#### **RATIONALE:**

The District is required to provide appropriate education, at no cost to parents, for all students with disabilities who reside within the District in accordance with their IEPs. If a program is not available, necessary contract services are required through a private provider.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION:**

The purpose of this agenda item is to request Board approval of an agreement with Concordia University, Irvine that would provide nursing students with school experience as one of their SAUSD currently has similar agreements with Santa Ana College, clinical placements. California State University, Fullerton and Dominguez Hills, and West Coast and Biola Universities. The agreement is ongoing unless terminated by either party.

#### RATIONALE:

Students who are enrolled in nursing programs are required to have learning experiences related to nursing roles in community settings. Giving students a chance to observe school nurses at work exposes them to the possibility of a career in school nursing and enhances their learning about community nursing. Students observe SAUSD nurses as they perform their duties and may assist with organizational tasks, as appropriate, under the direct supervision of an SAUSD nurse. The number of students and the duration of their assignment to SAUSD varies but could include two or three student nurses assigned to SAUSD twice weekly for one semester.

## AGREEMENT FOR USE OF CLINICAL FACILITIES BETWEEN

# Concordia University Irvine Division of Nursing and Santa Ana Unified School District

This agreement is made and entered into on		by

(hereinafter "the Facility) and Concordia Univ	versity (hereinafter "the University).	

#### WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the University is desirous of utilizing an operating nursing facility to provide a hands-on learning experience for its student nurses:

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the above premises and covenants hereinafter set forth, it is mutually agreed by and between the parties as follows:

#### I PURPOSE

The purpose of this agreement is to provide clinical training of Concordia University School of Nursing students in a quality nursing facility under the supervision of approved Facility staff and University nursing faculty.

#### II. TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT

This agreement may be terminated, with or without cause, by either party after giving the other party thirty (30) days of advance written notice of its intention to terminate. Any termination of the Agreement due to material breach of the covenants contained herein shall not take effect with respect to students participating in a clinical training program, until such time as the program is completed by enrolled students in accordance with its' original terms.

#### III. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE UNIVERSITY

- A. To accept responsibility for the development, organization, and implementation of the curricula under the direction of the University's Program Directors and Coordinator.
- B. To accept responsibility for the selection and guidance of the learning experience to meet the objectives of the curricula.
- C. To provide the Facility with qualified faculty whose purpose is instruction and supervision of students while they are in the Facility.
- D. To provide an administrative focal point in implementing this Agreement, including but not limited to furnishing copies of class schedules and student rotation in clinical assignments to the Facility, giving sufficient advance notice to allow the Facility to properly plan for the student rotation. University contact person: Mary E. Hobus, 1530 Concordia, Irvine, CA 92612; Phone (949) 854-8002, Ext. 1264, email mary. hobus@cui.edu and FAX (949)-854-6720.
- E. The University shall provide students orientation and training in Facility policies and procedures; rules and regulations; and concepts as set forth in Addendum A. The University shall maintain records documenting this training.

- F. Prior to clinical experience all students shall sign Facility's Confidentiality Statement (HIPAA). The University shall be responsible for maintaining these documents in the student's records.
- G. Prior to clinical experience all students shall sign the Facility's Child Abuse Reporting Form and Dependent Adult Abuse Reporting Form. The University shall be responsible for maintaining these documents in the student's records.
- H. The University shall be responsible for ensuring students possess and maintain current status of Basic Life Support (BLS) certification.
- I. Any student returning from an absence caused by illness or injury shall be cleared by a physician as monitored by the University.
- J. The University and the Facility shall meet yearly as otherwise deemed necessary to discuss the students' program, any existing problems and evaluation of student learning experience in the Facility.
- K. The University shall ensure that students are informed that: (i) they shall not receive any wages or employee benefits, either from the University or Facility; (ii) they shall be considered students who are receiving credit required as part of their curriculum; and (iii) they are not automatically entitled to a job at the Facility upon the conclusion of their clinical training.
- L. The University shall maintain standards of accreditation as formulated by its professional bodies.
- M. The University shall require each participating student to undergo an examination for physical fitness. The students shall provide proof of current immunization or immunity to Rubella, Rubeola, Varicella, Hepatitis B (or Declination) and a current PPD or tuberculosis evaluation. Records will be maintained by the University, kept in the nursing department at the University and reviewed by the appropriate University Director, Assistant Director or Faculty. The physical examination form, including immunization status will be provided to students admitted to the university and will be required to be completed before enrollment. The University shall comply with program health and applicable OSHA requirements and maintain records thereof.
- N. Each instructor for the University will dress professionally and wear an identification pin. Each student shall wear a uniform and identification pin designated by the University except when assigned to services for which the Facility requires and furnishes a special uniform.
- O. The University agrees to maintain in full force and effect coverage of not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for bodily injury, contractual liability and general liability insurance, including errors and omissions coverage of not less than three million dollars (\$3,000,000) which protects and insures against any and all liability attributable to the University, its employees, students, agents, officers, Board Members, and others arising from the activities required or contemplated under this agreement. Proof of the University insurance coverage shall be provided to the Facility. The University or its insurer shall provide written notice to the Facility at least twenty (20) days prior to any cancellation, termination or change in the insurance coverage referenced in this agreement. In the event that the University fails to maintain such insurance coverage in full force and effect during the term of this Agreement the Facility will terminate this agreement concurrently with such failure by the University.

#### IV. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE FACILITY

- A. The Facility will provide suitable learning experiences in the care of patients according to stated behavioral objectives identified in the course syllabus. Opportunity will be provided for students to obtain experience in all educationally relevant phases of patient care dependent on their area of study. The University faculty will be present at all times except for advanced senior preceptor clinical. Students will pursue course objectives with eventual pursuit of program outcomes all under instructor supervision. Students will have the privilege of consulting with members of medical and nursing services of the Facility on an individual basis or in conferences as recommended by the faculty.
- B. The Administration of the Facility, in cooperation with its individual department heads, supervisors, and medical staff will strive to ensure that a safe work environment is maintained at all times for students in the Facility. Work environment is composed of the physical location, equipment, materials processed or used, and the kinds of tasks performed in the course of an employee's work. In the course of a student's assignments every effort is made to minimize the probability of exposure to occupational illnesses and injuries.
- C. The Facility will provide suitable conference room facilities for post conference sessions.
- D. The Facility will provide access to the professional library. Access to medical records will be based on student assignments.
- E. The Facility will provide cooperation and intercommunication between the Facility administrative and staff personnel and the University staff.
- F. Upon appointment, the Facility will allow its clinical facilities to be visited and its personnel to be interviewed by national accreditation or review representatives(BRN and CCNE).
- G. When pre-arranged by the University the Facility will orient University staff and students.
- H. The Facility will provide an administrative contact person in implementing this Agreement, including, but not limited to, facilitating the operational aspects of clinical assignments and their scheduling. The contact person is:
- I. The Facility recognizes that the University students will receive first priority in student learning experiences and that if another institution wishes to use the Facility for learning experiences, their priority would be second. The Facility has final authority to ascertain the feasibility of adding more students to the Facility.
- J. The Facility shall, at all times, maintain accountability for the care of patients assigned to students. The Facility shall at all times ensure that its' staff is sufficient in number, quality, and stability to ensure safe and continuous service to patients and their Facility.
- K. Participation of students from the University in this instructional program shall in no way influence the Facility's staffing decisions, including the displacement of any regular paid employee of the Facility or cause the reduction of any Facility employee's hours.
- L. The students and instructors shall be permitted use of the Facility cafeteria.

- M. The Facility shall provide emergency first aid care for any student who becomes sick or injured by conditions arising out of or in the course of said student's participation in the clinical experience at the Facility. The Facility will direct the student to the appropriate health care facility for follow up care. Any costs incurred, will be the sole responsibility of the student.
- N. The Facility shall provide General Comprehensive Liability Coverage for the Facility, faculty and staff of the Facility at no less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence. The Facility shall provide Limited Professional Health Care Services Coverage for the Facility employees and agents at no less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence. Proof of the Facility insurance coverage shall be provided to the University. The Facility or its insurer shall provide written notice to the University at least twenty (20) days prior to any cancellation, termination or change in the insurance coverage referenced in this agreement. In the event that the Facility fails to maintain such insurance coverage in full force and effect during the term of this Agreement the University will terminate this agreement concurrently with such failure by the Facility.

#### V. CLINICAL EXPERIENCE – THE UNIVERSITY AND FACILITY AGREE THAT:

- 1. The schedule for the student's clinical experience at the Facility will be mutually agreed upon between the parties prior to the beginning of each clinical experience
- 2. The number of students participating in the clinical experience at the Facility shall be a minimum of ten (10) and a maximum of twelve (12). This number may be modified from time-to-time by mutual agreement upon the request of either party.
- 3. The selection of patients for student experience by the University clinical instructors shall be made in concurrence with the appropriate clinical manager of the Facility.

#### VI. SUPERVISION OF STUDENTS

Each student shall be subject to the rules, regulations, policies and procedures of the Facility and the University which are on file in the respective institutions and available to students. Students not following University and/or Facility policies may be removed from the Facility immediately.

#### VII. DISCONTINUANCE OF STUDENT ASSIGNMENTS

The University may, pursuant to its policies and procedures, discontinue the assignment of any student at any time, during the period of this agreement. The Facility reserves the right to terminate the clinical experience of any student at any time for non-discriminatory reasons.

#### VIII. STATUS OF STUDENTS AND INSTRUCTORS

- Students shall function under the direction and supervision of instructors of the University. Students may
  receive instruction from the Registered Nurse caring for the student's assigned patient. Such students and
  instructors shall not be deemed employees of the Facility for any purpose including but not limited to
  compensation for services, employee welfare and pension benefits or workers compensation insurance during
  the hours in which they are assigned to the student program.
- 2. Instructors are hired by the University and meet the University's teaching requirements and the requirements of the Board of Registered Nursing (BRN). The University shall maintain appropriate records.

3. Students will be selected for enrollment in programs through the established University process. Concordia University does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national and ethnic origin, gender, or disability in any of its policies, procedures, or practices. This includes but is not limited to admission, employment, financial aid, educational services, programs and activities.

#### IX. RELATIONSHIP

It is agreed and understood that the parties to this Agreement are independent contractors and that neither is the employee or employer of the other and the employees of one are not the employees of the other.

#### X. RESPONSIBILITY FOR OWN ACTS

Each party shall be responsible for its own acts or omissions and any and all claims, liabilities, injuries, suits, demands and expenses of all kinds that may result or arise out of any alleged malfeasance or neglect caused or alleged to have been caused by either party, their employees or representatives, in the performance or omission of any act or responsibility of either party under this Agreement. In the event that a claim is made against both parties, it is the intent of both parties to cooperate in the defense of said claim and to cause their insurers to do likewise. However, both parties shall have the right to take any and all actions they believe necessary to protect their interest, subject to mutually indemnifying and holding each other harmless for the above described acts and/or omissions.

#### XI. CONFIDENTIALTY OF HOSPITAL RECORDS AND INFORMATION

- 1. At all times during and after the term of this Agreement and any extension or renewals thereof, all business and patient records, including but not limited to medical records, all books or accounts, general administrative records and all information generated under or contained in the Facility's management information systems and all list of patients and contracts of any kind or nature shall be and remain the sole property of the Facility and shall be confidential to the fullest extent permitted by law and the University shall take all necessary precautions to prevent unauthorized disclosure of such information. Disclosure or dissemination of any such records and/or information shall only be made when expressly permitted by law, including without limitation the California Confidentiality of Medical Information Act, the Landerman-Petris-Short Act, the Privacy, Security and Transaction Standards of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability act of 1996 (HIPAA) and regulations there under, the provisions of the California Health and Safety code relating to HIV, and federal Confidentiality of Alcohol and Drug Abuse Patient the University disclose any such records or information to any other person. The University shall be responsible for maintaining confidentiality of such records and/or information and shall comply with all legal requirements in relation to the confidentiality of such information. This clause shall survive the termination this Agreement.
- 2. The Facility retains to itself alone, without exception, responsibility for all patients' records and information, whether electronic, hard copy or other media to which the University has access during the course of their business. This clause shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

#### XII. JURISDICTION

#### XIII. ASSIGNMENT

Neither party shall assign its rights, duties or obligations under this Agreement, either in whole or in part, without the prior written consent of the other party. Any such attempted assignment shall be null and void.

#### XIV. MODIFICATION

This Agreement may be modified or amended without additional consideration at any time in a written agreement signed by both parties, which specifically references this Agreement and states intent to modify it.

#### XV. ATTORNEY'S FEES

The University and Facility agree that the prevailing party in any litigation arising out of or related to this Agreement shall be entitled, in addition to any other recovery, an award of reasonable attorneys' fees and costs incurred in connection with such litigation.

#### XVI. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

The University and Facility agree that this Agreement constitutes the full and complete understanding between them, super-ceding all prior understandings, representations and agreements, and that neither party is relying on any matter not set forth herein.
