### REGULAR MEETING SANTA ANA BOARD OF EDUCATION

March 9, 2010

### CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at  $5:30~\rm p.m.$  by Board President Yamagata-Noji. Other members in attendance were Mr. Richardson, Mr. Palacio, and Mr. Reyna. Mr. Hernández arrived at  $5:45~\rm p.m.$ 

Cabinet members present were Ms. Russo, Dr. Olsky, Mr. Bishop, Mr. Lopez, Mr. Mendez, Mr. Ayala, Mr. Dixon, and Ms. Lohnes.

### PUBLIC PRESENTATIONS

Board President Yamagata-Noji asked those wishing to address the Board in matters pertaining to Closed Session to step to the podium.

Attorney Ernest Ching, Jr., stepped to the podium to address the Board regarding items on the Closed Session Agenda. Dr. Yamagata-Noji stated that the Board would consider comments by Mr. Ching in Closed Session and all Closed Session action would be announced later in the Board meeting.

### RECESS TO CLOSED SESSION

The Regular meeting recessed to Closed Session to consider student discipline issues, negotiations, public employee discipline, dismissal, confidential issues, and personnel matters.

### RECONVENE OPEN MEETING

The Regular meeting reconvened at 6:35 p.m.

### PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance led by Aris Chavez, an  $11^{\rm th}$  grade student from Saddleback High School.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S COMMENTS

Ms. Russo announced first-place winners from an Environmental Awareness contest. Students created superheroes with super powers to help conserve energy in the community. While she called up students to the podium, a slideshow played on the screens of the winning student's drawings. First place winners were Leslie Galarza, a 4<sup>th</sup> grade student at Franklin Elementary School; Ruby Soto, an 8<sup>th</sup> grade student at Carr Intermediate; and Aris Chavez, an 11<sup>th</sup> grader at Saddleback High School. Students were present and described their artwork.

As part of the "green" effort, another contest will begin soon in which schools compete for the District title of most energy efficient. Details will be sent to school sites. Winners will be announced in early June.

The Santa Ana Educators' Association (SAEA) donated five books to each school in honor of Read Across America Day, sponsored by the National Education Association. Now in its 13<sup>th</sup> year, Read Across America took place on March 2, the birthday of Dr. Seuss, to inspire kids to read. SAEA President Susan Mercer shared a few words and emphasized the importance of reading. A slideshow of Dr. Seuss' Read Across America Day logo and readings at various schools was shown.

Ms. Russo announced the Districtwide Top Five Educators of the Year recently named for 2010-11: Harvey Elementary Teacher Karla Ledon; Mendez Fundamental Intermediate Teacher Christian Miraglia; Saddleback High School Teacher Sandra Abend; Century High School Support Services/Counselor/Educator Tomas Hernández; and Orange County Classified Employee of the Year Fabiola Inda-Llamas of Lincoln Elementary School.

Fabiola will be honored by the Orange County Department of Education on April 15. For more information, please call the Public Information Office at (714) 558-5555.

A video was shown of Superintendent Russo and Board Members surprising the educators as they made announcements during their normal workday.

On Monday, March 8, Madison Elementary School Principal Marti Baker was honored as the Woman of the Year for California State Assembly District 69 for her contributions to education and the community. Nominated by Assemblyman Jose Solorio, Baker is one of 80 women selected from each of the State's Assembly districts. She was present to receive acclamations by the Board and Superintendent.

Displayed in the Board Room were Hoover Elementary School's Saint Patrick's Day art, California terrain and self-portraits; several art entries from the superheroes Energy Conservation Contest including the top three winning pieces, and Harvey Elementary School's 4<sup>th</sup> grade student's paper artwork which included stories from a fieldtrip to the San Juan Capistrano Mission.

Ms. Russo announced that the State released the persistently low Achieving Schools list on Monday, March 8. New California State legislation passed recently requires that the bottom 5% of the persistently low-achieving schools in California be identified to implement reforms for the 2010-11 school year. Three SAUSD schools including Willard Intermediate and Century and Saddleback High Schools were among the 188 persistently lowest achieving schools. SAUSD is committed to collaborating with the State Department of Education, O.C. Department of Education, SAUSD instructional leadership team, teachers' union, faculty, students, and parents to select an intervention model by June 1, 2010, to help guide school improvements. SAUSD previously began implementing requirements for transformation and turnaround, including the hiring of new principals, ongoing staff development, and the continuous use of student achievement data. Ms. Russo stated that this designation would bring additional funds to enhance academic efforts. Four intervention models below will be explored before a recommended course of action will be brought forth for Board approval.

- Turnaround Model: replace principal and up to half of instructional staff
- Transformational Model: replace principal and increase instructional time
- Restart Model: close and reopen under a charter school operator
- Closure Model: close school and enroll students in other higher achieving schools

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### DISCUSSION

### Principal Input on Santa Ana Building Healthy Communities and Promise Neighborhoods Initiative

Principals were present to provide input about two community grants, Santa Ana Building Healthy Communities and the Promise Neighborhoods Initiative. Principals were instrumental in voicing their support of both programs for school communities. Principals collaborated and came up with support systems they would like developed at their schools that included family resource centers, enrichment recreation, medical resources, job centers for parents, supervised playgrounds, transportation to services, nutrition and basic needs. Principals' Mr. Skelly, Ms. Infante, Ms. Landsiedel, and Ms. Solomon elaborated on each component.

The Building Healthy Communities is a 10-year plan designed to improve physical, social, and economic services that support healthy living and healthy behaviors in California to a targeted area of the City. There are over 700 stakeholders in the Santa Ana Building Healthy Communities Initiative that consists of residents, youth, and approximately 40 organizations. The plan must be submitted by May 15, 2010.

Promise Neighborhoods Initiative, is a \$210 million competitive federal grant. It is a new major community-focused initiative to improve academic achievement and life outcomes in high-poverty areas. The program aims to improve college-going rates by combining a rigorous prenatal to college education with supportive services from early childhood education to afterschool activities to college counseling. The goal is for each grantee to attain a dramatic increase in the number of students who successfully enter college.

Board members provided input and asked staff to share details with the Board before submission. And, asked that the Board be invited to planning meetings.

### PRESENTATIONS

### Garfield Elementary School Modernization Update

Mr. Dixon provided an update on the proposed Garfield Elementary School modernization. Before the Board was the conceptual plan. The plan shows the school with a new community development on the north end of the school. Mr. Cordoza of NTD Architecture, outlined the plan. Discussion ensued regarding the relocation of the parking lot and drop-off zone, the removal of portables, the new two-story classroom building, ramp way, green space, and the proposed joint-use community center. The Board provided suggestions and asked staff to bring updates regularly to the Board. A Board member asked if the plan allows for the projected increase in student enrollment. Furthermore, the Board advised Mr. Dixon to take precaution with Fourth Street traffic and its exposure to students. The Board expressed interest in attending school community meetings.

### Taft Elementary School Proposed Modernization Plan and Solar Project

Mr. Dixon presented information on the modernization and proposed solar project at Taft Elementary School. In February 2009, the Board approved a pre-approved list for energy savings services including solar photovoltaic electric generating systems. On May 12, 2009, Administration provided a brief overview of the Energy Conservation program efforts for the proposed solar photovoltaic projects to the Board of Education.

Mr. Dixon then reviewed the scope of work which includes interior and exterior upgrades such as a lunch shelter, energy efficient fixtures, new solar canopy and trellis with energy photovoltaic panels. Modernizations would be funded using State School Facilities at 60% and Measure G at 40%. Lighting upgrades would be funded by modernization funds and the photovoltaic panels funded by Measure G, with a return investment of nine (9) years. The first year estimated energy savings due to photovoltaic panels is \$39,245. The estimated first year savings for light fixtures is \$21,451. Mr. Guillermo Aguilar with gkkworks and Tomas Philp with Borrego Energy, provided additional information on the extent of the modernization and energy project.

Mr. Dixon stated that a special study session was necessary to bring the entire extensive plan as well as a facilities master plan of schools.

### PUBLIC HEARING

### Assembly Bill 602 Annual Budget and Service Plans for School Year 2009-10

Dr. Yamagata-Noji declared the meeting open to conduct a Public Hearing to receive comments regarding Assembly Bill 602 Annual Budget and Service Plans for school year 2009-10. Anyone wishing to address the trustees on this topic was invited to step to the podium.

Hearing no comment, the Public Hearing was closed.

### PUBLIC PRESENTATIONS

President Yamagata-Noji asked those members of the community who wished to address the Board to step forward as she called their names.

Peter Boyd, SAUSD teacher, addressed the Board regarding concerns about 8-Period Day. He said that he was speaking on behalf of MacArthur Fundamental staff members. And after studying the 8-Period day, they recommend maintaining MacArthur's current program.

Gloria Montiel, former SAUSD and Harvard University student, addressed the Board to thank Dr. Yamagata-Noji for her advice in the resubmission of an application to Harvard Graduate School of Education. She was accepted after initially declining her application.

Yolanda Ochoa, Jason Ochoa, and Yesireth Solis (parent and 2 students) addressed the Board regarding concerns about the entrance wait list at Villa Fundamental School.

### 11.0 APPROVAL OF AGREEMENT BETWEEN SCHOOL INNOVATIONS & ADVOCACY AND SAUSD FOR ATTENTION2ATTENDANCE SERVICES

Mr. Kevin Gordon, President and Mr. Jeff Owen, Executive Director of School Innovations & Advocacy, provided information regarding the Attention2Attendance (A2A) program. It is a comprehensive approach to managing attendance, combining professional development, attendance data analysis and consulting with two web-based management tools. The benefits includes, increased attendance intervention for effective student achievement, and maximized Average Daily Attendance (ADA) revenue.

Mr. Gordon stated that the service and efficiencies provided by the attendance team is unparalleled and helps educational leaders close the achievement gap by identifying and addressing the most at-risk students through attendance data. Services include the monitoring of attendance on a weekly basis, guides analysis and trend tracking, reports to the District leadership on an ongoing basis, and sends letters to parent's home regularly. It was noted by the Board, if A2A does not enhance ADA revenue, the District would discontinue the program.

It was moved by Mr. Richardson, seconded by Mr. Palacio, and carried 5-0, to approve the agreement between School Innovations & Advocacy and SAUSD for Attention2Attendance Services.

### 16.0 APPROVAL OF FIRST AMENDMENT TO JOINT-USE AGREEMENT BETWEEN SANTA ANA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AND YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION OF ORANGE COUNTY

On April 9, 2009, the Board approved the joint maintenance and operation agreement and the aquatic facilities schedule agreement with the YMCA. On February 2010, the Board approved the agreement for the design and construction of the Segerstrom High School aquatics center. This agenda will grant the YMCA a thirty-year license to use the property for the same thirty-year time period and will be structured as the first amendment to the Joint Operations and Maintenance agreement.

It was moved by Mr. Richardson, seconded by Mr. Palacio, and carried 4-0, Mr. Reyna not present, to approve the First Amendment to the Joint-Use Agreement and Covenant by and between Santa Ana Unified School District and the Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA) of Orange County.

It was moved by Mr. Palacio, seconded by Mr. Reyna, and carried 5-0, to approve the submission of California Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program Grant reapplication K-5 for 2010-11 school year.

7.0 APPROVAL OF SUBMISSION OF RENEWAL APPLICATION FOR HEAD START FUNDING FOR 2010-11 PROGRAM YEAR

It was moved by Mr. Hernández, seconded by Mr. Reyna, and carried 5-0, to approve submission of renewal application for Head Start funding for the 2010-11 program year.

8.0 AUTHORIZATION TO RENEW CONTRACTS FOR PURCHASE OF INSTRUCTIONAL SUPPLIES FOR WAREHOUSE STOCK

It was moved by Mr. Richardson, seconded by Dr. Yamagata-Noji, and carried 5-0, to authorize the renewal of contracts for the purchase of instructional supplies for warehouse stock in the amount of \$478,182 pursuant to Bid no. #12-08.

9.0 APPROVAL OF 2009-10 SECOND INTERIM REPORT - CERTIFICATION OF FINANCIAL STATUS "QUALIFIED" - JANUARY 31, 2010

Education Code Section 42130 requires that certification by the governing board be submitted twice annually confirming financial stability. The District's second period interim report as of January 31, 2010, satisfies the reporting period. The SAUSD staff recommends the submission of a "qualified" certification. It also indicates that the District will continue to struggle financially through June 30, 2012, and will continue with an abundance of caution.

A PowerPoint was presented which included an overview of California's State budget crisis overview, Second-Interim report, and cash flow considerations. Mr. Bishop stated that there have been no changes since the Governor's January proposed budget, although there is some new information. The State budget gap is \$19.9 billion. The Governor proposes to lower the minimum funding guarantee for schools from \$49.1 billion to \$46.8 billion. Mr. Bishop stated that the State budget assumptions are uncertain. California unemployment remains high with a long road to economic recovery, which appears to be perhaps until the 2014-15 school year. He provided a summary and recommendations from the Orange County Department of Education, includes the following:

- Fiscal/budget crisis was not created by the District, but by Worldwide recession, California Budget situation, and declining enrollment
- Establish reserves levels higher than State recommended minimums
- Conservative cash management monitor cash flows
- Budget and plan for the most flexibility

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Mr. Bishop stated that at this time there probably would be no mid-year cuts to SAUSD. He then called upon Mr. Tsunezumi to review the Second Interim Report.

Mr. Tsunezumi reviewed second interim revenue assumptions, expenditures, and 2010-11 budget cuts (totaling \$34 million,) and multi-year projections with regard to TRANs. He stated that the District successfully closed on its \$9 million TRANs on March 3, 2010 and funds have been deposited and are available if needed for cash flow purposes. He said that continuing deferrals plus new deferrals totals \$170 million, with a potential interest income loss of \$495,000. Mr. Bishop and Mr. Tsunezumi then addressed several questions from the Board.

It was moved by Mr. Hernández, seconded by Mr. Richardson, and carried 5-0, to certify the District may not be able to meet its financial obligations through the remainder of this fiscal year and for the subsequent two fiscal years.

### 14.0 AUTHORIZATION TO OBTAIN BIDS FOR EMERGENCY REPAIR PROGRAM PROJECTS

It was moved by Mr. Richardson, seconded by Mr. Palacio, and carried 5-0, to authorize the obtaining of bids for the construction of projects at Fremont, Garfield, Hoover, Jackson, Monte Vista, Wilson, elementary schools and Santa Ana High School.

### 15.0 AUTHORIZATION TO USE CRITICALLY OVERCROWDED SCHOOL (COS) PROGRAM SAVINGS ON SCHOOL SITES

Mr. Dixon presented information on the COS program relative to SAUSD school sites. He stated that project savings could be used on other high priority capital facility projects as deemed necessary by the Board of Education. Projects must be new construction at sites not currently eligible for state school facility program funding. He stated that Mitchell Child Development Center has never received prior state funding nor is it currently eligible, therefore in greatest need of facility improvement. The Board has asked Mr. Dixon to bring a plan for the child development center as the Board agrees it is important to discuss a potential project for that site.

It was moved by Mr. Richardson, seconded by Mr. Reyna, and carried 5-0, to authorize the use of COS Program savings on Garfield, King, Pio Pico elementary school and Mitchell Child Development Center.

### Mr. Richardson:

- He echoed Mr. Palacio about the re-dedication of plaques. He thanked the donors for their contributions. And requested at a future Board meeting to recognize Peggie Pierson, Glenda Newcomer, Bobby Rooker, and Doug Dyer for their contributions. He noted when SAUSD alumni do remarkable things within the district and should be recognized as well.
- He, Ms. Russo, and Mr. Reyna attended a breakfast and tour at El Sol Charter School earlier last Friday that was very nice.

### Mr. Reyna:

- Mr. Reyna commented on the Santa Ana Plaque dedication. To have the number of Santa Ana High School alumni present on that day was amazing. There was an alumnus from 1943, noting, "once a Saint always a Saint."
- He visited Remington Elementary. Kindergarteners celebrated Read Across America in a different way. They learned 100 words in 100 days with their star student learning 140 words. Kudos to them all!

- He asked the community to participate in the Census. It is vital that households count every person. He requested that schools promote information on school marquees. Ten years ago, only 76% of the Santa Ana population were counted which translated into a loss of \$200 million annually for Santa Ana for 10 years or \$2 billion totally.
- Ruby Soto, Intermediate School Student, did a terrific job in her artwork. She said, "she wants to build a better world."

### Dr. Yamagata-Noji:

- Dr. Yamagata-Noji said that the Santa Ana Educators' Association donated books for the Read Across America week. One book is <u>Farewell</u> to <u>Manzanar and Related Readings</u>, by McDougal Littell. She said that it is an outstanding book and one everyone should read. It teaches about social justice and history.
- Dr. Yamagata-Noji said that AB 37 authored by Assembly member Furutani, calls for honorary diplomas to be granted to Japanese Americans who were removed from independent colleges and universities during World War II. She asked staff to possibly outreach. Dr. Noji has curriculum teaching about camps perhaps in Secondary levels.
