Student Information System Update

- In July 2009, the Board authorized the purchase of a new Student Information System (SIS) in order to meet the increased needs for gathering, accessing, and managing data in support of student academic success
- The AERIES SIS is utilized to integrate with other data systems and provide a singular system to:
 - Maintain attendance records
 - Enroll students
 - Create class and teacher schedules
 - Maintain various student records, including discipline and health
 - Handle records of grades and academic progression
 - Provide statistical reports
 - Communicate to parents through a parent portal* (upcoming)



AERIES SIS Implementation Update

- Our comprehensive plan uses a phased implementation approach to ensure success
- Weekly meetings involving key departments and stakeholders to provide support to site implementation of AERIES
 - Monday morning SIS core department meeting
 - Thursday morning SIS briefing to Cabinet representatives
 - Friday mornings SIS "Level 2" functional group meetings
- Utilizing AERIES we can closely monitor enrollment, attendance and demographics in a more efficient manner to concentrate on processes and procedures



Implementation Phases of AERIES

- Phase I AERIES "Go Live"
 - Elementary schools: May 2010
 - All schools: start of 2010-11 school year
- Phase II AERIES Gradebook
 - Selected schools: start of 2011-12 school year
 - All identified schools: start of 2012-13 school year
- Phase III Parent Portal
 - Attendance view at second semester, 2010-11 school year
 - Attendance and grades at selected school sites, start of 2011-12 school year
 - Attendance and grades at all schools, start of 2012-13 school year



Attention2Attendance

- In April 2010, the Board authorized the implementation of a system that would allow us to effectively manage and increase our attendance (ADA)
- This system called Attention2Attendance® (A2A) is comprised of four main components
 - Attendance Notifications
 - Conference Management
 - Data Analysis
 - Professional Consultation
- Our comprehensive plan uses a phased implementation approach to ensure success



- Phase I (End of FY 2009/10)
 - Establish District A2A Core Team
 - Meet with sites to conduct brainstorming sessions
 - Assist with SIS (AERIES) Transition & Certification
 - Integrate data into system correctly and check for accuracy
- Phase II (Fall 2010)
 - Launch eTruancy (letters) and Conferencing (parent meeting)
 - Communicate, incentivize, recognize, monitor and adjust as appropriate
- Phase III (next step Winter 2010 /11)
 - Launch Attendance Monitoring System (individualized attendance website dashboard)



Phase I Building the Foundation

- Establish a district-level team focused on improving attendance
- Conduct brainstorming sessions with sites
- Integrated attendance data into letter generation reporting system (eTruancy)
- Collaborated to create State Attendance Certification Manual and develop communiqués to share best practices

- The first group of letters were sent home to Parents beginning October 8, 2010
- Early communication and intervention regarding attendance patterns is essential to changing attendance behaviors
 - eTruancy delivers weekly letters to parents as students meet attendance thresholds
 - In addition to Truancy notifications, excessive excused absence letters are now sent
 - Sites monitor letters that are being sent and set up followup conferences

- Indicators of a successful Attendance Notification
 - Appropriate number of attendance notifications are being sent
 - Low suppression rates are achieved and maintained
 - Decrease in questions on process and application
 - Sites are able to successfully and confidently field calls from parents regarding unexcused and excused attendance notifications
 - Over 120 Site Personnel were trained to use the system over a twoday period

- After three weeks of parent notification, trends are developing in the data
 - 3,316 compliant truancy letters sent
 - 819 excessive excused absence notifications sent
 - 462 letters suppressed at school sites



Phase II Conferencing

- Student conferencing is a key intervention point aligns
 District, parents and student expectations on attendance
- Indicators of a successful conference process
 - Conference procedures (from scheduling to closing) are incorporated into District processes
 - Site Administrators, Attendance Field Workers and Outreach Consultants are documenting interventions in single system of record
 - District and sites have confidence in conference activities if escalated to SARB and/or OC Truancy Court
 - Sites are able to successfully and confidently field calls from parents regarding conference procedures and activities



Next Step Phase III AMS Dashboard

- Attendance Monitoring System (AMS) is a personalized attendance webpage for each site that which places all attendance data at the administrators fingertips that will allow us to:
 - Ensure AERIES data is reported accurately
 - Identify attendance trends per site/per day of the week
 - Monitor and track ADA goals at the site level
 - Associate attendance with learning time (lost or gained)
 - Associate attendance with revenue (lost or gained) uses
 District-based revenue limit
 - Conduct site by site comparative attendance analysis
 - Conduct year to year attendance analysis by site, or districtwide

Current enrollment, while less than last year's CBEDS by 422, is greater than budgeted by 406 students.

This includes an decrease of 91 students since our last Board presentation.
