PHONE POLICY: All phones will be kept in the wall pockets during class every day. Place your phone in your numbered cubby on the wall each day when you enter the classroom.

Supplies Needed: Chromebook, college-ruled notebook paper, blue or black pens, red pens, 4 highlighters, colored pencils, 3-ringed binder, a divider marked "English" to keep your assignments in.

WORK: All work will be done in **pen**, unless you are taking notes. If you do not use a pen, be prepared to redo the work in pen in order to receive full credit for it. If a mistake is made, simply draw one line through the mistake (word, phrase, sentence) and continue with your sentence (assignment). **Formal essay** writing: Use 12 or 14 font, no Old English font, unless you are doing an assignment from the time of Shakespeare.

PARTICIPATION: You earn points for sitting in your seat before the tardy bell starts to ring, with all necessary supplies out, bags/backpacks put under tables, beginning to write in your agenda and **stamp** sheet.

Stamp sheet: In the first 5 minutes of each class period students will copy the current day's agenda into their school agenda & stamp sheet. Next, students will do the warm up. Monday, Wednesday, Friday are silent reading, Tuesday and Thursday are grammar and writing warm ups. Keep your stamp sheet and warm-ups in your three-ringed binder, behind a divider labeled English.

Exit slip: Your stamp sheet is also your exit slip each period. At the end of each period you will write one thing you did or learned, or a question about it. If you read, write the book title and the page # read during class that day.

Participation points will also be earned in group work. So, the students doing the most work in each group, will earn the most points in the group.

Mrs. Rodebaugh's Reading Program

- 1. Read 100-150 pages (the specific amount assignment or more) in a book.
- 2. At a quiet moment during class, bring the book and your reading folder to Mrs. R. You must have the book in class to show me.
- 3. Tell me what happened in the pages you've read so far. You may use post-its or notes, but not a written summary.
- 4. If you cannot prove you have read the book in the past 4 weeks, it will be handed back to you to be skimmed, annotated on post-its, and reported later (for credit).
- 5. I will give you points in a GoogleDoc and input them into Aeries,

You will not pass this class without reading and reporting on ALL books!

I repeat: to earn a "D" or higher in this class, you must read and report for every book (# of pages assigned).

^{*}Books with movies require my approval before reading and reporting on them. They also count for **half points.**
