BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board approval of the Memorandum of Understanding with the Orange County Health Care Agency (HCA) to ensure provision of AB 3632 Mental Health services for students with disabilities until July 1, 2011. The cost is \$120,000 for services to approximately 27 students.

This agenda item is not to be confused with the December 14, 2010 Board agenda item that focused on potential litigation toward enforcing a former MOU with HCA. The future of that litigation is now under review in light of interim agreements that were reached with the HCA.

RATIONALE:

In responses to the challenges of the former Governor's veto of AB 3632 funding, the Appellate and State courts have ruled that Counties are released from the obligation to provide AB 3632 Mental Health services for students with disabilities. As the primary agency responsible for IEP services, schools have to assume the responsibility.

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) does not address the additional 2010-11 cost for residential treatment placements which will be the responsibility of Santa Ana Unified School District estimated at \$130,000. At the April 12, 2011 Board meeting, approval will be requested for this additional cost.

AGREEMENT FOR PROVISION OF 1 2 EDUCATIONALLY-RELATED MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES BETWEEN 3 COUNTY OF ORANGE HEALTH CARE AGENCY 4 AND 5 SANTA ANA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT 6 APRIL 1, 2011 THROUGH JUNE 30, 2011 7 8 9 THIS AGREEMENT is entered into this 1st day of April 2011, which date is enumerated for purposes of reference only, is by and between the COUNTY of ORANGE (COUNTY) and SANTA 10 ANA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT (DISTRICT). This AGREEMENT shall be administered by the 11 County of Orange Health Care Agency (HCA). (Note: The terms "COUNTY" and "HCA" are used 12. interchangeably in this AGREEMENT.) 13 WHEREAS, Government Code Section 7570 et seq. (also known as "AB 3632") and its 14 implementing regulations remain codified; which shifts state's obligation to county mental health 15 agencies to conduct mental health assessments and to provide necessary mental health-related services, 16 including referral, where appropriate to, residential care-based treatment (placement including the 17 provision of psychotherapy) to students with disabilities, as determined by an individualized education 18 programs ("IEP"), pursuant to Government Code sections 7570, 7572, and 7572.5; 19 WHEREAS, the State Legislature, in the Budget Act, provides for the pass-through of federal 20 Individuals with Disabilities Education Act ("IDEA") funding for the provision of educationally-related 21 mental health services to students with disabilities as determined by an IEP pursuant to AB 3632 by 22 transmitting the funds to county offices of education from the State Superintendent of Public Instruction; 23 WHEREAS, in previous fiscal years the Budget Act required each county office of education and 24 county mental health agency to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding for the purpose of 25 transferring these federal IDEA grant funds, subject to the fulfillment of the grant's terms and 26 conditions, to the county mental health agency for educationally-related mental health services as set 27 forth in AB 3632 that are provided to students with disabilities as determined by an IEP; 28 29 WHEREAS, in Budget Acts for fiscal years preceding the current Budget Act for fiscal year 2010-11 the state has also provided General Fund support to the counties to provide an array of 30 educationally-related mental health services to students with disabilities pursuant to an IEP. And 31 counties obtained reimbursement for that portion in excess of IDEA funding pursuant to the SB 90 32 claiming process; 33 34 35 36

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WHEREAS, on October 8, 2010, California Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger ("Governor") exercised the line-item veto in relation to Item 8885-295-0001 of the Budget Act for fiscal year 2010-11 by deleting \$132,941,000 in appropriations scheduled to reimburse local mental health agencies for costs incurred in fiscal years 2004-05 through 2008-09 associated with providing educationally-related mental health services mandated by AB 3632, and in so doing stated "(t)his mandate is suspended";

WHEREAS, the Legislature failed to appropriate state funds in the approximate amount of \$70 million required by Welfare and Institutions Code section 18355 necessary to pay counties for the board and care costs for seriously emotionally disturbed students;

WHEREAS, there are three lawsuits pending in the courts regarding the Governor's veto of the \$132,941,000;

WHEREAS, the Judge in the case of County of Sacramento, et al., v. State of California, et al., Sacramento Superior Court case Number 34-2010-00090983 issued an Order on February 9, 2011 and found that the state mandate upon counties to provide services pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code section 18355 (residential board and care costs) is suspended based on the Legislature's failure to fund the program;

WHEREAS, the California Court of Appeal, Second Appellate District, Division Three issued a ruling on February 25, 2011 in the case of California School Boards Association, et al., v. Edmund G. Brown Jr., as Governor etc., et al., case number B228680 and held that the Governor's veto was properly exercised, and had the legal effect of suspending operation of the mandate;

WHEREAS, the Parties to this Agreement are unaware whether appeals will be filed in any of the pending lawsuits and therefore do not know what the final conclusion will be on the subject of the status of the AB 3632 mandate for fiscal year 2010-2011;

WHEREAS, the validity of the Governor's suspension of the AB 3632 mandate and the status of the mandate are currently matters of disagreement between the Parties;

WHEREAS, on October 29, 2010, the State Superintendent of Public Instruction ("SPI") announced that the California Department of Education ("CDE") will continue to allocate \$76 million in available federal IDEA funds to maintain essential mental health services for students with disabiliities despite the Governor's suspension of the AB 3632 mandate and his line-item veto of almost \$133 million in mandate reimbursement for services provided by county mental health agencies;

WHEREAS, the SPI stated that the \$76 million to be disbursed by the CDE will ensure mental health services that are included within a student's IEP, pursuant to the IDEA, are appropriately provided during the 2010-11 fiscal year by county mental health agencies consistent with current statute;

WHEREAS, the federal IDEA funds are insufficient to entirely fund the AB 3632 services provided by county mental health for the 2010-11 fiscal year;

I. HCA'S PROVISION OF SERVICES

- A. HCA agrees to continue to provide educationally-related mental health services from April 1, 2011 through and including June 30, 2011. Educationally-related mental health services for eligible students may include, but not be limited to attending IEP meetings, assessments, individual therapy, group therapy, collateral services, case management, medication management, and residential placement mental health services (excluding board and care).
- B. HCA agrees to provide monthly "Student by School District" Reports to DISTRICT to review and validate that HCA's Integrated Records Information System ("IRIS") has AB 3632 students documented in the correct district of residence, per the most current IEP found in the county mental health record.
- C. HCA agrees to provide two "AB 3632 Service Detail" reports to DISTRICT which provide detail of covered mental health services provided to eligible students.
- D. HCA agrees to seek out and apply for other sources of county, state or federal funding that may be available, including but not limited to, funding from Medi-Cal or the Department of Social Services and consistent with applicable laws. Such funding and/or reimbursement received by HCA for educationally-related mental health services shall offset any amount DISTRICT is required to fund under this Agreement. The accounting of expenditures to DISTRICT shall reflect the costs of services, the amount and payment of any offsets, and the net cost for the reimbursement.

II. RESIDENTIAL PLACEMENT AND PAYMENT OF ROOM AND BOARD

During the term of this AGREEMENT, HCA will make recommendations for students requiring residential placement directly to DISTRICT. DISTRICT will be responsible for making payments to residential treatment facilities for the board and care costs of students placed from their district.

III. TRANSFER OF IDEA FUNDS FOR AB 3632 SERVICES UNTIL IDEA FUNDS ARE EXHAUSTED

OCDE has committed to pass through federal IDEA funds as they are received to HCA for the provision of AB 3632 Services. This amount totals approximately \$12 million for the 2010-2011 fiscal year.

- A. The transfer of such IDEA funds shall only be for educationally-related mental health services for eligible students.
- B. HCA will provide a report to OCDE and the School Districts as to when it projects the federal IDEA funds allocated and distributed to OCDE for mental health services for eligible students will be exhausted. Current estimates suggest that these IDEA funds will be exhausted on March 31, 2011. The Parties anticipate HCA will distribute this report on or before March 4, 2011.

VI. MISCELLANEOUS

- A. If a court of competent jurisdiction reaches a final and binding decision that the Governor lacked authority to suspend the AB 3632 mandate, or a court, the Legislature or the Governor make a final determination that the State Department of Mental Health and its local county mental health agencies are responsible for providing AB 3632 Services during fiscal year 2010-11 and find that State reimbursement will be available, the Parties agree that HCA will reimburse DISTRICT for any Additional Costs that have been paid to HCA for provision of educationally-related mental health services during the term of this AGREEMENT within ninety (90) days.
- B. If reimbursement is due pursuant to Section VI.A. above, HCA will submit an SB 90 claim to the State for AB 3632 costs incurred during fiscal year 2010-11. If requested, DISTRICT will reasonably cooperate with HCA's efforts to seek reimbursement from the State of California through the SB 90 claiming process.
- C. Parties agree that neither side is waiving its legal arguments, remedies or right to reimbursement in connection with this Agreement or as to the effect of the Governor's suspension of the AB 3632 mandate and line item veto of funding.
- D. Referrals and assessment reports. HCA and DISTRICT agree to abide by the policies and procedures for making student referrals and providing the necessary assessment reports as mandated in Government Code Section 7576 and clarified in Title 2, Division 9, CCR, Section 60040 in connection with the services and understandings outlined in this AGREEMENT.
- E. Privacy. HCA and DISTRICT acknowledge the protections afforded to student health information under regulations adopted pursuant to the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, Pub. L. No. 14-109, students records under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, 20 USC Section 1232g; and under provisions of state law relating to privacy. COUNTY and DISTRICT shall ensure that all activities undertaken under this AGREEMENT will conform to the requirements of these laws.
 - F. Indemnity.
- 1. COUNTY and DISTRICT shall each defend, hold harmless and indemnify the other party, its governing board, officers, administrators, agents, employees, independent contractors, subcontractors, consultants, and other representatives from and against any and all liabilities, claims, demands, costs, losses, damages, or expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees and costs, and

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including but not limited to consequential damages, loss of use, extra expense, cost of facilities, death, sickness, or injury to any person(s) or damage to any property, from any cause whatsoever arising from or connected with its service hereunder, that arise out of or result from, in whole or in part, the negligent, wrongful or willful acts or omissions of the indemnifying party, its employees, agents, subcontractors, independent contractors, consultants, or other representatives.

- 2. This indemnity provision shall survive the term of this AGREEMENT and is in addition to any other rights or remedies that COUNTY or DISTRICT may have under law and/or this AGREEMENT.
- G. Laws and Venue. This AGREEMENT shall be interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of California. If any action is brought to interpret or enforce any term of this AGREEMENT, the action shall be brought in a state or federal court situated in the County of Orange, State of California, unless otherwise specifically provided for under California law.
- H. Third Party Rights. Nothing in this AGREEMENT shall be construed to give any rights or benefits to anyone other than DISTRICT and COUNTY.
- I. Severability. The unenforceability, invalidity or illegality of any provision(s) of this AGREEMENT shall not render the other provisions unenforceable, invalid, or illegal.
 - J. Term. This AGREEMENT shall cover the period of April 1, 2011 through June 30, 2011.
- K. Dispute Resolution. HCA and DISTRICT agree that resolution of disputes on the implementation of this AGREEMENT will be initially conducted through collaborative efforts between the Parties. In the event a collaborative resolution cannot be achieved, the Parties agree that Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations at §4600, et seq. relating to "Uniform Complaint Procedures" will be applied.
 - L. Default; force majeure.
- 1. Neither party shall be deemed to be in default of the terms of this AGREEMENT if either party is prevented from performing its terms by causes beyond its control, including without being limited to: acts of God; any laws and/or regulations of State or Federal government; or any catastrophe resulting from flood, fire, explosion, or other causes beyond the control of the defaulting party. If any of the stated contingencies occur, the party delayed by force majeure shall immediately give the other parties written notice of the cause for delay. The party delayed by force majeure shall use reasonable diligence to correct the cause of the delay, if correctable, and if the condition that caused the delay is corrected, the party delayed shall immediately give the other parties written notice thereof and shall resume performance of the terms of this AGREEMENT.
- 2. Neither party shall be liable for any excess costs if the failure to perform the AGREEMENT arises from any of the contingencies listed above.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is to present to the Board the High School Advanced Placement Art History Course for first reading in accordance with Board Policy (BP) and Administrative Regulation (AR) 6145.5 -Advanced Placement.

RATIONALE:

This Advanced Placement course will introduce students to a full year of college coursework through the intense study of Art History. In the course, students examine major forms of artistic expression from the ancient world to the present and from a variety of cultures. They learn to look at and analyze works of art within their historical context. and to articulate what they see or experience in a meaningful way. A meaningful way to experience works of art is learning to frame an understanding that relates how and why works of art communicate visual meaning. The main objectives of AP curriculum in Art History are to develop in students:

- 1. the ability to apply fundamental art and art historical terminology.
- 2. an appreciation for the process of making and displaying art.
- 3. an understanding of purpose and function of art.
- 4. the abilty to analyze works of art in context of historical evidence and interpretation, examining such issues as politics, religion, patronage, gender, and ethnicity.
- 5. an understanding of cross-cutural and global nature of art.
- 6. the ability to perform higher order thinking skills and articulate visual and art historical concepts in verbal and written forms.

This course will also prepare students for Advanced Placement Art History exam which is administered in the spring. The course currently meets the "F" requirement for University of California admissions as well as the criteria for Honors/Advanced Placement designation. Students will be encouraged to take the Advanced Placement examination in this subject area.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek Board approval to amend the Facilities Use Agreement between SAUSD and El Sol Science and Arts Academy Charter School.

El Sol Science and Arts Academy of Santa Ana and the Santa Ana Unified School District entered into a Charter Facilities Use Agreement dated June 26, 2007, whereby the District allows use of the District's property located at 1010 N. Broadway in Santa Ana by El Sol for the operation of the El Sol Science and Arts Academy of Santa Ana. The term of the original agreement expired on June 30, 2010. However, the Santa Ana Unified School District Board has previously approved amendments to extend the term of the original agreement to facilitate continued discussions and negotiations between the parties crucial to the development of a viable agreement. All other terms and conditions of the Agreement have remained in effect.

Although a feasible Charter Facilities Use Agreement has been drafted, additional time is required to allow for the resolution of specific fine points inherent to the agreement between the parties. To facilitate the completion of a final draft of the proposed agreement and the subsequent review and approval of the document by both parties, the Santa Ana Unified School District Board is asked at this time to approve an amendment to extend the term of the original Agreement until June 30, 2011, with all other terms and conditions of the Agreement remaining in effect.

RATIONALE:

Pursuant to Section 18 of the current charter facilities use agreement, the agreement may be amended by a written instrument executed by both parties. An amendment to the charter facilities use agreement by and between the parties has been drafted and fully executed by the charter school.

AMENDMENT TO CHARTER FACILITIES AGREEMENT BY AND BETWEEN SANTA ANA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AND EL SOL SCIENCE AND ARTS ACADEMY OF SANTA ANA

THIS AMENDMENT ("Amendment") to the Charter Facilities Agreement dated June 26, 2007 by and between Santa Ana Unified School District and El Sol Science and Arts Academy of Santa Ana is made this 22nd day of March, 2011 (the "Effective Date"), by and between Santa Ana Unified School District, a public school district organized and existing under the laws of the State of California ("District") and El Sol Science and Arts Academy of Santa Ana, a California non-profit public benefit corporation incorporated for purposes of operating El Sol Science and Arts Academy, a California public charter school ("Charter School"). The District and Charter School are collectively referred to as "the parties."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, El Sol Science and Arts Academy of Santa Ana ("El Sol') and the Santa Ana Unified School District ("District") entered into a Charter Facilities Use Agreement ("Agreement") dated June 26, 2007, whereby the District allows use of the District's property located at 1010 N. Broadway in Santa Ana ("property") by El Sol for the operation of the El Sol Science and Arts Academy of Santa Ana;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 1 of the Agreement, the Charter School's right to exclusive use of the Subject Property shall conclude at the expiration of this Agreement on June 30, 2010;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 18 of the Agreement, this Agreement, together with its attachments, constitutes the entire agreement between the parties and supersedes all prior discussions, negotiations and agreements, whether oral or written and may be amended or modified only by a written instrument executed by the Parties;

WHEREAS, at the June 22, 2010, meeting of the Santa Ana Unified School District Board of Education, an amendment extending the original charter facilities use agreement between the parties for ninety (90) days until September 28, 2010, was approved. All other terms and conditions of the Agreement remained in effect;

WHEREAS, during the ninety (90) day extension of the term of the Agreement, the Parties did engage in negotiation of, in good faith, a long term lease between the Parties for the Charter School's use of the property;

WHEREAS, at the expiration of the ninety (90) day extension of the original charter facilities use agreement on September 30, 2010, the parties desired to amend the agreement to extend the term for an additional thirty (30) days until October 31, 2010, to facilitate continued negotiation of, in good faith, a long term lease between the Parties for the Charter School's use of the property;

WHEREAS, at the September 28, 2010, meeting of the Santa Ana Unified School District Board of Education, an amendment extending the original Charter Facilities Use Agreement between the parties for an additional thirty (30) days was approved. All other terms and conditions of the Agreement remained in effect;

WHEREAS, discussions and negotiations between the parties has resulted in the drafting of a feasible Charter Facilities Use Agreement, additional time is still required to allow for the completion of review and approval of the document by the charter school governing board;

WHEREAS, to facilitate the completion of review and approval of the proposed facilities use agreement by the charter school governing board and to accommodate, if necessary, further discussion and negotiation, an amendment to further extend the term of the original charter facilities use agreement until November 31, 2010, was approved by the Santa Ana Unified School District Board on October 26, 2010.

WHEREAS, the development and refinement of several points of the proposed agreement was accomplished during the extension most recently approved by the Santa Ana Unified School District Board, the document is still pending finalization prior to submission to the Santa Ana Unified School District Board for consideration of approval. Therefore, approval of an extension of the term of the current agreement until June 30, 2011 in order to complete the remaining outstanding processes is being requested at this time.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the covenants and agreements hereinafter set forth, the Parties agree as follows:

Amendment 5. Extension of Term of Charter Facilities Agreement by and between Santa Ana Unified School District and El Sol Science and Arts Academy of Santa Ana.

Subsequent to the expiration of the first extension of the Charter Facilities Use Agreement, the Santa Ana Unified School District Board approved amendments to further extend the term of the original agreement. While all other terms and conditions of the Agreement remained in effect, the term of the Charter School's right to exclusive use of the Subject Property was extended to facilitate ongoing discussions and negotiations related to the development and drafting of a feasible facilities use agreement.
