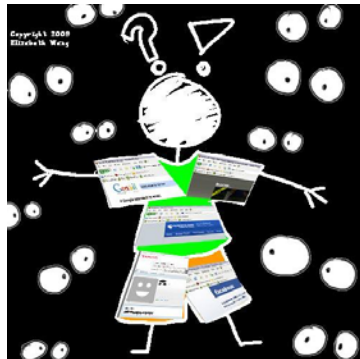
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## State & Federal Requirements

State Assembly Bill 307 and Federal Senate Bill 1492 require schools to educate students and staff in Internet safety and the ethical and appropriate use of information.

To fulfill these requirements, SAUSD's Education Technology and Instructional Media Services Department provides lesson materials to educate pupils and teachers on Internet safety, plagiarism, copyright, the implications of illegal peer-to-peer network file sharing, social networking, and cyber bullying.

The materials are provided for SAUSD classroom teachers to use during Cyber Savvy Week. Teachers will spend 10-15 minutes delivering information to students on the topic for that day.

## Online Safety Tips for Parents

- Keep your child's computer in an open area of the house.
- Install filtering software or choose child-friendly search engines.
- Be cautious about giving private or personal identifying information.
- Use anti-virus software and make sure it updates regularly.
- Never give out personal information online to someone you do not know.
- Never meet in person with someone your first met online.
- Do not respond to offensive or dangerous email.
- Tell your child not to open attachments from unknown sources or respond to pop-ups on your computer.
- Visit the Web sites your child visits.
- Teach your child to be a responsible cyber citizen.
