#### MINUTES

## REGULAR MEETING SANTA ANA BOARD OF EDUCATION

#### April 26, 2011

#### CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 4:58 p.m. by Vice President Richardson. Other members in attendance were Dr. Yamagata-Noji and Mr. Palacio. Mr. Hernández arrived at 6:50 p.m. and Mr. Reyna arrived at 7:05 p.m.

Cabinet members present were Ms. Russo, Dr. Olsky, Mr. Lopez, Mr. Bishop, Mr. Mendez, Ms. Miller, Mr. Dixon, and Ms. Lohnes.

#### RECESS TO CLOSED SESSION

At 5:00 p.m., Board Vice President recessed to Closed Session.

The Regular meeting recessed to Closed Session to consider student matters, negotiations, confidential issues, and personnel matters.

#### CLOSED SESSION PRESENTATIONS

Board Vice President Richardson asked those wishing to address the Board in matters pertaining to Closed Session to step to the podium.

There were no individuals wishing to address the Board.

#### RECONVENE OPEN MEETING

The Regular meeting reconvened at 6:15 p.m.

#### PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance led by Diana Ramirez, Santa Ana High School student.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S COMMENTS

The Superintendent began her remarks with a performance by Santa Ana High's cast of "The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee." Noel Palacios, a senior who played Leaf performed the song "I'm Not That Smart." Following the performance, Diana Ramirez who played Logainne and Noel shared their experience of being in a musical production and what it means to them and their education. The play was performed under the direction of Terry Schwinge, Visual and Performing Arts Coordinator. Musical accompaniment is provided by Laurie Cobb.

Ms. Russo invited Assistant Superintendent Herman Mendez to the podium to introduce supporters of arts in SAUSD including Pat Wayne of Arts Orange County, Diane Doyle of Santa Ana Arts Alliance, and Sarah Murr of the Boeing Co. Each shared positive remarks about the Arts and stated that students who are actively involved in arts are proven more confident than those not involved in art. The Board thanked the SAUSD art supporters for their dedication to the students of SAUSD.

The Superintendent recognized SAUSD nurses then called upon Assistant Superintendent Doreen Lohnes, who stated that nurses go beyond their duties and expressed appreciation for their assistance. She then called upon District Head Nurse, Gayle McLean who said that SAUSD nurses are dedicated staff members who are committed to ensuring the wellbeing of SAUSD students. Ms. Lohnes acknowledged each nurse by calling one-by-one the podium. She said that students rely on them for care and health services and thanked them for their services.

With Board consensus, Board President Hernández presented Agenda Item No. 17 on the agenda.

## ADOPTION OF RESOLUTION NO. 10/111-2877 - PROCLAIMING MAY 2011 AS NATIONAL NURSES' WEEK

It was moved by Mr. Richardson, seconded by Dr. Yamagata-Noji, and carried 4-0, Mr. Reyna not present to adopt Resolution No. 10/11-2876 - designating May 6-21, 2011 as National School Nurses' Week.

Nurse McLean made an announcement reminding parents that students in grades 7 to 12 to get their whooping cough vaccine, called Tdap, so they may be allowed to enter school this August.

Nurses present were Gayle McLean, Colette Bywater, Pamela Campbell, Karen Chronley, Jolaine Eberhardt, Kerstin Higbie, Pamela Majd, Colleen McNamara, Rizalina Querubin, Victoria Reiser, Diane Rey, and Laurie Ytuarte. They were thanked and congratulated by the Board of Education in recognition of Nurses' Month.

Ms. Lohnes next recognized the Santa Ana School District's School Attendance Review Board (SARB) who were present at the Board meeting. She stated that the SAUSD SARB was honored by the State Attendance and Review Board in San Francisco for improving attendance and reducing the dropout rate. Led by Director Nancy Diaz-Miller, the Pupil Support Services team has earned the State model designation for attendance improvement and dropout prevention. This recognition was bestowed to only nine school districts throughout California. Much of our improvement in attendance is attributed to the Aeries new student information system and more recently the truancy prevention program Attention2Attendance.

Ms. Lohnes and the Board of Education congratulated the following Pupil Support Services team members for their outstanding work. Director Nancy Diaz-Miller, Social Services Specialist Rosa Galindo, Attendance Field Worker Clarisa Santos, Attendance Field Worker Chris Ornelas, Interpreter/Translator Mario Peralta, District Lead Nurse Gayle McLean, School Resource Officer Brent Wimberely, and District Safety Officer Ray Sandoval. Members of the Board congratulated each member of SARB for an outstanding job.

Nancy Diaz-Miller, Pupil Support Services Director, expressed appreciation to the staff for their diligence, hard work, and for receiving the State recognition.

Ms. Russo asked those present to draw their attention to the artwork posted in our Boardroom from Thorpe Fundamental, Walker Elementary, and Century High Schools.

Superintendent Russo reported that on Friday, April 22 all school campuses hosted more than 50 key community leaders, business partners, supporters and elected officials during SAUSD's "Principal for a Day" event. The event provided community members an opportunity to experience the daily operation of a school and learn more about the educational process. In the process, many schools gained new support and strengthened ties with existing friends. Participating guest principals included Board of Education Vice President Rob Richardson at Willard Intermediate; Senator Lou Correa; Assemblyman Jose Solorio; City of Santa Ana Mayor Miguel Pulido; Council members Michele Martinez, and Sal Tinajero; as well as CEOs of major organizations including Ted Smith, Chairman & CEO of the MIND Research Institute. Channel 31 showed a video of the day's activities that was shared with the Board.

It was a great day for highlighting SAUSD's talented students, teachers and staff. We thank all participating guest principals, current principals for hosting and Saddleback High principal Dr. Robert Laxton and his team for their hospitality displayed to our guests.

#### RECOGNITION

#### Classified Employee of the Month April 2011 - Edgar Espinoza

Edgar serves as the Technology Instructional Assistant at Muir Fundamental Elementary School. He is an exceptional individual who goes above-and-beyond the call of duty. Mr. Espinoza's dedication and commitment to serving the school's needs are exemplary. He is knowledgeable and creative. Edgar was able to locate gently used computer tables at the warehouse, arranged for an electrical upgrade, trained staff, and maintains both Lexia and ST Math curriculum for both labs. Teachers cite that he is a natural teacher and the children are easily taken to him. The staff is most grateful for his professional demeanor and expertise that he brings to the Muir campus.

Mr. Espinoza was presented a gift card and a plaque to a restaurant of his choice. He was accompanied by family, friends, and colleagues.

#### PERSENTATIONS

#### Summarized Data of Williams Settlement Third Quarterly Report

In order to meet the Williams Settlement requirements, staff is required to report summarized data on the nature and resolution of all complaints on a quarterly basis to the County Superintendent of Schools and Governing Board of school districts.

There were no complaints to report during the third quarter.

#### High School Inc. at Valley High School Update

Ms. Miller introduced the item then called Mr. Rozema, Valley High School Focus Coordinator, to the podium to present an update on High School Inc. Academies at Valley High School (HSI). Mr. Rozema summarized each of the nine goals for each academy that aligned to the District goals. He said that all seven academies have courses that are articulated locally and soon four of the seven academies will have a-g approval for the UC system. Mr. Rozema stated that High School Inc. supports the SAUSD in Valley's transformational plan, brand, and branding strategies. The ninth HSI goal cultivates relationships between business and education to ensure college and career ready success for students upon graduation.

On the Agenda, there is a partnership agreement with the SAUSD and Santa Ana Chamber of Commerce, which calls for an update. District staff has continued to work with the Santa Ana Chamber of Commerce to design and develop concepts for the High School Inc. Academies at Valley High School.

SAUSD Board members expressed gratitude for the support from the Santa Ana Chamber and High School Inc. Board.

In attendance at the meeting were High School Inc. President Richard Porras; Mr. Oakes, Member; Dita Shemke, Member; Susan Dixon, Member; Mr. McLoughlin, Member and HSI Director Dale Ward and HSI Program Director Sharon Gomez.

Mr. Porras, HSI President thanked the SAUSD for the partnership with the Santa Ana Chamber of Commerce. He credited the 188 business partners within HSI and said without them, the program might not be as successful. He said that in order for students to be successful, they need tools and higher education and that is what High School Inc. offers Valley High School students.

Mr. Elliot, CEO, Santa Ana Chamber of Commerce, stated that this is a great opportunity to work together with SAUSD to bring business and education together. He said that he is amazed to see what SAUSD students are learning and that he appreciates is the support and collaboration with the SAUSD.

Ms. Gomez, HSI Program Director, recognized business partners in the audience.

The following were highlighted in the partnership agreement:

- Valley High School Principal will now be a non-voting member of HSI
- The partnership agreement shall remain in effect for five (5) years from the date of adoption by the SAUSD Board of Education and the Santa Ana Chamber of Commerce, unless terminated or modified earlier as set forth below in the agreement.
- All activities of HSI are subject to SAUSD Board Policies and Administrative Regulations
- Procedures are established by the SAUSD and the provisions of SAEA and CSEA collective bargaining agreements

With consensus of the Board, Agenda Item 2.0 was presented.

# 2.0 APPROVAL OF PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT WITH SANTA ANA CHAMBER OF COMMERCE FOR HIGH SCHOOL INC. ACADEMIES AT VALLEY HIGH SCHOOL

It was moved by Mr. Richardson, seconded by Mr. Palacio, and carried 5-0, to approve the partnership agreement with the Santa Ana Chamber of Commerce for the High School Inc. Academies at Valley High School.

#### Attention2Attendance Update

Mr. Bishop together with Dr. Wold and Ms. Diaz Miller provided information on the various segments of Attention2Attendance. Mr. Bishop introduced the item and stated that the presentation would update the Board on the impact and effectiveness of the Attention2Attendance components that includes attendance rates, conferencing, excessive excused absences, and the next steps.

- Phase I was implemented at the end of the 2009-10 school year
- Phase II implemented in the fall of 2010
- Phase III is expected to be implemented in the winter of the 2010-11 school year.

Mr. Bishop, Dr. Wold, and Ms. Miller provided the following formation on the launch of the attendance monitoring system as well as various facets already implemented and working in the SAUSD. The SAUSD's budget is based upon the actual attendance rate, not enrollment. The 5-year average attendance rate for SAUSD is 95.84%. In March 2010, the Board authorized the implementation of a system that would allow the District to effectively manage and increase attendance (ADA). The main components of this system are: 1). Attendance Notifications, 2). Conference Management, 3). Data Analysis, and 4). Professional Consultation. A historical attendance data chart showing years from 1999 to the current year was reviewed. The attendance-monitoring return on investment for the current and subsequent year was discussed. The attendance rate has increased from January to April then the reasons for the increased were reviewed. The number of parents that received three Truancy letters was 11,830, parents that received two Excessive Excused letters were 8,539, and parents that received request for conference letters was 6,379. This has increased parental awareness and communication by over 30%. These absences are managed before they become chronic absentees. Manageable absences are between 5-9; problematic absences are those between 10-17; and chronic absences are those greater than 18. Ms. Miller stated that site administrators have made student attendance improvement a priority goal. Ms. Russo stated that it is now included in the Principal's evaluations. He stated that District staff is constantly working on improving attendance and staff will be bringing an update to Phase III in the near future.

Dr. Wold held up a 4" binder and stated that the attendance firm helped create the manual at no cost to SAUSD. This is a State requirement for attendance accounting purposes when changing student information systems.

#### Enrollment and Budget Update

Dr. Wold introduced the item. He stated that that information regarding CBEDS was brought previously to the Board. Traditionally trends show from October-June, SAUSD loses approximately 700-1,000 students. Current enrollment shows less of a decline.

The projected enrollment showed 53,256 students for 2010-11, losing only 49 students, which calculated more than believed with CBEDS by 406 students. He described the approach to enrollment projections for the past two years and bases staffing allocation on the final projection. He said that SAUSD is looking at a slight increase in the budget.

Mr. Bishop updated the Board on the budget. He stated that there would not be a June election on the extension of existing taxes. He stated that school districts hoped for some financial stability for the current and next year. At this time, we are waiting for the May Revise for further information. Mr. Bishop shared projections and stated that we have no idea but there is an oil extraction fee to rescue education, but still a projection.

Mr. Bishop stated that there are three Bond rating companies and Fitch Ratings affirms SAUSD at AA. The AA rating reflects the district's sound financial operations, exhibited by two consecutive years of operating surpluses.

Mr. Bishop reviewed updated budget reductions utilizing one-time solutions in both 2011-12 and 2012-13. He stated that the SAUSD would still be required to make additional unidentified budget reductions of \$28.1 million for the 2012-13 school year by December 13, 2011. He stated that available one-time resources are approximately \$37 million. Noting that CBEDS show that decline will not be as significant as we expected. He then reviewed Plan C, which shows if we were to move that direction, utilizing one-time solutions in both 2011-12 and 2012-13 SAUSD would still be required to make additional unidentified budget reductions of \$30-41.0 million for 2011-12 and \$28.1 million for 2012-13 by December 13, 2011. He then reviewed Plan B that the SAUSD and Orange County Department of Education (OCDE) are utilizing. He stated that the OCDE requires 2011-12 reductions in Plan B, in the amount of \$31.5 million, but unsure of the actual reductions due to proposed reductions and/or increases for 2011-12. He then highlighted considerations for the third Interim. He next reviewed a chart showing OCDE required reductions for 2012-13 in the amount of \$32 million and stated that negotiations with certificated and classified associations are ongoing and expects to present the Third Interim Report identifying the remaining 2011-12 budget reduction measures. In addition, on June 28, 2011, staff will bring the 2011-12 budget for Board action. He stated that SAUSD is on a wait mode awaiting information from Sacramento.

# Denying the Charter School Petition for the Quest Academy Charter School

WHEREAS, pursuant to Education Code Section 47600 et seq., the Governing Board of the Santa Ana Unified School District ("District Board") is required to review and consider authorization of charter schools;

WHEREAS, the Quest Academy Charter School ("Quest" or "Charter School") submitted a Charter School Petition on or about February 17, 2011;

WHEREAS, in reviewing the Petition for the establishment of this Charter School, the District Board has been cognizant of the intent of the Legislature that charter schools are and should become an integral part of the California educational system and that establishment of charter schools should be encouraged;

WHEREAS, a public hearing on the provisions of the Charter was conducted on March 8, 2011, pursuant to Education Code Section 47605, at which time the District Board considered the level of support for this Charter by teachers employed by the District, other employees of the District, and parents;

WHEREAS, at that public hearing only one lead petitioner spoke on behalf of the Quest Charter Petition, and no District teachers, other District employees, parents/guardians, or other members of the public spoke in support of the Quest Charter Petition;

WHEREAS, the District staff, working with District legal counsel, has reviewed and analyzed all information received with respect to the Charter Petition and information related to the operation and potential effects of the proposed Charter School, and made a recommendation to the District Board that the Charter Petition be denied based on that review;

WHEREAS, the District Board has fully considered the Charter submitted for the establishment of the Charter School and the recommendation provided by District staff; April NGW, 2 THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED that the Governing Board of the Santa Ana Unified School District finds the above listed recitals to be true and correct and incorporates them herein by this reference.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED AND ORDERED that the Governing Board of the Santa Ana Unified School District, having fully considered and evaluated the Petition for the establishment of Quest, hereby finds the Petition not to be consistent with sound educational practice, based upon grounds and factual findings including, but not limited to, the following, and hereby denies the Petition pursuant to Education Code Section 47605:

A. The Charter School presents an unsound educational program for the pupils to be enrolled in the Charter School. [Education Code Section 47605(b)(1)]

B. The Petitioners are demonstrably unlikely to successfully implement the program set forth in the Petition. [Education Code Section 47605(b)(2)]

C. The Petition does not contain reasonably comprehensive descriptions of all of the required elements. [Education Code Section 47605(b)(5)]

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED AND ORDERED that the Governing Board of the Santa Ana Unified School District hereby determines the foregoing findings are supported by the following specific facts:

I. THE CHARTER SCHOOL PRESENTS AN UNSOUND EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM FOR THE PUPILS TO BE ENROLLED IN THE CHARTER SCHOOL. [Education Code Section 47605(b)(1)]

A. The description of the education program is inadequate. The Charter contains references to people and organizations that are associated with current research on successful models of effective urban high schools and includes laudable goals and educational "buzzwords," but does not include the necessary description, plan, and substance to back them up or explain exactly what would actually be implemented at the proposed Quest.

1. For example, page 17 of the Charter includes a laundry list of "features" for learning best to occur, but the Charter includes few specifics to ensure that features will be successfully implemented at the proposed Charter School. It is not enough to describe how learning best occurs, the Charter would need to include a clear, practical, and specific plan for how such goals and proposals would be successfully implemented at the proposed Charter School.

- B. The Charter School's proposed blended program, incorporately and in-seat components, is not clearly described or defined.
  - 1. It is impossible to determine how the online component folds into the daily in-seat program, and whether the online portion occurs at the Quest site and/or whether the online component occurs during the regular school day, during the extended school day, or entirely separately from the in-seat day.
  - 2. While the Charter specifies that mathematics and English language arts are the subjects that will be taught through the online component of the program, the Charter fails to explain whether these two fundamental subjects will be taught exclusively through online programs, if there will also be face-to-face classes in these subjects, and, if so, how the online and face-to-face classes would actually be blended successfully. The Charter also does not identify what online math and ELA course will be used.
- C. The Charter Petition does not adequately address the provision of services pursuant to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act ("IDEIA"), and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 ("Section 504"), and/or the Americans with Disabilities Act ("ADA"). The District has numerous concerns regarding the proposed language in the Charter Petition related to the provision of services pursuant to the IDEIA, Section 504, and the ADA.
  - 1. The Charter Petition states that "initially and by default, Quest Academy Charter School shall be considered a 'school of the district' for purposes of Special Education . . . however, should its board decide, Quest Academy Charter School reserves the right to make written verifiable assurances that it may become an independent local educational agency . . ." However, the Charter Petition does not indicate whether the Charter School will actually be attempting to obtain LEA status. Further, should Quest ever attempt to become its own LEA, such a change would constitute a material revision to the Charter and would require Quest to establish its ability to serve as its own LEA in compliance with Education Code Section 47641.
  - 2. Additionally, although not entirely clear and not specifically set forth, it appears that during any such time that the Charter School is considered a school of the District for purposes of special education, it is the intent of the Charter School that the District provide <u>all</u> special education services to students attending the Charter School. Further, the Charter Petition

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indicates that the District will retain all of the Charter School's funding pursuant to AB 602 to cover the District's costs for providing special education and related services to students attending the Charter School. However, AB 602 funding does not cover the District's actual costs for providing special education and related services, however, the Charter Petition does not indicate that the Charter School is willing to contribute its equitable share of the District's unfunded special education in compliance with California Education Code Section 47646, which specifies that a charter school for which the authorizing school district serves as the LEA shall contribute "an equitable share of its charter school block grant funding to support district-wide special education instruction services," including services to charter school students. This contribution specifically is not limited to an arrangement whereby the District retains only AB 602 funds. Nor has Quest budgeted for such additional expenses. Specifically, the budget assumption narrative states:

Special Education costs have been budgeted and expensed for identical amounts, based on the assumption that SAUSD will assume and retain all AB602 funds generated by charter school, in exchange for Special Ed services as described in Element 1.

This is an unsound budget assumption, as there is no basis for Quest to assume that the District will cover the potentially high expense for unfunded special education costs related to Quest's operation or excuse Quest's contribution to special education costs pursuant to Education Code Section 47646.

3. The District is also concerned with Quest's staffing plan to assure compliance with the IDEIA and Section 504. The Charter states that "[s]hould funding and recruitment allow, it is the goal of Quest Academy Charter School to employ at least one fulltime core subject teacher who . . : will also possess a Special Education Credential. This teacher . . . will be the primary Quest Academy Charter School representative tasked with assuring that all aspects of the IEP and any possible 504 plans are properly implemented." Otherwise, Quest will assign another faculty member to this task, which appears to put at risk Quest's ability properly to implement IEP and 504 requirements. compliance with both the IDEIA and Section 504 are legal mandates

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which hare not excused due to lack of funds &Pridn3@cc265Hul recruiting efforts. While all California public schools are facing severe budget crises, they must budget in a manner that assures compliance with these laws.

- The Charter Petition does not set forth any plan for how the School will provide special education and services to special education students if and when the Charter School decides to become its own LEA. However, the Charter Petition does indicate (although in the section titled Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act) that the "Charter School reserves right make alternative arrangements representation in and resolution of legal disputes pertaining to special education" if the Charter School elects to become its own This demonstrates a fundamental lack of understanding of LEA. the impact of and requirements for becoming an LEA related to the provision of special education and related services. its own LEA would shift the entire burden of all aspects of compliance with the IDEIA, including legal defense, exclusively Further, whether or not Quest is its own LEA, it is to Quest. solely responsible and liable for compliance with Section 504, including the resolution of legal disputes related thereto.
- 5. The Charter Petition fails to adequately set forth how the Charter School will comply with Section 504. First, the Charter Petition fails to identify an employee with the specific responsibility of ensuring compliance with Section 504, such as a 504 Coordinator. Second, the Charter Petition does not identify who will be responsible for conducting evaluations for students with a suspected disability pursuant to Section 504. District is specifically concerned about this issue, given the fact that 34 C.F.R. 104 requires the Section 504 evaluation to be conducted by a team or group of persons including those who are knowledgeable about the student, the suspected handicapping condition, evaluative procedures, the meaning of evaluative data, and accommodation and placement options. The Charter Petition does not currently provide for any employees who would meet the above-listed requirements (except perhaps a teacher with a special education credential, but only if funding permits). Moreover, the Charter Petition does not explain how it could provide related services, should they be required for a student eligible under Section 504, either with its own staff or by

April 26, 2011 contracting out. Further, the budget does not provide any funds
for the provision of related services pursuant to Section 504.

In the District's experience, such services can be very costly
and the failure to plan for them could negatively impact the
operations of the Charter School.

- 6. Lastly, while the Charter Petition does indicate that the Charter School will comply with the ADA, it does not contain any information as to how the Charter School will comply with the ADA.
- D. The Plan for English Learners is inadequate. The flaws include, but are not limited to:
  - 1. The Charter lacks clarity as to the specific program model Quest would institute to address the needs of the projected English Learner ("EL") population, which is estimated at 41 percent.
  - 2. The overall instructional plan to address the needs of EL students is neither clear nor well articulated.
  - 3. The Charter portrays an overall lack of understanding of the differences of, and purpose for, Immersion, Structured English Immersion, Specially Designed Academic Instruction in English, and mainstream programs.
- II. THE PETITIONERS ARE DEMONSTRABLY UNLIKELY TO SUCCESSFULLY IMPLEMENT THE PROGRAM SET FORTH IN THE PETITION. [Education Code Section 47605(b)(2)]
  - A. The Charter raises a variety of budget and finance issues. For example:
    - Education Code Section 47605(g) specifically requires the Charter petitioners to submit cash flow projections for the first three years of operation, but the Quest Charter failed to include such cash flow.
    - 2. The lack of detailed budget assumptions makes it difficult to determine how projections were reached in both the Revenue and Expenditure sections of the budget documents. While Quest attempts to explain its cost figures, many of the expenses appear to be underestimated, particularly in the area of supplies.
      - a. The budgeted figure of \$6,250 for 90 computers in the first year may support the purchase of the computers themselves, but appears inadequate to support implementing technology infrastructure.
      - b. The budgeted \$8,000 for health and welfare benefits is very low. Based on the information provided, and since the

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District cannot determine whether this is for the 6 employee only, it assumed that this amount is the "cap" of what Quest would pay. Based on current market and conditions, the District believes that this amount would be sufficient only to provide employee only coverage under an HMO medical plan, without any dental, vision, or life coverage, as indicated in the Charter. This would be detrimental in Quest's efforts to recruit top quality employees.

- 1) Further, health and welfare benefits are understated in future years compared to the start-up year, with no explanation how those figures were determined.
- B. The various issues, concerns, and deficiencies discussed above related to the provision of services pursuant to the IDEIA, Section 504, and the ADA are hereby incorporated herein by this reference. A failure properly and fully to comply with these legal requirements would necessarily mean that Quest was not effectively implementing the proposed Charter with respect to the education and rights of students protected by these laws.
- C. The Charter provides: "Prior to the expiration of the charter, SAUSD will, at its own expense, contract [with] an independent third party to perform a school evaluation based upon the measurable goals and terms outlined in this charter." This is unacceptable to the District. an initial matter, the District would not agree to expend District resources to contract with a third party for a Quest school evaluation in order for Quest to obtain renewal of its charter; such burdens and expenses would be the Charter School's responsibility. Further, the Charter Schools Act addresses charter renewals, and renewals are "governed by the standards and criteria in [Education Code] Section This does not include any requirement that the District undertake a third party analysis of the Charter School. Additionally, the District would require Quest to establish its compliance with the academic performance criteria of Education Code Section 47607(b), that is not a District burden.
- D. The various issues, concerns, and deficiencies discussed above related to the English Learner program are hereby incorporated herein by this reference. A failure properly and fully to comply with these legal requirements would necessarily mean that Quest was not effectively implementing the proposed Charter with respect to the education and rights of EL students.

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THE FETTION DOES NOT CONTAIN REASONABLY COMPREHENSIVE DESCRIPTIONS OF ALL OF THE REQUIRED ELEMENTS. [Education Code Section 47605(b)(5)]

- A. DESCRIPTION OF THE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM OF THE SCHOOL. [Ed. Code \$47605(b)(5)(A)(i)]
  - All of the above-described concerns regarding the unsoundness of the educational program and the inadequacy of the Charter's description thereof are hereby incorporated herein by this reference.
- B. THE QUALIFICATIONS TO BE MET BY INDIVIDUALS TO BE EMPLOYED BY THE SCHOOL. [Ed. Code §47605(b)(5)(E)] According to the description of duties, no Quest administrators, including the Executive Director (who "[e]stablishes budgets and plans to ensure that school meets its financial commitments to its students, staff and community") or the Dean of Students (who "will oversee the financial affairs of the corporation") are required to have any business and finance education, training or experience, in general, or in public school finance in particular. Public school finance is a complex field that differs significantly from private sector business and finance. Particularly in the current economic crisis facing California's public including schools, charter schools, is imperative that the individual(s) responsible for a charter school's business and finances have the necessary expertise in this area of specialization.
- C. THE PROCEDURES THAT THE SCHOOL WILL FOLLOW TO ENSURE THE HEALTH AND SAFETY OF PUPILS AND STAFF. [Ed. Code \$47605(b)(5)(F)]

  The Charter includes its discussion of insurance and indemnification in this section of the Charter, but these elements are not adequate to protect the Charter School or the District from potential liability for Quest's acts or omissions, despite the fact that Quest will be operated by a 501(c)(3) nonprofit public benefit corporation. The identified insurance levels are too low and the limited indemnification provisions included in the Charter do not protect the District from liability, particularly if there is not adequate insurance to allow those indemnification provisions to be enforced.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED AND ORDERED that the terms of this Resolution are severable. Should it be determined that one or more of the findings and/or the factual determinations supporting the findings is invalid, the remaining findings and/or factual determinations and the denial of the Charter shall remain in full force and effect. In this regard, the District Board specifically finds that each factual determination, in and of itself, is a sufficient basis for the finding it
