are and what they may be able to do to help them?
Chapter 49 - Wolves
Peter and Kat find themselves trapped in a dangerous situation when they go on a mission to try to save some of the charmed children. Scared and desperate, Kat decides to utilize the chatelaine.
How is Kat able to gain control of the chatelaine? What does she say or do? What does the chatelaine do to help save her, Peter and Rob?

The Charmed Children of Rookskill Castle Chapters 50 - 57

Personal Connection – All Hallow's Eve, or Halloween, is believed to be based on <i>Samhain</i> , a Gaelic harvest festival. It is a recognition of those who have died and departed as well as a celebration of the changing of the seasons - from light (<i>fall</i>) to dark (<i>winter</i>). How does this element of time (and what you know of it) affect the mood of the
story for you?
Chapter 53 - Witch
From the start, Kat has been wary of Lady Eleanor, her identity and her plan. One by one, the other children have become suspicious as well.
Who or what is Lady Eleanor really? Who was she before she became who or what she is now?

Chapter 54	-Pen,	Scissors,	Thimble
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Peter and Kat finally find and meet Lord Gregor Craig, the owner of the castle and Kat's distant relative. Unfortunately, he is confined to his bed and cannot be of much help to them. He does, however, share some important information about Lady Eleanor and her plan for the children.

What does Lord Craig tell Peter and Kat about Lady Eleanor? What impact does this information have on them?
Chapter 55 - The Witch's Mark
Lady Eleanor's life has been an unhappy one for many years. In a confrontation with Kat, she reveals her motivations for what she is doing. What does Lady Eleanor want? Why does she want it so desperately? What rol do the charmed children play in her plan?

Personal Connection – Rob calls Kat "stodgy" numerous times - a word that can mean

serious and close minded. Throughout the course of the book, Kat's character evolves and she learns to blend her logic and skill with resourcefulness.

Chapter 61 - Scattered Pieces

Because of Kat, Lady Eleanor begins to change.
