COLLEGE FRESHMAN NEXT STEPS



There are several tasks you should have completed or need to complete.

- Login to your college portal, 2) check the admission decisions for each school you applied to,
 check your "To Do List" and submit requested documents, and 4) make a decision.
- Every college has a PORTAL, similar to our AERIES, where you will find all you need.
- The admission decision from the four-year university should be listed on your college PORTAL or you may have received a letter from them. Community Colleges send you an email with next steps to Enrollment.
- On your PORTAL you will find your financial aid award. This shows you how much you will receive from that particular school. Grants, scholarships, Work Study, student and parent loans are listed here. The amount is only for the 2020-21 school year.
- If you were offered admission, you must decide which school you will say "yes" to. Before you respond to the colleges, you need to compare each school to identify the school that is best for you.
 - Comparing your top three choices can be simplified using the following website. https://bigfuture.collegeboard.org/compare-colleges
 - Add your top three choices, and see which college has the most to offer you. The information you will see is the school's location, type of school, campus life, admission, and cost & aid. All of these will play a big role in your future at the university of your choice.

On or before May 1, you will need to go to your portal and let the college know about your decision. Keep in mind that you need to check your "to do list" on a regular basis. Failure to do so can affect your admissions decision. Additional documents may be requested through your "To Do List". Remember, if you have any questions, contact your counselor or Higher Education Coordinator.

What does being Selected for Financial Aid Verification Mean?



Don't worry, many students are selected for verification at random.

Verification notification will usually be on your TO DO LIST (This is located in college portal).

Verification will usually require confirmation of parents' and/or student's adjusted gross income.

Additional forms may be requested from different institutions.

EASY WAY TO LINK/REQUEST tax transcript:

- 1. Request a RETURNED tax transcript online (using parent SSN or Tax ID) on <u>irs.gov</u> OR
- 2. Link tax transcript on your FAFSA (only if you parents have a social security number, NOT A TAX ID).

Applying is faster and easier if you transfer your tax return information into this FAFSA with the IRS Data Retrieval Tool (IRS DRT)!



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Items to remember:

Cost of Attendance includes items such as Tuition & Fees which are non-negotiable. But it also includes items such as:

- housing
- meal plans
- personal expenses
- books
- transportation

These are items you have the ability to manipulate in terms of how much you choose to spend in each category.

Therefore, your Estimated Cost of Attendance is typically higher than what you are going to spend out of pocket per year. If you are hoping to live on campus, you have the ability to choose your campus housing option.

You can lower your costs by:

- looking at the cost of a triple or even quad dorm option
- select a different meal plan
- if you have your own health insurance* plan, you can remove that cost from your overall cost of attendance.

*If you do not have health insurance, you will need to purchase a policy as a student attending that institution.

The financial aid offices at the 4-year colleges/ universities are working to put together your financial aid award letter. Remember, financial aid is broken into four different categories: grants, loans, work study, and scholarships. To simplify the way an award letter looks, the U.S. Department of Education has created a template for colleges to use. This format was called the "Financial Aid Shopping Sheet" but has been renamed as the "College Financing Plan." Here is an example of the College Financing Plan that you might see within your financial aid portal.

WHERE DO I FIND MY FINANCIAL AWARD LETTER?

The University of California System (UC) typically releases this information with acceptances and will post information in your student portal about how to access it. You may need to make a separate financial aid portal in order to access this information. Each UC facilitates this differently.

For example, UC Irvine notifies students within their <u>UC Irvine Applicant portal</u>, How to make a UC Irvine Financial Aid portal known as "<u>My Aid</u>" within the UC Irvine Financial Aid and Scholarships website.

UC Berkeley financial aid is found within a website called CalCentral. Most applicants are given a student portal that then has a link to the <u>CalCentral website</u>.

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The Cal State University System (CSU) runs their financial aid a little differently.

Their information is embedded within your student portal for that school. Each campus calls their student portal something different.

We know that Cal Poly Pomona is MyCPP. Whereas CSU San Bernardino is MyCoyote. At Cal State Fullerton, the information is within your student Titan portal under an area called the "Student Center". Other campuses will also have their information in the Student Center, it just depends on where that is located within your student portal.

For now, we know that **most Cal States will be getting financial aid awards out to students by mid-April.** Cal State Fullerton has plans to get their financial aid award letters out by April 17. Cal Poly Pomona indicated they would have their financial aid award letters out by the first week of April.

FINANCIAL AID AT COMMUNITY COLLEGES

Most community colleges will make financial award letters available in June but you may be able to see if any documents are needed to determine your financial need. Check your community college student portal and look for the financial aid link. Here is a breakdown of Cost of Attendance at a community college.

Tuition	\$300.00 per unit	\$7,200.
Enrollment Fee	\$46.00 per unit (24 units per year)	\$1,104.
Books and Supplies	12 month period (Estimate)	\$800.
Health Center Fee	\$19.00 per semester	\$38.
Student Health Insurance	12 month period (Estimate)	\$1,626.
SAC College Activities Fee	\$12.50 per semester (Optional)	\$25.
International Student Services Fee	\$50.00 per semester	\$100.
Parking Fee	\$30.00 per semester (Optional)	\$60.
Personal Living Expenses	Estimate	\$12,000.

Remember, most community colleges waive the tuition costs, as long as you graduate from high school and submit your FAFSA or CalDream Act application.

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AP exams format has changed for the Spring 2020 assessment season. Please make sure that you are connecting with your AP instructor(s) about your device capabilities and course materials.

Your AP teachers have met with the District Officials and also within each school site to make sure they are posting information about the AP exams electronically.

Exams will be 45 minute, online free-response questions. The exam will cover 75% of the material from the course. April 3, 2020, the College Board will update their website as to the dates the exams will be offered. There will be two test dates available. It is unknown at the moment if a student can take exams on two different dates, or if they must take all their exams on the same date that they select.

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





Do you want to apply to the Community College?

- Go online to <u>cccapply.org</u>
- **CLICK** on the community college you wish to apply to and select **APPLY**.
- You will be taken to the community college website where you will CLICK on APPLY.
- You will be taken to "Application to College" where you will first need to CREATE your OPENCCC Account, unless you have one already.
 - (If you have a Social Security Number or an ITN number have it ready or decline to provide at this time. It's best to include this information if you have it. Also, use your **PERSONAL EMAIL** in the application.)
- Once you create the OPENCCC account, you
 will CLICK on START APPLICATION and make
 sure you apply for the FALL
 2020. (Remember, think future! All the
 information you report has to be inputted as a
 high school graduate, because by the time you
 start college, you will have graduated from
 high school.)

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What are the steps to successfully enroll at MY **Community College of choice?**

1. **Apply online** to the Community College you wish to attend.



- 2. Complete the **Online Orientation** (When applying to the college, they will send you a link to your email. Follow the link to complete this and other necessary steps.)
- 3. Create a **Student Education Plan** (You can set-up an appointment with a counselor to create an education plan to select classes. This can be done through virtual conferences due to the Coronavirus (COVID-19), depending on the community college. Check your emails for more information.)
- 4. Register for classes. (Check emails and find out when your online Registration date will be. This means you will be selecting classes from home. If you plan to work while in school, then you need to keep this in mind for when you select class times and days.)

The steps that have been shared in the last two pages can be applicable to any community college. If you have questions, contact the community college representative directly.
