State Funding Changes (on-going? funds)

- The adopted State Budget eliminated several of the Governor's original reductions, adding approximately \$271/ADA or \$13.8 million for SAUSD through
 - Elimination of negative 0.39% COLA
 - Elimination of on-going revenue limit reduction of negative 3.85%
- Additional changes related to mandated claims funding and County mental health have not been quantified

Federal Funding Changes (one-time funds)

- Jobs Bill (subject to statutory guidelines)
 - Award amount for SAUSD: \$10.3 million (\$9.2 million received)
- ARRA Stabilization
 - State to distribute remaining 10% of ARRA Stabilization funds held
 - Projected award amount: <u>\$2 million</u> (?)

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Election Impact to State Budget

While now both houses and the Governor's office are all from the same political party, there are significant concerns as the newly elected officials move to Sacramento.

— "It is likely there will be a midyear budget session."

Election Impact to State Budget Cont'd

- Proposition 25 was approved allowing the State to adopt a budget by a simple majority rather than the two-thirds vote.
- Proposition 26 was also approved which classifies some fees as taxes which then require a two-thirds vote.
- Proposition 22 limits the State's ability to take local funds immediately creating a new \$1 billion hole in the current year State budget.

Santa Ana Election Impact to Unified School District State Budget - Next Steps

- The real budget will be developed by the new Governor, when he takes office and at that time, there may be significant cuts to Education as soon as the January budget proposal.
- Newly elected Governor Jerry Brown stated that he would begin taking action on the State budget immediately, with some actions coming even before he takes office.



Reality Check

 School Services of California (SSC) is equally concerned and advises districts to:

"Open the planning books but close the checkbook."

- In other words,
 - Include the additional revenues for budget purposes
 -but don't spend any of the dollars
 - Instead, wait until the January 2011 Governor's Proposal or better yet, the May Revise (2011) before spending any of these dollars.





Adopted State Budget & Budget Reductions

- The Orange County Department of Education has issued guidance that require districts to revise their budget to the current State adopted budget
- Utilizing the State Adopted Budget assumptions, <u>preliminarily</u> projected budget reductions will be adjusted as follows for the first interim:

(\$s in millions) Reductions Required to Eliminate Deficit	2011-12	2012-13
Budget Cuts (May Revise assumptions)	<\$31.5>	<\$30.5>
Budget Cuts (State Adopted Budget assumptions)	<\$18.0>	<\$24.0>

 OCDE will require districts to identify ongoing budget reductions for 2011-12 by the 2nd interim budget (March 8, 2011)


In submitting the 2010-11 First Interim Report and an implementation plan for budget reductions in 2010-11, the Board understands its fiduciary responsibility to maintain fiscal solvency for the current and subsequent two fiscal years. If necessary, it is recognized that based on the 2010-11 Enacted State Budget, the school district will implement \$(18.0 million*) in ongoing budget reductions in 2011-12 and an additional \$(24.0 million*) reductions in 2012-13 to maintain fiscal solvency. It is further recognized that the school district will submit a revised detailed list of Board approved ongoing budget reductions for 2011-12 with the 2010-11 Second Interim Report.
