

Mission

School & Community At a Glance

Saddleback High School opened its doors in 1967 with a commitment to creating a college-bound culture where academic excellence meets student accountability. Saddleback High School provides a comprehensive, standards-based core curriculum grounded on high expectations and accountability for all. The school's structures and procedures are designed to implement and support "Fundamental School Concepts." Some of these concepts include an emphasis on high standards of student conduct and attendance to enhance quality instruction; insistence on strong study habits, self-discipline, and responsibility; reinforcement of traditional values of patriotism, citizenship, respect, courtesy, and pride in accomplishment; and parent involvement.

Santa Ana Unified School District is the sixth largest district in the state, currently servicing over 56,000 students in grades K-12 and residing in the City of Santa Ana. The district operates 36 elementary schools, 9 intermediates, 7 high schools, 3 alternative high schools, 5 charter schools, and 1 special school. The student population is comprised of 8.3% receiving special education services and 82% qualifying for English language learner support.

Instructional Focus

The school's mission is "to maintain a community that provides a challenging and supportive environment which empowers students to develop skills and strategies necessary for post-secondary success." The school vision is "to create a community where all students do their best learning and all staff do their best teaching." Literacy competence remains the focus of Saddleback. The school has an extensive school-wide writing program and mandates reading across the curriculum. Our college going culture is a school expectation and ensures all students graduate or exceed the entry-level requirements of a four year university.

Saddleback is the only International Baccalaureate (IB) World School in the Santa Ana Unified School District offering the Diploma Programme (DP) beginning the Fall 2017 school year. In 2019, 9 out of the 20 first IB cohort candidates earned the IB Diploma.

The International Baccalaureate (IB) DP program is a rigorous two-year program for 11th and 12th grade students. The IB Program prepares students for a global education, focusing on international issues and improving the lives of community members locally and around the world, as well as helping students improve themselves. Pre-IB courses are available as early as 7th- 10th grade at our campus.

Specialized Instruction

The school and district have adopted The Common Core State Standards and have begun implementing numerous courses of student components in core subject area.

Special education is a full-inclusion model. Students are mainstreamed into the general education classroom based upon their IEP (Individualized Education Program) and are provide instruction support within each of their individual courses. This provides instruction in the least restrictive environment. English Language Learners are placed in a classroom with a teacher who has been certified to teach English learners.

Faculty

Saddleback High has a professional certificated staff of 93. An advanced degree is held by 73% of the faculty; 7 hold counseling degrees and 4 are administrators; all Saddleback teachers are Highly Qualified Teachers according to the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 and, 100% of the teaching staff are CLAD/SDAIE certified. There is 27 classified support staff in a full-time or part-time capacity.

Counseling & Support

The counseling & support staff work collaboratively to provide a comprehensive proactive program. Through individual & group counseling, the four Counselors, Higher Ed. Coordinator, two Social Workers, school Psychologist, School Nurse, Outreach Consultant and Speech Pathologist are instrumental in improving student attendance and achievement through the identification, referral, and remediation of health and/or emotional concerns. As a high school that values academic, college and career development, counseling is an important part of the guidance service.

Access to Courses, Exams & Limitations

Saddleback High School has an open enrollment policy for students wishing to enroll in AP and Dual Enrollment courses. The number of AP courses a student can take each year is limited to schedule availability.

Students in the Pre-IB program in 9th & 10th grade in addition to taking a sequence of courses have the option to take AP courses limited to schedule availability. Students in the IB program 11th & 12th grade take a sequence of courses and are not able to take any AP courses.

Saddleback subsidized the cost of AP & IB exams so that all students are able to take exams for any courses they are enrolled in.
