In the midst of all of the sad news we have received in the last few weeks, I wanted to share some really great news with you. Your hard work is paying off! The overall academic performance improved last year as indicated on many of the academic and social emotional measures just released by the state. Although we have a long way to go, we have made significant progress. Last week the California Department of Education unveiled their new Dashboard. Based on the SBAC data just released we have moved up quite a bit from where we were two years ago. The 2014-15 baseline SBAC data indicated we were dead last in the county and in our District. Our SBAAC performance for last year indicates we have surpassed Lathrop, Sierra, Spurgeon and Willard. We are on the heels of McFadden and several other District schools. The best part of all of this is that when you look at the data, we had strong gains across all subgroups, especially students with disabilities.

As you can see, our students had significant improvement in both English Language Arts and in Mathematics. We can see that the work we do on a daily basis does make an impact in the big picture of how our students are doing. I think that our staff embracing the programs that we put into place last year has absolutely contributed to these improvements. Many of you used Google Classroom, Actively Learn, Kahoot and Slides to help our students to enrich their learning using the 1:1 Chromebooks. We are continuing to help our students to be successful by meeting them where they are. There are two curricula, REWARDS and System 44, available to students based on their ELA level. Additionally, there are Khan Academy/NWEA materials which show RIT to Content. I believe that this year with the strong leadership of our ILT, their intent for us to focus on literacy, an increased awareness of our students' skills and limitations, we will be even more effective in helping our students to reach level 3 proficiency. This means that they will be on track to demonstrate the knowledge and skills necessary for college and career readiness. I don't want to jinx it, but based on our strong performance on the MAP test in Math and ELA, we are going to kick some butt next year. Fundamentals need to watch out for Carr, here we come.

Ms. Solares's Mariachi Club



What is St. Baldrick's? And why did it come to Carr Intermediate?

The St. Baldrick's Foundation is a volunteer-powered organization that funds pediatric oncology research by asking the simple question, "How much money would you donate to help kids with cancer if I shaved my head in solidarity?"

Everybody knows someone who has had cancer. Mrs. Lathus became active in the cancer community after her mother passed away after a 7-month battle with Acute Myelogenous Leukemia in 2002. Mrs. Lathus' son was just three months old. She was teaching at Wilson Elementary at the time and began walking marathons to raise funds to fund cures for blood-related cancers.

Mrs. Lathus learned of St. Baldrick's through her network so when a friend challenged her to grow her hair out to donate to Locks of Love, she considered shaving her head with St. Baldrick's and being able to donate her hair sooner than if she simply got a haircut.

By this time, she was teaching at Carr, and she approached Mr. Patrick (the principal at the time) with the question "How would you feel about a female teacher walking around campus bald?" She explained what she wanted to do, intending to fly to Denver to join another team for the shave.

Mr. Patrick looked up the St. Baldrick's Foundation and when he discovered that there were no Events scheduled in the area, he said, "Why don't you go ahead and set up an event here at Carr? I'll even shave my head with you!"

And so it began. On June 4, 2010, Mrs. Lathus (who was Ms. Hefner at the time), Mr. Patrick, and nine students shaved their heads at lunch. The students were mostly sixth graders, including one girl who would be moving away at the end of the school year. They came short of their \$5000 goal, but managed to raise \$3456 that year. They sent three ponytails to Pantene Beautiful Lengths that year.

Every year since then, the event has grown and we have raised even more money to fund childhood cancer research.

In 2013, the Carr event became even more personal. An 8th grade student, Fernando Gallegos, had been diagnosed with Ewing Sarcoma in August, 2012. His lower leg was amputated the following month. Since then, Carr's St. Baldrick's event has been dedicated to him. We have had two more childhood cancer survivors on our campus since then.

This year, our goal is to raise \$10,000 to fund childhood cancer research. Several teachers and students are registered to shave on March 28. https://www.stbaldricks.org/events/carr2017

Mr. DeSantiago will join the League of Extraordinary Heroes this year, when he becomes a Squire, signifying his third fundraising shave. He joins Ms. Wedekind and Mr. Brincks, who will be shaving for the fifth time this year.
